NOTIFICATIONS.

JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 23rd February 1893.

No. 1171.— The following Rules and Forms, for use in District and Subordinate Courts and in Mofussil Small Cause Courts, prepared by the Accountant General, and approved by the Honourable the Chief Justice and Judges of the High Court, have been sanctioned by the Governor in Council and are published for general information. These Rules supersede the Rules for Mofussil Small Cause Courts published with Government Notification No. 5692, dated the 17th October 1890:—

1. These rules and forms apply to all sums received and paid by a Civil Court in connection with any suit or judicial proceeding.

2. Wherever in these rules and forms the Názir 'Názir' defined. is referred to as performing any duty, the term includes any officer of the Court authorized by the Judge to perform the duty in question.

List of Forms.

3. The following account forms shall be used:

- A. Book of receipts for money paid into Court.
- B. Register of unadvised money orders.
- C. Register of deposit receipts, viz., register of sums received in Court in connection with suits or judicial proceedings and deposited with Government (to be kept in duplicate).
- D. Register of deposit payments, viz., register of payments from sums received in Court in connection with suits or judicial proceedings and deposited with Government (to be kept in duplicate).

- E. R gis'er of intestate property.
- F. Register of attached property.
- G. Register of money received on account of civil prisoners and subsistence money of expenses of witnesses.
- H. Register of payments on account of subsistence money of civil prisoners and expenses of witnesses.
- I. Cash Book.
- J. Ledger.
- K. Bank or Treasury Pass-book.
- L. Bank or Treasury Cheque-book.
- M. Application for refund of lapsed deposits.
- 4. In all District Courts, except for special reasons, the accounts shall Language in which the accounts are to be kept. be kept in English (ex-G, H). In Subordinate and Small Cause Courts they may be kept in English or Vernacular, but the duplicates of the Registers C, D, shall be in English in all Courts.
- 5. When any person pays money into Court in connection with any suit Procedure on receipt of or judicial proceeding, or money. when collections of any such money are made by any officer of the Court, such person or officer shall tender such money or collections to the Nazir, who shall cause a receipt to be prepared, with counterfoil, according to Form A, and shall obtain the signature or mark of the person or officer tendering the money, on the counterfoil of the receipt. Both original and counterfoil of the receipt. counterfoil shall be signed both by the officer of the Court receiving the money and also by the Názir. The counterfoil shall be recorded for reference and the receipt delivered to the person paying the money. When payments are made into Court by an officer of the Court, the receipt shall not be given to him, but shall be kept in the record of the proceedings in reference to which the collection has been made.
- 6. When money is received by postal money order, without advice from the remitter as to and Money orders. the cause or purpose for which the money has been forwarded, the amount shall be entered in a register (Form B).

Pending receipt of the information necessary to admit of the amount being credited to the cause or account for which the money was remitted, the item shall be transferred from Register B to Register C, the words "Money order suspense account" being written across column 5 of Regis-On receipt of the required information the amount shall be adjusted by entering the item in the manner described above, as a payment in Register D, and re-entering the item in Register C or G, as the case may be, as a receipt of that date, the necessary explanation being entered in the column of remarks. A note should invariably be made on the counterfoil of receipts issued in Form A for money received through the post by money order or otherwise, giving a reference to the letter or advice with which the money was forwarded, and if the money order coupon affords nformation, it should be pasted on the counterfoil of the receipt (Form A). The original receipt, there being no person to receive the same, should be crossed and cancelled and be initialled by the Názir.

7. In the Register of deposit receipts (Form C) Use of Register C. shall be entered :-

- (a) All sums deposited with the Court in connection with any suit or judicial proceeding and not to be immediately credited to Govern-
- (b) The sums received on account of intestate and attached property as provided for in Rules

8. In the Register of deposit payments (Form D) shall be entered:— Use of Register D.

- (a) All payments from sums deposited with the Court in connection with any suit or judicial proceeding and not to be immediately credited to Government;
- (b) The payments from sums received on account of intestate and attached property as provided for in Rules 11, 12.

