REVENUE DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 17th June 1893.

No. 4363.—Whereas it appears to the Governor in Council on the report of the District Magistrate, Surat, that in the local areas hereinbelow specified subject to the jurisdiction of the said Magistrate, cattle are habitually allowed to trespass on land and damage crops or other produce thereon; the Governor in Council is pleased to direct, in exercise of the power conferred upon him by Section 12 of the Cattle Trespass Act, 1871, as amended by Section 5 (1) of Act I of 1891, that on and after 15th July 1893 for every head of cattle specified in the scale contained in the first-mentioned section which may be seized within any of the said local areas and impounded in accordance with the provisions of the Cattle Trespass Act, 1871, as amended by Act I of 1891, the pound-keeper shall levy a fine equal to double the fine mentioned in the scale aforesaid.

2. And in exercise of the power conferred by Section 26 of the Cattle Trespass Act, 1871, as amended by Section 8 of Act I of 1891, the Governor in Council is pleased to direct that, with respect to the local areas hereinbelow specified, the first paragraph of the said Section 26 of the Cattle Trespass Act, 1871, shall, on and after the date specified in the first paragraph of this Notification, be read as if it had reference to cattle of any kind mentioned in the scale aforesaid instead of to pigs only, and as if the words "fifty rupees" were substituted for the words "ten rupees."

RESOLUTION.

Increase of pay of Apprentices appointed to the Engineer Branch of the Public Works Department and Superior Establishment of the Indian Telegraph Department.

Read—

Clause IV of Resolutions by the Government of India, Public Works Department, Nos. 2112-G. and 156-T.E., dated respectively the 19th July and 25th August 1892.

Public Works Department Circular letter No. 208-G., dated 26th January 1893.

Letter from the Government of the Punjab, Public Works Department, No. 510-E.I., dated 15th March 1893, and enclosure.

OBSERVATIONS.—In clause IV of the Resolutions read above it was laid down that recruits from the Indian Civil Engineering Colleges for the Engineer Branch of the Public Works Department and Superior Establishment of the Indian Telegraph Department shall be appointed as apprentices on a salary of Rs. 100 per mensem; and in the Circular letter also read above it was decided that in future no Engineer apprentices shall be promoted to the rank of Assistant Engineer until after at least one year's training as an apprentice.

RESOLUTION.—The Government of India are now pleased to decide that if an apprentice has given complete satisfaction during the first six months of training, his salary may, with the sanction of the Local Government, be increased to Rs. 150 a month.

No. 2110.—The following telegram from the British Consul, Alexandria, dated 14th instant, is published for general information:—

"Quarantine regulations for return pilgrimage imposed in Egypt on arrivals from all ports of Hedjaz and Yemen as far as Babelmandeb. Vessels without pilgrims or analogous crowds leaving these ports with clean bills of health before 24th June next will have ordinary cholera quarantine, but after 24th quarantine against return pilgrimage. Passengers embarking at Aden require certificate of fifteen days' stay there before embarkation. Egypt has imposed quarantine on arrivals from Bussorah, Fao and Muhamrah."

No. 2116.—In exercise of the power conferred by Act I of 1870, the following Rules for Quarantine against Cholera have been made by the Government of Bombay, with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council: they have effect from the 9th instant in the Ports of Aden, Perim and the Somali Coast as a temporary measure:—

I.—The Commander of every vessel, including buggalows or other native craft, arriving from Arabian Ports shall, before entering the harbour, indicate by signal the port from which such vessel has come.

- II.—Such Commander shall not, except as hereinafter provided, allow any communication, either with the pilot boat, except orally, or with the shore, or with any other vessel or boat in the harbour.
- III.—Immediately on arrival the Commander shall cause the letter R of the Commercial Signal Code to be hoisted, and shall keep the said flag flying during his stay in port or until authorized by the Health Officer to haul it down. If communication with the shore is not desired, the vessel shall anchor at such place as may be pointed out by the Port authorities, having regard to the season of the year. If communication with the shore is desired, the Health Officer shall go alongside the vessel, and, after all necessary enquiries, shall direct the Commander to take the vessel to the quarantine anchorage duly appointed and notified in that behalf by the Resident, there to remain for a period of seven days from the date of arrival, or for the shorter period prescribed in Rule IV, and undergo disinfection, which should apply as well to crew, passengers, effects, and susceptible goods.
- IV.—If the Health Officer of the Port has sufficient evidence that no cases of a suspicious nature have taken place on board during the voyage, and if the vessel is besides in good hygienic condition, the duration of the quarantine will be diminished according to the following scale :—

- X.—All vessels which have undergone quarantine in the manner above prescribed should have the fact clearly stated on their Bills of Health.

No. 2157.—In exercise of the power conferred by Act I of 1870, the following Rules for Quarantine against Cholera have been made by the Government of Bombay, with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council: they have effect from the 14th instant in the Ports of Aden, Perim and the Somali Coast as a temporary measure:—

- I.—The Commander of every vessel, including buggalows or other native craft, arriving from the ports of the Hedjaz and Yemen as far as Babelmandeb and from Bussorah, Fao and Muhamrah shall, before entering the harbour, indicate by signal the port from which such vessel has come.
- II.—Such Commander shall not, except as hereinafter provided, allow any communication, either with the pilot boat, except orally, or with the shore, or with any other vessel or boat in the harbour.
- III.—Immediately on arrival the Commander shall cause the letter R of the Commercial Signal Code to be hoisted, and shall keep the said flag flying during his stay in port or until authorized by the Health Officer to haul it down. If communication with the shore is not desired, the vessel shall anchor at such place as may be pointed out by the Port authorities, having regard to the season of the year. If communication with the shore is desired, the Health Officer shall go alongside the vessel, and, after all necessary enquiries, shall direct the Commander to take the vessel to the quarantine anchorage duly appointed and notified in that behalf by the Resident, there to remain for a period of seven days from the date of arrival, or for the shorter period prescribed in Rule IV, and undergo disinfection, which should apply as well to crew, passengers, effects, and susceptible goods.

