CONTRACT FOR THE SUPPLY OF GRAIN, &c.

Persons desirous of entering into a Contract for the supply of such Grain, &c., as may be required by the Commissariat Department at the Presidency for the term of one year from the date of the acceptance of the Tender may, on application at this Office, from 11 A.M. till 5 P.M. daily (Sundays excepted), obtain Copies of the Schedule, or List of Prices, and such information relating thereto as they may require.

2. No person will be allowed to tender for the Contract, unless he deposit in this Office, in cash, the sum of Rupees (6,000) six thousand, which will be forfeited in the event of withdrawal of his Tender, before the Commissary General or other authorised person in that behalf, shall have signified to him, by a notice in writing, his refusal to accept such Tender, or in the event of delay, evasion, or refusal, on his part, to furnish the requisite further Security, and execute the Deed of Contract, when required to do so on his Tender being accepted.

3. The further security required is Bonded Security to the amount of Rupees (24,000) Twenty-four thousand, subject to the approval of the Government Solicitor; and this, together with the amount previously deposited, will be held as a guarantee for the due fulfilment of the Contract.

4. Sealed Tenders for the Contract will be received at this Office on Wednesday the 20th proximo, at 1 o'clock precisely. Tenders must specify a percentage above or below the prices exhibited in the above List, at which the supply will be made.

5. The articles supplied must be of unexceptionable quality, and according to Musters, which may be seen in this Office, or of the exact kind, quality and description demanded, and are to be delivered in the first instance, at the Commissariat Stores, if required, and afterwards to the Indenting Departments, in good condition, free of all charges beyond the stipulated price, in such quantities as may, from time to time, be demanded, being liable to examination and rejection by the Executive Commissariat Officer, or by the Indenting or Receiving Officers, or by a Committee of Officers appointed, on the part of Government, in the event of the Contractor being dissatisfied with the decision of the above Officers, or either of them.

6. It is to be clearly understood, that such of the articles specified in the Schedule as form part of the rations for European Soldiers or Hospital diet, are to be supplied under the rules laid down in G. G. O. No. 613 of the 10th October 1853, and No. 33 of the 11th January 1854, copies of which may be seen at this Office.

7. In case the said articles, or any of them, shall be rejected by the Committee so appointed, the said Committee shall not be required to assign or give any reason for such rejection, but the decision of such Committee shall be final and conclusive; and it shall not be competent to the Contractor, his Heirs, Executors, or Administrators, to question such decision in any Court of Law or Equity, or otherwise howsoever.

8. The Contractor must comply immediately with emergent demands, and meet others of less urgency, within the periods stated in the Requisitions made upon him; in failure whereof, or if any supply be condemned by a Committee as aforesaid, the articles, or such others as may be required in lieu thereof, may be at once purchased by this Department, at his risk and cost; and in all such cases, Thirty (30) per cent. upon the amount of expenses incurred, or a fine not exceeding Rupees (500) Five hundred, at the option of the Executive Commissariat Officer, shall be levied as liquidated damages for each and every such breach of Contract; the condemnation of any article by a Committee being held to constitute a breach of Contract, whether the rejected articles be replaced by the Contractor or by this Department. In every such case, the Contract may be cancelled, at the discretion of the Commissary General; and if it be so cancelled, the Cash deposits, mentioned in paragraph 2 of this Notice, will be forfeited to Government.

9. Any delay, negligence, evasion, or refusal on the part of a Contractor to make supplies or obey orders, or any attempt on his part, or that of his Agents, to pass off articles of an inferior quality in lieu of those he is bound to supply, or any neglect to deliver them at the time and place appointed, will subject

him to be fined to the extent of Rupees Twenty-five (25), by the Executive Commissariat Officer; an appeal from his order may be made to the Commissary General, whose decision is to be final; but when any of the penalties provided for in the preceding clause are exacted, no further penalty shall be leviable under this clause.

10. Any party whose Tender is accepted, must produce Sureties, such as shall meet the approval of the Government Solicitor, within Fifteen days from the date of the acceptance of his Tender, or the Contract will be re-sold, and the amount deposited by the Tenderer forfeited to Government. No reason will be stated for rejecting any Security offered.

11. Bills for articles supplied under this Contract must be preferred for examination within one month from the date of delivery of the same, or the Contractor will forfeit their full value, unless it clearly appear, to the satisfaction of the Commissary General, that the delay was unavoidable. Payment of Bills passed in this Office must be claimed within five days after they are passed, or the amount will be forfeited to Government.