The Nazir before payment shall obtain the payee's signature or mark in Procedure on payment by the Názir. column 13 of Register D, both the original and duplicate; but where a receipt stamp is required, it shall be affixed to the former only. Payment shall be endorsed on the copy of the decree or order when such is produced, the endorsement being signed by the officer actually making the payment, and attested by the Registrar or Názir, who shall also initial the entry of payment in column 14 of Register C and column 11 of Register D.

The Registers C and D shall be written up from day to day in dupli-Posting of Registers cate. The original shall remain on the record of

the Court, and the duplicate, which must be kept in English, shall also be written up from day to day and be forwarded every month to the Accountant General. In writing up Form C for the Accountant General, the columns 12 to 24 for details of payments shall be left blank for use in the Accountant General's office, but in the office copy of this register columns 12, 13 and 14 shall be filled up at once as the transactions occur; and in writing up Form D for the Accountant General, columns 10 and 11 shall be left blank.

- When the accounts are closed at the end of the day, the total of al Daily closing of Registers the transactions for that C, D. day, which are entered in column 8 of Register C, shall be entered in column 11 of that Register. The daily total of the transactions in column 9 of Register D shall be similarly entered in column 12 of Register D. The Nazir shall each day check the entries in these registers and initial the same.
- 11. In the case of property left by persons dying intestate and withof Account of i property, Form E. intestate out known heirs, a register shall be kept in Form

E by the Nazir of the District Court, when he is appointed administrator for the management of the property. At the close of each day the total receipts on account of each such estate shall be posted from column 14 of Register E into Register C, and the total payments shall be posted from column 20 in respect of charges, and from column 24 in respect of the disposal of each of the estates, into Register D, quoting in the latter the original credit entry or entries from Register C. The receipts or acquittances for these payments shall be taken in column 13 of Register D.

Account of attached property which may come into the Court's custody in the course of a suit, whether before or after judgment, shall be registered in Form F, and the proceeds, when realized, shall be posted from column 15 of this register into Register C. When money is attached, it shall be taken direct from Register F to Register C, but a note of this shall be made in Register F when the attachment includes both property and cash. Payments shall be entered direct into Register D, quoting the original credit entry from Register C. A note of the payment shall also be made in the last column of Register F.

13. For subsistence money of civil prisoners and expenses of witnesses, the registers of receipts and payments shall be in Forms G and H, respect-

ively. As these sums are required for immediate disbursement, they need not be deposited in the treasury, but the amounts shall be retained in the cash balance of the Nazir or officer of the Court entrusted with the accounts of money received by the Court. The daily total from column 10 of Register G and column 8 of Register H shall be entered in the cash book, Form I. Items remaining unpaid over twelve months at the end of each account year shall be communicated to the Accountant General in the return prescribed in Rule 23 and paid into the treasury as lapsed deposits.

- 14. In the cash book (Form I) shall be entered separately on the debit or credit side, as may be necessary—
 - (a) the daily totals of each of the Registers C, D (which include the daily totals of Registers E, F) and the daily totals of G, H;
 - (b) such items as are intended to be finally credited to Government; these shall be taken direct to the cash book, and the subsequent payment to Government or refund debited per contra. In such cases only will columns 3, 4, 5, 10, 11, 12 be entered up.
- Remittances to treasury with chalans.

Entry I must agree with the pass-book K, and the aggregate of 2, 3 and 4 should be verified by counting the eash. The Názir, having ascertained that the transactions of the day have been correctly entered in the eash book and that the arithmetical balance is correct, shall sign the eash book on the left and obtain the signature of the Judge on the right side below the closing entry. In Small Cause Courts where there is a Registrar, the Registrar of the Court shall be responsible that the amounts have been correctly entered and that the arithmetical balance is correct, and shall sign the book every day on the right side below the closing entry. When a Judge presides over more than one Court, or when he is absent from his Court, there being no locum leners, he shall on his return to his Court examine and sign the accounts for the days of his absence. In District Courts, where there is an Assistant Judge, he may, by order of the Judge, sign the accounts.

