The following Preliminary Report of the Select Committee on the Bill to consolidate and amend certain Indian enactments relating to Merchant Shipping and the carriage of passengers by sea was presented to the Council of the Governor General of India for the purpose of making Laws and Regulations on the 21st March 1895 :-

The whole Bill has been crossreferenced to the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, and we have introduced into the Bill all changes necessitated by the sub-stitution of that Act for the numerous other Shipping Acts which it repealed.

- 4. We have also carefully compared the wording of the two measures and have altered the wording of the Bill so as to bring it into conformity with the wording of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, in all cases in which the intention of the two measures is the same, and in which it seemed possible that the retention of a different wording in the Bill, however it might otherwise be justified, might lead to a reasonable supposition that a difference in the two laws was intended.
- We have omitted section 17 of the Bill, which rendered liable to port-dues the space occupied by deck cargo in home-trade ships, and have recast but without materially modifying, the provisions of the whole of Part II.
- 6. Section 25.—We have provided for the grant of certificates of competency to masters of "Asiatic ships" the meaning of which term we have defined in the explanation annexed to this section. We do not contemplate that the examination to which masters of Asiatic ships should be subjected should do much more than ensure their knowledge of the rules of the road at sea, the reading of signals, etc.
- In section 26 we have provided for the grant of local certificates of service to engineers in Her Majesty's navy or in the Royal Indian Marine as well as to sub-lieutenants and officers of a higher grade in those services.

We have further provided for the grant of a local certificate of service as moster or mate of a hometrade ship not exceeding three hundred tons to any master or mate who before the passing of this Act served as master or mate respectively of a home-trade ship of one hundred tons and upwards. It appears to us that it would be a hardship to require suddenly that none but certificated officers should henceforth be allowed on home-trade ships of between one hundred and three hundred tons burthen which do not under the existing law require certificated officers unless they are passenger boats carrying, if a steamer sixty, and if a sailing vessel thirty, Native passengers.

- 8. Section 31 (5).—We have so far modified section 31 (5) as to require that masters of Asiatic ships shall possess either local certificates of service or local certificates of competency.
- 9. In section 32 we have empowered the Government of Bombay to extend the definition of home-trade ships so as to include British steam-ships proceeding from Aden to any foreign port on the coast of Arabia or Africa not being more than six hundred miles distant from Aden.
- 10. Section 33 (1).—We have omitted the provise to section 33 (1), which empowered Local Governments to exempt foreign steam-ships from the requirements in regard to certificated officers imposed on British ships. It has been pointed out to us that this power is not given in the English Act and that its exercise might be injurious to the interests of the country.
- 11. Sections 37 and 38.—We have omitted the offence of stranding a ship in section 37 and in section 38 from the list of offences for which, if caused by his wrongful act or default, the certificate of a master, mate or engineer may be suspended or cancelled by a Court or by a Local Government. The offence in question is not one for which under the English law a certificate can be suspended or cancelled unless it results in the loss or abandonment of, or serious damage to the, ship or in loss of life, or is the result of incompetency. In all such cases it will still remain punishable under the Bill as we propose to amend it, and we do not think that the Indian law should in this matter differ from the English law.
- 12. We have recast and considerably modified sections 50 and 51. In section 50 (g) we have inserted the words "short allowance of provisions" among the punishments for which regulations may, with the approval of the Governor General in Council, be made and inserted in the agreement with the crew. This modification will bring the clause into accord with the English law on the subject and with the existing Indian law, while it will still be possible for the Governor General in Council in any case or in any particular cases to prohibit the entry in any agreement of a penalty of the nature referred to.

To section 50 (h) we have, at the instance of the Resident at Aden and of the Government of Bombay, added a proviso to prevent lascars or other Native seamen not shipped at Aden or ordinarily resident at that port from being discharged there, a course which would be likely to result in much inconvenience both to the seamen concerned and to the State. We have added a further proviso to the effect that a statutory Native of India of European race or extraction shall not, except with his own express consent, be deemed to be a Native seaman within the meaning of this section.

