NOTIFICATIONS.

JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 23rd March 1893.

No. 1821.—The Governor in Council is pleased, in exercise of the powers conferred by Section 25 of the Bombay District Police Act, 1890, to sanction for a period of one month and twenty-eight days from the 19th May 1892, the continuance of the punitive police post which was sanctioned for a period of one year by Government Notification No. 2423, dated the 1st May 1891, in the town of Bankápur in the Dhárvár District.

No. 1929.—In exercise of the power conferred by Section I of the Bombay Prevention of Gambling Act, 1887, the Governor in Council is pleased to extend all the provisions of that Act, as amended by Bombay Act I of 1890, to the following local area in the Shikárpur District:—

The town of Mehar in the Shikárpur District.

No. 1933.—In modification of Government Notification No. 475 dated the 24th January 1883, His Excellency the Governor in Council is pleased to constitute, under Section 8 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, 1882, the tálukas of Anand, Thásra and Kapadvanj in the district of Kaira a sub-division of that district, and under Section 13 of the said Code to appoint Mr. W. Doderet, Indian Civil Service, Assistant Collector and Magistrate of the First Class in that district, to be the Magistrate in charge of that sub-division.

No. 1935.—Under Section 8 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, 1882, the talukas of Chikodi and Athni in the district of Belgaum are made a sub-division of that district, and under Section 13

of the said Code Ráo Bahádúr Narayan Ganesh Deshpande, District Deputy Collector and Magistrate of the First Class in that district, is placed in charge of that sub-division.

No. 30.—In exercise of the power conferred by Section 21 of the Inland Steam Vessels Act (VI of 1884), as amended by subsequent enactments, and with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council, the Governor in Council is pleased to make the following rules to regulate the making of surveys of inland steam-vessels at the Port of Bombay:—

1. Every application for the survey of an inland steam-vessel shall be made between the hours of

10 A.M. and 5 P.M. on any day except Sundays and Government holidays, on a printed sheet in the Form No. 1 hereto annexed (which will be supplied for this purpose at the Surveyor's office) to the Surveyor at an appointed place of survey, and should be made at least three clear days before the day on which it is desired that the survey shall take place.

2. Upon receipt of an application in the prescribed form duly filled in, the Surveyor will fix the date and hour at which the survey shall be commenced, and will forward to the applicant an intimation of the date and hour so fixed, together with a list of the requisite preparations for the survey of the inland steam-vessel. The said intimation and list shall be in the Form No. 2 hereto annexed.

3. Surveys shall be made by Surveyors appointed under the Act on any day in the year, with the exception of Sundays and Government holidays at Bombay, and at such other places as may, from time to time, be appointed by Government to be places of survey. With the concurrence of the Owner or Master who applies for a survey and of the Surveyor, a survey may be made on a Sunday or holiday.

4. If every part of the steam-vessel is not ready for survey at the time appointed under Rule 2, or if the requisite preparations have not been made in accordance with the list forwarded to the applicant under the said rule, the Surveyor may fix some other convenient time for the survey.

If the Surveyor is unavoidably prevented from being present at the time fixed, the earliest possible intimation shall be sent to the applicant, and some other time convenient to the applicant and to the Surveyor shall be fixed for the survey.

5. Owners and Masters will be able to avoid inconvenience and delay in fixing the time for the survey of vessels in dock or undergoing repairs by prompt intimation to the Port Officer if the vessels have afterwards to be surveyed.

6. If a Surveyor finds that any defect exists in the hull, machinery or equipments of a

steam-vessel, he shall, before refusing to give a declaration regarding the vessel under Section 9 of the Act, address a letter in the Form No. 3, hereto annexed, to the Owner or Master of the steam-vessel, pointing out such defect, and also pointing out the repairs, &c., necessary to make good the same.

If the Surveyor be subsequently informed by the Owner or Master that the requisite repairs, &c., have been executed, he shall, with the approval of the Port Officer, pay one or more extra visits to the steam-vessel, and thereafter either give or refuse a declaration as he shall think proper.

7. Every declaration of survey furnished under Section 9 of the Act shall be in Form No. 5, hereto annexed, and shall contain the several particulars therein prescribed.

8. The notice to be given under Section 11 (sub-section 3) of the Act to the Owner or Master, when a certificate is ready for delivery, shall be given in the Form No. 4 hereto annexed under the signature of the officer to whom this function has been delegated by the Local Government under Section 11, sub-section (4), clause (b), of the Act.

9. Certificates of survey shall be in the Form No. 6 attached to these rules or in such other form as the Governor General in Council may hereafter direct.

10. Whenever two Surveyors are employed by order of Government under Section 18 of the Act, instead of one only, to make a survey, and whenever two Surveyors are directed by Government under Section 19 of the Act to make a second survey, one of the said Surveyors shall be a Shipwright Surveyor and the other an Engineer Surveyor. The Shipwright Surveyor will inspect the hull, equipments, and passenger accommodation, measure and determine the number of passengers the vessel is fit to carry and see that the certificates of the Master and Engineer or engine-driver are such as are required by the Act; also that the lights and fog-signals are in accordance with the regulations for the prevention of collisions at sea. The Engineer Surveyor will survey the engines, boilers, and all the machinery required to be surveyed under the Act.

