# BILLS OF THE COVERNMENT OF INDIA.

# LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT.

The following Report of the Select Committee on the Bill to amend the law relating to Reformatory Schools and to make further provision for dealing with youthful offenders was presented to the Council of the Governor General of India for the purpose of making Laws and Regulations on the 25th February 1897:-

We, the undersigned, Members of the Select Committee to which the Bill to amend the law

relating to Reformatory Schools and to make further provision for with dealing youthful offenders was referred, have considered the Bill and the noted papers in the margin, and have now the honour to submit this our Report, with the Bill as amended by us annexed thereto.

2. Clause 1. We have ascertained that the Punjab and Coorg are the only two provinces of British India (other than deregulationized areas such as Upper Burma and British Baluchistan) in which the Reformatory Schools Act, 1875, has not been brought into force. We have, therefore, while making the repeal of the existing Act general, altered the extent clause of the Bill as introduced so as to bring the proposed Act into force at once in all places in which the existing Act is now in force.

3. Clause 4.—"Youthful offender:"—Owing to the representations made on the subject by the Government of Bengal, we have reduced the age required to bring a boy under this definition from sixteen to fifteen years. It is to be noted that clause 31 is now applied to girls as well as boys.

We have also added a difinition of "District Magistrate," making that term include a Chief Presidency Magistrate for the purposes of the proposed Act.

- 4. Clause 8.—In consequence of the objections taken to it by the High Court at Calcutta and other authorities, we have recast this clause and restored the provisions of the existing law under which the discretion of the Courts as to the period for which a youthful offender is to be sent to a reformatory is limited by rules to be made by the Local Government. We have further limited the discretion of the Courts as to the kind of youthful offenders who may be sent to reformatories by also conferring power on the Local Government to provide by rule what youthful offenders should be sent to reformatories having regard to the nature of their offences or other considerations. In view of the reduction of age in the definition of "youthful offender" above explained, we have extended the minimum period of detention from two to three years. Lastly, we have extended the powers conferred by this clause to any Magistrate specially authorized by the Local Government in this behalf and have declared that the powers conferred may be exercised whether the case comes before the Court originally or on appeal.
- 5. Clause 9.—We have made this clause conform more strictly to the procedure prescribed by section 349 of the Code of Criminal Procedure by reserving the power to pass sentence as well as to pass the order for detention in a reformatory in the hands of the District Magistrate.
- 6. Cluse 10.—We agree with the North-Western Provinces and Oudh Government that the wording of sub-clause (1) of this clause might with advantage be made clearer, and we have adopted the re-draft of the sub-clause proposed by that Government.
- 7. Clause 11.—We have inserted a new sub-clause (2) to this clause requiring a subordinate Magistrate, before sending a case up to a District Magistrate as prescribed by clause 9, to hold such an inquiry into the age of the youthful offender as is required by this clause. We have omitted the old sub-clause (2) as being now unnecessary.
- 8. Clause 12.—We have, on the suggestion of the North-Western Provinces and Oudh Government, recast the proviso to this clause so as to make it impossible to keep a boy, who has been sent to a jail to wait there until he can be removed to a reformatory, for a longer term in the jail than that of his substantive sentence.
- 9. Clause 13.—We have recast this clause on lines proposed by the Chief Commissioner of the Central Provinces, so as to provide a procedure for dealing with a youthful offender whose age has been afterwards found to have been understated at the time of sentence.
- 10. Clause 14.—We have omitted sub-clause (b) of this clause because we do not consider that a boy who has been detained in a reformatory should be sent back to prison under any circumstances.
- 11. Clause 15 is new. We are aware that power is already possessed by the Governor General in Council under section 32 of the Prisoners Act, 1871, as amended by Act VII of 1894, section 1, to remove youthful offenders from one reformatory to another in British India, but we are of opinion that it is desirable nevertheless to insert in the body of the new Reformatory Schools Act a specific provision of the nature of that contained in this clause, which confers a general power on the Governor General in Council to direct the use of a reformatory in one province for the reception of youthful offenders from another, and to issue such supplemental orders as to cost of maintenance and other matters as may be necessary.
- 12. Clause 16 (formerly clause 15).—We agree generally with the criticisms which have been passed on this clause and have accordingly amended it so as to leave the jurisdiction of the superior Courts under the Code of Criminal Procedure unrestricted, save in so far as relates to orders passed with respect to the age of a youthful offender or the substitution of an order for detention in a reformatory for transportation or imprisonment.