We have made an important alteration in the existing law in order to permit of the agreement with the crew being signed either by the master or by the owner's agent, instead of requiring, as under the existing law in England and in India, that it shall in all cases be signed by the master.

- 13. Section 55.—We have modified section 55 (1), consequent on the alteration made in section 51, so as to make the master punishable when he carries a seaman to sea without a lawful agreement having been made with him either by the master himself or by the owner's agent.
- 14. Section 59 .- We have struck out the words "or elsewhere" in section 59, which bound the master to report to the Superintendent of a Mercantile Marine Office any change in his crew occurring before his final departure no matter whether the crew was engaged in India or elsewhere. Under the section as it stands report will be necessary only when change occurs in a crew engaged in India.

15. Section 62 .- We have inserted the words "otherwise than in accordance with the terms thereof " after the word " discharged" in the fifth line of this section to bring

the section into harmony with the English law and with justice.

16. Section 67.—In sub-section (4) of this section and in all other sections of the Bill where an equivalent expression was used we have substituted the words "the ship may be detained" or words to that effect for the words "the Local Government may detain the ship" or equivalent words. It is quite unnecessary, as has been pointed out that an order of a Local Government should be required in any ordinary case of breach of rule.

To section 67 (5) we have prefixed the words "In the case of a voyage terminating in British India" to show clearly that the sub-section applies only to such cases.

17. Section 68.—In section 68 (1) (a) we have included engine-drivers among the class of officers whose certificates are to be periodically produced to a Superintendent of a Mercantile Marine Office.

18. Section 70.—This section of the Bill permits of advances being made to the seaman himself only. We have altered the section so as to admit of a stipulation to be made in an agreement for a payment in advance to be made either to, or on behalf of, a seaman. This brings the section into accord with the existing English law, from which there seem to be no reasonable grounds why it should differ.

For sub-section (2), which the modification described above practically cancels, we have substituted clause (b) of section 140 of the English Act. Further slight conse-

quential amendments have been made in sub-sections (3) and (4).

19. Sections 71 and 72.—We have limited, as in the English Act, the granting by a seaman of allotments of his wages to the case of "near relatives," for which expression we have in section 72 adopted the definition given in section 141 (4) of the English Act.

20. Section 79.—The section, as it originally stood in the Bill, provided for the wages of discharged seamen being paid to them in the presence of a Superintendent of a Mercantile Marine Office. We have slightly modified the section so as to admit of wages being paid either as above or through a Superintendent of a Mercantile Marine Office.

21. Section 85 .-- For this important section, which determines the period within which a seaman's wages are to be paid, we have adopted the provisions of the English Act in preference to those of the Bill. The English law makes the whole amount of the wages due within two days (exclusive of any Sunday, fast day in Scotland, or Bank holiday) after the time when the seaman lawfully leaves the ship at the end of his engagement, an advance of pay being claimable on the day the scaman lawfully leaves the ship. The English law is in tolerably close accord with the existing Indian law, which makes the wages payable within three days after the cargo has been delivered or within five days of the seaman's discharge, whichever first happens. No sufficient reasons have been adduced for the change of practice proposed in the Bill, which makes wages payable within one week after the delivery of the cargo has commenced.

22. Section 91.—We have omitted this section and also sections 114, 117, 119 and 126, which made the provisions of Chapters IX, XII, XIII, XIV and XV applicable to Native seamen engaged at any port in British India to serve in a foreign ship. We find that there are no equivalent provisions in the English Act, and the proposed change in procedure could hardly be made without the consent of foreign Powers, which consent it would

be difficult to obtain.

23. Section 100 (1) (a).—We have omitted the words "in British India" in clause (a) of this sub-section in view to making the section applicable to a British ship registered in British India, which has not been heard of for twelve months or upwards since leaving a

port of departure, whether situated in British India or out of British India.

24. Section 106.-We have altered section 106, a new provision in Indian law, to bring it into more exact conformity with section 206 of the English Act, with which it corresponds. We have provided, as in the English Act, that no fee shall be levied for an inspection under the section, and we have further provided that no provisions which have been certified under section 206 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, for use in any voyage shall be again inspected under this section in the course of the same voyage.

