for regulating the custody, supply and sale of stamps of all descriptions, and embodied in the Government Notifications noted in the margin,* are

published for general information:—

1. There shall be three central depôts for stamps of all descriptions in charge of the Superintendent of Stamps at Calcutta, Madras and Bombay respectively. These central depôts shall maintain a stock of stamps sufficient for two years'

consumption. The Superintendents of Stamps in Madras and Bombay shall, for this purpose, forward, not later than the last week in September in each year, indents for the supply of the various descriptions of stamps required in the following year for the territories dependent on them for the supply of stamps to the Superintendent of Stamps, Calcutta. The Superintendent of Stamps, Calcutta, shall prepare a general consolidated indent for stamps of all descriptions, showing separately the demand for the following year for each of the three Presidencies, including in it the indents of the Superintendents of Stamps, Madras and Bombay; and shall forward this general indent to the Government of India in the Finance Department for transmission to the Secretary of State so as to reach him not later than the 1st November in each year. The Superintendent should forward a copy of the section of the general indent relating to Postage stamps to the Director General of the Post Office, and of the section relating to Telegraph stamps to the Director General of Telegraphs.

2. Stamps for the Bengal Presidency, including the North-Western Provinces and Oudh, the Punjab, Central India, Rajputana, Assam, and Burma, and local depôts subordinate to Calcutta, and stamps for copies for use in the Central Provinces, shall be supplied from the central depôt, Calcutta, on the indent of officers in charge of local depôts.

3. Stamps for the Madras Presidency, including Coorg and local depôts subordinate to Madras, shall be supplied from the central depôt at Madras on the indent of the officers in charge of local depôts.

4. Stamps for the Bombay Presidency, including Sind, Berar, the Central Provinces (save as provided in rule 2) and local depôts subordinate to Bombay, shall be supplied from the central depôt, Bombay, on the indent of officers in charge of local depôts.

5. The Superintendent of Stamps, Calcutta, Madras and Bombay, on receiving an indent from a local depôt, shall have the indent examined to ascertain that the indent is such as to insure the local depôt having a proper supply, and may comply with the indent in full or in part as he thinks fit. If he thinks that the indent should be increased, he should request the officer who submitted the indent to submit a supplementary indent. The Presidency Post Offices of Calcutta, Madras, and Bombay may indent for supplies on the central depôts.

32. On the last open day of September and March each year, the officer in charge of each local depôt will count, or have counted in his presence, the stamps in the depôt, both those under double lock and those under single lock, and will require the officers in charge of the branch depôts subordinate to him similarly to count the stamps in the branch depôt. He will attach to the monthly

statements for September and March rendered to the Superintendent of Stamps, Calcutta, Madras or Bombay, or, in the Provinces noted in the margin* to the local Superin-

* Beugal, Bombay, the North-Western Provinces and Oudh, Punjab, the Central Provinces, and Berar. [In the case of revenue adhesive stamps supplied to Berar from the central depôt at Madras the monthly statements will continue to be submitted to the Superintendent of Stamps, Madras.]

tendent or Commissioner of Stamps or other officer named by the Local Government, a certificate in the following form :

the explanation of which is as follows :

33. Monthly statements showing the receipts and issues of each local depôt, including the transactions of the subordinate branch depôts, shall be prepared by the officer in charge of the local depôt, and forwarded in the first week of the succeeding month to the Superintendent of Stamps, Calcutta, Madras or Bombay, or the local Superintendent or Commissioner of Stamps, or other officer specified in Rule 33, separate statements being prepared for General stamps, Court-fee stamps, Telegraph stamps, and Postage stamps.

These statements shall show for each denomination of stamp the values of the balance in hand, at the beginning of each month, of the quantities received from the Superintendent of Stamps or other officer during the month, of the quantity sold during the month, and of the balance in hand at the end of month. The statements may be forwarded direct to the Superintendent of Stamps, Calcutta, Madras or Bombay, or the local Superintendent or Commissioner of Stamps, or through any officer named by the Local Government.

34. The statements shall be checked by the Superintendent of Stamps, Calcutta, Madras or Bombay, or by the local Superintendent or Commissioner of Stamps or other officer specified in Rule 33, by comparison with previous statements

and the accounts of the central depôts and shall be used by him to check indents and to watch the balances in the local depôts. If the monthly statements of transactions show that the balance of any kind of stamp in any local depôt is falling too low, the attention of the officer in charge should be called to the fact. To enable him to check the returns each local Superintendent or Commissioner of Stamps, or other officer specified in Rule 33, will be supplied by the Superintendent of Stamps, Calcutta or Bombay, with monthly statements showing the stamps issued to and returned by the local depôts subordinate to each.