- IV.—If the Health Officer of the Port has sufficient evidence that no cases of a suspicious nature have taken place on board during the voyage, and if the vessel is besides in good hygienic condition, the duration of the quarantine will be diminished according to the following scale:—

X.—All vessels which have undergone quarantine in the manner above prescribed should have the fact clearly stated on their Bills of Health.

No. 2953.—The following Rules framed by the Commissioner of A'bkāri under the provisions of Section 35 of the A'bkāri Act, 1878, for the management of the public toddy spirit distillery at Dādar in the Island of Bombay, and for the regulation of the storage, removal and transport of spirits made therein and published under Notifications Nos. 2351, 2974 and 2147, dated the 8th May 1889, 18th June 1890 and 1st May 1893 respectively, are consolidated and published hereunder for general information:—

Rules framed by the Commissioner of A'bkāri under the provisions of Section 35 of the A'bkāri Act, 1878, for the management of the public toddy spirit distillery at Dādar in the Island of Bombay, and for the regulation of the storage, removal and transport of spirits made therein.

1. No toddy shall be admitted into the distillery between the hours of 12 noon and 4 P.M., or between the hours of 8 P.M. and 6 A.M.

2. Toddy brought to the distillery aforesaid shall be taken direct to the Inspector in charge thereof for examination and measurement.

3. The Distillery Inspector shall examine and measure without delay all toddy brought to the distillery and shall enter in a register, to be kept by him in the annexed Form A, the quantity of toddy brought in from time to time by or on account of each licensed distiller.

4. Each licensed distiller shall, at his own expense, construct and complete within thirty days after the date of his distillery license, and thereafter keep in good repair to the satisfaction of the Collector, a store-room for the custody of spirit, and shall separately deposit therein all spirit manufactured by him as soon as it is drawn from the still, and shall not open the entrance thereof or remove spirit therefrom without the permission of the Distillery Inspector. He shall also provide Chubb's locks and such other fastenings for the entrance to the store-room as the Collector may prescribe. He shall also provide vessels of such kind and capacity as the Collector may prescribe for the storage of spirit in his said store-room.

5. No liquor shall be removed from the distillery by persons other than licensed distillers. Spirit shall be removed from the distillery only in casks, each of capacity between 16 and 21 gallons. All casks used for the removal of spirit shall be filled full to the bung-hole before being gauged and tested and passed out of the distillery.

6. Licensed distillers shall provide each his own casks of authorised capacity for the removal of spirit. Each cask, before being used, shall be taken by the owner to the Inspector, who shall gauge its capacity by means of the measures provided for the purpose, and shall brand upon it—

- (1) the name of the distillery,
- (2) the consecutive number of the cask,
- (3) the capacity of the cask in gallons and pints,
- (4) the date of branding.

7. Every cask so branded shall be again gauged once in every six months by the Inspector by means of the measures provided for the purpose, and shall then be branded anew if necessary. Whenever any cask is coopered, or repaired in any way, it shall be taken by the distiller to whom it may belong to the Inspector before being used for the removal of spirit, and shall be re-gauged by the Inspector in the manner aforesaid and shall be branded anew, if necessary. Whenever the capacity of a cask as ascertained by measurement with the measures may be found to differ from the capacity branded thereon, the old brand shall be erased and the correct capacity of the cask shall be branded upon it.

8. The Inspector shall keep a register of all casks measured and branded by him.

9. Each licensed distiller shall be provided gratis with a bound book of permit forms, the pages of which shall be numbered consecutively and severally stamped with the Collector's seal. The permits shall be printed in triplicate in the Form B hereto annexed.

10. Whenever a licensed distiller wishes to remove spirit from the distillery, he shall enter in a permit form in the said book the particulars shown therein to be entered by him, and shall take, or send by the hand of his servant, the permit book to the Collector's office before 2 P.M. on any week day. The form filled in by the distiller shall there be examined by the Assistant Collector or other officer appointed for the purpose, who, if he finds the entries to be correct, shall receive the still-head duty and distillery charge recoverable on the spirit to be removed and shall sign the receipt and permit allowing the licensee to remove spirit from the distillery. He shall tear off the 3rd portion of the permit and forward it to the Inspector in charge of the Division in which the shop to which the liquor mentioned therein is intended to be conveyed is situated, and shall return the permit book to the licensee, or his servant, without delay and before closing office on the same day. The licensed distiller shall, before 10 A.M. on the following morning, present the permit book together with the spirit intended to be removed to the Distillery Inspector. The Distillery Inspector shall then measure and test the contents of each cask of spirit offered for removal and satisfy himself that the quantity and strength of the spirit offered for removal does not exceed the quantity and strength entered in the permit for removal. He shall also calculate the still-head duty and distillery charge payable on the spirit presented for removal by the licensed distiller, and shall satisfy himself that the correct amount has been levied in the Collector's office. He shall then note on the reverse of the receipt and permit all the particulars required to be by him therein entered, and shall complete and sign the transport permit, and allow the spirit to pass out of the distillery.

11. When the permit has been completed as above, the Distillery Inspector shall make the necessary entries in his register in Register Form C, hereto annexed, and shall tear off the 2nd portion of the permit which shall be delivered to
