No. 1985.—In exercise of the powers conferred by Section 18A (2) of the Bombay A'bkári Act, 1878, as amended by the Bombay A'bkári Act Amendment Act, 1892, His Excellency the Governor in Council is pleased to notify that "the prescribed area" referred to in the said section shall include the whole of the revenue district of Thána and the tálukas of Panvel (including Uran Petha), Karjat (including the Khálápur Petha) and Pen (including the Nágothna Petha) of the revenue district of Kolába.

No. 1985A.—In exercise of the power conferred by Section 6 of the Bombay A'bkári Act, 1878, His Excellency the Governor in Council is pleased to invest the following officers with the power, to the extent hereinafter mentioned, of issuing permits and passes under Section 18A (1) of the said Act, for the possession or transport of mhowra flowers exceeding in weight four seers, within the area prescribed under clause (2) of the said section by Notification No. 1985 dated this day:—

No. 1985B.—In exercise of the powers conferred by Section 30 of the Bombay A'bkári Act, 1878, the Governor in Council is pleased to direct—

(1) that permits for the collection, transport, possession and sale, passes for the transport, licenses for the possession and sale, and permits for the possession of mhowra flowers shall respectively be in the Forms H to K hereto annexed, and contain the particulars, and be granted subject to the restrictions and conditions therein respectively set forth;

(2) that licenses in Form J shall be granted for a period of one year commencing on the 1st August in one year and ending on the 31st July of the following year; that permits in Forms H and K shall be granted for such period not exceeding one year as the officer granting them shall in each case deem fit; and that passes in Form I shall be granted with validity for such periods as the officers granting the same shall in each case deem fit but not exceeding ordinarily double the length of time actually necessary for the purpose for which the permit is granted.

License is hereby granted to _____ of _____ (hereinafter called the licensee), authorizing him, under and subject to the provisions of the Bombay A'bkári Act, 1878, to possess and sell mhowra flowers in his shop situated at _____, in the táluca of _____, of the district of _____, for the period of _____ from the _____ 189 to the 31st July 189 , both days inclusive, subject to the following conditions, viz. :—

1. The licensee shall not sell, keep or store mhowra flowers in any place except in his shop above described.

2. The licensee shall reside in his said shop, and shall personally carry on the business thereof. If the licensee shall wish to absent himself from the said shop at any time, or to appoint any other person to officiate for him in carrying on the business of the said shop, he shall first obtain the sanction of the Collector in writing endorsed on the back of this license. The licensee shall be responsible for the acts of every person so appointed to officiate for him in carrying on the business of the said shop and of all his servants.

3. The licensee shall not sell any mhowra flowers after 9 o'clock P.M. or before 6 o'clock A.M.

4. Except to a licensed distiller of mhowra spirit, or to a person holding a special permit from the Collector or other authorized officer for the possession of mhowra flowers in quantities exceeding 4 seers, or to a person holding a permit from the Collector or other authorised officer for the transport of mhowra flowers to any place outside the prescribed area referred to in Section 18A (2) of the Bombay A'bkári Act, 1878, the licensee shall not sell to any one person, at one time, or in the aggregate in any one day, mhowra flowers in quantity exceeding four seers in weight.

5. The licensee shall keep in a book, bound and paged, each page of which shall bear the seal of the Collector, Assistant or Deputy Collector in charge of the Division, or Mámlatdár or Mahálkari of the táluka or petha, plain and correct accounts written up to date daily, showing the quantities of mhowra flowers brought to the shop, from what places they were brought, the names of the persons from whom they were bought, the number and date of the permit under which they were transported and the quantities sold and in stock each day, together with a list showing the names and addresses of all persons to whom mhowra flowers may have been sold in quantities exceeding four seers in weight at one time or in the aggregate in any one day.

6. The licensee's shop, all stocks of mhowra flowers stored therein, and his accounts connected therewith shall always be open for inspection by any officer of the Revenue, A'bkári or Police Departments of rank not lower than that of Aval-Kárkún, to a Mámlatdár or Mahálkari or Sub-Inspector of A'bkári or Head Constable of Police.

7. The Collector shall have power to withdraw or suspend this license in whole or in part, if in his opinion there has been an infringement by the licensee or by any of his servants, of any of the conditions hereof, or of any provision of the law relating to A'bkári revenue for the time being in force.

"I have the honour to forward herewith, for the information of the Government of Bombay and for communication to Commanders of Her Majesty's Ships of War and of Her Majesty's Royal Indian Marine vessels proceeding to Bassorah, Letter dated 6th February 1893 from the Sanitary Inspector, Bassorah, copy of marginally noted letter with enclosure, enclosure received by me from Her Majesty's Consul at Bassorah.

