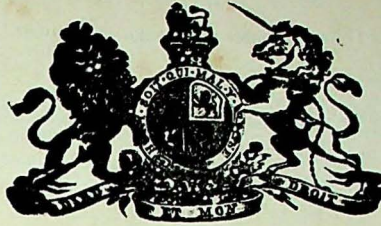

No. 6123.—The Commission appointed by the Government of India to enquire into the cultivation of the hemp plant and the use of hemp drugs in India have now pretty definitely decided on their plan of operations. They desire to obtain, in the first instance, as full information as they can, in respect to the excise systems of the different provinces in regard to hemp drugs, and also in respect to the nature of the objections raised against these systems. They have therefore determined to pay a brief preliminary visit to certain provinces to collect information. The programme of this tour has been drawn up. The approximate date of arrival in each province is—

The Commission, besides obtaining information in writing, will be able to discuss the system of each province with the local Revenue and Excise officers and with other persons interested therein. At the

same time they invite any well-informed persons who object to the existing systems to forward, without delay, a written statement setting forth their objections as fully and clearly as possible. In forwarding this written statement, the objector is also invited to state whether he will submit himself for examination as a witness hereafter. The Commission hope by the above plan to obtain information regarding existing systems and the objections taken to them, which will render it possible for them to examine witnesses on clear and intelligible issues. Meanwhile, they have drawn up a series of questions dealing fully with the cultivation, preparation, consumption, effects and taxation of hemp drugs. The Commission are circulating these questions to local Governments to be put into the hands of selected witnesses. These questions will also be sent to those persons whose written statements deal with matters regarding which the Commission may desire to have further information, and to such other persons as the Commission may think fit to examine. These witnesses will submit written answers and will also (where it is deemed expedient) be orally examined by the Commission when they visit the different provinces for that purpose. The tour for the purpose of recording evidence formally will begin with Bengal in the beginning of November. The provinces will be taken probably in pretty much the same order as for the preliminary tour. The especial point to which it is necessary to invite public attention at present is that if there are any objections taken to existing systems, these should be submitted as promptly as possible to the Secretary, Indian Hemp Drugs Commission, Camp.

Extract from the Proceedings of the Government of India in the Revenue and Agricultural Department (Museums and Exhibitions), dated Simla, the 4th August 1893.

Read—

Letter dated 21st June 1893 from the Consul-General for Belgium, Bombay, intimating that an International Exhibition will be held at Antwerp between the months of May and November 1894, and inviting the co-operation of the Government of India.

RESOLUTION.

The Consul-General has been informed that the Governor-General in Council regrets that financial considerations prevent any extensive contributions being furnished by the Government of India itself. Arrangements will, however, be made by the Reporter on Economic Products to contribute a collection of products either likely to be useful to Indo-Belgian trade or calculated to attract Belgian capital to India. A small grant of money will be allowed for the freight of this collection and of such articles as may be provided by private exhibitors and approved by the Reporter on Economic Products. The Inspector General of Forests has also been instructed to arrange for a collection of forest products and timbers which are likely to find a demand on the Continent. As regards the representation of artware, one of the leading dealers in Indian art manufactures has been informed that if he is prepared to exhibit a collection of such manufactures the space required at the Exhibition will be provided at the cost of Government.

Mr. E. Thurston, Officiating Reporter on Economic Products, has been placed in charge of arrangements so far as the participation by the Government of India in the Exhibition is concerned. But the general conduct of arrangements for representation of Indian exhibitors will be undertaken by the Consul-General, Bombay, and by the Indian Consular Agents for Belgium at Calcutta, Bombay, Madras, Karachi and Rangoon, and intending exhibitors should apply to them for any information which they may require.

ORDER.—Ordered, that the Resolution be published in the Supplement to the *Gazette of India* for general information, and that copies be forwarded to all Local Governments and Administrations with a request that the above information regarding the Exhibition may be notified in the local Gazettes.

RATES OF EXCHANGE.

No. 3624-d.

Simla, the 18th August 1893.

RESOLUTION.—By the Government of India, Finance and Commerce Department.