- 17. The ledger (Form J) is a supplementary record of all sums shown in the Registers C, D. The entries made in C and D shall be posted in J every evening or at latest the first thing the next morning.
- Remittances to treasury with the treasury in regard to the Court's déposit account shall be by means of a pass-book (Form K) and by cheques (Form L). Every remittance to the treasury, intended to be credited to the Court's deposit account, shall be accompanied by the pass-book and a treasury chalan in a form that will be supplied on application by the treasury officer. Entries will be made in the pass-book at the treasury and be receipted by the Accountant and Treasurer when the remittance is under Rs. 500, and by the treasury officer when it exceeds that sum. The Nazir shall not retain, except with the special permission of the Judge, a larger cash balance in his hands than in the case of Subordinate

and Small Cause Courts, Rs. 100, and in the case of District Courts, Rs. 200. All sums in excess of this amount shall be paid into the Government Treasury as a deposit with Government. There shall be, as far as possible, a daily remittance from the Court to the Treasury, and to secure an agreement between the treasury and the Názir's accounts no portion of the amount entered in Form C shall be retained from deposit on the last working day of the month.

19. Withdrawals from the Court's deposit account with the treasury Withdrawals from treashall be by cheques (Form sury by cheque, Form L. L) signed by the Judge or Assistant Judge, or (with the approval of Government) the Registrar or the Clerk of the Court. In such cases the District Judge shall inform the treasury officer of the name of the officer authorized, and furnish a specimen of his signature. Whenever it is convenient to make several small payments to different persons, one cheque for the aggregate amount may be issued in favour of the Nazir; but payments to parties when the amount is large or exceeds a limit to be fixed by the Judge, can be made by a cheque in favour of the payee : but the payee must be informed that payment can only be made at the treasury on the date of issue. If it is late in the day, and there is a possibility that the cheque cannot be presented on the date of issue, it can bear the next day's date. If the currency of a cheque has lapsed, it may be revived by an endorsement thereon for immediate payment, on satisfactory explanation being furnished.

These registers will be examined in the Accountant General's Office, and any discrepancies or errors discovered made the subject of reference to the Judge of the Court, until the several transactions entered in them are passed as correct.

23. In the month of January of each year a list shall be posted up in Lapsed deposits. the court-house, showing the sums of money in deposit with the Court which have remained unclaimed for over twelve months, and the names of the persons to whom they are due, and if no one appears before the 31st of March following to claim the sum due to him, it shall be paid into the treasury to the credit of Government as a deposit unclaimed, for the eventual benefit of any person who may duly establish his claim thereto to the satisfaction of the Court. To ensure the lapsed deposits being adjusted at the treasury before the 31st of March, the cheque should reach the treasury not later than the forenoon of that date. In the month of April following the Court shall furnish to the Accountant General in Form C, the heading of the form being suitably altered, a statement of the balances written off and credited to Government, prepared from the original register (Form C) and not from the ledger (Form J).

24. Deposits credited to Government under Rule 23 cannot be repaid without the sanction of Refunds of lapsed deposits. the Accountant General, but this sanction will be given as a matter of course on proof that the item was really received, was carried to credit in the Government accounts as a lapsed deposit, and is now claimed by the person who was entitled to draw it before the lapse, or his heir. Applications for refund shall be made in Form M by the Judge to the Accountant General, who, if the credit for the amount is exhibited on his books, will authorize payment and return the document to the Juage 101 delivery the party concerned, who should personally, or by an agent, claim payment from the treasury. These refunds will not be brought on the Court's accounts. On receipt by the Court of the Accountant General's sanction, a note of the number and date thereof shall be made against the original. entry in Register C.

SIR,—I have the honour to report that a revised Customs Tariff for the imports and exports into and from Portuguese India has been introduced with effect from the 1st instant, under the Portaria of the Portuguese Government, No. 777, dated the 26th December last.

- 2. A translation of the Tariff Schedules A. and C. referring to the customs duties leviable on imports and exports respectively, and B. referring to goods, the importation of which into the Portuguese Indian settlements is free of duty, accompanying that Portaria, is herewith submitted, together with a copy of the original Portuguese document.
- 3. The effect of the new tariff is to relieve the following articles, formerly taxed, from payment of duty:—

Unwrought steel.
Shells for purposes of manufacture into lime or cement.
Shark-fins.
Wheat husks.
Flour (in Diu).
Gum, copal or arabic.
Wool, raw or yarn.