35. Treasury officers and other officers in charge of local depôts shall forward to the local Accountant General or Comptroller such returns of the receipts and sales of stamps as the Comptroller General may direct, in the form of Plus and Minus Memoranda or otherwise.

36. Each Superintendent or Commissioner of Stamps, or other officer specified in Rule 33, shall send to the Accountant General or Comptroller such accounts of the transactions of the Central and local depôts as the Comptroller General may prescribe.

39. The local Governments in Bengal, Madras and Bombay shall arrange for a periodical verification by counting of the stock of stamps in the respective central depôts. The verification shall be carried out in the manner and form prescribed by the Comptroller General, to whom the result will be reported.

40. The Superintendent of Stamps, Calcutta, Madras and Bombay shall forward every month to the Director General of the Post Office a statement showing the balances and receipts in the central depôt and the issues to each local depôt of postage stamps during the month. Each Superintendent or Commissioner of Stamps or other officer specified in Rule 33 shall also send monthly to the Comptroller of the Post Office a statement of the sales during the past month of the several denominations of postage stamps in the local and branch depôts subordinate to him. Each Accountant General or Comptroller will, with his monthly account current with the Examiner of Telegraph Accounts, forward a statement showing the total realisations at each treasury from the sales of Telegraph stamps during the month.

In view of the resolution arrived at by the Permanent Committee of Tariffs at their meeting of 10th May last, and in conformity with the unanimous vote of the Government Council given in yesterday's Session, the Governing Council deems it expedient to determine as follows:

- (1) That the words "*Excepting Indian tobacco the duty on which shall be the same as on tobacco leaves,*" should be added after "*Tobacco in rolls,*" in Article 48 of Schedule A of the existing tariff.
- (2) That duty-free goods cannot be exempted from being accompanied by a bill either on importation or exportation thereof. Such bill shall be exempted from stamp duty.
- (3) That only amended bills substituted for the original bills in consequence of decrease in the value of goods in cases in which the duty is assessed *ad valorem* shall bear a stamp of 100 reis as per No. 190, Class 11, Table I of the Stamp Act dated 16th September 1890.

The authorities and other persons concerned upon whom it is incumbent to carry out these orders shall duly attend.

No. 5511.—His Excellency the Governor in Council is pleased to make the following modifications with regard to the Departmental Examination of the officers of the Preventive Department of the Bombay Customs House in the rules published by Government Notification No. 1665 of the 4th March 1891 for the recruitment and organization of the Customs Department in the Bombay Presidency:—

RULES.

1. Every officer of the Preventive Department shall be required, after he has served for one year, to pass an examination in the following subjects:

A.

(1) Officers who are natives of India and whose vernacular is native to India—English, comprising handwriting, spelling and ability to draft clearly and correctly.

(2) Officers whose vernacular is English—Hindustani, Marathi or Gujarati, colloquial test.

B.

The following Acts:—

- Indian*.—The Arms Act No. XI of 1878, Sections 1, 4 and 6 to 12 with the rules for Transport, Import and Export.
- " The Sea Customs Act No. VIII of 1878.
- " The Merchant Shipping Act No. VII of 1880, Sections 33 to 53.
- " The Native Passenger Ships Act No. X of 1887, Chapters I—IV.
- " The Opium Act No. I of 1878 and Rules: the parts relating to Import, Export and Transport, and Sections 15 to 21.
- " The Petroleum Act No. XII of 1886, Sections 3, 7, 9 and 10 and Import Rules 1—22.
- " The Ports Act No. X of 1889, Sections 33 and 34 and Part 3 of Schedule I.

Indian.—The Tariff Act No. XI of 1882 and amending Acts.

Bombay.—The A'bkári Act No. V of 1878, Sections 3, 9, 10, 12 and 36 to 42, 54 and 55.

” The Salt Act No. II of 1890, Sections 3, clauses (d) to (h) and (k) to (o) and Sections 34, 36, 38, 41, 43 and 44.

(2) The examination will be divided into two parts—

3. Officers who pass only this lower test are not eligible for appointments in the Gauging and other branches of the Customs House unless and until they pass the higher test under the rules prescribed in the above quoted Notification.