11. A fee at the following rates shall be payable in respect of surveys:

12. On Sundays and Government holidays Rs. 20 per hour will be charged in addition to the fees ordinarily chargeable. Time spent in travelling is not to be included in the charge allowed for holidays.

If the vessel is then out of a port of survey, she must be surveyed and have a new Certificate before she first begins to ply after her next subsequent return to a port of survey.

Either this Certificate, or the duplicate thereof furnished by the Government of Bombay, is to be put up in a conspicuous part of the vessel, where it will be visible to all persons on board the same.

If the number of passengers carried exceeds the number stated in this Certificate, the Master and Owner shall, for every passenger over and above that number, be each liable to a fine which may extend to ten rupees.

In case of any accident occasioning loss of life, or any material damage affecting the seaworthiness or efficiency of the vessel, either in the hull or in any part of the machinery, a report by letter, signed by the Owner or Master, is to be forwarded to the Port Officer, Bombay, within 24 hours after the happening of the accident, or as soon thereafter as possible.

No. 34.—In exercise of the power conferred by Section 11, Sub-Section (4), clause (b), of the Inland Steam-vessels Act, 1884 (as added by Section 4, Sub-Section (2) of Act III of 1890), the Governor in Council delegates to the Port Officer of Bombay the function assigned to the Local Government by Sub-Section 3 of the said Section 11 of causing notice to be given of certificates of survey of inland steam-vessels at Bombay being ready for delivery.

2. Lieutenant-General Sir George Greaves' long personal experience, before taking up this Command, both as a Regimental officer and on the Staff, of the conditions under which British Troops serve in India, and of the feeling and needs of Native Troops, would naturally assist His Excellency to anticipate where improvements in the surroundings of the troops were most likely to be needed, and the personal inspection which His Excellency has annually given, not only to every station, but to every detail in every station in his Command, has enabled Sir George Greaves to make practical improvements which—whilst carried out with a proper regard for economy—cannot but tend to the greater comfort and well-being of the men.

3. The Hospitals of the Native Army have been so improved in the details of bedding, floors, furniture and wall decorations—details which may not convey a sound of great importance, but which nevertheless mean very much to the unfortunate inmates—as to justify the claim that they are now on a level with the hospitals for British troops.

4. The inadequate conditions under which Sir George Greaves found the troops of the Bombay Army housed at Quetta in the winter of 1890-91 were brought before the Government of India, and an immediate improvement in accommodation was urgently pressed for; and His Excellency leaves this Command with the satisfaction of knowing that, owing to his representations, the Bombay Regiments quartered in the Quetta District are not unnecessarily exposed to the rigours of its climate. The use to which Deolali is now put as a sanitarium for British troops will, it may be hoped, lead to their increased comfort and improved health. The adaptation of the station to this purpose, without interference with its use for a portion of the year as a School of Musketry and Rest Camp, is a practical and economical improvement solely due to Sir George Greaves' inception, whilst the personal interest which His Excellency has exhibited in Soldiers' Institutes has resulted in their being maintained at a high standard of popularity and efficiency. The practical knowledge which the Commander-in-Chief has gained of field service in many parts of the world has ensured, in the annual manœuvres, a very close approach to Service conditions. Every military operation, from the cavalry reconnaissance to the siege operations and the final attack, has been undertaken with a comprehensiveness in advance of anything attempted hitherto; and it is satisfactory to have learnt from them that the long marches and fatigue duties in the sun, and the bivouacking by night, have fully established the good health and powers of endurance of the young soldiers of the present day. In the important matter of musketry His Excellency has done all in his power to improve the shooting of the Bombay Army by the improvements he has brought about in nearly every rifle range in the Presidency. The aspect, wherever possible, has been changed to the north; the markers are now practically out of danger; the receipts for lead caught by the butts erected under His Excellency's orders have been doubled; and the Central Rifle Meeting has already received a satisfactory impetus by the establishment of the new ranges at "The Sisters," Dhanowri, near Poona, the advantages of which over the old range at Wanowrie will be more fully appreciated when the magazine rifle is issued.

5. In the important responsibility of recommending for and making appointments Sir George Greaves has proceeded with a rigid regard for the primary necessity of the Army, that it should be commanded and administered by the best officers available. In these and other matters of supreme military importance touching the distribution and recruitment of the Native Army, which have engaged the attention of this Government during the last three years, Sir George Greaves has rendered it the greatest service, and in bidding His Excellency farewell, His Excellency the Governor in Council begs to tender to him his best thanks, not only for the care he has displayed for the needs of the soldier, and the attention he has given to the military training of the Army under his command, but also for the assistance which, as a Member of the Executive Council, he has always afforded to Government in the general administration of the Presidency.

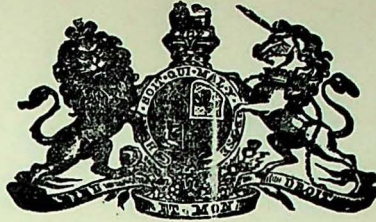
