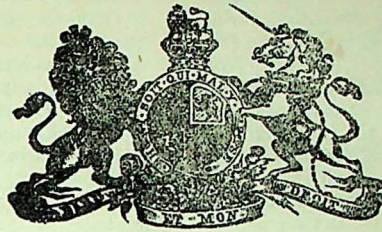

GENERAL DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 31st October 1893.

No. 3932.—The following Resolution of the Government of India, Revenue and Agricultural Department, (Meteorology), No. ⁶¹/₅₅, dated 6th October 1893, is republished for general information :—

Extract from the Proceedings of the Government of India in the Revenue and Agricultural Department, No. (Meteorology),—dated Simla, the 6th October 1893.

Read—

Letter from the Meteorological Reporter to the Government of India No. 4098, dated 11th September 1893, submitting the Annual Report on the Administration of the Meteorological Department for the year 1892-93.

RESOLUTION.

During the year Mr. H. F. Blanford, who retired in 1889, after controlling the Department for 15 years, died in England. His services to meteorological science in this country, which were acknowledged on his retirement, only ceased with his life, for he continued to work enthusiastically for the Department until the end. The Government of India deplore the loss of so valuable a worker, whose labours have greatly improved the knowledge of the weather and climate of India, and whose work, both as the administrator of the Indian Meteorological Department and as an independent investigator, has given him a prominent place amongst meteorologists.

2. The number of observatories in charge of the Meteorological Department has risen from 154 in 1889-90 to 174 in 1892-93. The ‘battery’ of observations in the Mysore State referred to last year was completed by the establishment of three

second-class stations at Chitaldrug, Mysore and Hassan. Ten of the fourteen observatories sanctioned in the previous year were established during the year under report in the North-Western Provinces and Oudh, in Burma, on the North-West Frontier, and in Persia. Arrangements were also made to obtain meteorological observations from Muscat and several stations on the Indo-European line of telegraph. In connection with these latter stations the officers of the Telegraph Department rendered cordial and useful help, and the thanks of the Government of India are due to them as well as to the officers of the Survey Department who have permitted the establishment of observatories both at the tidal stations of Muscat and Minicoy and at the Trigonometrical Office in Dehra Dun. The observatories maintained by Municipalities did good work, and the Government of India would be glad to see this class of observatories extended.

3. With the co-operation of the Foreign Department it has been possible to extend the area of snowfall registration, and the intelligence now received gives fairly comprehensive and accurate information regarding the Eastern and Western Himalayan region, Lower Thibet, Afghanistan, and Baluchistan. The valuable information recorded last cold weather by 25 observers regarding the character and distribution of the snowfall was of considerable service in the preparation of a forecast of the south-west monsoon for the present summer.

4. The registration of rainfall continued to receive attention. Native States have been supplied with 81 rain-gauges during the year and British Provinces with 130. The local reports indicate an improvement as regards the inspections of rain-gauge stations by District Officers. The Government of India trust that this improvement will continue, and that provincial authorities will endeavour to secure systematic and adequate inspections. Credit is due to the officers of the Meteorological Department itself for the active inspection conducted by them.

5. A more than usual amount of work was done under the head of Marine Meteorology. Data from ships' logs are now collected systematically and published as promptly as circumstances allow, and a daily chart is issued which includes the marine area. It is hoped that valuable information will thus be recorded regarding the early stages of meteorological change which are not indicated by coast or inland observations taken in India.

6. The Government of India recognise the value of the estimates obtained from short forecasts of the autumn rains and of the cold weather rains and snowfall. The anticipations in the forecasts of the year under report were on the whole in satisfactory accordance with actual results. In regard to the winter forecasts, Mr. Eliot remarks :—
‘The methods of forecasting the cold weather rainfall have not been fully worked out, but much attention is being devoted by the department to the conditions of its occurrence in the hope that it may be possible to issue useful forecasts of the rainfall of that period.’

7. Storm and flood warnings were found useful and efficient. Telegrams were sent daily to the Camp of Exercise at Muridki, and the report on

the experiment warrants the belief that telegraphic information of the kind would be of practical use to troops in the field. The warning of seaports was for the most part timely and satisfactory. Attention is being specially devoted to this subject, and particularly to the improvement of the code of signals. The assistance already given in the development of sea-warnings by shipowners and masters and the marine authorities merits the thanks of Government.