4. These rules do not bar any officer from examination under the higher test.

No. 5515.—In exercise of the powers conferred by Section 5 of the Opium Act, 1878, the Governor in Council is pleased, with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council, to modify, so far

as is hereinafter expressed, the rules made under the said section and published with amendments by Notifications specified in the margin, by directing as follows:—

Notifications No. 4472A at Bombay Government Gazette for 1885, Part I, pages 704—715 and No. 6437 at Bombay Government Gazette for 1892, Part I, page 802.

(1) In No. 4 (ii), in No. 7 and in No. 38 of the said rules there shall be inserted as the initial words thereof the following, viz.:

“Save as provided in Rule 60.”

(2) After No. 59 of the said rules, there shall be added the following, viz.:

“Special exceptions as to crude opium in part of the Thar and Pákar District.”

“60. In applying, so far as concerns crude opium, the provisions of Rule 4 (ii), Rule 7 and Rule 38 to such portion of the Thar and Pákar District as lies east of the Eastern Nára Canal, those rules shall be read as if for the words ‘two tolas’ wherever they occur therein, there were substituted the words ‘ten tolas.’”

AT THE COURT AT WINDSOR.

The 16th day of May 1893.

PRESENT :

The Queen’s Most Excellent Majesty.

Lord President.

Marquess of Ripon.

Mr. Secretary Asquith.

Whereas by treaty, grant, usage, sufferance, and other lawful means, Her Majesty the Queen has jurisdiction within the dominions of the Sultan of Zanzibar :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers by ‘The Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890,’ or otherwise in Her Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :

1. Any act which, if done in British India, would be an offence against the law for the time being in force in British India relating to trade-marks, merchandise-marks, copy-right designs, or inventions, shall, if done in Zanzibar by a person subject to the Orders in Council relating to Zanzibar, be an offence, whether such act is done in relation to any property or right of a British subject, or of a foreigner or native, or otherwise ; and any person guilty of such offence shall be punished with imprisonment for a term which may extend to two months, or with a fine which may extend to 1,000 rupees, or with both.

2. Any Act of the Governor General of India in Council, or of the Governor of Bombay in Council, amending or substituted for any of the Acts of those Legislatures respectively which are made applicable to Zanzibar by or under the provisions of Article 8 of ‘The Zanzibar Order in Council, 1884,’ or shall hereafter be made so applicable, shall apply to Zanzibar without any

orders of the Secretary of State in that behalf, subject, however, to the provisions made in that article for facilitating the application of enactments.

3. This Order shall be read and construed as part of 'The Zanzibar Order in Council, 1884,' and may be cited as 'The Zanzibar (Trade-marks, &c.) Order in Council, 1893.'

4. (a) This Order shall come into operation at the expiration of one month after it is first exhibited in the public office of the Consulate at Zanzibar: provided that any Act of the Imperial Parliament extending to India, or any Act of the Governor-General in Council which is passed after the commencement of this Order and applies to Zanzibar by virtue of this Order, shall not take effect until the expiration of one month after such Act has been exhibited in like manner.

(b) The Consul-General shall cause a copy of this Order and of every such Act to be exhibited, and for the said period kept exhibited, in the public office of the Consulate accordingly.

And the Right Honourable the Earl of Rosebery, K.G., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein.

No. 437.—In supersession of the Notification of this Department, No. 813, dated the 18th December 1888, the Governor General in Council is pleased to make the following rules regarding the remuneration of Medical Officers for attendance on Native Chiefs and Nobles and Native gentlemen of high position in a Native State.

2. When a Native Chief or Noble or gentleman of high position desires the professional attendance of any Medical Officer of Government, the latter will be at liberty to attend him, provided that such attendance does not interfere with the due performance of his ordinary duties. The special permission of the Local Government will, however, be necessary when such attendance involves the absence of the officer from those duties for any substantial time.

3. The Native Chief, Noble or gentleman may offer any Medical Officer of Government attending him such fee as he thinks fit. The offer made will be reported by the Medical Officer through the Political Agent or other officer of Government exercising political functions in the State of which the said Chief, Noble or gentleman is a resident for the consideration of the Local Government within whose jurisdiction the Native State is situated. In reporting the offer, the Medical Officer will state, so far as he is able to do so consistently with his

position as a medical adviser, the nature and extent of the relief afforded, the importance of the case from a professional point of view, and the circumstances under which he attended the patient. The Political Agent or officer forwarding the report will submit it with such remarks as he considers necessary. The Local Government will have authority to sanction the acceptance of any fee so reported unless the amount appears to be out of proportion to the relief afforded and to the circumstances of the case, in which event the matter will be submitted, with the Local Government's opinion, for the consideration and orders of the Government of India.