25. Section 107 .- At the suggestion of the Government of Bombay we have made it compulsory on an officer to whom a complaint is made to examine the provisions and water complained of. The modification made in the section brings it into accord with

26. Section 110.- We have modified section 110 (1) (a) to provide for the case of a reduction of provisions being imposed as a punishment in accordance with section 50 (g). We have added a new sub-section empowering the Court or Magistrate trying the case to require an inspection and report by a Superintendent of a Mercantile Marine Office or other duly empowered officer.

27. Section 113.—The papers relating to the provision of space for Native crews have been considered by the Select Committee. They find that the proposal to increase the space has met with a strong opposition, and in view of this fact, and of the observations made during the discussion in Council and of the importance of the interests involved, they do not consider it wise, in discussing a measure that is mainly one of consolidation, to propose any amendment of the existing law on the subject.

28. Section 114.—We have omitted this section from the Bill. It is generally conceded that, if it is found necessary to reduce the size of lascars' chests, the desired end can best be obtained by providing for it in the agreement which a master enters into

with his crew.

29. Section 115 .- We have modified section 115 to admit of any other officer appointed for the purpose by the Local Government performing, in lieu of the Superintendent or Deputy Superintendent of a Mercantile Marine Office, the duties of inspecting

medicines, medical stores, etc.

30. Section 116 (1).—We have slightly modified the wording of clause (a) of this sub-section to make the intention clearer.

31. Section 120.-We have modified this section to bring it more closely into accord with sections 163 and 212 of the English Act, on which it is based, and we have added a new sub-section, No. (4), equivalent to section 163 (2) of the English Act, to render it clear that nothing in section 120 is intended to affect the provisions of the Bill with respect to allotment-notes.

32. Section 130.—We have modified the wording of the section to make it agree

more closely with the English Act, and we have inserted in the section the provisions of the existing Indian law, under which the offences of desertion, neglect or failure to join

the ship or absence without leave are punishable with imprisonment.

The English Act provides that elsewhere than in England these offences shall be punishable with imprisonment, and we think that the offence of desertion in India may

involve such serious consequences that the penalty against it should not be reduced.

33. We have omitted section 134 (4) from the Bill as amended. The provision in question, which allows any seaman or apprentice of a British ship to absent himself from his ship or his duty by giving forty-eight hours' notice to the owner or the master, is by the English Act declared applicable to the United Kingdom only. A similar provision incorporated in Indian law would render nugatory the various measures which it has been found necessary to pass from time to time to prevent European seamen being left stranded in this country.

34. Section 143.—We have added a new clause 143 (1) (a) providing that a seaman or apprentice may be sent on board ship in lieu of being kept in prison if he has been imprisoned (without any limit of time) on the ground of his having neglected or refused to join or to proceed to sea in any ship, or has deserted or absented himself from the ship without leave or has committed any other breach of discipline. This is the existing Indian law, and the omission of the provision in the Bill was apparently due to oversight.

35. Section 152.—We have modified this section to admit of the wages due to a seaman or apprentice left behind in British India on the ground of unfitness or inability to proceed to sea to be paid to the Superintendent of a Mercantile Marine Office instead

of to the seaman or apprentice himself.

36. Section 174.—The Bill exempts all native craft not square-rigged from the provisions of Chapter XXI in regard to life-saving appliances. We consider that the Bill goes too far, and we have limited the exemption to the case of native craft of not more than two hundred tons burthen and not carrying passengers.

37. Section 176.—In respect of the power to make rules with regard to the life-saving appliances that shall be required for each ship or class of ships we have specially provided in section 343 that draft rules shall first be published and shall not be taken into

consideration for six months after date of publication.

We have made a similar provision in respect to the rules which a Local Government is empowered by section 204 of the Bill to make in view to regulating the making of surveys under Chapter XXIII. We think that the importance of the matters dealt with under the two sections referred to justifies the demand for ample time for consideration of the rules which has been pressed upon us by interested bodies.

