# BILLS OF THE COVERNMENT OF INDIA.

## LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT.

The following Bill was introduced in the Council of the Governor General of India for the purpose of making Laws and Regulations on the 11th July, 1895:

## No. 10 of 1895.

A Bill to amend the Foreign Jurisdiction and Extradition Act, 1879.

XXI of 1879, Whereas it is expedient to amend the Foreign Jurisdiction and Extradition Act, 1879; It is hereby enacted as follows :

"12A. A Political Agent issuing a warrant for the arrest of any person

under section 11 may in his discretion direct by endorsement thereon that. if such person execute a

bond with sufficient sureties for his attendance before the officer mentioned in the warrant at a specified time, the Magistrate to whom the warrant is directed shall take such security and release such person from custody.

"The endorsement shall state (a) the number of sureties (if any), (b) the amount in which they and the person for whose arrest the warrant is issued are to be respectively bound, and (c) the time and place at which he is to attend before the officer mentioned in the warrant.

"Whenever security is taken under this section, the Magistrate shall certify the fact to the Political Agent by whom the warrant was issued, and shall retain the bond.

# STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.

There is not now any legal authority for the extradition from British India of a deserter from the Imperial Service Corps. These corps are raised, drilled and maintained under the supervision of British officers at the expense of certain Native States in order to form part of the military forces of Her Majesty, and it seems reasonable that the surrender of deserters therefrom to British India should be provideu for. The object of this Bill is, by means of an amendment of section 11 of the Foreign Jurisdiction and Extradition Act, 1879, making such desertion an offence in respect of which warrants for arrest may be issued, to give Political Agents the necessary power to obtain extradition in these cases.

Many offences of a comparatively trivial kind are extraditable, but the Foreign Jurisdiction and Extradition Act, 1879, does not provide for the enlargement on bail of a person arrested under a warrant issued by a Political Agent under section 11 thereof. To remedy this defect it is proposed by this Bill to embody in that Act the provisions of the Code of Criminal Procedure which admit of the release of a person arrested under a warrant on his furnishing security, to the satisfaction of a Magistrate, for his due appearance.



# LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT.

The following Bill was introduced in the Council of the Governor General of India for the purpose of making Laws and Regulations on the 11th July, 1895 :---

## Bill No. 11 of 1895.

# A Bill to amend the Indian Penal Code.

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend the Indian XLV of 1860. Penal Code; It is hereby enacted as follows:

1. (1) To Section 230 of the said Code the Addition to Section 230 following shall be added, of Code. namely: " Any piece of metal which has at any time been the Queen's coin as above defined shall be deemed to be the Queen's coin for the purposes of this Chapter notwithstanding that it may have ceased to be used as money."

(2) To the illustrations appended to the said Section the following shall be added, namely :

" (c) The 'Farukhabad rupee,' which was formerly used as money under the authority of the Government of India, is Queen's coin, although it is no longer so used."

## STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.

As Section 230 of the Indian Penal Code now stands, pieces of metal alleged to be "coin" and "Queen's coin" must be "used for the time being as money" in order to fall within the definitions there given. The Indian Coinage Act, 1870, enables the Governor General in Council, by notification in the Gazette of India, to call in coins of any date or denomination, and it would not unlikely be held that coin of any denomination so called in was not "used for the time being as money," at any rate when after a space of time it became sufficiently scarce. With coin of this kind, however, fraud can be committed of exactly the same character as before the calling in, and the same reasons apply to prevention of the counterfeiting coin that is so called in as apply to the coin before being called in—until at least the coin ceases to have any but a numismatic value.

2. Farukhabad rupees, which were formerly in use and circulation as legal tender in Bengal, under the authority of the Government of India, were called in in 1877, and are therefore not covered by the definition as it stands. They are (or very recently were) not altogether out of use as money in some of the Native States. They were recently extensively manufactured in Bombay; and it is considered necessary to take legal power to stop this manufacture.

### A Bill to make better provision for the regulation of Pilgrim Ships.

WHEREAS it is expedient to make better provision for the regulation of pilgrim ships; It is hereby enacted as follows:

### Preliminary.

- 1. This Act may be called the Pilgrim Ships [S. 1, Title, Act, 1895. of I
- 2. (1) It extends to the whole of British [S. 2, il Extent and application. India, and applies—

(Preliminary - Sections 3-5. Rules for Voyages of Pilgrim Ships-Sections 6-11.)

