MINT.

Simla, the 26th June 1893.

No. 2662.—The Governor General in Council hereby announces that, until further orders, gold coins and gold bullion will be received by the Mint Masters of the Calcutta and Bombay Mints respectively in exchange for Government rupees, at the rate of 7·53344 grains troy of fine gold for one rupee, on the following conditions :

- (1) Such coin or bullion must be at par for coinage.
- (2) The quantity tendered at one time must not be less than 50 tolas.
- (3) A charge of one-fourth per mille will be made on all gold coin or bullion which is melted or cut so as to render the same fit for receipt into the mint.
- (4) The Mint Master, on receipt of gold coin or bullion into the mint, shall grant to the proprietor a receipt which shall entitle him to a certificate from the Mint and Assay Masters for the amount of rupees to be given in exchange for such coin or bullion payable at the General (Reserve) Treasury, Calcutta or Bombay. Such certificates shall be payable at the General Treasury after such lapse of time from the issue thereof as the Comptroller General may fix from time to time.

No. 2663.—In supersession of the Notification by the Government of India in the Financial Department, No. 3287,* dated the 28th October 1868, which is hereby cancelled, the Governor General in Council is pleased to direct that, from and after the date of this Notification, Sovereigns and Half-sovereigns of current weight coined at any authorized Royal Mint in England or Australia shall be received in all the Treasuries of British India and its dependencies, in payment of sums due to the Government, as the equivalent of fifteen rupees and of seven rupees and eight annas respectively.

PAPER CURRENCY.

Sovereigns and Half-sovereigns of current weight coined at any authorized Royal Mint in England or Australia shall be taken as the equivalent of fifteen rupees and of seven rupees and eight annas respectively.

cattle are habitually allowed to trespass on land and damage crops or other produce thereon, the Governor in Council proposes to direct, in exercise of the power conferred upon him by Section 12 of the Cattle Trespass Act, 1871, as amended by Section 5 (1) of Act I of 1891, that on and after the 1st September 1893 for every head of cattle specified in the scale contained in the first mentioned section which may be seized within any of the said local areas and impounded in accordance with the provisions of the Cattle Trespass Act, 1871, as amended by Act I of 1891, the pound-keeper shall levy a fine equal to double the fine mentioned in the scale aforesaid.

2. And in exercise of the power conferred by Section 26 of the Cattle Trespass Act, 1871, as amended by Section 8 of Act I of 1891, the Governor in Council proposes to direct that, with respect to the local areas hereinbelow specified, the first paragraph of the said Section 26 of the Cattle Trespass Act, 1871, shall, on and after the date specified in the first paragraph of this Notification, be read as if it had reference to cattle of any kind mentioned in the scale aforesaid instead of to pigs only, and as if the words "fifty rupees" were substituted for the words "ten rupees."

RESOLUTION—By the Government of India, Public Works Department.

Orders on certain questions raised in connection with the establishment of a Provincial Service recruited in India for the Engineer Branch, Public Works Department.

Read again—

Public Works Department Resolution No. 2112 G., dated the 19th July 1892.

Read also—

Letter from the Secretary to the Government of the North-Western Provinces and Oudh in the Public Works Department, No. C-1786-E., dated 14th October 1892.

Letter from the Secretary to the Chief Commissioner of Burma in the Public Works Department, No. 15635, dated the 15th November 1892.

In the letters read in the preamble, the following questions are raised:

- (i) Whether the provisions of Article 720 of the Civil Service Regulations are applicable to the Provincial Engineer Service, and whether Civilian Upper Subordinates promoted to the Provincial Engineer Service may be permitted to serve on after they have attained the age of 55 years.
- (ii) Whether Upper Subordinates promoted to the Provincial Engineer Service are required to pass examinations in professional subjects and in the native languages under Public Works Department Code, Vol. I., Chapter II, paragraphs 12-14 and 17.
- (iii) Whether Upper Subordinates shall on promotion to the Provincial Engineer Service be graded according to the salary they have been drawing in the Upper

Subordinate grades, or whether they shall be placed in the 2nd grade of Assistant Engineers, receiving the difference between the pay of their grade in the Upper Subordinate establishment and that of the 2nd Assistant Engineer grade as a personal allowance. Also whether the sub-divisional allowance which they may have been in receipt of at the time of their promotion will be continued to them as a personal allowance on promotion.

- (iv) Whether students of the Indian Colleges appointed to the Provincial Engineer Service shall, under Regulation IV of the Resolution of the 19th July 1892, be promoted to the 1st grade of Assistant Engineers immediately on passing the professional examination required by Public Works Department Code, Vol. I., Chapter II, paragraphs 12-14.
- (v) Whether the Imperial and Provincial Services are to be one and the same or on separate lists for purposes of promotion.
- (vi) Whether any, and if so what, portion of the military service of Military Upper Subordinates promoted to the Provincial Engineer Service shall count towards civil pension.