"2. Her Majesty's Consul at Bassorah also informs me that in accordance with local regulations all vessels must anchor at Mahoula until they obtain pratique."

23. On goods landed at the Wet Docks and previously entered for transhipment the following wharfrage fees shall be charged:

Foreign Merchandise.

1. Iron and machinery and other bulky goods classed as machinery exceeding 5 tons, sugar other than loaf or chopped sugar in cases, and dates:

One-third the import wharfrage fee laid down in the dock scale.

2. Other articles:

8 annas a ton.

Indian Produce and Manufactures.

1. Cotton and grain of all sorts ... 2½ annas per ton.
2. Groundnuts, Myrobalans, Oil-seeds and Jagree ... 3½ annas per ton.
3. All other Indian produce and manufactures ... 6 annas per ton.

This fee will cover the right to storage for five days, thereafter the ordinary dock ground or shed rent charges will be levied.

Prior arrangements shall be made with the Dock Superintendent for the labour required in the handling and storage of transhipment goods, and the cost of such labour shall be borne by the transhippers.

In the case of liners having preferential berths, special arrangements may be made with the Dock Superintendent as to the period during which free storage will be allowed.

LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT.

No. 41.—The Governor in Council is pleased to notify for general information that the following Regulations made by the Governor General in Council under Section 1 (4) of the Indian Councils Act, 1892, for Bombay, have been approved by the Secretary of State in Council:—

I.—Of the persons, other than the Advocate General or officer acting in that capacity, to be nominated Additional Members of Council by the Governor of Bombay for his assistance in making Laws and Regulations, not more than nine shall be officials.

II.—The nominations to eight seats shall be made by the Governor on the recommendation of the following Bodies and Associations respectively, namely,—

A—The Corporation of Bombay;

B—Such Municipal Corporations, or group or groups of Municipal Corporations, other than the Corporation of the City of Bombay as the Governor in Council may from time to time prescribe by notification in the *Bombay Government Gazette*;

C—Such District Local Boards, or group or groups of District Local Boards, as the Governor in Council may from time to time prescribe as aforesaid;

D—The Sardárs of the Deccan or such other class of large landholders as the Governor in Council may from time to time prescribe as aforesaid;

E—Such Association or Associations of merchants, manufacturers or tradesmen as the Governor in Council may from time to time prescribe as aforesaid;

F—The Senate of the University of Bombay:

Provided that the Bodies described above under A, B, C, D, E, and F, respectively, shall each (except as hereinafter provided in Rule VII) have at least one person nominated upon its recommendation, and A and F not more than one each.

III.—The Governor may, at his discretion, nominate persons to such of the remaining seats as shall not be filled by officials, in such manner as shall, in his opinion, secure a fair representation of the different classes of the community.

IV.—When a vacancy occurs and is to be filled under Rule II of these Regulations, the Governor shall cause the proper Body or group of Bodies, or Association or Associations, to be requested to recommend a person for nomination by the Governor.

V.—The recommendation shall be made—

(a) in the case of a Municipal Corporation or of a District Local Board, or of the Sardárs of the Deccan, or such other class of large landholders as the Governor in Council may from time to time prescribe, or of the Senate of the University, by a majority of votes of the Corporation, Board, Body, or Senate, respectively;

(b) in the case of Associations not established by law, in the manner laid down in their rules or articles of association for carrying resolutions or recording decisions upon questions of business brought before the Association;

(c) in the case of a group of Municipal Corporations, District Local Boards, or Associations, by the majority of votes of representatives to be appointed, according to such scale as the Governor in Council may from time to time prescribe, by the Corporations, Boards, or Associations.

VI.—It shall be a condition in the case of any person to be recommended by a Municipal Corporation or group of Municipal Corporations that he shall be a person ordinarily resident within the Municipality or the district in which it is situated, or in some one of the Municipalities constituting the group or of the districts in which they are situated. A similar condition shall also apply to persons to be recommended by District Local Boards.

VII.—If within two months after receiving the request of the Governor as provided by Rule IV the Body or Association or group of Bodies or Associations fails to make a recommendation, the Governor may nominate at his discretion a person belonging to the class which the Body or Association or group is deemed to represent.

VIII.—If the Governor shall decline to nominate any person who has been, under these Regulations, recommended for nomination, a fresh request shall be issued as provided in Rule IV, and the procedure laid down in Rules V and VII shall apply.