We have omitted clause 16 of the Bill as introduced, as we consider that the cases for which it provides are not such as should properly be dealt with in a reformatory.

- 13. Clause. 18.—We have required the Superintendent to obtain the sanction of the Committee before licensing youthful offenders to employers of labour, as we think that this is a power which should not be left in the hands of the Superintendent alone.
- 14. Clause 19.—We have omitted the second part of this clause in the Bill as introduced, because in our opinion it should be left in every case to the discretion of the Committee to license the youthful offender to another employer or not as they may think fit.
- 15. Clause 20.—In compliance with a suggestion from the Chief Commissioner of the Central Provinces, we have made the fact of an employer named in a license ceasing to employ labour a reason for the determination of the license.
- 16. Clause 22.—As in the case of licensing, so in the case of apprenticing, we have subjected the Superintendent's authority to the saction of the Committee.
- 17. Clause 27.—We have brought this clause into more strict conformity with section 42 of the Prisons Act, 1894, by making it cover cases in which prohibited articles are removed from a reformatory and by including communication with a youthful offender in the scope of the clause.

- 18. Clause 28.—We have raised the penalty of fine under this clause from one hundred to two hundred rupees as in the preceding clause.
- 19. Clause 31.—We have extended the provisions of this clause to girls who may be youthful offenders, and we have limited the exercise of the powers which it confers to the Courts which are empowered to act under clause 8, making provision, analogous to that contained in clause 9, for the case of subordinate Courts which are not empowered to take action under the clause.
- 20. Clause 32.—Having considered the criticisms offered on this clause by the Calcutta High Court and various Local Governments, we have entirely recast it, our object being to provide that a sentence passed on a youthful offender in a reformatory shall commence at once subject to any special orders which the Local Government, to whom the matter is to be reported forthwith, may think fit to issue.
- 21. We have considered the proposal to provide Reformatory Schools for female juvenile offenders, and in view of the grave objections to this course arising out of Hindu and Muhammadan customs, we are not in favour of the proposal. The Madras Local Government alone favours it, and it may be that the circumstances of that Presidency, where there is a large Christian population, are such that the objections urged by all the other Local Governments' and Administrations do not prevail there, but in this case we are of opinion that the proper course is for the Local Legislature to undertake such special legislation for the establishment of such schools in Madras as it may deem necessary.

# THE REFORMATORY SCHOOLS BLLL.

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# No. II.

A Bill to amend the law relating to Reformatory Schools and to make further provision for dealing with youthful offenders.

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend the law relating to Reformatory Schools and to make further provision for dealing with youthful offenders; It is hereby enacted as follows:—

# I .- Preliminary.

Title, commencement and extent.

I. (1) This Act may be [Sec. I.] called the Reformatory

Schools Act, 1897, and

- (2) It shall come into force at once.
- (3) This section and Section 2 shall extend to the whole of British India. The other sections shall extend in the first instance to the whole of British India except the territories for the time being administered by the Lieutenant-Governor of the Punjáb and the Chief Commissioner of Coorg, but either of the said Local Governments may at any time, by notification in the local official Gazette, extend these sections to their territories from such day as may be fixed in any such notification.

Repeal of Act V of Schools Act, 1876, is here-V of 1876. by repealed.

- (2) But all proceedings taken, orders passed, officers appointed or authorised and rules made under the said Act shall, as far as may be, be deemed to have been respectively passed, appointed or authorised and made under this Act.
- (3) Any enactment or document referring to the said Act shall, as far as may be, be construed to refer to this Act, or to the corresponding portion thereof.