During the past year and a half numerous representations have reached the Government of India from European officers in Government service, bringing to notice the hardship which they have undergone in consequence of the fall in the rate of exchange, and praying for the adoption of measures of relief. The facts which came to the knowledge of the Government of India left no doubt that the distress from which their servants were suffering was widespread and severe; and His Excellency the Governor General in Council has lost no opportunity of expressing his sympathy with those who have been affected, and of urging upon the Secretary of State the necessity of applying an early and adequate remedy. It was not, however, found possible to deal with the matter while measures regarding the reform of the currency were still under consideration. His Excellency the Governor General in Council is now able to announce that the Secretary of State has been pleased to accord his sanction to the following scheme :

To every European and Eurasian Officer of Government, Civil or Military, not domiciled in India (except those whose pay is fixed in sterling and converted into rupees annually at the official adjusting rate) will be granted an allowance, to be designated Exchange Compensation Allowance, sufficient to enable each officer to remit to Europe one-half his salary, subject to a maximum limit of £1,000 a year, at a privileged rate. The privileged rate has been fixed until further orders at 1s. 6d. the rupee. The allowance, which will be admissible whether any remittance is actually made to Europe or not, will be given in the form of a percentage on the officer's salary, varying with the rate of exchange assumed as the market rate for the quarter, and calculated to yield an amount equal to the difference between one-half salary converted at 1s. 6d., and one-half salary converted at the average market rate. The allowance will be payable month by month along with pay, and under the rules under which pay is drawn; and will be subject in every case to an annual maximum equal to the difference between £1,000 converted at 1s. 6d. and the same sum converted at the average market rate.

2. Rules have been framed prescribing the manner in which the percentage for each quarter shall be calculated, and defining the conditions under which the allowance may be drawn, and these are published herewith for general information. The Secretary of State has been pleased to authorize effect being given to the rules from the beginning of the current official year 1893-94, and the allowance will accordingly be granted in re-

spect of all payments of salary which became payable on or after the 1st April 1893. For the first quarter of the present official year, April to June, the percentage has been fixed at 10·81, corresponding to an exchange of 1s. 2½d. to the rupee, this being the actual average rate during that quarter. For the second quarter, July to September 1893, the percentage has been fixed at 7·6, corresponding to an exchange of 1s. 3½d., that being the actual average market rate from 1st July to the date of the Secretary of State's sanction to the scheme now announced. For future quarters the percentage will be fixed in the manner prescribed in the rules.

3. From the date when these rules come into force, the present system under which family remittances are made through the Government account by military officers and some others will cease, except in cases where this course is inconsistent with the terms of any contract of service. In the case of officers who have made family remittances since the 1st April last, an adjustment will be made when paying them their arrears of Exchange Compensation Allowance. Officers who have made family remittances since 1st April last should refer to their Account Officer before presenting for payment their bills for the arrears from 1st April of the Exchange Compensation Allowances now sanctioned.

4. The Secretary of State has further been pleased to sanction the payment of furlough allowances from the Home Treasury at the same privileged rate of 1s. 6d. to the rupee. This concession also will take effect from the 1st April last in lieu of the special rate of 1s. 4½d. provisionally sanctioned in the Notification in this Department No. 823-A, dated the 27th February 1893, published in the *Gazette of India* of the 4th March 1893.*

ORDER.—Ordered, that the Resolution be communicated to the several Departments of the Government of India; to all local Governments and Administrations; to all Heads of Departments subordinate to the Finance Department; to the Comptroller and Auditor General; and to all Accountants General and Comptrollers.

Ordered also, that the Resolution be published in the *Gazette of India*.

Rules referred to in paragraph 2 of Finance Department Resolution No. 3624-A. of 18th August 1893.

EXCHANGE COMPENSATION ALLOWANCE.

1. The allowance admissible under these rules is called Exchange Compensation Allowance. It is granted to European and Eurasian officers of Government not domiciled in India to compensate them for the extra cost of remittance to Europe occasioned by the fall of the value of the rupee below 1s. 6d., which is herein called the 'privileged rate.'

2. The allowance is granted with the view of enabling every European or Eurasian officer of Government not domiciled in India to remit to Europe half his salary at the privileged rate, subject to a maximum limit of £1,000 a year.

3. In case of doubt the Local Government will decide whether any officer is domiciled in India or not so domiciled for the purposes of these rules. But any European or Eurasian officer to whom the rules in Chapter XIII of the Civil Service Regulations apply may be assumed without further proof to be entitled to the allowance admissible under these rules.

4. The allowance is not admissible to any officer whose pay is fixed in sterling and is converted into rupees at the rate of exchange fixed annually for the adjustment of transactions between England and India.

5. The allowance is granted irrespective of whether any remittance is actually made or not.

6. Officers will be enabled to remit half salary at the privileged rate if they receive a percentage on half salary equal to the proportion by which the privileged rate exceeds the market rate of remittance, or half that percentage on the full salary. The allowance is accordingly given in the form of a percentage on the full salary drawn limited to the amount which would be admissible on a remittance of £1,000.