8. The Government of India are glad to notice the large amount of inspection done during the year and the continued improvement in the condition of the observatories, as well as the arrangements made during the year in the Provinces for the publication of rainfall data. The weather was unfavourable for actinometric work at Simla. The meteorological observations in forests were continued as in previous years, and the data for the past six years will, it is hoped, shortly be reported upon by the Meteorological Reporter of the North-Western Provinces and Oudh.

9. As usual, the publications of the department record much valuable work. Arrangements which were made to publish the meteorological observations taken at Trevandrum by the late Mr. Allen Broun from 1853 to 1864 are progressing satisfactorily, and the first of the publications will probably be issued next year. The monthly weather review has not issued as punctually as might be desired, but there have been difficulties in the way of its publication and the Meteorological Reporter is doing his best to ensure its prompt issue in future.

10. The thanks of the Government of India are again due to Mr. Eliot, to his assistants, and to the Provincial Reporters for the work done.

ORDER.—Ordered, that the foregoing Resolution be forwarded to the several departments of the Government of India; to Local Governments and Administrations; to the Director General of Telegraphs; to the Surveyor General of India; to the Surgeon General with the Government of India; and to the Meteorological Reporter to the Government of India.

Ordered also, that it be published in the Supplement to the *Gazette of India*.

No. 7890.—In exercise of the powers conferred by Sections 37, 52, 53 and 59 of the Bombay Salt Act, 1890, the Governor in Council is pleased to make the following rules, and to direct that on and after the 15th November 1893 the same shall have force in supersession of all existing rules on the same subjects respectively:—

Preliminary.

1. These rules may be cited as the Bombay Salt Rules, 1893.

Short title.

Deposit and Storage of Salt at Salt-Works.

1A. No person shall allow any salt which is under his control to lie unheaped for more than 10 days or for a period longer than that allowed under any general or special order communicated to him as made by the Collector of Salt Revenue in this behalf.

2. Except before first storage in heaps at a salt work or after removal to a distance of at least one mile beyond a Preventive Station, no person shall sift or spread out any salt to dry except with the special sanction of the Commissioner.

3. Before first storage no person shall sift salt or spread it out to dry except in places appointed by the Sarkarkún for that purpose.

4. The licensee shall be bound to store the salt produced in or during each manufacturing season separately from the salt produced in or during every other manufacturing season, unless specially permitted by the Sarkarkún to do otherwise.

5. No person shall construct or cause or allow to be constructed any storage platform or salt heap in any shape or of any size or in any situation other than such as may be in accordance with the general or special orders of the Collector of Salt Revenue for the time being in force and applicable in that behalf.

6. When a heap of salt has been broken open to satisfy a permit, the licensee shall not, except with the written permission of the Sarkarkún, allow any other heap in the same salt-work to be resorted to for the same permit until the heap first opened has been disposed of and cleared away.

7. No person shall open or cause or allow to be opened any salt heap which he has been directed by the Sarkarkún not to open. The licensee shall close in such manner as the Sarkarkún may direct any salt heap which has been opened.

8. No person shall add to, or remove from, or cause or allow additions or removals to be made to, or from, any salt in a heap that has been partly made and not completed, if loss by smuggling,

rain, flood, or any exceptional accident has occurred thereto, or if the Sazedár, on the ground of such loss having occurred, prohibits such addition or removal, unless and until such heap has been inspected by the Sarkarkún or some officer deputed by him.

9. No person shall at any time add any salt to, or cause or allow any salt to be added to, a heap after it has been once made and completed.

Deposit of Salt.

10. No person shall deposit or cause or allow to be deposited at any salt-work in the Kánara District any salt within 200 yards of any kothár or building used or intended to be used for the storage of salt on which excise duty has not been paid excepting on ground allotted for the purpose by the Sarkarkún; and any person depositing salt on any such ground shall be bound to at once remove it if so ordered by the Sarkarkún.

Removal of Salt.