12. The amount of retrenchments made by the auditing authorities on the Contractor's Bills, will be recovered from the first sum payable to him; but in the event of such retrenchments, or any portion thereof, being remitted, the amount remitted will be refunded.

13. Any party who, after tendering for the Contract, fails to furnish the necessary Security, as provided for in Clauses 3 and 10 of this Notice, will be interdicted from tendering on future occasions, unless he produces a document, from some person or persons, of unexceptionable character and sufficient means, guaranteeing the due finding of the requisite Security and execution by him of the Deed of Contract on his Tender being accepted.

14. Persons intending to tender may, on application, see a statement of the actual annual consumption during the past years; but it is to be distinctly understood that supplies must be furnished to any extent required, without reference to such former consumption.

15. No reason will be assigned for the rejection of any Tender.

16. Tenders should be superscribed "Tender for the supply of Grain, &c."

TENDERS FOR PRIVILEGE OF SELLING LIQUOR.

Notice is hereby given, that the Contract for the exclusive privilege of selling to Natives (excepting as specified in the Europe Shopkeepers' Licences, viz. "Article 13, Standing Passes will be granted by the Superintendent of Bazaars, to any Natives of known respectability of position and character, such as Native Judges and Magistrates, Native Commissioned Officers of the Army and Police, Merchants of the Camp and City, Writers and Clerks employed in Government Offices, drawing salaries of Rupees (50) Fifty per mensem and upwards") Arrack, Country, Liquor, Toddy, Europe and Foreign Spirits, to the Troops and Camp Followers of the Poona and Kirkee Cantonments, will be put up to Public Auction at the Bazar Flag-Staff, on the 1st April 1861, at 12 o'clock (noon), for one year, commencing from 1st May 1861 to 30th April 1862.

2. The Native Troops and Followers at present composing the Brigade are as follows :—

3. But the Contracts will be sold for the actual number of Troops and their authorised Followers that may be present on the day of sale, which will be duly notified to the bidders at the time; and the amount of the monthly payment shall not be increased or decreased on account of Troops and their authorised Followers arriving at, or departing from the Cantonment, unless the strength of such details of Troops and their authorised Followers for whom the Contract has been entered into; and that the amount to be paid by, or remitted to the Contractor will be determined in reference to the proportion that the number of Troops and their authorised Followers, increased or diminished beyond one-fourth of their number specified in the Contract, bears to the whole number of Troops and their authorised Followers and Camp Inhabitants therein specified.

4. It is, however, to be distinctly understood, that any alteration in the number of Camp Inhabitants will not entitle the Contractor to claim any remission in the payment of the stipulated monthly amount of his engagement.

5. Each bidder, or person tendering for the Liquor Contract, must deposit the sum of Rupees (6,000) Six thousand, which sums will be forfeited in the event of delay, evasion, or refusal, on the part of the parties concerned, to execute the necessary agreement, should their offer be accepted.

6. Each bidder for the Contract will be required to produce a Certificate from two individuals of unexceptional character, that they will stand security for him in the event of his offer being accepted.

7. The Articles of Agreement to be entered into by the Contractor may be seen, and all further particulars may be learnt, on application at the Office of the Superintendent of Bazaars any day between the hours of 10 A.M. and 4 P.M., Sundays excepted.

8. The party whose Tender for the Liquor Contract may be accepted will be required to bind himself to defray the expenses of maintaining a Preventive Police, where and whenever it may be found necessary by the Officer Commanding the Station, for preventing the clandestine sale of Spirits to European Troops.

9. The Distillery at Moondwa will be made over to the Contractor, at the valuation of a Committee of European Officers, should a new Contractor take the Contract and fail to agree with the present owner as to the terms of transfer.

10. No Liquor will be allowed to be taken away from the "Kullall's" Shop, except under written permission.

11. Twenty-three (23) Shops are allowed for the Sudder Bazar, and one in each Regimental Bazar, if not objected to by the Commanding Officers.

12. All Shops to be closed at 9 P.M., and no extra hours allowed.

13. The Contractor will be allowed no drawback on account of scarcity, drought, &c.: and the Contract will not be considered binding till confirmed by the Quartermaster General of the Army.

