Extract from the Proceedings of the Government of India in the Home Department (Public),—under date Simla, the 8th November 1893.

Read—

Home Department Circular letter No. 1—112—21, dated the 15th February 1889.

Also replies of Local Governments and Administrations to the above Circular.

RESOLUTION.

As there appeared to be no uniform practice in regard to the gazetting of appointments of uncovenanted officers, the Government of India took into consideration the question whether it was possible to prescribe any general principle for determining whether an appointment should be treated as gazetted or not, and the authority under whose orders it should be gazetted. With this object Local Governments and Administrations were asked in the Circular letter cited above for information as to the practice prevailing in the several Provinces in this respect, and whether the practice was based on any general principle. From the replies received from Local Governments it appears that, although no general principle has been prescribed to regulate the distinction between gazetted and non-gazetted appointments, the term ‘gazetted officer’ is generally held to apply to an

officer whose appointment is gazetted by Government and not by the Head of a Department.

2. After giving careful consideration to the subject, the Governor General in Council is of opinion that the broad line of demarcation between gazetted and non-gazetted officers should be that which separates the Provincial from the Subordinate Service; and that all officers belonging to the Provincial Service (including Munsifs, except in the Punjab and the Central Provinces, where these officers are placed in the Subordinate Service, should be held to be gazetted officers within the meaning of the Civil Service Regulations; while members of the Subordinate Service should not come within that category, even if their appointments are published in the Gazette. His Excellency in Council accordingly directs that as a general rule, and except in very special cases, such as that of Munsifs in the Madras Presidency, who are gazetted by the High Court, all appointments which it is decided to include in the Provincial Service shall be gazetted by the Local Government and shall be held to be gazetted offices within the meaning of the Civil Service Regulations; while those in the Subordinate Service shall, if gazetted at all, be gazetted by the Heads of Departments who have the power to make them under the orders of the Local Government. In Provinces where the powers delegated to Heads of Departments elsewhere in respect of the latter class of appointments are exercised by the Head of the Administration himself, appointments of officers in the Subordinate Service shall, if gazetted, be notified in that part of the Gazette in which notifications of Heads of Departments appear. Thus Tahsildars would be gazetted in the North-Western Provinces and Oudh by the Board of Revenue and in the Punjab by the Financial Commissioners, while Mamlatdars would be gazetted in Bombay by the Commissioners. On the other hand, in Bengal and the Central Provinces, where the corresponding class of officers (Sub-Deputy Collectors and Tahsildars) are appointed by the Head of the Administration himself, the appointments, though gazetted under the orders of the Local Government, will be notified under a separate heading relating to the Subordinate Service, together with appointments made by Heads of Departments.

The case of officers serving in other Departments, such as Medical, Registration, Police or Jails, should be governed by the same rule; that is to say, where Government makes the appointment it should gazette, and only appointments so made should be recognised as gazetted appointments within the meaning of the Civil Service Regulations; in other cases Heads of Departments should gazette appointments of officers subordinate to them subject to the orders of the Local Government as to any limit which it may think it expedient to lay down.

3. The Governor General in Council at the same time desires that it may be clearly understood that notifications investing officers with powers under different Acts, in order that the Courts may take judicial cognizance of them, do not constitute the persons invested with such powers ‘gazetted officers’ within the meaning of the Civil Service Regulations.

4. It is the practice for the Heads of Imperial Departments named in the margin to issue notifications relating to officers serving under them in Part II of the *Gazette of India*. The orders contained in the present Resolution are not intended to take away these powers; nor do they render officers so gazetted non-gazetted officers.

ORDER.—Ordered, that a copy of this Resolution be forwarded to Local Governments and Administrations for information and guidance; that a copy be forwarded to all Departments of the Government of India for information; and that it be published in the *Gazette of India* for general information.

SIR,—I have the honour to subjoin below, for information, the Resolution of the Government of India, Department of Finance and Commerce, No. 4806-P, dated the 3rd November 1893:—

"The question having been raised whether the exchange compensation allowance is liable to annuity and fund deductions, His Excellency the Governor-General in Council has decided that annuity and civil fund deductions shall be levied on the exchange compensation allowance in all cases in which under the operation of the existing rules and regulations the allowance is liable to such deductions.

"2. The Rules applicable do not require the levy of fund subscriptions on the allowance except in the following cases:

'Annuity Deduction.—All Indian Civil Servants are liable to pay these deductions on their exchange compensation allowances except Madras and Bombay Civil Servants who entered the service or passed the final examination before 1876. The latter are exempt because they would not have been liable under the rules of the Funds to which they belonged; and though the funds no longer exist, their subscriptions continue to be regulated by the rules of the Funds.

'Civil Fund deduction.—All Indian Civil Servants who were Members of the old Madras, Bombay, and Bengal Funds are liable to pay these deductions on their exchange compensation allowances.'"