- (a) to all subjects of Her Majesty within the dominions of Princes and States in India under the suzerainty of Her Majesty ;
- (b) to all native Indian subjects of Her Majesty without and beyond British India ; and,
- (c) subject to the exceptions mentioned in subsection (2), to every pilgrim ship as hereinafter defined.
- (2) But it does not apply-
  - (i) to any ship-of-war, troopship, transport or other ship belonging to the Royal Navy of Her Majesty's Indian Marine Service, or
  - (ii) to any other ship for the time being in the service of Her Majesty, or
  - (iii) to any ship-of-war belonging to any Foreign Prince or State, or
  - (iv) to any ship not being a pilgrim ship.
- This Act shall come into force on the first Commencement, day of October, 1895.
- Repeal of Act X, 1887, so

far as regards pilgrim ships.

4. On and from that day nothing contained in the Native Passenger Ships Act, 1887, shall apply to any pilgrim ship.

5. In this Act, unless there is anything repugnant in the subject Definitions. or context, -

(1) "pilgrim" means a Muhammadan passenger going to, or returning from, the Hedjaz :

(2) " pilgrim ship " means a ship conveying pilgrims from or to any port in British India to or from any port in the Red Sea :

Provided that no ship carrying passengers other than pilgrims of the lowest class and having on board pilgrims of the lowest class in a less proportion than one pilgrim for every one hundred tons of the gross tonnage of the ship shall be deemed to be a pilgrim ship within the meaning of this Act.

Explanation .- "By pilgrims of the lowest class" are meant pilgrims who are steerage passengers :

(3) "voyage" means the whole distance between a pilgrim ship's port or place of departure and her final port or place of arrival :

(4) "Chief Customs-officer" means the chief executive officer of sea-customs in any port or place to which this Act applies : and

(5) "Magistrate" means a person exercising powers not inferior to those of a Magistrate of the second class.

#### Rules for Voyages of Pilgrim Ships.

6. (1) No pilgrim ship shall depart or pro-

Pilgrim ships to sail only from places appointed by the Government. ceed from, or discharge passengers (whether pilgrims or not) at, any port

or place within British India other than a port or place appointed in this behalf by the Local Government.

(2) After a pilgrim ship has departed or proceeded on a voyage from a port or place so appointed, no person shall be received on board as a pilgrim except at some other port or place so appointed.

- (d) that the master holds certificate A;
- (e) that she is propelled principally by steam ;
- (f) that, if she is to carry more than one hundred pilgrims, she has on board the medical officer, or medical officers, required by section 23, licensed in accordance with the rules under this Act; and

(2) If the officer causes a survey to be made of a pilgrim ship holding any such certificate, and the surveyors report that she is seaworthy and properly equipped, fitted and ventilated for the conveyance of pilgrims, and that there was no reasonable ground why the officer should have thought it likely that she would be found unseaworthy, or not properly equipped, fitted or ventilat-ed for such traffic, the expense of the survey shall be paid by the Local Government.

- (b) the time within which a pilgrim ship shall depart or proceed on her voyage after commencing to take pilgrims on board.

(3) In making a rule under this section the authority making it may direct that a breach of it shall be punishable with fine which may extend to two hundred rupees, and when the breach is a continuing breach with a further fine which may extend to twenty rupees for every day after the first during which the breach continues.

(4) The power to make rules under this section is subject to the condition of the rules being made after previous publication.

## STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.

The object of this Bill is to give effect to recommendations made by the International Sanitary Conference held at Paris in 1894 and accepted by Her Majesty's Government for the regulation of the Muhammadan pilgrim traffic by sca between British India and Arabia. Vessels engaged in that traffic are at present governed by the Native Passenger Ships Act, 1837; but, as that Act contains, besides special provisions applying to pilgrim ships, provisions of general application to ships carrying natives of Asia or Africa as passengers, it appears to be the most convenient course, instead of attempting to amend it to meet the special circumstances of the case, to remove altogether from its operation pilgrim ships and to provide for them in a separate enactment such as that now proposed. This Bill, it will be found from the marginal references, reproduces, with such amendments as are necessary to carry out the object stated above, all the sections contained in Act X of 1837 except sections 18, 19, 20, 21, 37, 55 and 57, some of which are on the face of them inapplicable in the case of ships making the long voyage from British India to foreign ports in the Red Sea. The more important of the amendments made in the provisions of the existing enactment are noticed below.