Lac.
Clay or paste for manufacture of bangles.
Telegraphic and telephonic materials.
Ebony.
Sandalwood (unwrought).
Silk, raw.
Cotton-seeds.

No. 22.—The following draft of Rules which it is proposed to make under the Indian Ports Act, 1889, is published for the information of persons likely to be affected thereby. The draft and any objections or suggestions made with respect thereto, received before the 1st day of April 1893, will be taken into consideration on or after the said date:—

ADEN PORT RULES.

1. For the purposes of these Rules -

(a) the words "Inner Harbour" mean and inInner Harbour defined. clude all that space
in the Port of Aden
to the north-eastward of and within a line
drawn from the flag-staff on the Battery
(called the Saluting Battery) through the
Light Vessel to the opposite coast, to which
the Governor in Council has, by notification
noted in the margin,

No. 74 of 29th July 1892, page 761, Bombay Government Gazette, 1892, Part I. specially extended the provisions of Section 31 (1) of the Indian Ports Act, 1889, which

provisions are as follows :-

- "No vessel of the measurement of 200 tons
 "or upwards shall enter, leave or be moved
 "in any port to which this section has been
 "specially extended, without having a Pilot,
 "Harbour-master or Assistant of the Port
 "Officer or Harbour-master on board;
- "and no vessel of any measurement less
 "than 200 tons shall enter, leave or be
 "moved in any such port without having
 "a Pilot, Harbour-master or Assistant of the
 "Port Officer or Harbour-master on board,
 "unless authority in writing so to do has
 "been obtainedfrom the Conservator or some
 "officer empowered by him to give such
 "authority":
- (b) the words "Outer Harbour" mean and include all the space other than the Inner Harbour within the limits of the Port of Aden depage, Bombay Government Gazette, 1892, Part I.

 (b) the words "Outer Harbour" mean and include all the space other than the limits of the clared by notification noted in the margin.

(a) Entering or Leaving Port.

- 2. Vessels may enter or leave the Outer Harbour at all hours.
- 3. All steamers and square-rigged vessels arriving off the Port of Aden, and requiring the services of a Pilot, shall fly the Pilot Jack at the fore, and shall remain in the Outer Harbour until boarded by a Pilot.
- 4. A vessel not entering in Inner Harbour is not required to take a Pilot. But a Pilot will be supplied to such a vessel intimating as above required its need of one, on payment of the fee chargeable under Notification No. of 1892, issued under Section 35 of the Indian Ports Act, 1889, published in Bombay Government Gazette, 189, Part I, page, and redublished in the Appendix to these Rules.

- 5. When a Pilot is required for an outgoing vessel a written application shall be made to the Port Officer between the hours of 8 A.M. and 4 P.M., specifying the vessel's draught of water and the time at which the Pilot is to be on board.
- 6. Before any vessel drawing more than 17½ feet is piloted into the Inner Harbour, her Master may be required to give a certificate to the Conservators of the Port, that, should the vessel ground at low water, the Master will take upon himself all responsibility for damages that may be sustained by the vessel in so grounding.
- 7. No vessel entering or leaving the Inner Harbour shall steam at a greater speed than shall be directed by the Pilot in charge.
- 8. When two or more vessels wish to enter the Inner Harbour at or about the same time, the Port Officer or the Senior Pilot shall arrange verbally, or by letter, that the one that has to proceed to moorings highest up the Harbour shall enter first, and the other shall not attempt to enter until the passage is clear.
- 9. When a vessel is entering the Inner Harbour at the same time that another vessel wishes to leave, the former shall have the preference, the latter remaining at her moorings or anchorage until the vessel entering has passed her or taken up her moorings.
- 10. No boat shall be towed by a vessel in charge of a Pilot without the permission of such Pilot.
- 11. No lighters or barges shall be towed by any vessel when proceeding in or out of the Inner Harbour or when moving from one part of the Inner Harbour to another.
- 12. Every vessel when entering or leaving the port between sunrise and sunset shall fly her national flag, and when entering the port shall show her number.
- 13. Every Native emigrant ship and every ship which is a Native passenger ship within the menning of the Native Passenger Ships Act X of 1887 shall, on nearing the port and before entering the harbour, indicate by signal the port from which it has come.
- 14. Vessels arriving from a port which is quarantined shall fly the flag R half-mast at the fore.
- 15. Country craft entering the Inner Harbour are required before proceeding to their berths to anchor opposite the Prince of Wales' Bandar for inspection by the Harbour Police, unless they are coming from quarantined ports, in which case they shall proceed at once to the place assigned by Rule 65 as quarantine anchorage for such craft.

