No. 3029.—The following Notification by the Government of India in the Foreign Department is republished for general information :—

" Simla, the 27th April 1893."

No. 1431-I.—Whereas a capital sentence is occasionally passed by a British Court exercising in or with respect to territory beyond the limits of British India jurisdiction which the Governor-General in Council has in such territory ;

And whereas there may be in such territory no secure place for the confinement of a prisoner under sentence of death or no suitable appliances for his execution in a decent and humane manner ;

In exercise of the powers conferred by Sections 4 and 5 of the Foreign Jurisdiction and Extradition Act, XXI of 1879, and of all other powers enabling him in this behalf, the Governor-General in Council is pleased to direct as follows :

1. When any person is sentenced to death by a British Court in the exercise of such jurisdiction as is referred to in the first paragraph of the preamble to this notification, and, in the opinion of the Court, such sentence should for any such reason as is referred to in the second paragraph of the said preamble be executed in British India, the Court shall issue its warrant for such execution to the superintendent or keeper of a jail in British India, and shall in such warrant prescribe, as nearly as may be, the place in British India where such superintendent or keeper is to cause the execution to be carried out.

2. The jail in British India to which the Court may send its warrant under the provisions of this notification shall be such as the Governor-General in Council, or a Local Government authorised by him in this behalf, may by general or special order direct.

3. Every warrant for the execution of a sentence of death to be issued by a Court under the provisions of this notification shall be in the form set forth in the schedule hereto annexed.

"SCHEDULE.

FORM OF WARRANT.

To the Superintendent or Keeper of the Jail at in British India.

Whereas at a trial held on the day of 189, at (*name of place*), in (*name of territory*), before me, A. B. (*name of Judge*), being the presiding officer of a British Court exercising in (*or with respect to*) territory beyond the limits of British India jurisdiction which the Governor-General in Council has in such territory, C. D. (*name of prisoner*) was duly convicted of the offence of culpable homicide amounting to murder and sentenced to suffer death [*and the said sentence has been confirmed by E. F. (*name of authority*)];

And whereas there is in (*name of territory*) no secure place for the confinement of a prisoner under sentence of death (*or no suitable appliances for the execution of a person under sentence of death in a decent and humane manner*);

And whereas this Court is of opinion that for the reasons aforesaid the said sentence should be executed in British India;

This is to authorise and require you, the said superintendent (*or keeper*), being a superintendent (*or keeper*) of a jail specified in an order under Section 2 of Act No. V of 1893 passed by the Governor-General of India in Council, to receive the said C. D. (*prisoner's name*) into your custody in the said jail, together with this warrant, and there him safely to keep until the time hereinafter appointed, and then to carry the said sentence into execution by causing the said C. D. (*prisoner's name*) to be hanged by the neck until he be dead, at (*time and place of execution*), and to return this warrant to this Court with an endorsement certifying that the sentence has been executed.

I have received and considered in Council your letter in the Home Department No. 71 (Public) of the 30th November 1892, with which you forward reports received from Local Governments and Administrations on the subject of the mortality caused by wild beasts and venomous snakes and of the measures taken for their destruction during the year 1891.

2. I am glad to see that this matter continues to receive the serious attention of Your Excellency's Government and of the various Local Governments and Administrations.

REPORTS CONCERNING THE DESTRUCTION OF WILD ANIMALS AND VENOMOUS SNAKES IN 1891.

It is satisfactory to know that the Supreme Government of India continues to be impressed with the importance of giving effect to measures for the prevention of the destruction of human and animal life by predaceous wild beasts and poisonous snakes, but it is disappointing to learn that the results of the last year (1891) compare unfavourably with those of the preceding year. It is not to be expected, I fear, that any measures, however carefully and rigorously carried out, will ever altogether obviate this loss of life, but I venture to repeat the opinion that I have frequently expressed on former occasions that a system of well-organized preventive measures, based upon some well-prepared scheme and carried out uniformly without reference to the conflicting ideas of various authorities to whom these measures may be entrusted, must in the end have the result of mitigating the evil which, although it cannot be entirely done away with, may reasonably be considered susceptible of diminution. It is obvious from the perusal of the last Resolution on this subject that the Government of India are anxious to deal with it in this spirit.

I observe by the returns under consideration that 2,440 human beings were killed by predaceous animals in 1890, whilst 2,911 were killed in 1891, being an increase of 471; and that 64,535 cattle were killed in 1890 to 67,158 in 1891, being an increase of 2,623.

Rewards seem to have been freely distributed for the destruction of these wild beasts, and the reasons for this excess in mortality are not very obvious. There, at all events, the importance of giving rewards has been fully recognised.

