SIR,—I have the honour to forward herewith, for your information, Letter from Controller, India Treasuries, No. G. A. dated 6th September 1893. Letter to Finance Department of the Government of India, No. 970, dated 14th September 1893. Letter from the Finance Department of the Government of India, No. 4211 P, dated 28th September 1893. copies of the correspondence, noted in the margin, regarding the interpretation of the term "Eurasian" and the question of "domicile," for the purpose of the Exchange Compensation Allowance.

Copy of a letter from the Comptroller, India Treasuries, to the Comptroller and Auditor General, No. G. A. dated 6th September 1893.

"With reference to your Circular to all Accountants General and Comptrollers, No. 330, dated 24th August 1893, on the subject of the recently

sanctioned Exchange Compensation Allowance (which from the second clause of paragraph 1 of Government of India Resolution in the Finance and Commerce Department, No. 3624 A, dated 18th August 1893, and rules 1 and 2 referred to in paragraph 2 thereof, appears to be claimable only by European and Eurasian officers of Government not domiciled in India), I have the honour to enquire whether, in auditing claims to the allowance, I am correct in holding—

First, that it is the intention of rule 3 of the rules above mentioned and of the first sentence in clause (i) of your Circular to Treasury Officers, No. 829, dated 24th August 1893, that the allowance shall be passed to any European or Eurasian Officer to whom the rules in Chapter XIII of the Civil Service Regulations may either now or hereafter apply even though such an officer be known by his own admission or otherwise, to be domiciled in India;

Secondly, that the term "European or Eurasian", as used in the above-mentioned Government of India Resolution and the rules thereunder, includes all persons who are not of purely Asiatic descent; and

Thirdly, that no person can be held to be "not domiciled in India" for the purposes of the above-mentioned Resolution and rules (whatever may be his legal domicile under the provisions of the Indian Succession Act or otherwise) if the circumstances of his inhabitation of Asia are such as to render it unnecessary or unnatural for him to remit money to Europe for the purpose of being immediately or ultimately spent in Europe and not for the purpose of being again remitted to India."

Copy of a letter from the Comptroller General to the Secretary to the Government of India, Finance and Commerce Department, No. 970, dated 14th September 1893.

"I have the honour to submit a copy of a letter No. ^{G.A.}₆₀₀, dated 6th instant, from the Comptroller, India Treasuries, and to solicit the orders of Government on the points raised therein.

2. Copies of this office Circulars Nos. 829 and 830, dated 24th August last, referred to by the Comptroller, India Treasuries, are enclosed for reference.

3. I apprehend that the replies to the Comptroller, India Treasuries' questions should be as indicated below; but, as some doubt has been felt, I think it best to submit the case for the orders of Government:

(I) The allowance should be passed to any European or Eurasian officer to whom the rules in Chapter XIII of the Civil Service Regulations apply, no question as to domicile being raised.

(II) "Eurasian" for the purpose of Exchange Compensation Rules includes any person of mixed European and Asiatic descent (it being borne in mind, however, that where the father is Indian, the domicile of the son would be Indian, unless he has acquired a new domicile).

(III) The question of domicile does not depend either on the actual remitting or on the necessity of remitting money to Europe to be spent there. A man's domicile is his domicile of origin, unless he has acquired a new domicile by taking up his fixed habitation in a country which is not that of his domicile of origin."

Copy of a letter from the Secretary to the Government of India, Finance and Commerce Department, to the Comptroller and Auditor General, No. 4211 P, dated 28th September 1893.

"In reply to your letter No. 970 dated 14th instant, I am directed to say that the Government of India approve the replies which you propose to give to the questions (II) and (III) put by the Comptroller, India Treasuries, in connection with the title of certain officers to the Exchange Compensation Allowance.

2. As regards the first question dealt with in paragraph 2 of your letter, I am to observe that it is not intended that every officer who is subject to the leave rules in Chapter XIII of the Civil Service Regulations should be held to be eligible for the Exchange Compensation Allowance irrespective of the fact whether he is or is not domiciled in India. The fact of an officer being subject to the rules in Chapter XIII of the Civil Service Regulations raises the presumption that he is entitled to the allowance, but this presumption is not conclusive and may be rebutted.