4. The report prescribed in the preceding paragraph will not be required from a Medical Officer in the following cases:

(1) When the officer names his own charge in accordance with a scale which he has fixed for his patients generally who are not Native Princes or Chiefs, and when such charge is accepted by the patient; and

(2) When the officer and patient reside in the same station and the fee does not exceed Rs. 50 for each visit, or Rs. 1,000 in the aggregate for repeated visits during the course of a year.

5. For the purposes of this Notification the term 'Local Government' will be held to include an Agent to the Governor General and a Resident of the 1st class.

THE STATUTE LAW REVISION ACT, 1893.

[56 VICTORIA, CHAPTER 14.]

An Act for further promoting the Revision of the Statute Law by repealing Enactments which have ceased to be in force or have become unnecessary.

[9th June 1893.]

WHEREAS it is expedient that certain enactments, which may be regarded as spent, or have ceased to be in force otherwise than by express

specific repeal by Parliament, or have by lapse of time or otherwise become unnecessary, should be expressly and specifically repealed :

Be it, therefore, enacted by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows :

1. The enactments described in the schedule to this Act are hereby repealed, subject to the provisions of this Act and subject to the exceptions and qualifications in the schedule mentioned; and every part of a title, preamble, or recital specified after the words 'in part, namely,' in connexion with an Act mentioned in the said schedule may be omitted from any revised edition of the Statutes published by authority after the passing of this Act, and there may be added in the said edition such brief statement of the Acts, officers, persons, and things mentioned in the title, preamble, or recital as may in consequence of such omission appear necessary :

Provided as follows :

The repeal of any words or expressions of enactment described in the said schedule shall not affect the binding force, operation, or construction of any statute, or of any part of a statute, whether as respects the past or the future ;

and where any enactment not comprised in the said schedule has been repealed, confirmed, revived or perpetuated by any enactment hereby repealed, such repeal, confirmation, revivor, or perpetuation shall not be affected by the repeal effected by this Act ;

and the repeal by this Act of any enactment or schedule shall not affect any enactment in which such enactment or schedule has been applied, incorporated, or referred to ;

nor shall such repeal of any enactment affect any right to any hereditary revenues of the Crown, or affect any charges thereupon or prevent any such enactment from being put in force for the collection of any such revenues, or otherwise in relation thereto ;

and this Act shall not affect the validity, invalidity, effect, or consequences of anything already done or suffered,—or any existing status or capacity,—or any right, title, obligation, or liability already acquired, accrued, or incurred, or any remedy or proceeding in respect thereof,—or any release or discharge of or from any debt, penalty, obligation, liability, claim, or demand,—or any indemnity,—or the proof of any past act or thing ;

nor shall this Act affect any principle or rule of law or equity, or established jurisdiction, form or course of pleading, practice, or procedure, or the general or public nature of any statute, or any existing usage, franchise, liberty, custom, privilege, restriction, exemption, office, appointment, payment, allowance, emolument, or benefit, or any prospective right, notwithstanding that the same respectively may have been in any manner affirmed, recognised, or derived by, in, or from any enactment hereby repealed ;

nor shall this Act revive or restore any jurisdiction, office, duty, drawback, fee, payment,

franchise, liberty, custom, liability, right, title, privilege, restriction, exemption, usage, practice, procedure, form of punishment, or other matter or thing not now existing or in force ;

and this Act shall not extend to repeal any enactment so far as the same may be in force in any part of Her Majesty's dominions out of the United Kingdom, except where otherwise expressed in the said schedule.

2. If and so far as any enactment repealed by this Act applies or may have been by Order in Council applied to the court of the county palatine of Lancaster, or to any inferior court of civil jurisdiction, such enactment shall be construed as if it were contained in a local and personal Act specially relating to such court, and shall have effect accordingly.

3. Where any Act cites or refers to another Act otherwise than by its short title, the short title may, in any revised edition of the Statutes printed by authority, be printed in substitution for such citation or reference.

4. This Act may be cited as the Statute Law Revision Act, 1893.

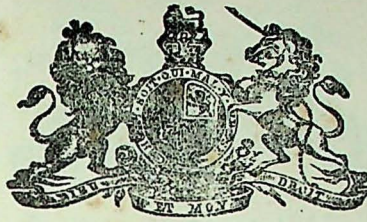