It further appears that whilst 21,361 human beings were killed by snakes in 1890, 21,389 were killed in 1891. The difference here is very small, and considering that in 1891 the population of Upper Burma is added, the mortality is somewhat diminished. Again, whilst 3,948 cattle were destroyed by snakes in 1890, 3,658 were killed in 1891; here there is a slight diminution.

With reference to the method of dealing with this death cause, discrepancies of opinion still seem to exist among local authorities, some advocating the distribution of rewards, some suppressing them altogether, while one has reduced the reward to the trivial sum of 1 pie, which is obviously insufficient.

For the two years 1890 and 1891 it appears that, in 1890, 23,801 human beings were killed by snakes and wild beasts, in 1891, 24,300. This may be, relatively to the whole population of India, a small number (1 to 74,697 for wild beasts and 1 to 10,166 for snakes), but still it merits, as it is now receiving, serious consideration.

I am well aware of the many difficulties that exist in dealing with a question of this kind. I am equally cognizant of the great amount of labour that falls to the share of every administrative as

well as executive officer in India. I am loth to suggest any addition to these already too responsible and numerous duties, but I desire again most deferentially to re-submit the opinion, before expressed, that nothing but thorough organization and well concerted measures carried out in every district, sub-division or locality by persons specially appointed for the purpose and in compliance with some scheme from which no departure should be admitted, will ever be effective in minimising the evil under consideration.

With reference to the *ferae naturae*, I believe that the present system of rewards and modes of distributing them, supplemented by the relaxation of the forest laws, encouragement given to sportsmen and others to whom gun licenses are granted, subject to any modifications of detail though not of principle that the local officers may deem necessary if carried out persistently and uniformly, will in time produce a favourable result.

With reference to poisonous snakes, I would again submit the importance of encouraging the destruction of the poisonous varieties only by a well-regulated system of rewards which should make it worth while to destroy them. There can be no difficulty in recognizing the half-dozen venomous snakes of India that cause all the destruction of life. Pictures of these creatures with which I provided the Government of India 20 years ago in the Thanatophidia, for example of the following snakes—

Cobra (very common),
Ophiophagus (very rare),
Bungarus caeruleus or
Krait (very common),
Bungarus fasciatus or
Sankin (very rare),
Daboia Russellii or Russell's Viper (common),
Echis carinata, kupper or
phursa (common),

NOTE.—Copies of these six might be struck off from the Thanatophidia already in the possession of the Government of India, and widely distributed.

should be widely distributed in every district, sub-division and thāna, a fixed reward being assigned for the destruction of each one of them. The cobra, the krait, the daboia, and the echis being those that cause by far the largest destruction of life should be specially emphasized.

No reward should be given for any innocent snake, and with the pictures at hand there is no excuse for doing so. Difficulties in carrying out the destruction of poisonous snakes must no doubt exist, but I cannot think they are insurmountable; the need for such measures is obviously great.

I gratefully acknowledge the desire expressed by the Government of India to cope with the evil, and I should be exceedingly sorry to suggest anything to discourage what they are doing. But the destruction of the jungle round about the villages, though it may be valuable from a sanitary point of view, can, I fear, avail little towards diminishing the number of snakes for the reason that snakes are by no means confined to such localities and must be sought for elsewhere also,

With reference to what is urged about the habits of the people and the modes in which they expose themselves to danger, this is an obstacle with which it will be very difficult to reckon, until advancing

civilization shall have ameliorated their condition in this respect, and render the destruction of the snakes themselves all the more necessary.

The measures that I would again suggest resolve themselves into three heads :—

1. Making known the appearance of the poisonous snakes by a wide distribution of pictures.
2. Assigning to some one the duty of supervising these measures.
3. Giving fixed rewards, wherever poisonous snakes exist, for their destruction.

The giving effect to these must of necessity involve extra expenditure, but the money would be well spent in obviating a death cause, which must be regarded as to a great extent preventible.

It would be worth consideration, and I respectfully beg to suggest it, whether it would not be well to place the administration of this department under a selected officer or officers, whose whole time and attention should be devoted to it.

The system of strangling Thuggie, so long the curse of India, has entirely disappeared under a well-organized preventive system supervised by officers specially selected for the purpose.

Any officer who should be to tigers, leopards, cobras, kraits, daboias and phursas what Sleeman was to the strangling Thugs, would prove no less a boon to the country than that distinguished officer and would probably save a greater number of lives, for I doubt if it can be shown that strangling Thugs ever killed 20,000 to 24,000 people a year.
