No. 2533.—Under the provisions of Section 12 (c) of the rules framed under Sections 5 and 13 of the Opium Act, 1878, and published by Notification No. 4472.A at pages 704 to 715 in Part I of the *Bombay Government Gazette* of 1885, His Excellency the Governor in Council is pleased to permit the direct importation of opium from Malwa or Meywar into the district of Surat for retail sale

in the said district by the person duly licensed to retail opium in that district subject to the following conditions:—

- (a) All opium so imported shall be subject to the rate of duty imposed, for the time being, on opium imported into the Presidency of Bombay for home consumption, and payment of the duty leviable thereon shall be made in accordance with the provisions of Rule 17 of the rules under the Opium Act, 1878, for the payment of duty on opium intended for exportation by sea.
- (b) All opium so imported into the Surat District shall, on arrival, be deposited in the Government Treasury at Surat.
- (c) Opium deposited as aforesaid will remain there at the risk of the importer, who shall be at liberty to keep it in his own boxes and under his own keys and seals and to remove it to his shops at such times as the Collector of the district may determine and in such quantities at a time as he may require for use, not being less than the minimum quantity to be fixed by the Collector; he shall not be entitled to have access to the place of deposit except during office hours, nor without special permission of the Collector or other officer duly empowered by the Collector to grant such permission.
- (d) The quantity of opium to be removed from the place of deposit shall, on each occasion, be presented to the officer in charge of the place for weighing and registration, and shall be covered by a pass in the Form C attached to the rules.

No. 12.—The following Notification by the Government of India in the Public Works Department is republished for information:—

"Simla, the 5th April 1893.

No. 136.—In exercise of the authority given by Section 135 of the Indian Railways Act (IX of 1890), and in continuation of the notification of the Government of India in the Public Works Department No. 270, dated the 12th June 1890, the Governor General in Council is pleased to declare that every railway administration shall be liable to pay, in aid of the funds of every local authority in respect of—

(a) any railway or any portion of a railway which may have been opened for the public carriage of passengers, animals, or goods within the local area subject to such authority since the 30th April 1890, or which may hereafter be so opened, or

(b) any building or land constructed or acquired within such local area for the purposes of a railway since the said date, or which may hereafter be so constructed or acquired,

the taxes following, that is to say:

(1) when such administration was during any part of the year ended on the 30th April 1890 taxed by such local authority in respect of any railway, or portion of railway or building or land, the same taxes, and at similar rates of taxation as were actually levied from such administration by such authority during such year; and

(2) when such administration was not during any part of such year taxed or taxable by such authority in respect of any such thing as aforesaid, all such taxes, and at such rates as such administration would have been liable to if such railway or portion of railway had been open, or such building or land had been constructed or acquired, prior to the said 30th April 1890.

The liability imposed by this notification shall be deemed to have arisen in the case of every railway or portion of a railway which has been or shall be so opened, and of every building or land which has been or shall be so constructed or acquired as aforesaid, as from the date on which such railway or portion of railway was so opened, or such building or land was so constructed or acquired respectively.

SIR,—I have the honour to request on behalf of the Municipal Corporation of Bombay, under Act III of 1883, the favour of the sanction of Government to the raising of a loan of Rs. (42,00,000) forty-two lakhs from the public, in order to allow of the paying off of the balance that may be found due to Government on 1st July 1893 on account of the Consolidated Loan of (4½) four and a half per cent. (raised for a period of thirty years from 1st January 1881) as per the accompanying statement which gives the particulars required by Rule 5 of the rules relating to loans so raised.

*Statement showing particulars pursuant to Rule 5 of the Rules published by the Government
of India for the raising of Loans by Local Authorities.*

I.—The loan is required in order to allow of the paying off of the balance that may be found due to Government on 1st July 1893 on account of the Consolidated Loan of (4½) four and half per cent. (raised for a period of thirty years from 1st January 1881, vide Bombay Act II of 1880).

II.—The amount which it is proposed to borrow is Rs. 42,00,000.

III.—It is proposed to borrow the said sum on the security of the general revenue of the Bombay Municipality, aggregating nearly 58 lakhs (or over 57½ lakhs excluding the adjustment item of profit on stock) on the average of the three years ending 1891-92, as per Supplementary Statement A hereto annexed. The income for the last year exclusive of stock adjustments was Rs. 60,84,703, and that for the current year was estimated at about 62 lakhs as per revised estimates and has been ascertained as per latest actuals at about 66 lakhs.

IV.—The laws under which funds, duties, taxes, rates, cesses, &c., are levied, received or held are Act IV of 1857 and Bombay Acts VI of 1863, V of 1873 and III of 1883.

V.—The loan is required for a period not exceeding thirty years. It is proposed to raise the loan in

one or more instalments on or before 1st July 1893. Interest will be paid half-yearly (on 1st January and 1st July) at 4 per cent. per annum (Rs. 84,000 + Rs. 84,000 = Rs. 1,68,000 per annum) and a sum of Rs. 75,000* will be annually set aside from 1st July 1894 as a Sinking Fund which with interest accumulations at 4 per cent. will pay off the whole loan on 1st July 1923 (in not more than 60 instalments).

VI.—The yearly proceeds of each separate source of income are shown in the Supplemental Statement A hereto annexed.

VII.—All expenditure incurred by the Municipality in each of the three years 1889-90, 1890-91, 1891-92, is shown in the Supplemental Statement B hereto annexed.

VIII.—All existing prior charges upon the funds of the Municipality are shown in the Supplemental Statement C hereto annexed.

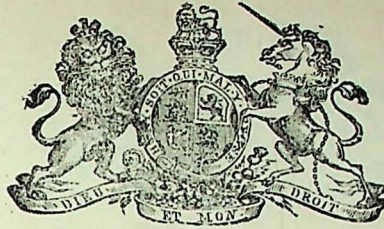