IX.—(a) As soon as conveniently may be after these Regulations come into force, eight of the seats held by non-official persons shall be filled up by recommendation under Rule II.

(b) If there shall not be the full number of eight vacancies available for this purpose, the Governor shall determine at his discretion, subject always to the proviso in Rule II, which of the Bodies or groups mentioned in that Rule shall be requested to recommend the persons to fill up such vacancies as may then be available; and so whenever and as often as any other vacancies among non-official members become available, until the full number of eight has been completed.

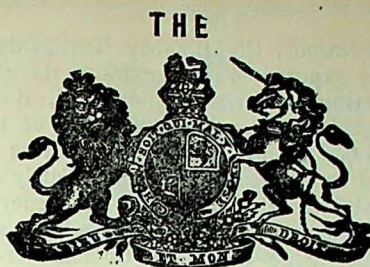

No. 158.—His Excellency Lieutenant-General Sir GEORGE RICHARDS GREAVES, K.C.B., K.C.M.G., British Infantry, being about to resign the Command of the Army of this Presidency, and having intimated his intention of embarking on his return to England on the 1st of April, His Excellency the Governor in Council desires to place on record his appreciation of the services rendered to the Bombay Government and to the Bombay Army by the Commander-in-Chief.

2. Lieutenant-General Sir GEORGE GREAVES' long personal experience, before taking up this Command, both as a Regimental officer and on the Staff, of the conditions under which British Troops serve in India, and of the feeling and needs of Native Troops, would naturally assist His Excellency to anticipate where improvements in the surroundings of the troops were most likely to be needed, and the personal inspection which His Excellency has annually given, not only to every station, but to every detail in every station in his Command, has enabled Sir GEORGE GREAVES to make practical improvements which—whilst carried out with a proper regard for economy—cannot but tend to the greater comfort and well-being of the men.

3. The Hospitals of the Native Army have been so improved in the details of bedding, floors, furniture and wall decorations—details which may not convey a sound of great importance, but which nevertheless mean very much to the unfortunate inmates—as to justify the claim that they are now on a level with the Hospitals for British Troops.

4. The inadequate conditions under which Sir GEORGE GREAVES found the troops of the Bombay Army housed at Quetta in the winter of 1890-91 were brought before the Government of India, and an immediate improvement in accommodation was urgently pressed for; and His Excellency leaves this Command with the satisfaction of knowing

that, owing to his representations, the Bombay Regiments quartered in the Quetta District are not unnecessarily exposed to the rigours of its climate. The use to which Deolali is now put as a sanitarium for British troops will, it may be hoped, lead to their increased comfort and improved health. The adaptation of the station to this purpose, without interference with its use for a portion of the year as a School of Musketry and Rest Camp, is a practical and economical improvement solely due to Sir GEORGE GREAVES' inception, whilst the personal interest which His Excellency has exhibited in Soldiers' Institutes has resulted in their being maintained at a high standard of popularity and efficiency. The practical knowledge which the Commander-in-Chief has gained of field service in many parts of the world has ensured, in the annual manœuvres, a very close approach to Service conditions. Every military operation, from the cavalry reconnaissance to the siege operations and the final attack, has been undertaken with a comprehensiveness in advance of anything attempted hitherto; and it is satisfactory to have learnt from them that the long marches and fatigue duties in the sun, and the bivouacking by night, have fully established the good health and powers of endurance of the young soldiers of the present day. In the important matter of Musketry His Excellency has done all in his power to improve the shooting of the Bombay Army by the improvements he has brought about in nearly every Rifle Range in the Presidency. The aspect, wherever possible, has been changed to the north; the markers are now practically out of danger; the receipts for lead caught by the butts erected under His Excellency's orders have been doubled; and the Central Rifle Meeting has already received a satisfactory impetus by the establishment of the new Ranges at "The Sisters," Dhanowri, near Poona, the advantages of which over the old Range at Wanowrie will be more fully appreciated when the Magazine Rifle is issued.

5. In the important responsibility of recommending for and making appointments Sir GEORGE GREAVES has proceeded with a rigid regard for the primary necessity of the Army, that it should be commanded and administered by the best officers available. In these and other matters of supreme military importance touching the distribution and recruitment of the Native Army, which have engaged the attention of this Government during the last three years, Sir GEORGE GREAVES has rendered it the greatest service, and in bidding His Excellency farewell, His Excellency the Governor in Council begs to tender to him his best thanks; not only for the care he has displayed for the needs of the soldier, and the attention he has given to the Military training of the Army under his command, but also for the assistance which, as a Member of the Executive Council, he has always afforded to Government in the general administration of the Presidency.