38. Section 183A.—We have provided, as in the English Act, for the levy of a fee for

the inspection of ships with regard to lights and fog-signals. No fee, however, will be levied where the lights and signals are found to be in order unless the visit is made on the

application of the owner.

39. Section 183B.—We have empowered the Governor General in Council to exempt from the provisions of Chapter XXII of the Bill any classes of native craft which do not use lights or fog-signals.

40. Section 204.—Power of Local Government to make rules to regulate the making

of surveys. See remark against section 176.

41. Section 205.—We have modified section 205 of the Bill, which exempts certain ships from the provisions of Chapter XXIV in regard to "unsafe ships," "load-lines," etc. We have restricted the exception proposed in the Bill of all home-trade ships of less than one hundred and fifty tons register to the case of sailing ships. In the case of steam-ships, we have limited the exemption to the case of home-trade steam-ships of less than eighty tons register. On the other hand, we have exempted all ships employed solely

42. Section 206 .- We have added a sub-section providing that for the purpose of determining whether any ship is so loaded as to submerge the centre of the disc in perfectly smooth salt water the ship may, if the owner or master so desires, be taken into a wet basin or dock. The costs of such a proceeding would, under section 225, be borne

by Government if the disc were found not to be submerged.

43. Section 247.—We have omitted from clause (b) of the proviso to this section the amending words inserted in the Bill which unduly limit the powers of a Local Government. ment to exempt officers who have not passed the survey test prescribed in section 246 from practising as surveyors in any port in which any surveyor who has passed the test is exercising the profession of a ship surveyor. The main object of the proviso as it stands in the existing law was, as was stated by the Hon'ble Mr. Stokes in proposing it. to admit of an expert-surveyor being sent to this country in certain cases from England for the special purpose of surveying and directing repairs. This object of the provisowould be defeated by the introduction of the amending words proposed in the Bill.

44. Section 253.—In cases where the amount of salvage claimed exceeds one thousand rupees we have provided that an appeal shall be allowed against the decision of a Magis-

5. Section 260.—We have modified section 260 (2) with the view of providing that the Magistrate who is a member of a Court of Investigation appointed by the Local Government shall be a Magistrate of the first class, that another member shall be some person of nautical skill and knowledge, and that the other or others (if any) shall be

persons of nautical, engineering, mercantile or other special skill or knowledge.

46. Sections 262 and 263.—We have modified these sections in view to securing that a master, mate or engineer charged with incompetency, etc., shall have reasonable

time for the preparation of his defence.

47. Section 277.-We have slightly modified the first line of the section to make the meaning clearer.

We have also added a clause exempting from the operation of this Part of the Bill any ships to which the provisions of the Inland Steam-vessels Act, 1884, are applicable.

48. Section 279.—We have added words to the definition of "native passenger" to show that passengers of the first and second class are excluded from the definition, which is intended to refer only to passengers of the lowest class or steerage passengers.

We have modified clause (a) to show that a voyage from Aden to any other port in

British India is a long voyage as well as a voyage in the contrary direction.

We have slightly modified clauses (d) and (e) to make the intention clearer.

49. Section 280 .- We have omitted the last four lines of section 280 (1) after the words "seasons of foul weather." We have carefully defined the terms "long voyage," "short voyage," "shelter-port voyage" and "excursion voyage," and we think it unnecessary to vest the Governor General in Council with further power to declare what shall be deemed to be a long voyage, a short voyage, a shelter-port voyage or an excursion voyage.

50. Section 282 .- We have reduced the time of notice of sailing to be given in the case of all voyages other than long voyages from twenty-four hours before the time of

sailing to six hours before that time.

51. Section 284 (1) .- We have provided that Certificate B shall be required to be held by a master in the case of short voyages as well as in the case of long voyages, for which latter case only the Bill provides. The Bill does not propose to exempt ships proceeding on short voyages from the necessity of holding a certificate that food, fuel, water, etc., necessary for the passengers are carried (vide section 303 of the Bill), and this is the chief matter dealt with in Certificate B. The existing law requires that Certificate B shall be held in the case of all voyages.