11. Except as is hereinafter in this rule otherwise provided, no one shall remove salt from a salt-work otherwise than in bags legibly marked with consecutive numbers and with the initials or other distinguishing mark of the person on whose account the salt is removed: Provided that this rule shall not apply to removals of salt from Government Salt-Works at Kháraghoda to the stores or from the works at Sanikatta to the kothárs, or to salt removed under the special orders of the Collector or by Wanjaris.

Conservancy of Salt-Works.

12. No person shall commit a nuisance within the limits of any salt-work.

Warehousing of Salt for Sale.

13. Licenses, granted by the Collector under Section 37 of the Act for the storage or possession of salt for sale within any of the limits mentioned in Section 36 of the Act, shall be either for the wholesale or for the retail sale of salt and shall be in the form annexed to these rules and contain the conditions specified in the said form. The said conditions shall be deemed to be and shall have the same force as rules framed by the Governor in Council under Section 37 (1) of the Act.

14. Every license shall be taken out not later than the 1st of January in each year and shall be in force until the 31st December next following and no longer.

15. The Collector may cancel or refuse to renew a license without assigning any reasons therefor.

16. If a licensee desires to open, for purposes of sale, more than one shop or warehouse, he must obtain a separate license for each such shop or warehouse.

17. Every such license shall be liable to suspension or revocation, at any time, on breach, by the licensee or any of his servants, of any of the conditions thereof or of any provisions of the Act.

Disposal and destruction of things seized.

Destruction of confiscated salt-earth. 18. Confiscated salt-earth shall be destroyed.

19. At any time after the seizure of goods under the Act, it shall be lawful for an officer not lower in rank than a Sarkarkún to direct that any such goods which appear to him to be subject to natural and speedy decay, shall be sold by public auction at once or, if unsaleable, that they shall be destroyed.

20. Any officer of a class not lower in rank than Sarkarkúns or Inspectors may give the directions specified in Section 52 (b) in any case in which such directions may be given under the provisions thereof.

21. The surplus proceeds of all sales under Rules 19 and 20 shall, unless the owner of the property sold establishes his claim to them within three months of the sale, be forfeited to Her Majesty.

Penalties.

22. Whoever commits a breach of any of the Rules 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10 and 11 or of any condition of a license granted under Rule 13, shall be punished with fine which may extend to rupees fifty; and in default of payment of fine, with simple imprisonment for a term which may extend to one month.

23. Whoever commits a breach of Rule 12 shall be punished with fine which may extend to rupees twenty, and in default of payment of the fine, with simple imprisonment for a term which may extend to ten days.

FORM OF LICENSE FOR THE STORAGE AND POSSESSION OF SALT (*vide* RULE 13).

I, _____, Collector of Salt Revenue, do hereby authorize and empower _____, now dwelling at _____, in the taluka of _____, in the district of _____, to store or have in his possession salt for the purpose of sale in the below-mentioned building (or enclosure or premises as the case may be) situated in the village of _____ in the taluka of _____

in the district of _____, viz., in the building (enclosure or premises as the case may be) known as _____ and situated on the _____ side of _____ street and numbered No. _____ by the Municipality of _____ provided that he conform to the following conditions, viz.:

(1) That he keep and have ready for inspection at any time by any officer of the Salt Department, requiring to see the same, a detailed diary

account showing truly the quantities of salt received by him, the name of the persons from whom, and of the salt-works at which such salt has been obtained, the No. and date of the permit covering the same and the names of the ports, if any, at which such salt is landed, as well as the names of the persons to whom he may sell salt and the quantity delivered to each.

(2) That he furnish on the first of every month to the Sarkarkún at _____ an abstract account in such form as may from time to time be required of him, showing the gross quantities of salt received and sold by him during the previous month and the balance in store at the end of the same.

(3) That he shall not sell more than 40 seers of 80 tolas each of salt to one and the same person, except on the production by such person of a special permit under Section 38 (2) of the Bombay Salt Act II of 1890, to retain more than that amount for his private consumption or to transport more than that amount to some place beyond the limits mentioned in Section 36 of Bombay Act II of 1890, or to some other licensed shop or warehouse within those limits, duly signed by myself, or my successor in office for the time being, or by one of my deputies or assistants.