14. The Foreign Spirit Licences for Hotel-keepers and Travellers' Bungalows are to be granted under the conditions and in the manner directed in Government Resolution, dated 15th September 1858, No. 6345, to the address of the Adjutant General of the Army, viz. the Licences, in the first instance, being granted by the Liquor and Toddy Contractor, subject to the approval of the Collector. The Europe and Foreign Spirit Licences in the Cantonment are granted, as heretofore, by the Superintendent of Bazaars, subject to the confirmation of the Brigadier; and at present there are Thirty-two (32) Licensed Shopkeepers.

15. No reason will be assigned for the rejection of any offer.

16. Four (4) Shops will be allowed for the city of Poona, the Licence for holding which will be sold separately by the Collector of Poona on or about the 2nd April next, the conditions of which may be learned on application at the Office of the Superintendent of Bazaars and Collector of Poona.

TRANSPORT TRAIN BETWEEN WASSIND AND INDORE.

The Government Bullock Transport Train between Wassind and Indore having been thrown open to the Public, the following Rules and Regulations are published for general information:—

1st. There are Fifty-four Stages between Wassind and Indore, six miles apart : the Cattle will be relieved at every Stage.

2nd. There are three descriptions of Carriages:—

1st Class or Spring Carts for Passengers.

2nd „ Muster Carts „ do.

3rd „ Country Carts „ do. and Goods.

3rd. Of these, until further notice, twenty Carts will be available for Passengers and Goods daily.

4th. Tickets for passages &c. upwards from Wassind will be granted at the Head Quarter Office, Bombay, and downwards at Indore, Mhow, and intermediate Stations, by the Assistant Director or Inspectors on the Line.

5th. The Halting Stations between Wassind and Indore are as follows:—

PASSENGER TRAIN.

1st. The Train will start at 3 p. m. daily from each end of the Line, and also from each Halting Station, at the same hour, except on Sundays, when Passengers will not be received unless in cases of emergency. This is not applicable to Passengers wishing to travel through without halting; but whenever halts are made, the above hour for starting must be conformed to; if voluntary halts be made at any Station beyond 24 hours, demurrage will be charged at the rate of two Rupees per every hour in excess of that time.

2nd. Twenty pounds of Luggage will be allowed free of charge to Passengers travelling by spring cart, and ten pounds per muster cart. A spring cart will carry two adults, and a muster and country cart, four.

3rd. All Luggage in excess of the above weight must be paid for, and will be sent with the Travellers on country carts at the Train rates of hire; 500 pounds in weight are allowed to each cart in the fair weather, and 400 pounds in the monsoon.

4th. All fares for Passengers and excess Luggage must be prepaid.

5th. Tickets must be shown or given up by Passengers to the Subordinates of the Train, at the Halting Stations on demand. Any Passenger refusing to comply will have to pay the fare from the Terminus in rear to his destination, and will be prevented from proceeding further by the Train, unless the prescribed amount is at once paid or arranged for.

6th. Passengers are on no account whatever to ill-treat the Cattle, Drivers, or Subordinates of the Train. Should any person employed in the Department evince a want of proper civility, or cause unnecessary inconvenience, the same should be reported to the Director at Bombay, or to the Assistant Director at Mhow, detailing all particulars, with the names of the Drivers, Stations, Dates, &c.

7th. Passengers are earnestly requested to conform strictly to the above Rules, as infringements of them not only disturb the arrangements of the Department and interrupt the working of the Train, but may cause considerable inconvenience to themselves.

GOODS TRAIN.

1st. The Train will start from Wassind and intermediate Halting Stations downwards at 3 p. m. daily, and upwards to Bombay from Indore, Mhow, and other Halting Stations at 9 a. m.

2nd. Until arrangements are made for receiving Goods in Bombay, Consignees must forward them by Railway at their own cost to Wassind,—but Tickets for Goods must be obtained and paid for at the Head Quarter Office, Bombay. These Tickets should be enclosed or presented to the Inspector of the Transport Train at Wassind, who will, on receipt of the Goods from Bombay by Railway, forward them to their respective destinations.

3rd. Goods, including Opium, intended for despatch upward, will in like manner be forwarded from Indore, Mhow, and all the principal intermediate Stations.

4th. Goods Trains will necessarily travel at a slower rate than Passenger Trains, and be subject to greater detention at the Halting Stations, for examination and such repairs to carts as may be found necessary.

5th. One spare cart will be allowed to every ten engaged for Opium and other Goods, for the accommodation of the Escort in charge, and to prevent delay in cases of accident.