In sub-section (2) (c) (iii) we have added words to show that railings and netting

protected by curtains will be treated as equivalent to substantial bulwarks.

52. Section 288 .- We have modified the section in view to requiring the surveyor to report that the ship, besides fulfilling the other requirements of the section, is properly lighted. We have slightly altered sub-section (3) to make the meaning clearer.

53. Section 291 .- We have added words to the fourth clause to exempt from the necessity of carrying a medical officer any ship carrying more than four hundred Native passengers and trading between ports in the territories administered by the Government of Bombay and other ports not in those territories in cases where these latter ports are situated on the west coast of India. The requirements of the Bill in this matter appear to

us to be unnecessarily stringent.

54. Section 294.—We have added two new sub-sections: the first (sub-section (2)) providing that the upper deck, excluding the portion set apart for the first and second class passengers and the airing space for the crew and any space which may be reserved as a hospital for the use of such passengers, shall be reserved for the use of the native passengers in the proportion which the number of native passengers on board bears to the total number which the ship is calculated to carry, and the second (subsection (3)) providing that the height between decks shall in no case be less than six feet. The intention of the Bill was to provide for these objects, both of which were included in the recommendations of the Hon'ble Dr. Lethbridge's Committee on native passenger ships, by rules under section 324. It has seemed to us preferable to make provision for them in the body of the Act.

55. Section 296 .- We have inserted a new section 296A requiring the master to give immediate notice of any alteration in a ship which has the effect of altering the number of passengers which a ship can carry, and we have made failure to furnish the information

punishable under a new section 316A.

56. Section 297A .- We have inserted between section 297 and section 301 of the Bill a number of new provisions dealing specially with pilgrim ships proceeding to and from the Hedjaz. These special provisions give effect to the terms of the convention agreed to at the International Sanitary Conference convened by the French Government at Paris early in 1894, in so far as the terms of the convention have been accepted by the Government of India.

In the sections of the Bill referred to the words "pilgrim ship" and "pilgrim" are defined; and, while under the existing law no steam-ship carrying pilgrims comes under the Native Passenger Ships Act unless it carries sixty pilgrims of the lowest class, the Bill as amended will apply to all pilgrim ships which carry not less than one pilgrim

for every one hundred tons of gross tonnage.

57. Section 297A .- The notice of sailing, which for ordinary native passenger ships on a long voyage is under section 282 (2) one day, is extended by section 297A in the

case of pilgrim ships to three days.

58. Section 300 of the Bill, which gives power to the Local Government to direct that no native passenger shall be received on board a ship carrying passengers to the Red Sea until the passenger has been medically inspected, has been largely modified. It now renders medicial examination compulsory prior to being received on board ship in the case of all pilgrims, and the inspecting officer is required to prohibit the embarkation of a pilgrim suffering from cholera, choleraic indisposition or any form of suspicious diarrhoea or any dangerously infectious or contagious disease, or who has recently been in attendance upon or otherwise in contact with any person so suffering.

A new sub-section (4) is added which provides that all articles which have been contaminated by persons suffering from cholera or choleraic indisposition, or any dangerously infectious or contagious disease, or are suspected of having been so contaminated, shall, before being taken on board a pilgrim ship, be disinfected under the supervision of a medical officer appointed by the Local Government for the purpose, in such manner as

the Local Government shall direct.

59. A new section 300A provides that the master of every pilgrim ship shall be required to pay the whole amount of the sanitary taxes at the ports visited.

60. Section 301 .- The provisions of section 301 of the Bill, which are based on the report of the native Passenger Ships Commission already referred to, prescribe the space to be allotted to native passengers on short, shelter-port and excursion voyages in sailing ships and steam-ships, respectively, and in seasons of fair weather and foul weather, respectively. We have recast the section and have introduced into it two provisos of the nature of those referred to in paragraph 54 above reserving the upper deck or portions thereof for the use of native passengers, and providing for the proper height of the roof of decks.