7. The percentage will be calculated for each quarter with reference to the difference between the privileged rate and the rate fixed as the approximate market rate applicable to the quarter—see rule 8. Thus, if the market rate of exchange applicable to any quarter is 1s. 4d., the difference between this and the privileged rate is equivalent to a percentage of 12½ on that market rate, and the difference between the cost of remitting £1,000 at 1s. 6d. (Rs. 13,333½) and at 1s. 4d. (Rs. 15,000) is Rs. 1,666½. The allowance payable during the quarter would therefore be granted at 6½ per cent. on the full salary limited to the maximum of Rs. 1,666-10-8.

8. The market rate applicable to any quarter will be approximately the average of the Calcutta demand rate during the preceding quarter, and will be calculated and notified by the Comptroller General before the beginning of the quarter.

9. The market rate fixed for any quarter will be applicable to all payments of salary falling due during that quarter. Thus, the rate fixed for the quarter July to September will apply to salary payable between the 1st July and 30th September, —i.e., ordinarily to the salary for the months of June, July and August.

10. For the purpose of illustration, a table is appended showing the percentage admissible on full salary and the maximum allowance admissible at the rates which have been fixed as the market rates for the quarters April to June 1893 and July to September 1893, and at some other rates above and below 1s. 4d.

11. In the case of officers whose emoluments are regulated by the Civil Service Regulations, the allowance is admissible only on 'Salary' as defined in Article 47, Civil Service Regulations. In the case of officers whose emoluments are regulated by the Army Regulations, India, it is admissible only on Pay, Indian Allowances and Staff Pay.

12. The allowance may be drawn regularly with pay in the manner and under the rules under which pay is drawn; and will be charged to the

EDUCATIONAL DEPARTMENT.

No. 1679.—In supersession of Government Notification No. 2015, dated 21st September 1892, the following revised Schedule I to the Grant-in-aid Code (Rules for the Encouragement of Elementary Drawing and Regulations for Drawing Teacher's Certificate) is published for general information:—

GRANT-IN-AID CODE (1890).

SCHEDULE I.

Rules for the Encouragement of Elementary Drawing.

1. * Payments may be made on the results of the Annual Examination in Drawing of pupils and of pupil-teachers as follows:

- (a) Annas 3. For every exercise of the First Grade marked "Fair."
- (b) Rupee 1. For every exercise of the First Grade marked "Good."
- (c) Rupees 2. For every exercise of the First Grade marked "Excellent."
- (d) Rupees 5. For every exercise of the Second Grade in which a pupil passes.

* These payments are made only on scholars in grant-in-aid schools. Payments a, b and c are made only on scholars under 15 years of age.

2. School-masters and pupil-teachers in all schools and colleges who hold Second Grade Art Certificates and Drawing Teacher's Certificates and who teach drawing in their own schools, shall receive an annual grant of Rs. (100) one hundred, provided that not less than ten of their pupils take the First Grade Certificate. On the same conditions the same grant may be given on account of any drawing master teaching in a large school or in a group of schools. And the grant shall be Rs. 150 in case the teacher holds the Third Grade Certificate and the Drawing Teacher's Certificate of the School of Art.

3. The following rules apply to all schools and colleges in the Presidency at which drawing is taught.

4. *Prizes and Certificates.*—A prize will be given for every drawing of the First or Second Grade which reaches the standard of excellence, and a certificate to every pupil who passes in all the subjects of the First or Second Grade.

First Grade Prizes are only given to pupils under 18 years of age.

5. Examinations in First and Second Grade for the purpose of awarding prizes and certificates shall be held annually in April.

6. The subjects forming the First Grade are :—

- (a) Simple Free-hand Drawing.
- (b) Simple Model and Object Drawing.
- (c) Practical Geometry.

A.—First Grade Simple Free-hand Drawing.

By simple free-hand drawing is meant drawing without the aid of any kind of mechanical means of execution, such as ruling, measuring or tracing; or the use of anything but pencil, paper (or slates) and India rubber.

The examples used should be characterized by simplicity and beauty of outline, and the subject should be a small ornamental figure, a flower, leaf, fruit or some simple object with which the pupils are acquainted.

B.—First Grade Model Drawing.

By model drawing is meant drawing in outline from simple objects arranged so that the pupils may have to draw both curved and straight lines. Indian pottery, brass utensils and Surat toys form admirable examples for this subject.

C.—Practical Geometry.

This stage is intended to teach elementary notions of practical geometry and the use of simple drawing instruments. The examination in this subject will be based on problems 1 to 30 and 33 and 37 of Burchett's Practical Geometry, and the construction of the ellipse by means of the trammel.

7. Not less than three lessons a week of one hour's duration each must be given to the teaching of First Grade Art.

8. Scholars must be presented for the three subjects of the First Grade at one examination, but those who have failed in any one subject may be presented again for that subject at the next annual examination.

9. No pupil is eligible for examination in any subject of the Second Grade who has not passed in all the subjects of the First Grade.

