No. 1799.—Whereas it appears to the Governor in Council, on the report of the District Magistrate of Dhárwár, that in the local areas hereinbelow specified, subject to the jurisdiction of the said Magistrate, cattle are habitually allowed to trespass on land and damage crops or other produce thereon, the Governor in Council is pleased to direct, in exercise of the power conferred upon him by Section 12 of the Cattle Trespass Act, 1871, as amended by Section 5 (1) of Act I of 1891, that, from the date of the publication of this Notification, for every head of cattle specified in the scale contained in the first-mentioned section which may be seized within any of the said local areas and impounded in accordance with the provisions of the Cattle Trespass Act, 1871, as amended by Act I of 1891, the pound-keeper shall levy a fine equal to double the fine mentioned in the scale aforesaid.

And in exercise of the power conferred by Section 26 of the Cattle Trespass Act, 1871, as amended by Section 8 of Act I of 1891, the Governor in Council is pleased to direct that, with respect to the local areas hereinbelow specified, the first paragraph of the said Section 26 of the Cattle Trespass Act, 1871, shall, on and after the date specified in the first paragraph of this Notification, be read as if it had reference to cattle of any kind mentioned in the scale aforesaid, instead of to pigs only, and as if the words "fifty rupees" were substituted for the words "ten rupees."

No. 2485.—The following rules approved by the Commissioner of A'bkári under the provisions of Section 35 of the A'bkári Act, 1878, for the manage-

ment of the Central Distillery at Surat and for the regulation of the storage, removal and transport of spirits made therein are published for general information:—

Rule 1.—The Inspector in charge of the distillery will live on the premises in tents provided for him during the dry season.

Rule 2.—The distillery gate shall be opened for the Engineer only at 4-30 A.M. (local time) for the purpose of getting up steam in the boiler. He shall not let any steam into the stills until the Assistant Inspector arrives.

Rule 3.—The Assistant Inspector must arrive at the distillery punctually at sunrise and admit all workmen into the distillery. His first duty will be to break the seal on the steam valve, which shall have been placed there by the Inspector the evening before, thus allowing the engineer to utilise the steam for the purpose of distillation.

Rule 4.—The Assistant Inspector will then examine the locks and seals and open the liquor store-rooms. He will gauge and test the contents of the several vats and make up the liquor stock account book, and enter the quantity found in each vat in a rough memorandum book.

This work should be completed as soon as possible, and no liquor should be poured into or taken out of any one of the vats until that vat has been gauged and tested.

Rule 5.—After the Assistant Inspector has taken stock and written up his books, which should be done before 8 o'clock, he will allow mowra to be admitted, as well as to be taken for soaking, doing for the time being the work of the weigher, who will arrive at 10 o'clock A.M. and relieve the Assistant Inspector from mowra work.

Rule 6.—The Assistant Inspector should occupy his time between 10 and 12 o'clock in walking about all parts of the distillery premises, and if he should notice anything irregular or untidy or otherwise calling for remarks, he should report the matter to the Inspector in charge, who will relieve the Assistant not later than 12 o'clock noon.

Rule 7.—The Inspector in charge will be held directly responsible for all issues of liquor which should be made solely by him, except in cases of unavoidable necessity, such as sudden illness, &c., when the Assistant Inspector will issue liquor on the written authority of the Inspector, such authority to be placed on record.

Rule 8.—The Inspector in charge will consider himself responsible for all accounts and see that the books of the distillery are correctly written up to date.

He should from time to time test the work of the Assistant, by gauging and taking stock and strength of liquor in the store-rooms. He will also see that the distillery premises are kept neat and clean and issue instructions to that effect to the contractor's distiller in charge.

The Inspector will be also held responsible for the orderly performance of all orders issued by the Collector or the Assistant Collector in charge Chorási Division for the management of the distillery.

Rule 9.—All liquor covered by permit should leave the distillery at the same time with the permit and should be checked by the Náik or the guard and particulars entered in his checking book while passing the gate.

Rule 10.—Distillation and other work should stop at sunset, when half an hour will be allowed for the workmen to clean themselves, and leave the premises. The distillery will then be closed in the presence of the Inspector in charge, who, before leaving the distillery, will see that the store-rooms are secured under his lock and seal.