- (a) "youthful offender" means any boy who has been convicted of any offence punishable with transportation or imprisonment

and who, at the time of such conviction, was under the age of fifteen years;

- (b) "Inspector-General" includes any officer appointed by the Local Government to perform all or any of the duties imposed by this Act on the Inspector-General;
- (c) "District Magistrate" shall include a Chief Presidency Magistrate.

# II .- Reformatory Schools.

- 5. With the previous sanction of the Gover-. [Sec. 4.] Power to establish and nor-General in Council, the Local Government Reformatory discontinue may-
  - (a) establish and maintain Reformatary Schools at such places as it may think fit;
  - (b) use as Reformatory Schools schools kept by persons willing to act in conformity with such rules, consistent with this Act, as the Local Government may prescribe in this behalf;
  - (c) direct that any school so established or used shall cease to exist as a Reformatory School or to be used as such.

6. Every school so es-Requisites of schools. tablished or used must provide-

- (a) sufficient means of separating the inmates at nght;
- (b) proper sanitary arrangements, water-supply, food, clothing and Ledding for the youthful offenuers detained therein;
- (c) the means of giving such youthful offenders industrial training;
- (d) an infirmary or proper place for the reception of such youthful offenders when sick.

7. (1) Every school intended to be established Inspection of Reformaor used as a Reformatory tory Schools. School shall, before being used as such, be inspected by the Inspector-General, and if he finds that the requirements of Sect.on 6 have been complied with, and that, in his opinion, such school is fitted for the receition of such youthful offenders as may be sent there under this Act, he shall certify to that effect, and such certificate shall be published in the local official Gazette, together with an order of the Local Government establishing the school as a Reformatory School or directing that it shall be used as such, and the school shall thereupon be deemed to be a Reformatory School,

(2) Every such school shall, from time to time. and at least once in every year, be visited by the sad Inspector-General, who shall send to the Local Government a report on the condition of the school in such form as the Local Government may pre-

  - (b) the management of the school;
  - (c) the education and industrial training of eape of youthful offender, youthful offenders;

- (d) visits to, and communication with, youthful offenders;
- (e) the terms and conditions under which any articles declared by the Board to be "prohibited articles" may be introduced into or rem wed out of the school;
- (f) the manner in which such articles are to be removed when introduced without due authority;
- (g) the conditions and limitations under which such articles may be supplied outside the school to any youthful offender under order of detention therein;
- (h) the conditions on which the possession by any such youthful offender of such articles may be sanctioned;
- (i) the penalties to be imposed for the supply or possession of such articles when supplied or possessed without due authority;
- (j) the punishment of offences committed by youthful offenders; and
- (k) the granting of licenses for the employment of youthful offenders.
- (2) In the absence of a Board of Management the Local Government may make rules consistent with this Act to regulate for any Reformatory School the matters mentioned in any clause of sub-section (1), other than clause (ii) (n), and also the mode in which the Committee of Visitors shall conduct their business.

#### IV.—Offences in relation to Reforma'ory Schools.

27. Whoever, contrary to any rule made under [New.]

School, or supplies or attempts to supply outside the limits of any Reformatory School to any youthful offender under order of detention therein, any prohibited article,

and every officer or person in charge of a Reformatory School who contrary to any such rule, knowingly suffers any such article to be introduced into or removed from any Reformatory School, to be possessed by any youthful offender decained therein, or to be supplied to any such youthful offender outside its l.mits,

- (3) The powers conferred on the Court by this section shall be exer ised only by Courts empowered by or under section S.
- (4) When any youthful off nder is convicted by a Court not empowered to act under this section and the Court is of opinion that the powers conferred by this section should be exercised in respect of such youthful offender, it may record such opinion and submit the proceedings and forward the youthful offender to the District Magistrate to whom such Court is subordinute.
- (5) The District Magistrate to whom the proceedings are so submitted may thereupon make such order or pass such sentence as he might have made or passed if the case had originally been tried by him.

The following Bill was introduced in the Council of the Governor General of India for the purpose of making Laws and Regulations, on the 25th, February 1897:-

A Bill to amend the Indian Emigration Act, 1883.

## STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.

A Native of India who departs by sea out of British India under an agreement to labour for hire in the Straits Settlements, does not "emigrate" within the meaning of the Indian Emigration Act, 1883, and, under section 102 of that Act, the system of comparative freedom under which emigration (in the ordinary sense of the term) from British India to the Straits Settlements is conducted, can be extended only to a protected Native State adjoining the Straits Settlements or to a British Colony or possession. This limitation makes it impossible to extend the same system, which has many advantages, to certain other countries, such as Sarawak, which obtain their supply of labour from British India through the agency and under the general control of the Straits Immigration Department, and regarding which the Government of India may from time to time be satisfied that their administration is such that the freedom from legislative restrictions enjoyed by the Straits may be safely extended. It is, therefore, proposed to amend section 102 of Act XXI of 1883, so as to make it possible for the Governor General in Council, by notification in the Gazette of India, to declare that the departure of a Native of India under an agreement to labour for hire in any country for labour in which such persons are recruited exclusively through the agency of the Government of the Straits Settlements, is not "emigration" within the meaning of that enactment.

# LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT.

The following Bill was introduced in the Council of the Governor General of India for the purpose of making Laws and Regulations on the 25th February 1897 :-

#### No. 5 of 1897.

A Bill to enable local authorities to borrow money for temporary emergencies.

WHEREAS it is expedient to enable local authorities to borrow money for temporary emergencies; It is hereby enacted as follows:-

- 1. (1) This Act may be called the Local Authorities (Emergency) Loans Short title, extent and commencement. Act, 1897.
- (2) It extends to the whole of British India; and
  - (3) It shall come into force at once.

- 2. Notwithstanding anything contained in the Local Authorities Act, 1879, or in any other Power to local authorities to borrow in cases of famine or epidemic disease. law for the time being in defined in that Act may, with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council, borrow money on the security of its funds for any of the following
  - (1) the giving of relief and the establishment and maintenance of relief-works in time of famine or scarcity;
  - (2) the prevention of the outbreak or spread of any dangerous epidemic disease; and
  - (3) any measures which may be connected with, or ancillary to, any of the purposes aforesaid.

Power to Governor General in Council to impose

3. (1) Every loan under the last foregoing section shall be made subject to such terms and conditions as the Governor General in Council may

think fit to impose.

conditions.

- (2) In particular and without prejudice to the generality of the provisions of sub-section (1), the Governor General in Council may, by general or special order, prescribe-
  - (a) the terms on which the Governor General in Council or the Local Government may lend money under this Act;
  - (b) the manner of recording and enforcing the conditions on which such loans are to be made:
  - (c) the inspection of any works carried out or expenditure incurred by means of such loans;
  - (d) the instalments by which such loans are to be repaid, the interest to be charged thereon and the manner and time of repaying such loans and of paying the interest thereon; and
  - (e) the accounts to be kept in respect of such loans.
- 4. The provisions of sections 6 and 7 of the Local Authorities Loan Act, XI of 1879. Application of section 0, Act XI, 1879. 1879, shall apply to the borrowing of money under this Act.

5. The provisions of this Act shall apply to any loan made after the first Application to loans made before commencement of day of January 1897, and before the commencement of this Act by, or with the

sanction of, the Governor General in Council to any local authority for any of the purposes hereinbefore mentioned, and every such loan shall be deemed to have been made under this Act.

#### STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.

The Local Authorities Loan Act (XI of 1879) enables a local authority to raise a loan "for the carrying out of any works which it is legally authorized to carry out," and section 8 of that Act declares that, except as provided by or under it, no local authority shall for any purpose borrow money upon or otherwise charge its funds, any contract made in defiance of that prohibition being expressly barred as void. Under these provisions, read with those of the special Acts regulating Local Boards and Municipal Committees, it is doubtful whether a loan could lawfully be raised by such a Board or Committee which is temporarily in want of funds, and requires to meet urgent expenditure for the purpose of affording relief in time of famine or scarcity or coping with a visitation of epidemic disease such as that of the bubonic plague. The object of this Bill is to remove all doubt in this connection. Clause 5 has been added in order to validate one loan in particular which the Government of India have recently felt themselves justified by gravis emergency in making to a certain municipality.