(b) Berths of Vessels.

16. All steamers and square-rigged vessels within the limits of the Port of Aden shall take up such berths as may be appointed for them by the Port Officer, and shall change their berths or remove when required by the same authority. All country craft shall take up their berths opposite the Maalla Pier.

- 17. At the discretion of the Port Officer permission may be granted for any steamer or square-rigged vessel to be taken alongside of another steamer or square-rigged vessel in the port.
- 18. No vessel of any description shall anchor outside the Light Ship in the fair way of the channel, but shall leave a clear passage for vessels wishing to enter or leave the Inner Harbour. Vessels anchoring in the fair way in contravention of this rule shall be liable to be removed under the control of a Pilot.

(c) Striking Masts or Yards.

- 19. All vessels moored within the Inner Harbour shall have their jib-booms rigged in and shall, when ordered by the Port Officer, rig in their driver booms, strike their masts or yards, and swing in their boats and davits.
 - (d) Removal and placing of Anchors, &c.
- 20. Every vessel moored within the Inner Harbour shall remove any anchor or spar or other substance projecting from her side when required to do so by the Port Officer.

(e) Vessels taking in or discharging Cargoes, Passengers, &c.

- 21. No steamer or square-rigged vessel shall take in or discharge, except at the berth assigned to it in the port, any passengers or ballast or any cargo other than such as, under any law in force relating to explosives or other particular kind of cargo, may be required to be taken in or discharged at places appointed for the purpose.
- 22. No country craft shall take in or discharge passengers, ballast or cargo, except at their berths opposite Maalla Pier or alongside the said pier.
- 23. Masters of vessels at moorings shall not allow more than two cargo boats abreast of each hatch on each side, nor more than two in a tier to be made fast astern.

(f) Keeping Free Passages.

- 24. Free passages shall be kept to all piers, jetties, landing places, wharves and moorings, and all boats and vessels shall be bound to move when required by the Harbour Police or Boat Inspectors to clear such passages.
- 25. No boats, whether ships' boats or boats plying for hire, shall lay alongside any of the piers or landing places longer than is actually necessary to embark or land passengers and their baggage, &c., but shall anchor or lay off at a distance of at least 30 yards from such pier or landing place, so as not to obstruct the approach thereto.

(g) Anchoring and Mooring.

- 26. All vessels within the Inner Harbour shall anchor, moor or unmoor when and where required by the Port Officer.
- 27. Vessels of 12 feet draught and upwards shall not remain at single anchor in the Inner Harbour without the permission of the Port Officer.

(h) Moving or Warping.

28. All vessels within the Inner Harbour shall be moved or warped from place to place as required, and by such means or appliances as may be ordered by the Port Officer.

(k) Regulations of Boats.

- 29. Boats when under weigh shall observe the rules of the road at sea enacted by Her Majesty's Order in Council, dated 11th August 1884.
- 30. When two boats, one being propelled by sails and the other by oars, are proceeding on a course which if continued will involve the risk of collision, the boat propelled by oars shall keep out of the way of the other, but the boat under sail shall use every precaution to avoid accident, and, if necessary, shall alter its course.
- 31. Tugs when not towing, and launches and other boats propelled by steam, shall keep out of the way of all other boats.
- 32. Tugs, launches and other vessels, steam and sailing, shall carry the Regulation lights as ordered by Her Majesty's Order in Council, dated 11th August 1884.