10. The subjects comprised in the Second Grade course are :—

- (a) Free-hand drawing from flat examples.
- (b) Free-hand drawing from models.
- (c) Practical geometry.
- (d) Linear perspective.

11. Pupils for Second Grade Art Certificates must be prepared to—

- (a) Draw in a given time an example in outline from the flat.
- (b) Draw in outline a group of models placed by the examiners.
- (c) Solve on paper questions in geometry, as follows :—

I. Plane Geometry by R. Burchett, Problems 1 to 105, omitting Nos. 33, 35, 36, 39, 41, 43, 44, 45, 46, 48, 50, 51, 52, 55, 56, 58, 59 and 60.

II. The construction of scales, and the application of scales to pattern drawing, taken from "Practical Geometry for Art students adapted to the Second Grade, by John Carroll." See Lesson VII., Problem 49, Lesson VIII., and Lessons IX, X, XXVI, XXVII, XXVIII.

III. Elementary Solid Geometry, from Carroll's Plane and Solid Geometry.

In the text-book this subject begins with Definitions and an Introductory Lesson; these are followed by six short Lessons, of which only four are required, viz. :—

- (1) Solids in simple positions.
- (2) Solids, with one or more sides inclined to the vertical plane.
- (3) Solids, with one or more sides inclined to the horizontal plane.
- (4) Sections of solids made by horizontal and vertical Planes.
- (d) Solve questions in perspective showing the use of vanishing and measuring points used in horizontal planes, and to represent simple solids on the ground plane in any position.

12. A pupil may be examined in any one subject of the Second Grade at a time, but a specimen work of the subject (in which he or she wishes to be examined) must be sent up to the Sir Jamsetji Jijibhoy School of Art, Bombay, by the 15th of March and must be approved before he or she can be admitted to the annual examination.

13. The specimen works are :—

- (a) A sheet of free-hand outline drawing from flat examples.
- (b) A drawing from a group of models in outline.
- (c) A sheet of no less than six geometrical problems.
- (d) A perspective diagram.

The above works must be executed on half imperial (21 inches by 15 inches) sheets of paper, and must be delivered at the Sir Jamsetji Jijibhoy School of Art on or before the 15th of March, with the fee of one rupee for each subject.

14. A pupil who has once passed in a subject may not be examined again in that subject.

15. School-masters and pupil-teachers residing in Bombay can attend the early morning classes at the Sir Jamsetji Jijibhoy School of Art to qualify themselves for Second Grade Art Certificates by paying the usual school-fees.

N.B.—Maráthi, Gujaráti, Kámarese and Sindhi translations of Burchett's Practical Geometry can be obtained from the Government Depôts. Carrol's Practical Geometry can be purchased of Mrs. Radaabhai Atmaram Sagoon, Kalbadevi Road, Bombay.

Drawing Teacher's Certificate.

1. The holder of this certificate is qualified to teach drawing up to the standard of the highest art certificate he may hold.

2. No candidate is eligible for examination until he has taken the Second Grade Certificate.

3. The candidate will be required to pass two tests :—

First.—A paper examination.

Second.—An examination in Black-board Drawing.

4. In the paper examination the candidate will be given two simple ornamental figures from the flat and he will be required to show a good method of drawing these figures. For this purpose a series of drawings must be made which shall sufficiently illustrate the manner in which a student should begin to copy the example given, and the successive steps by which he should carry on his drawing to completion; and these drawings must be accompanied by explanatory written notes in English which should be as clear and concise as possible. The candidate will also be given a diagram of two or three simple objects, drawn in perspective which is to be regarded as a group of models seen from a given point of view. He will be required to make a drawing of this, showing the methods he would teach his students to make use of in setting out and constructing the figures; and with the drawing he must give short explanatory written notes in English.

5. The above test will be held on the first day of the annual examination, and it will be given in two papers, for the first of which four hours will be allowed, and for the second two hours.

6. A candidate will not be allowed to draw on the black-board unless he passes the preliminary paper examination.

7. In the examination of drawing on the black-board the candidate will be required to make three drawings :—

First.—The drawing of one of the ornamental figures given previously in the paper examination.

Second.—A drawing of a group of two or three simple objects.

Third.—A drawing of any two or three problems in First Grade Geometry.

Twenty minutes will be allowed for each drawing.

8. In case of failure in any test the whole examination must be taken by the candidate who again appears for the Drawing Teacher's Certificate.

9. The tests will be set by the Principal of the School of Art, Bombay.

The papers will be examined by the Principal or Vice-Principal.

The black-board drawing will be conducted by the Principal, Vice-Principal and the Government Examiners of the Sir J. J. School of Art.

10. Each candidate shall pay a fee of Rs. 3 in advance.