2. Section 4 of the Bill repeals the Native Passenger Ships Act so far as regards " pilgrim ships," and section 5, besides defining a "pilgrim" and a "pilgrim ship," provides that no vessel shall come within the purview of the proposed Act unless, besides ordinary passengers, among whom may be included pilgrims not of the lowest class, it has on board pilgrims of the lowest class in a proportion of at least one to every hundred tons of the gross tonnage. In accordance with the terms of the Convention, every individual Muhammadan passenger of whatever age, making the voyage to or from the Hedjaz, is to be reckoned as a pilgrim. 3. In section 7 of the Bill it is provided that at least three days' (instead of twenty-four hours') notice beforehand shall be given of the sailing and destination of a pilgrim ship.

4. Section 21 of Act X of 1887 fixes the minimum space to be made available for passengers on long voyages, while section 56 enables the Governor General in Council, notwithstanding the earlier provision, to prescribe by order the number of superficial or of cubic feet to be allowed. Sub-section (1) of section 18 of the Bill omits the former, but includes the latter, provision, it having been decided that the increase of space, on which much stress was laid at the Conference, should be provided for by executive order in this way. The remaining sub-sections (2) and (3) give effect to the recommendations of the Conference as to the reservation of the upper deck for the use of pilgrims by day and by night and the hospital accommodation to be set apart for their benefit.

5. By section 23 of the Bill, which for the rest reproduces section 26 of the Native Passenger Ships Act, the presence of a second medical officer on board is, in accordance with the Convention, required if the number of pilgrims carried exceeds one thousand.

6. Section 24 of the Bill reproduces section 27 of the Native Passenger Ships Act, so modified a to dispense with the unnecessary and often inconvenient call at Aden on the return journey to India which is at present compulsory. This change is not required by the Convention, but is in no way opposed thereto.

7. By section 27 of the Bill, which corresponds to section 30 of the Native Passenger Ships Act, it is provided, as mecommended by the Conference, that the medical examination of all pilgrims shall take place on land prior to embarkation, that persons suffering from cholera or choleraic diarrhœa or any dangerously infectious or contagious disease shall not be permitted to embark, that the embarkation of others who have been in attendance upon or otherwise in contact with persons so affected may, at the discretion of a duly appointed medical officer, be forbidden, and that contaminated articles shall not be taken on board without having been first disinfected under the supervision of a medical officer as aforesaid.

8. Section 28 of the Bill is an entirely new provision based on the Convention, and is to the effect that all the sanitary taxes levied at the ports visited shall be paid by the master, who is left to recover the amount, by arranging to have it included in the price of the tickets issued or otherwise, from the pilgrims concerned.

9. The remaining alterations are either consequential on those already explained or are of an unimportant character, and do not, therefore, call for further notice or explanation.

# LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT.

The following Bill was introduced in the Council of the Governor General of India for the purpose of making Laws and Regulations on the 11th July, 1895 :—

# Bill No. 13 of 1895.

A Bill to amend Sections 632 and 652 of the Code of Civil Procedure.

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend Sections 632 XIV of 1882. and 652 of the Code of Civil Procedure ; It is hereby enacted as follows : 1. In Section 632 of the said Code, after the word Amendment of Section 632, Act XIV, 1882. "the words and figures "and in Section 652" shall be added.

Amendment of Section 652, Act XIV, 1882. 2. To Section 652 of the said Code the following shall be added, namely :

"Notwithstanding anything in this Code contained, any High Court established under the said Act for establishing High Courts of Judicature in India may make such rules consistent with the Letters Patent establishing it to regulate its own procedure in the exercise of its original civil jurisdiction, as it shall think fit.

"All such rules shall be published in the local official Gazette, and shall thereupon have the force of law."

## STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.

THE BOMBAY GOVERNMENT GAZETTE, JULY 18, 1895.

SECTION 652 of the Code of Civil Procedure, as it now stands, purports to require that any rules to regulate its own procedure made by a High Court, oven although it be established by Royal Charter, shall be consistent with that Code. The Letters Patent of the High Courts at Fort William, Madras and Bombay, appear, however, to recognise the practical expediency of leaving such High Courts some latitude in the direction of adapting the provisions of the ordinary law to meet their requirements. It has been found by experience that those provisions are not in all respects convenient in the case of original proceedings in those Courts, and the object of this Bill is, by an amendment of Section 652 and an ancillary amendment of Section 632, to bring the Code into perfect harmony with the provisions of those Letters Patent and to enable the High Courts referred to to regulate the exercise of their original civil jurisdiction accordingly.