(1) Public Passenger Boats.

- 33. In Rules 34, 35, 36, 37, 38, 39 and 40 the words "passenger boats" mean public water conveyances licensed under Bombay Act VI of 1863 and plying for hire.
- 34. No passenger boat shall leave the place assigned for such boats when not employed, unless and until it has been engaged by a person wishing to employ it.
- 35. No passenger boat shall carry a greater number of passengers than that fixed in respect thereof by the Port Officer, and the number so fixed shall be shown on a board in some conspicuous part of the boat.
- 36. No passenger boat shall carry more than 336 lbs. weight of luggage with its full complement of passengers, nor more than 112 lbs. in addition thereto in place of each one of the number of passengers falling below the full complement.
- 37. Passenger boats shall land passengers at the following places only, and at no other place without special permission from the First Assistant Resident:—
 - (1) Port Office Pier.
 - (2) Prince of Wales' Pier.
 - (3) Maalla Pier.
- 38. Passenger boats shall land the luggage of passengers, not being Military Officers or troops, as follows and not otherwise, that is to say—
- the luggage of passengers travelling by steamers or squarerigged vessels,
- the luggage of passengers travel- at the Maalla ling by country craft, Pier.

- 39. Every licensee of a passenger boat shall, before taking any passenger to any place west of Hiswa, give intimation of his intention to do so to the First Assistant Political Resident.
- 40. No passenger boat shall lie alongside of any steamer, ship, vessel or pier, except to embark or disembark passengers or their luggage. They may be off at any distance not less than twenty yards, or anchor off at any distance not less than thirty yards.

(m) Bum-boats.

40a. No boat, which shall not have been duly licensed and registered by the Conservator of the Port, shall ply within the port for the sale of provisions, curiosities or other goods; and each such boat shall have the number of its license painted on the stern.

(n) Cargo Boats.

- 41. No boat which shall not have been duly licensed and registered shall ply as a cargo boat for the landing and shipping of merchandize within the limits of the port.
- 42. Cargo boats' licenses shall be issued by the Port Officer,
- 43. Licenses issued under these rules shal remain in force up to the 31st December of each year.
- 44. No licenses shall be given to boats which are not seaworthy and well found.
- 45. Licensed cargo boats are at liberty to carry passengers from any landing places in Aden to the Shaikh Othman Pier or Little Aden.
- 46. No licensed cargo boat, when employed in carrying passengers as stated in Rule 48, shall carry a greater number of passengers than that certified in the license as fixed by the Port Officer.
- 47. No cargo boat shall carry cargo in excess of the quantity determined and certified in the license by the licensing officer.
- 48. Each cargo boat shall have the number of its license painted on the stern.
- 49. All licenses for boats shall be produced when demanded, and shall be in the boat in custody of the Nácoda or crew of the boat for the time being.
- 50. The licenses may be cancelled or suspended if the boats for which they have been issued are concerned in a breach of the Customs, Abkári or other law or rules.
- 51. Licensed cargo boats are at liberty toleave the port as coasters on settlement of port dues.

(o) Fires and Lights.

52. Pitch shall not be heated on board vessels, but in a boat alongside or astern.

(p) Signal Lights.

53. All vessels of whatever denomination, when under weigh or at anchor, shall exhibit

between sunset and sunrise the lights ordered under Her Majesty's Order in Council, dated 11th August 1884, and when moored in the Inner Harbour shall exhibit where it can be best seen, but at a height not exceeding 20 feet above the hull, a bright white light in a globular lantern not less than 8 inches in diameter, and so constructed as to show a clear uniform and unbroken light visible all round the horizon at a distance of not less than one mile.

(q) Number of Crew.

- 54. All vessels when afloat within the port shall have on board such number of the crew as the Port Officer may declare sufficient to perform any duties which may become necessary for the safety of the vessel in regard to veering or having in cable, passing extra hawsers to moorings, bracing up the yards, striking masts and yards, &c., in case of any emergency arising.
 - (r) In cases where there is disease or a dead body on board:—

I .- GENERAL.