We have also provided that the deck on which any native passenger is carried during a short voyage or a shelter-port voyage in a season of foul weather shall have solid

61. Section 302.—To the words "substantial bulwarks" in the sixth line we have added the words "or rails and netting protected by curtains" as in section 284.

62. Section 303.-We have provided that clauses (c) and (d), which required the master to carry food, fuel, pure water, etc., for the use of the passengers, and to certify at each port that he has complied with this rule, shall be limited to the cases of short voyages, and shall not apply to the case of shelter-port and excursion voyages.

CHAPTER XXXII.

SPECIAL PROVISIONS WITH REGARD TO PILGRIM SHIPS.

Definitions.

297. In this Chapter,—

"pilgrim ship" means a vessel conveying Muhammadan pilgrims from or to any port in British India to or from any port in the Red Sea:

Provided that no vessel carrying passengers other than pilgrims of the lowest class and having on board pilgrims of the lowest class in a less proportion than one pilgrim for every one hundred tons of the gross tonnage of the vessel shall be subject to the provisions of this Chapter.

Explanation.—By "pilgrims of the lowest class" are meant "pilgrims who are steerage passengers:"

"pilgrim" means a Muhammadan passenger going to or returning from the Hedjas, and, in the computation of pilgrims for any of the purposes of this Chapter, two pilgrims under the age of twelve years shall be reckoned as one pilgrim.

297A. The notice required by section 282

(4) All articles, which have been contaminated by persons suffering from cholera or cholerate indisposition, or any dangerously infectious or contagious disease, or are suspected of having been so contaminated shall, before being taken on board a pilgrim ship, be disinfected under the supervision of a medical officer appointed by the Local Government for the purpose, in such manner as the Local Government shall direct.

if the ship is propelled by steam, or partly by steam and partly by sails,—

for each native passenger, seven superficial and forty-two cubic feet;

(5) when performing an excursion voyage,-

for each native passenger, six superficial and thirty-six cubic feet on any deck:

Provided that, in the case of a ship performing a short voyage or a shelter-port voyage during a season of foul weather—

- (a) if native passengers are carried in more than one deck below the main or tonnage deck, the ship shall have on each such additional deck fourteques superficial and eighty-four cubic feet of space for each such passenger;
- (b) the spaces hereinbefore prescribed for the carriage of native passengers shall be sheltered by a permanent iron or wooden deck-covering and by solid bulwarks; and
- (c) there shall be reserved for the use of the native passengers the uppermost deck or decks (excluding the portion set apart for the first and second class passengers and the airing space for the crew, and any space which may be reserved as a hospital for the use of the passengers): Provided that, if any such ship has less than the full number of native passengers which she is authorised to carry, only so much of such upper-deck or decks need be reserved for such passengers as is proportionate to the number of such passengers carried:

(a) if the ship is registered in the United Kingdom or in British India or any other British Possession, the Customs-collector may require the owner or master of the ship or any person having possession of her certificate of registry to produce such certificate for inspection.

(b) If the owner or master or such person as aforesaid neglects or refuses to produce such certificate, or otherwise to satisfy the Customs-collector as to what is the true tonnage of the ship in respect of which the coast-light dues are pay-able, he shall be punished with fine which may extend to one hundred rupees, and the Customs-collector may cause the ship to be measured, and the tonnage thereof to be ascertained, according to the mode of measurement for the time being prescribed by or 57 & 58 under the Merchant Shipping Act, Vict., c. 60. 1894, for ascertaining the tonnage of British ships; and in such case the owner or master of the ship shall also be liable to pay the expenses of the measurement.

(2) If the ship is not registered in the United Kingdom or in British India or some other British Possession, and the owner or master thereof fails to satisfy the Customs-collector as to what is her true tonnage according to the mode of measurement for the time being prescribed Vict., c. 60. by or under the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, for ascertaining the tonnage of British ships, the Customs-collector shall cause the ship to be measured, and the tonnage thereof to be ascertained, according to the mode aforesaid; and in such case the owner or master of the ship shall be liable to pay the expenses of the measurement.

