## Bombay Castle, 21st November 1893.

No. 7344.—In supersession of Government Notification No. 3673, dated the 9th July 1890, the Governor in Council is pleased, under Section 8 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, 1882, to divide the district of Kolaba into two sub-divisions, comprising the following talukas respectively :—

- (1) The Northern Sub-Division, comprising the talukas of Karjat, Panvel and Pen, including the Mahals of Khalapur, Uran and Nagothna.
- (2) The Southern Sub-Division, comprising the talukas of Alibag, Rohe, Manganon and Mahad;

and, under Section 13 of the Code, to place Mr. J. H. DuBoulay, I. C. S., Assistant Collector and Magistrate of the First Class in charge of the Northern Sub-Division, and Rao Bahadur Kashinath Narayan Bhangamkar, District Deputy Collector and Magistrate of the First Class, in charge of the Southern Sub-Division.

2. Under Section 37 of the Code Mr. J. H. DuBoulay, I. C. S., and Rao Bahadur Kashinath Narayan Bhangamkar are invested with the following additional powers specified in the fourth schedule :—

Power to hear appeals from convictions by Magistrates of the Second and Third Classes (Section 407).

Power to call for records (Section 435).

3. Under Section 260 of the Code His Excellency in Council is also pleased to specially empower Rao Bahadur Kashinath Narayan Bhangamkar to try in a summary way all the offences mentioned or referred to in that section.

## FINANCIAL DEPARTMENT.

*Bombay Castle, 17th November 1893.*

No. 3971.—In accordance with Rule 9 of the Rules prescribed in the Notification of the Government of India in the Department of Finance and Commerce No. 15, dated 1st January 1889 republished in the *Bombay Government Gazette* of the 10th idem, under No. 116, dated 9th idem, Financial Department, His Excellency the Governor in Council is pleased to publish the following application from the Municipal Commissioners of Hubli for the grant of a loan of Rs. 47,000 under the provisions of the Local Authorities Loan Act, 1879 :—

“To

SIR,

We, the President and members of the Managing Committee of the Hubli Municipality, beg to apply to Government, under the Local Authorities Loan Act of 1879 and Government Resolution, Financial Department, No. 387, dated 28th January 1889, for a grant of loan of Rs. 47,000.

2. The loan is required for the completion of the Hubli Water Works sanctioned by Government Resolution dated 8th April 1890, No. C. W.—41. The subsequent additions and alterations in the original design were sanctioned by Government ending with the Resolution No. 3 C. W.—6 of 1893, dated 23rd January 1893.

3. The cost of the work, as originally estimated, was Rs. 4,45,286. Subsequent changes brought the estimate to Rs. 4,95,286. Of this, the Southern Marátha Railway Company have paid Rs. 2,50,000 and the Municipality Rs. 1,94,015, making Rs. 4,44,015 in all. The balance of Rs. 51,271 is to be met, but the Executive Engineer in charge of the work expects some saving in the said sanctioned estimate, and for this reason the Municipality have for the present resolved to borrow Rs. 47,000 only.

4. The funds on the security of which the amount is to be borrowed are the water-rates to be levied by the Municipality under Act VI of 1873 and Act II of 1884.

5. The loan is required during the official year 1893-94. Of the total sum of the loan asked for, Rs. 30,000 is required at once, the Executive Engineer in charge of the works having made an urgent call for the same.

6. The loan will be repaid with interest in 30 years.

7. The loan being required for the completion of a work for which Government have already given a loan at Rs. 4½ per cent., and it being in continuation of the same, it is hoped that Government will be pleased to grant it on the same terms as the previous one, namely at 4½ per cent. per annum. The annual instalments to be paid by the Municipality in liquidation of the principal and interest for 30 years will therefore be Rs. 2,880-4-10.

8. The statements showing the annual receipts and expenditure of this Municipality for the last three years are submitted herewith, from which it will be seen that the average receipts have been Rs. 59,068-10-8 and the expenditure Rs. 59,492-9-5, exclusive of that incurred on the new Water Works.

9. Prior existing charges upon the funds of the Municipality is a loan of Rs. 1,95,000 taken from Government for the above-mentioned work, which is to be paid by annual instalment of Rs. 11,971-4-10. The first instalment has already been paid.

10. The Municipality intend to levy a water-rate in order to meet the charges already incurred and those that are to be incurred on account of this work after the work is completed and the water is distributed in the town. The rate is calculated to yield a sum of about Rs. 30,900 a year,—in other words, sufficient to cover the current charges for maintenance, as also the amount of annual instalments required to be paid to Government in liquidation of the loan.

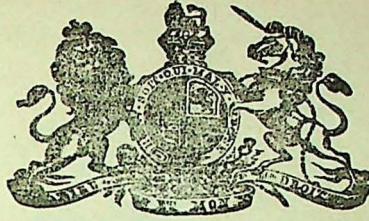