Regulating action of Master when there is a Dead Body on board his Vessel.

- 55. The Master of every vessel arriving or at anchor in the port, on board of which there is a dead body, shall at once notify the circumstance to the Health Officer.
- 56. No Master shall bury, or take or allow action for the burial of, any dead body on shore at Adon, unless and until he has satisfied the Health Officer of the Port that the death was not from cholera or plague or other disease which the Health Officer may state would render such burial objectionable, nor until the Health Officer has given permission for such burial.
- 57. Whenever permission under the last preceding rule has been accorded, the Master of the vessel shall make all arrangements for the burial, which shall take place in the established burial or burning ground, and shall furnish a carrying party from the ship.
- 58. No Master of vessel shall place any dead body, whatever the cause of death, in the sea within the limits of the port.

II.—SPECIAL.

Regulating action in cases of (a) Infectious Diseases and (b) Deaths resulting from such Disease.

59. The Master of every vessel, in or entering port, on board of which there is or has been, during the voyage from which she is arriving or has last arrived, either among the passengers or crew any case of cholera, small-pox or other epidemic disease common in India, or of measles or scarlatina, or if two or more deaths from unknown or suspicious causes have occurred on the voyage, shall report such case or cases at the earliest possible moment to the Health Officer of the Port, unless it shall appear that notice had already been received by that officer through the

Pilot or by signal or otherwise as provided for by rule next following.

- 60. (1) If the vessel is coming into port the Master shall report such case or cases to the Pilot or other boarding officer at the earliest opportunity, or, if she be not boarded or is already at anchor within port limits, shall hoist a signal, which shall be during the day the flag R of the Commercial Code, at the main, and during the night three lights, viz., red, white and red, one above the other at the same place.
- (2) Pending the arrival of the Health Officer the Master shall act as laid down in Rules V and VI.
- 61. (1) When the Health Officer inspects the vessel, more especially with reference to its sanitary condition, and on inquiring into the circumstances attending the case or cases of the said disease directs the removal of all persons suffering from such disease to the appointed hospital and the separation and disinfection of any infected bedding, clothes and cargo, the Master of the vessel shall give every assistance in his power in order to the carrying out of such directions.
- (2) The following are the appointed hospitals referred to in this rule:—

For cholera and The Hospital on the Alia plague. Island.

For small-pox ... The Small-pox Hospital at Maalla.

For other infectious diseases.

Such Hospitals in Adon as the Health Officer of the Port may determine in each case.

- (3) The route from the vessel to the hospital for cholera on the Alia Island or the small-pox hospital at the Maalla will be by sea outside, i.e., to the north of the shipping. The patient will be conveyed from the vessel in a boat flying the yellow flag both going and returning, and such boat shall in no way communicate with any other vessel or boat or with the shore, except at the appointed landing for the said hospitals. The vessel from which the patient is landed shall provide a carrying party from the shore to the hospital.
- 62. No vessel coming under Rule 59 shall enter the Inner Harbour without the permission of the Health Officer of the Port, and the Master of the vessel shall not permit any person on board to land or communicate with any other vessel without the written approval of the Health Officer.
- 63. The vessel, whenever the Health Officer deems it advisable for any reason to take such further precautions, shall proceed or be removed as soon as possible to the anchorage appointed for the purpose, and the Master shall not allow any of the passengers or crew to leave, nor, in the case of undecked vessels, any cargo to be disturbed, until the Health Officer has made his inspection and has taken such measures as he considers necessary, and, if the vessel is decked, shall cause all cargo to be landed under such precautions as the Health Officer shall direct.

64. Vessels coming under the last rule shall remain at the appointed anchorage and shall fly the flag Q by day at the main, and by night exhibit two red lights one above the other at the main, till they have been thoroughly cleaned and fumigated, all other precautions considered necessary by the Health Officer have been taken and permission has been given by him for them to proceed on their voyage or to the usual place of anchorage: Provided that the Master shall not allow any of the passengers or crew to leave the ship without the special authority of the Health Officer.