(4) That he shall not transfer this license to any other person, nor permit salt to be sold under colour thereof by any other than himself or his servants duly approved for such purpose by the Sarkarkún at _____, a list of whose names he shall from time to time, as required, furnish to the said Sarkarkún.

(5) (*For retail licenses only.*)

That he shall at no time keep in store more than 50 Indian maunds of salt or such other quantity as I or my successor in office may by special order prescribe.

(*For wholesale licenses only.*)

That he shall store all the salt in his possession in bags, each containing not less than one or more than three maunds.

(6) This license shall be in force from the day of _____ 189 until the day of _____ 189 and no longer, but shall be liable to be suspended or revoked at any time by myself, or one of my deputies, in the event of the infringement by the said _____, or by any of his servants, of any conditions thereof or of any of the provisions of the Bombay Salt Act, 1890.

Notification.

GENERAL DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 4th November 1893.

No. 3976.—In exercise of the power conferred by Act I of 1870, the following Rules for Quarantine against Plague have been made by the Government of Bombay, with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council: they have effect from the 15th ultimo in the Ports of Aden, Perim and the Somali Coast as a temporary measure:—

- I.—The Commander of every vessel, including buggalows or other native craft, arriving from the Arabian Coast of the Red Sea from Leet to Lohayya inclusive shall, before entering the harbour, indicate by signal the port from which such vessel has come.
- II.—Such Commander shall not, except as hereinafter provided, allow any communication, either with the pilot boat, except orally, or with the shore, or with any other vessel or boat in the harbour.
- III.—Immediately on any such arrival being signalled, the Health Officer of the Port shall go alongside the vessel and ascertain by enquiry from the Commander whether any person on board is suffering, or has during the voyage suffered, from plague, and if the Health Officer is satisfied by such enquiry that no person on board is suffering, or during the voyage has suffered, from plague, he shall direct the Commander to take the vessel to the quarantine anchorage duly appointed and notified in that behalf by the Resident, there to remain for a period of seven days from the date of arrival in the harbour. The Health Officer shall also direct the Commander to prohibit, during the period for which the vessel remains at the quarantine anchorage as aforesaid, all communication, except such as is hereinafter provided for between such vessel and the shore, or other vessels and boats in the harbour.

- IV.—If the Health Officer shall have reason to believe at the time when the vessel arrives in the harbour that any person on board is suffering, or during the voyage has suffered, from plague, he shall direct the Commander to take the vessel to the quarantine anchorage as aforesaid, and there to remain for a period of fifteen days from the day of arrival in the harbour; and shall further direct that during such fifteen days, intercourse between the said vessel and the shore or other vessels and boats in the harbour shall be prohibited as provided in Rule III.
- V.—If during the period a vessel is at the quarantine anchorage aforesaid any case or cases of plague should occur on board, the said vessel shall remain in quarantine for a period of fifteen days from the date of the last case occurring, and be subject to all the prohibitions provided for in Rules III and IV.
- VI.—When any vessel has been placed in quarantine as aforesaid, the Health Officer may direct the removal of so many of the passengers and crew as may not be suffering from illness, and whose services may not be required on board the vessel, to such particular spots as may from time to time be selected by the Resident as places of quarantine, there to remain for a period of seven days, or if the vessel has been placed in quarantine for fifteen days, for a period of fifteen days. If a case of plague occurs among such passengers and crew during any such period, they shall remain in a place of quarantine for a period of fifteen days from the date of the occurrence of the last case of such illness.
- VII.—Any mails or cargo which may be brought by any vessel so arriving shall be landed under such precautions as the Health Officer may deem necessary to prevent the spread of the disease.
- VIII.—It will be the duty of the Port Officer to facilitate the conveyance to all vessels in quarantine of such supplies of provisions, stores and other articles as may be required by those on board. Such supplies will be placed on the boats of the vessels in quarantine to be subsequently removed by members of their crews.
- IX.—All vessels arriving at Aden, Perim and the Somali Coast, which may have communicated with vessels coming from the Arabian Coast of the Red Sea from Leet to Lohayya inclusive, shall be subjected to the same quarantine as vessels arriving at Aden, Perim and the Somali Coast from the Arabian Coast of the Red Sea from Leet to Lohayya inclusive.
