# PART VI.

# BILLS OF THE COVERNMENT OF INDIA.

## LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT.

The following Bill was introduced in the Council of the Governor General of India for the purpose of making Laws and Regulations on the 11th February 1897 :-

#### No. 3 of 1897.

A Bill to repeal certain Obsolete Enactments and to amend and facilitate the citation of certain other enactments.

[Of. Act XII, WHEREAS it is expedient that certain enact-1891, pream ments specified in the first schedule to this Act which are spent, or have ceased to be in force otherwise than by express specific repeal, or have by lapse of time or otherwise become unnecessary, should be expressly and specifically repealed;

> And whereas it is also expedient that certain formal amendments should be made in the enactments specified in the second schedule to this Act;

> And whereas it is also expedient to facilitate the citation of the enactments specified in the third schedule to this Act;

It is hereby enacted as follows:-

[Of. Act XII, 1891, s. ].]

- 1. (1) This Act may be called the Repealing and Amending Act, 1897; Title and commencement. and
  - (2) It shall come into force at once.

[Of. Act XII, 1891, s. 2.]

2. (1) The enactments specified in the first Enactments in schedules repealed and amended respectively.

schedule are hereby repealed to the extent men-tioned in the fourth column thereof.

- (2) The enactments specified in the second schedule shall be modified to the extent and in the manner mentioned in the fourth column thereof.
- 3. The repeal by this Act of any enactment [cf. Act XI shall not affect any Act 1891, . 2] or Regulation in which such enactment has been applied, incorporated or referred to;

and this Act shall not affect the validity, invalidity, effect or consequences of anything already done or suffered, or any right, title, obligation or liability already acquired, accrued or incurred, or any remedy or proceeding in respect thereof, or any release or discharge of or from any debt, penalty, obligation, liability, claim or demand, or any indemnity already granted, or the proof of any past act or thing;

nor shall this Act affect any principle or rule of law, or established jurisdiction, form or course of pleading, practice or procedure, or existing usage, custom, privilege, restriction, exemption, office or appointment, notwithstanding that the same respectively may have been in any manner affirmed, recognized or derived by, in or from any enactment hereby repealed;

nor shall the repeal by this Act of any enact-ment provide or restore any jurisdiction, office, custom, liability, right, title, privilege, restriction, exemption, usage, practice, procedure or other matter or thing not now existing or in force.

22nd August 1878, in the districts of Kannrup, Nowgong, Darrang, Sibsagar, Lakhimpur, Goalpara (oxcluding the Eastern Dvars) and Cachar (excluding the North Cachar Hills) and, on the 3rd October 1879, in the district of Sylhet. It is possibly also applicable to the North Cachar Hills, the Garo Hills, the Khasi and Jaintia Hills and the Naga Hills, which were acquired before 1854. The Act has been superseded by Bengal Act IX of 1879 in the districts of Goalpara, Cachar (excluding the North Cachar Hills) and Sylhet, and will be superseded by the same Act in the districts of Kanrup, Nowgong, Darrang, Sibsagar and Lakhimpur on the issue of proposed Draft II; and it is probably not required in any of the Hill Districts.

This Act is quite general in its terms, and therefore applied to Assam along with the other territories comprised in Bengal at the time that it was passed. It has been repealed in the districts of Sylhet, Kamrup, Nowgong, Darrang, Sibsagar, Lakhimpur, Goalpara (excluding the Eastern Dvars) and Cachar (excluding the North Cachar Hills), by Bengal Act VI of 1873, which has been declared in force in all these places, but it is unrepealed as regards the rest of Assam.

It is proposed to repeal Bengal Act VI of 1873 in Assam, as being of no practical use there, and Act XXXII of 1855 is no doubt similarly useless in the tracts in which it is nominally in force.

This Act was declared in force in the district of Sylhet by Notification No. 1152, dated the 3rd October 1879, issued under the Scheduled Districts Act, 1874, but it is a dead-letter there, the cultivation of opium in Assam being prohibited.

There are now no "labour-districts" in Bengal, and the Khasi Hills District in Assam has ceased to be a "labour-district". The words now suggested for repeal appear to have become obsolete, in consequence of the repeals made by Act VII of 1893, s. 3 (1).

#### STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.

The object of this Bill is, as stated in the preamble, to repeal certain enactments which are spent, or have eeased to be in force otherwise than by express repeal, or have by lapse of time or otherwise become obsolete or unnecessary, and also to make certain formal amendments in the Statute-book suggested in the course of the preparation in the Legislative Department of the Government of India of a Code of the Acts and Regulations in force in the territories administered by the Chief Commissioner of Assam. The opportunity has been taken to facilitate the citation, where necessary, of the enactments (other than those of the Bengal Council) contained in that Code by following the example set by Parliament in passing the Short Titles Acts of 1892 and 1896.

- The object of this Bill is to assimilate the law contained in the Negotiable Instruments Act, 1881, to the law contained in Section 74 of the Bills of Exchange Act, 1882 and 46 Vict., c. 61), as appears from the Statement of Objects and Reasons.
- We think that object can best be attained by adopting the language of the English Act. We have therefore substituted the terms of Section 74 of the English Act for the present provisions of Section 84 of the Indian Act. We have also added two illustrations to make the object of the new provisions clearer.
- 4. As Section 84 qualifies the provisions of Section 72 and the two sections must be read together, we have thought it best to amend Section 72 by prefixing the words "subject to the provisions of Section 84."
- 5. We have substituted these amendments for the proposals of the original Bill, which have been subjected to many criticisms, some of which seem to us to be well founded.

### No. II.

A Bill to amend the Negotiable Instruments Act, 1881.

XXV of 1881.

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend the Negotiable Instruments Act, 1881; It is hereby enacted as follows :-

Short title and commencement.

- (1) This Act may be called the Negotiable Instruments Act Amendment Act, 1897; and
- (2) It shall come into force at once.
- 2. To section 72 of the said Act the following. words shall be prefixed, Amendment of section 72, Act XXVI of 1881. namely, " Subject to the provisions of section \$4."

Substitution of new section for section 84, Act XXVI of 1881.

- 3. For section 84 of the said Act the following section shall be substituted, namely :-
- When cheque not duly presented and drawer damaged thereby.

"84. (1) Where a cheque is not presented for payment within a reasonable time of its issue, and the drawer or person on has not suffered actu whose account it is drawn presenting the cheque.

had the right, at the time when presentment ought to have been made, as between himself and the banker, to have the cheque paid and suffers actual damage through the delay, he is discharged to the extent of such damage, that is to say, to the extent to which such drawer or person is a creditor of the banker to a larger amount than he would have been if such cheque had been paid.

- (2) In determining what is a reasonable time regard shall be had to the nature of the instrument, the usage of trade and of bankers and the facts of the particular case.
- (3) The holder of the cheque as to which such drawer or person is so discharged shall be a creditor, in lieu of such drawer or person, of such banker to the extent of such discharge and entitled to recover the amount from him.

#### Illustrations.

- (a) A draws a cheque for Rs. 1,000, and, when the cheque ought to be presented, has funds at the bank to meet it. The bank fails before the cheque is presented. The drawer is discharged, but the holder can prove against the bank for the amount of the cheque.
- (b) A draws a cheque at Umballa on a bank in Calcutta. The bank fails before the cheque could be presented in ordinary course. A is not discharged, for he has not suffered actual damage through any delay in presenting the chemical damage.