Rule 11.—The day's manufacture of spirit will be put separately into a vat emptied to receive it, so that the quantity and strength may be clearly ascertained. An empty vat shall be kept for each strength of spirit manufactured.

Rule 12.—No distillation shall be carried on on Sundays, Good Friday, Christmas Day, New Year's Day and the Queen's Birthday, but the distillery will be opened on those days for cleaning the premises and for soaking mowra only, from 6 A.M. to 1 P.M.

The Assistant Inspector, first Kárkún and weighing Kárkún will be deputed in turn to be present on these days, and they will open and close the distillery at the hours named.

No mowra or other material will be admitted into the distillery on Sundays and the abovementioned holidays, nor will any of the liquor store-rooms be opened.

Rule 13.—The first Kárkún will attend daily from 10-30 A.M. to 6-30 P.M.

Rule 14.—The weighing Kárkún will ordinarily attend from 10 A.M. to 6 P.M., but he shall be present from such hour to such hour as the Distillery Inspector may specially direct, according to the work to be done. He will superintend the weighing of mowra issued for soaking and keep an account of the quantities soaked and distilled. He will also superintend the weighing of coal and firewood admitted into the distillery yard, and enter the quantities in a book kept for that purpose. On the evening of the last day of each month he will weigh the quantity of coals and firewood lying in the yard, and deduct the amount from the total quantity admitted during the month, thus arriving at the quantity consumed during the month.

The weighing Kárkún shall also keep an account of mowra admitted into the mowra godowns, and no mowra should be admitted unless passed by the weighing Kárkún or Assistant Inspector. In the absence of the weigh-bridge which the contractor has been directed to select, the present practice of accepting the weights shown in the railway receipts may continue, but when the weigh-bridge is fixed, actual figures must be taken.

Rule 15.—Mowra should be issued for soaking from a godown selected for the day, and mowra admitted during the day shall not be put into that godown.

The mowra godowns will be kept under the Inspector's lock and seal, except on Sundays, when the godown opened for issuing mowra for soaking

will be under the lock and seal of the official deputed to be present according to Rule XII.

Rule 16.—There should be only two authorities in the distillery, *i. e.*, the Inspector in charge or his Assistant when on duty, on the part of Government, and the Head Distiller, on the part of the contractor. Anything to be done should be pointed out to the distiller by the Government officer and *vice versa*.

The distiller should have a nokarnáma showing that he is in charge of the distillery on behalf of the contractor according to clause 16 of the license.

Rule 17.—No admittance is allowed except on business. Visitors can see the distillery on permits from the Collector.

Rule 18.—A visitor's book will be kept and produced on the arrival of an Inspecting officer, and his remarks therein will be copied and forwarded to the Collector through the Assistant Collector in charge Chorási Division.

An order book will also be produced containing the orders issued by the Collector for the management of the distillery in order that the Inspecting officer may enter in the visitor's book any suggestions he may wish to make regarding the modification or amplification of existing orders.

Rule 19.—For regulating the payment of extra remuneration to the distillery establishment supervising the distillation of spirit on Sundays or holidays, or beyond office hours on working days, the rules laid down in Government Resolution No. 6882 of 29th September 1886 shall be followed.

Rule 20.—All distillery workmen may be allowed a ration of liquor not exceeding one dram morning and evening. This liquor shall be drunk on the premises in the presence of the Inspector or his Assistant. On no account is it to be drunk elsewhere or taken off the premises. Employés found drinking or removing liquor contrary to the above will be forthwith discharged from service in the distillery.

Rule 21.—When it is necessary through accident to the machinery, or unexpected fermentation of the raw material for distillation, that work should be carried on in the distillery on Sundays, or on holidays, or before sunrise or after sunset on working days, and when the permission of the Collector cannot be immediately obtained the Distillery Inspector may grant permission on the written requisition of the Distillery Manager, taking every precaution in the interest of Government by ordering the attendance of the necessary Government supervising establishment and provided that the rule in the preamble to Government Resolution No. 6882 of 29th September 1886 be complied with. Report should be made without delay to the Collector of each instance in which permission is granted.

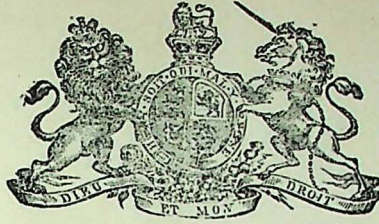