65. The following places of anchorages have been appointed where vessels referred to in Rules 63 and 64 shall anchor:—

For Seagoing Vessels.

That portion of the Outer Harbour which lies to the southward and westward of, and 1,000 yards distant from, an extended line drawn through Flint Island and the outer Light vessel bearing W. ½ S. and E.½ N.

For Coasting Steamers under 200 tons burden.

A line drawn from west end of Flint Island
Western limit. through No. 9 mooring
buoy towards the coast.

A line drawn from east end of Flint Island through No. 11 mooring buoy towards the coast.

Southern limit. One hundred yards north of a line from No. 9 to No. 11 mooring buoy

For Country Craft.

A space to the northward of Prince of Wales' Pier bounded by the following limits:—

A line drawn through No. 5 buoy and the west end of the Union Club building.

A line drawn through No. 4 buoy and the west end of the Union Club building.

66. No person dying of cholera or plague on board a vessel in the port shall be buried on shore without the permission of the Health Officer. The burial, if permitted, shall take place at the appointed quarantine burial ground to the south of Shaikh Othman about 300 yards distant from Laud's End and at no other place. In case of death from other infectious diseases on board vessels in the port, the body may be buried at the usual burial grounds, with the permission

of the Health Officer, if the Master desires the burial to take place on shore. The route to the quarantine burial ground from the vessel will be by sea outside, i.e., to the north of the shipping; the corpse will be conveyed from the vessel in a boat flying the yellow flag both going and returning, and such boat shall in no way communicate with any other vessel or boat or with the shore, except at the appointed burial place. The vessel from which the corpse is landed shall send a carrying party from the ship to convey the corpse to the burial place.

- (e) "Inspector" means an officer appointed by the Trustees to check the entry and exit of goods at a wharf, or officer acting for an Inspector.

4. Except with the permission of the Superintendent, no officer in charge of a vessel shall load from, or discharge on, to the premises of the Board, ashes, ballast, bricks, cinders, coal dust, lime, rub-

6. No person shall use any unprotected light, or fire, in any part of the wharfage premises of the

Board, or smoke in any shed or warehouse set apart for the storage of goods.

7. Except with the special permission of the Superintendent, no person shall lay, or cause to be laid, any goods or transhipment goods, for more than 24 hours on the T piece of the pier head at Maala, or within ten feet of the sea front of the Abkari Pier at Tawahi. Goods or transhipment goods lying on either of the said spaces, for more than 24 hours, shall be removed by the owners on the requisition of the Superintendent, and in default the goods will be removed by the Board or their officers at the expense of the owners.

8. No person shall obstruct any road, thoroughfare or pathway within the Port Trust Estate, by placing thereon goods or other articles for storage, or in any other manner obstruct the same or hinder any traffic thereon. Any Port Trust Officer may require any person causing such obstruction to remove or discontinue the same; and such person on failing to comply, within a time sufficient for the purpose, with such requirements shall be liable to the penalty prescribed in Bye-law No. 30, and the cause of obstruction may be removed by the Board or their officers, who will hold the person causing such obstruction liable for any expenses incurred in its removal.

9. No person shall discharge or load, or cause to be discharged or loaded, at any wharf belonging to the Board, timber, fuel, coke or coal, without the consent of the Superintendent, or at any place other than the one pointed out by the Superintendent, and no owner of such article shall allow it to remain on any wharf more than 24 hours after its removal has been ordered by the Superintendent.

- 10. The use of a crane on the Port Trust Estate shall be subject to such rates as may from time to time be prescribed under Section 40 of the Aden Port Trust Act. Any person using such crane shall, within 24 hours, give information to the Superintendent, as to the purpose for which he has used the crane, and pay the rates leviable thereon, if any.

Any person infringing any of the Bye-laws Nos. 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 12, 14, 15, 17, 18, 19, 21, 22, 23, 24, 25, 26, 28 or 29 shall be punished with a fine which may extend to Rupees one hundred, or, in case of continued infringement of the said Bye-laws, with a fine which may extend to Rupees fifty for every day after notice shall have been given by the Board to the person guilty of such infringement.