2. The Governor General in Council is pleased to issue the following orders on the several questions raised:

Question i.—The 55 years' rule is at present applicable to all members of the Engineer establishment (*cide* note to Article 720 of the Civil Service Regulations), and it will therefore be applicable to all persons appointed to the Provincial Engineer Service, and no one will be allowed to remain in the service after he has attained the age of 55 years.

Question ii.—In Regulation V of the Resolution of the 19th July 1892 it is laid down that the men of the Upper Subordinate class shall be ordinarily Sub-Engineers chosen for their ability and merit. As these men will be selected for promotion on account of their general efficiency and experience in practical work, it is unnecessary that they should be required to pass the examinations in question.

Question iii.—On promotion to the Provincial Engineer Service, men of the Upper Subordinate class will be ordinarily placed in the 2nd grade of Assistant Engineer, and will draw the pay of that grade, *viz.* Rs. 250. The difference between this sum and the pay of their grade in the Upper Subordinate establishment, including the increments they may have at the time of promotion earned as Sub-Engineers, will be granted to them as a personal allowance. The Governor General in Council is, however, pleased to rule that men of the Upper Subordinate class shall be as a rule selected for promotion to the Provincial Service before they have qualified for the increments of Sub-Engineers.

It is also ruled that Sub-Engineers promoted to the Provincial Engineer Service shall not be granted the sub-divisional allowance which they may have been receiving prior to their promotion.

It will be optional with any subordinate to decline promotion.

Question iv.—Promotions from 2nd to 1st grade Assistant Engineer in the Provincial Service will be made only as vacancies admit, and on recommendations. Promotions will also be regulated by selection for vacancies within the sanctioned scale, as laid down in Regulation VI of the Resolution of the 19th July 1892. Passing the examination prescribed in Public Works Department Code, Vol. I, Chapter II, paragraphs 12-14, merely qualifies for promotion, subject to the above conditions, in the case of students appointed from the Indian Colleges.

Question v.—Officers of the Imperial and Provincial Services will be on one list for purposes of promotion.

Question vi.—Warrant officers of the rank of Conductor and Sub-Conductor and non-commissioned officers and soldiers when promoted from the Upper Subordinate class to the Provincial Engineer Service are required to take their discharge from the Army, and will then count their whole departmental service for civil pension (*vide* Article 388, clause 3, Civil Service Regulations). It will, however, be optional with such officers to decline promotion. The case of honorary commissioned officers is under consideration, and orders in regard to them will issue hereafter.

3. The question has also been raised whether Upper Subordinates of the Military Works Department are eligible for appointment to the Provincial Engineer Service of the Public Works Department. His Excellency the Governor General in Council is pleased to rule that the claims of the Upper Subordinates of the Military Works Department shall be considered when selecting men for promotion to the Provincial Establishment.

The Chief Commissioners of the Central Provinces, Burma, Assam, and Coorg.

The Accountant General, Public Works Department.

The Director General of Railways.

The Consulting Engineers to the Government of India for Railways, Calcutta, Central Division, Lucknow, and Assam.

Day Signals for Dredgers and Hoppers.

36A.—Every Dredger when at work laying out chains or not under control and every Hopper when similarly employed in attendance on any such

Dredger and not under control shall carry by day as a Signal three shapes as follows :—

- (1) The three shapes shall be arranged in a vertical line one above the other, and when there is a foremast head they shall be in front of it and all of them above it, and when there is no foremast head, they shall be arranged as aforesaid where they can be best seen by other vessels.
- (2) The uppermost and the lowest of the three shapes shall be—
 - (a) globular in shape and red in colour,
 - (b) not less than two feet in diameter.
- (3) The second shape shall be—
 - (a) six feet below the uppermost shape and six feet above the lowest shape,
 - (b) diamond in shape and white in colour,
 - (c) not less than two feet in diagonal.

Free passages to be kept for Dredgers and Hoppers.

36B.—All vessels and boats shall give every Dredger and Hopper carrying a signal required by Rule 36A, a wide berth in such manner as, taking into consideration that such Hopper or Dredger is out of control and cannot get out of the way, may be necessary to avoid all interference with it and with its operations.

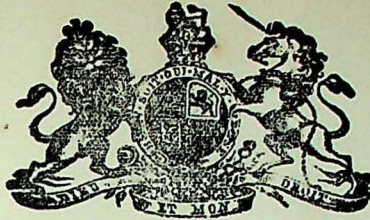