3. The Exchange Compensation Allowance should accordingly be passed to every European or Eurasian Officer, subject to the rules in Chapter XIII of the Civil Service Regulations as they now stand without requiring formal proof in regard to domicile. But if in the case of any such officer the audit officer, the head of the officer's department, or the Local Government, has any reason to believe, from personal knowledge or otherwise, that the officer is not eligible for the allowance as having an Indian domicile enquiries should be instituted, and, if necessary, the case should be submitted through the proper channel for the orders of the Government of India in the Finance and Commerce Department or of the other authority which is empowered to dispose of it, if any."

GENERAL DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 16th October 1893.

No. 3718.—In exercise of the power conferred by Act I of 1870, the following Rules for Quarantine against Cholera have been made by the Government of Bombay, with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council: they have effect from the 10th instant in the Ports of Aden, Perim and the Somali Coast as a temporary measure:—

- I.—The Commander of every vessel, including buggalows or other native craft, arriving from all ports on the Arabian Coast of the Red Sea shall, before entering the harbour, indicate by signal the port from which such vessel has come.
- II.—Such Commander shall not, except as hereinafter provided, allow any communication, either with the pilot boat, except orally, or with the shore, or with any other vessel or boat in the harbour.
- III.—Immediately on arrival the Commander shall cause the letter R of the Commercial Signal Code to be hoisted, and shall keep the said flag flying during his stay in port or until authorized by the Health Officer to haul it down. If communication with the shore is not desired, the vessel shall anchor at such place as may be pointed out by the Port authorities, having regard to the season of the year. If communication with the shore is desired, the Health Officer shall go alongside the vessel, and, after all necessary enquiries, shall direct the Commander to take the vessel to the quarantine anchorage duly appointed and notified in that behalf by the Resident, there to remain for a period of seven days from the date of arrival, or for the shorter period prescribed in Rule IV, and undergo disinfection, which should apply as well to crew, passengers, effects, and susceptible goods.

IV.—If the Health Officer of the Port has sufficient evidence that no cases of a suspicious nature have taken place on board during the voyage, and if the vessel is besides in good hygienic condition, the duration of the quarantine will be diminished according to the following scale :—

After eight days of voyage	...	...	six days of quarantine.
Do. nine do.	...	...	five do.
Do. ten do.	...	...	four do.
Do. eleven do.	...	...	three do.
Do. twelve do.	...	...	two do.
Do. thirteen do.	and upwards	...	twenty-four hours of quarantine.

V.—If during the period a vessel is at the quarantine anchorage aforesaid any case or cases of cholera should occur on board, the said vessel shall remain in quarantine for a period of seven days from the date of the last case occurring, and be subject to all the prohibitions provided for in Rule III.

VI.—When any vessel has been placed in quarantine as aforesaid, the Health Officer may direct the removal of so many of the passengers and crew as may not be suffering from illness, and whose services may not be required on board the vessel, to such particular spots as may from time to time be selected by the Resident as places of quarantine, there to remain for a period of seven days. If a case of cholera occurs among such passengers and crew during any such period, they shall remain in a place of quarantine for a period of fifteen days from the date of the occurrence of the last case of such illness.

VII.—Any mails or cargo which may be brought by any vessel so arriving shall be landed under such precautions as the Health Officer may deem necessary to prevent the spread of the disease.

VIII.—It will be the duty of the Port Officer to facilitate the conveyance to all vessels in quarantine of such supplies of provisions, stores and other articles as may be required by those on board. Such supplies will be placed on the boats of the vessels in quarantine to be subsequently removed by members of their crews.

IX.—All vessels arriving at Aden, Perim and the Somali Coast which may have communicated with vessels coming from all ports on the Arabian Coast of the Red Sea shall be subjected to the same quarantine as vessels arriving at Aden, Perim and the Somali Coast from such ports.

X.—All vessels which have undergone quarantine in the manner above prescribed should have the fact clearly stated on their Bills of Health.
