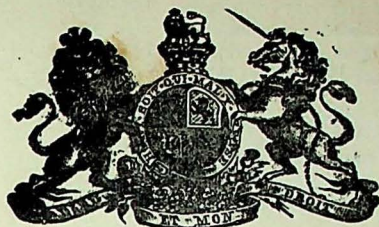

The following Letter from the Queen has been received by The Right Honourable the Secretary of State for the Home Department :

Windsor Castle, July 10, 1893.

The Queen wishes once again to express to Her people how much gratified and touched She has been by the great loyalty and devotion to Herself and Her Family which has been so strikingly evinced on the occasion of the Marriage of Her Beloved Grandson, The Duke of York, and His dear Bride, Princess Victoria Mary of Teck.

It is, indeed, nothing new to the Queen ; for in weal and woe She has ever met with the warmest, kindest sympathy, which She feels very deeply.

She knows that the peoples of Her vast Empire are aware how truly Her heart beats for them in all their joys and sorrows, and that in the existence of this tie between them and Herself lies the real strength of the Empire.

JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 30th August 1893.

No. 5481.—In exercise of the power conferred by Section 320 of the Code of Civil Procedure (Act XIV of 1882, as amended by Act VII of 1888) the Governor of Bombay in Council is pleased, with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council, to declare that in each of the Revenue districts in the Province of Sind the execution of decrees shall be transferred to the Collector of that district in the following cases, viz.:—

- (1) Decrees for money in execution of which a Court has ordered the sale of immoveable property belonging to any person who earns his livelihood either wholly or principally by agriculture, and
- (2) Decrees ordering the sale of immoveable property belonging to any such person in pursuance of a contract specifically affecting the same.

No. 5512.—In exercise of the powers conferred by Section 7 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, 1882, His Excellency the Governor in Council is pleased to alter the limits of the Sessions Division and district of Karáchi and of the Sessions Division and district of Shikárpur by directing as follows, namely:—On and after the 7th September 1893 the areas hereinbelow specified and described by their respective boundaries shall cease to be part of the Shikárpur District included in the Shikárpur Sessions Division and shall be included in and form part of the Karáchi District and Sessions Division.

His Excellency in Council is also pleased, in exercise of the powers conferred by Section 8 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, 1882, to alter the limits of the Sehwan Sub-division of the Karáchi District and of the Mehar Sub-division of the Shikárpur District by directing that on and after the said 7th of September 1893 the areas specified and described as aforesaid shall cease to be part of

Mooring Fees.

Mooring Fees for the use of vessels will be levied as under :—

- (1) Vessels liable to payment of Port Dues at the rate of 4 annas per 100 tons, under the Indian Ports Act, 1889, Rs. 1-8-0 per diem.
- (2) Other vessels Rs. 3 per diem after 48 hours after arrival.
- (3) Vessels exempted from the payment of Port Dues under the Indian Ports Act X of 1889—Free.

No. 104.—In exercise of the powers conferred by Section 6 (1) (m) and (f) of the Indian Ports Act, 1889, His Excellency the Governor in Council is pleased to make for the Port of Bombay the following rules, and to direct that they be incorporated as Nos. 36A and 36B, respectively, in the body of rules in force in the said Port :—

Day Signals for Dredgers and Hoppers.

36A.—Every Dredger when at work laying out chains or not under control and every Hopper when similarly employed in attendance on any such Dredger and not under control shall carry by day as a Signal three shapes as follows :—

- (1) The three shapes shall be arranged in a vertical line one above the other, and be hoisted where they can be best seen by other vessels.
- (2) The uppermost and the lowest of the three shapes shall be—
 - (a) globular in shape and red in colour,
 - (b) not less than two feet in diameter.
- (3) The second shape shall be—
 - (a) six feet below the uppermost shape and six feet above the lowest shape,
 - (b) diamond in shape and white in colour,
 - (c) not less than two feet in diagonal.

Free passages to be kept for Dredgers and Hoppers.

36B.—All vessels and boats shall give every Dredger and Hopper carrying a signal required by Rule 36A, a wide berth in such manner as, taking into consideration that such Hopper or Dredger is out of control and cannot get out of the way, may be necessary to avoid all interference with it and with its operations.

No. 4578.—The following rules approved by the Commissioner of A'bkári under the provisions of Section 35 of the A'bkári Act, 1878, for the management of the Central Distillery at Sholápúr and for the regulation of the storage, removal and transport of spirits made therein are published for general information:—

Rule 1.—The Distillery Inspector shall live on the premises throughout the year in the quarters provided for him and shall be responsible for the general management of the distillery and for the efficient sanitation of the premises. The Distillery Inspector shall open and close the distillery daily in the presence of the officer in charge of the Police guard.

Rule 2.—No work shall be carried on in the distillery before sunrise or after sunset or on Sundays, Good Friday, Christmas Day, New Year's Day, or the Queen's Birthday, except upon the

written permission of the Huzúr Deputy Collector, to whom power to grant this permission has been delegated.

Rule 3.—In the event of work being done under such permission extra remuneration shall be given to the Distillery Inspector for supervision on the scale sanctioned in Government Resolution No. 6882 dated 29th September 1886, and report should be made to the Collector of each occasion on which such permission is granted.

Rule 4.—The Inspector shall be present on duty at the distillery while the stills are working and while distillation is going on, and he shall be responsible that no spirits are removed from the distillery except under proper authority. In the event of his unavoidable absence from sudden illness or other urgent cause, the Huzúr Deputy Collector will make such arrangement as is possible for the temporary conduct of his duty, reporting his proceedings to the Collector forthwith. In cases of urgency the Huzúr Deputy Collector may grant casual leave to the Distillery Inspector, and shall submit a report to the Collector on each occasion of his doing so.

Rule 5.—All liquor drawn during the day shall be tested with the standard Syke's hydrometer and the strength thereof ascertained and adjusted to the standard prescribed as soon as it is cool and fit for testing. It shall then be removed to the strong room, measured by the brass standard measures supplied by Government and deposited in the vats there.

Rule 6.—The Distillery Inspector shall forward to the Huzúr Deputy Collector daily at 11 A.M. a report in the accompanying form showing—

- (a) the opening balance,
- (b) liquor drawn during the preceding 24 hours,
- (c) liquor issued up to 11 A.M.,
- (d) balance in stock.

Rule 7.—There shall be two locks to the strong-room, the keys of one of which shall be kept by the Inspector, of the other by the Contractor or his Agent.

Rule 8.—To each vat in the strong room shall be affixed a board on which shall be clearly painted—

- (1) the serial number of the vat,
- (2) its full capacity,
- (3) date of testing capacity.

The strong room shall always be kept locked except when it is necessary to open it for the purpose of storing or issuing liquor.

Rule 9.—No combustibles other than liquor shall be allowed to be stored in the strong room, and it must not be entered with an open light.

Rule 10.—The Distillery Inspector shall be directly responsible for all accounts, for keeping the distillery books and registers correctly written up to date, and for the due performance of all orders issued by the Collector or by the Huzúr Deputy Collector for the management of the distillery.

Rule 11.—Liquor issued under permit should leave the distillery at the same time as the permit.