TO THE DISPOSAL OF THE PROCEEDS OF WRECKS ON THEIR RESPECTIVE COASTS.

The Government of Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Empress of India, and the Government of the French Republic, desiring to regulate by a new Agreement questions relative to the disposal of the proceeds of wrecks on the coasts of the two States, have agreed to replace the Declaration signed at London on the 16th June, 1879, by the following arrangements :-

ARTICLE I.

When any ship belonging to the subjects of one of the two Contracting States is wrecked or stranded on the coast of the other, the competent local authorities shall, with as little delay as possible, bring the fact to the knowledge of the Consul General, Consul, Vice-Consul or Consular Agent nearest to the spot where the wreck or stranding has taken place.

ARTICLE II.

All operations relative to the salvage of Brifish ships which may be wrecked or stranded on the coasts of France shall be directed by the Consuls General, Consuls, Vice-Consuls or Consular Agents of Great Britain, and reciprocally (Schedule VI.—Declaration between the Government of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and the Government of the French Republic with reference to the disposal of the proceeds of Wrecks on their respective Coasts.)

the French Consuls General, Consuls, Vice-Consuls and Consular Agents shall direct all operations relative to the salvage of ships of their nation wrecked or stranded on the coasts of Great Britain.

ARTICLE III.

If the owners of the ship and cargo, or their duly authorised representatives, shall be present and shall claim it, the Consuls General, Consuls, Vice-Consuls and Consular Agents shall hand over to them the conduct of the salvage operations after requiring the deposit of the ship's papers, as well as the reimbursement of the expenses already defrayed, and a sufficient guarantee for those incurred before the operations were handed over, and which may not have been already settled.

ARTICLE IV.

The intervention of the local authorities shall only take place in the two countries for the purpose of assisting the Consular authority, of maintaining order, of securing the interests of the salvors if they are strangers to the ship-wrecked crews, and of assuring the due execution of the arrangements to be carried out for the entry and departure of the merchandise saved.

In the absence, and until the arrival, of the Consuls General, Consuls, Vice-Consuls or Consular Agents, the local authorities shall, moreover, take all necessary measures for the protection of the persons and for the preservation of the articles which shall have been saved from the wreck.

This intervention shall not give rise to any charges, with the exception of those which the salvage operations and the protection of the articles saved shall have rendered necessary, and those to which national ships would, under similar circumstances, be liable. These charges shall be paid according to the circumstances of the case, either by the Agents of the Consular service, or by their owners or their proxies.

In case absence, sickness or any other cause should prevent the Agents of the Consular service from seeing to the operations and the management of the salvage, the local authorities who may be charged with the operations and management in question shall be bound to remit to the aforesaid Agents the ship's papers and the net proceeds of the ship and the cargo.

ARTICLE V.

The merchandise and articles saved shall not be liable to any customs duties, unless they are intended for home consumption, in which case they shall pay the same duties as they would have had to pay if they had been imported in national vessels.

ARTICLE VI

The stipulations of the present Declaration shall be applicable to all the Colonies and foreign possessions of Her Britannic Majesty, excepting to those hereinafter named, that is to say, except to—

India.
The Dominion of Canada.
Newfoundland.
The Cape.
Natal.

New South Wales. Victoria. Queensland. Tasmania. South Australia. Western Australia.

New Zealand.

Provided always that the stipulations of the present Declaration shall be made applicable to any of the above-named Colonies or foreign possessions on whose behalf notice to that effect shall have been given by Her Britannie Majesty's Representative to the French Republic within one year from the date of the signature of the present Declaration.

The stipulations of the present Declaration shall be applicable to all the Colonies and foreign possessions of France.

ARTICLE VII.

The present Declaration shall come into operation three months after the date of its signature, and shall remain in force until the expiration of one year from the day on which either party may give notice of its intention to terminate it.

In witness whereof, the undersigned plenipotentiaries, His Excellency the Earl of Lytton, Ambassador of Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Empress of India, and His Excellency M. Eugene Spuller, Minister for Foreign Affairs, have signed the present Declaration, and have affixed thereto their seals.
