PROCEEDINGS OF THE LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT, BOMBAY.

The following Extract from the Proceedings of the Governor of Bombay in the Legislative Department is published for general information:—

Abstract of the Proceedings of the Council of the Governor of Bombay, assembled for the purpose of making Laws and Regulations, under the provisions of "The Indian Councils Acts, 1861 and 1892."

The Council met at Poona on Monday the 12th October 1896, at 12 noon.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS.

The Honourable Mr. CHIMANLAL HARILAL SETALVAD then put question No. 1 standing in his name—

- (a) Under what authority did the Collector of Ahmedabad write to the Kázi of that place that he would not allow any intra-mural burials?
- (b) And under what powers did the Municipality in 1895 issue the notice prohibiting the burial of Mahomedan Pirs and others in mausoleums and other private burial grounds within the city walls?

The Honourable Mr. BIRDWOOD in reply said-

- (a) Government understand that the Collector acted under the general authority vested in the head of a district of preventing what appeared to him insanitary proceedings.
 - (b) Government cannot undertake to explain the action of the Municipality.

The Honourable Mr. Setalvad then put question No. 2 -

Is it true that, with reference to the refusal of the Collector of Ahmedabad to allow the Municipality to open the Baradari Gate in the Bhadra at Ahmedabad, the Commissioner, N. D., has lately written to the Municipality informing that body that their power to open or close public streets and gates would be admitted on the understanding that they would not further press for the re-opening of the gate in question; and (2) that the Municipality has passed a resolution refusing to make any such terms and asserting their right to open the said gate and pointing out the public inconvenience caused by its closing?

Will Government be pleased to lay on the Table copies of the said letter of the Commissioner, N. D., and the Resolution of the Municipality thereon? Has the Commissioner given any, and, if so, what, decision in the matter of the above gate in pursuance of the direction of Government in that behalf? (Vide Answer (h) to Question No. 2 at the meeting of 17th August 1896.)

Will Government be pleased to give directions to the Commissioner, N. D., and the Collector of Ahmedabad to allow the Municipality to open the said gate without further delay?

The Honourable Mr. Birdwood in reply said—Government consider that the disposal of the appeal, a date for the hearing of which has been fixed, may be awaited.

The Honourable Mr. Setalvad then put question No. 3—

What is the result of the communication that this Government had with the Government of India about the question of giving early effect to the recommendation made by the Finance Committee in 1886 to put the Clerk of the Insolvency Court on a salary of Rs. 500 or Rs. 600 a month, and credit all fees in excess of that sum to Government?

The Honourable Mr. Birdwood in reply said—Government are awaiting a reply to a communication to the Government of India on the subject.

The Honourable Mr. Setalvad then put question No. 4-

- (a) How far from Tarbhan is the village to which the Tarbhan School has been transferred, and what is the number of pupils attending the school there?
- (b) What was the nature of and to whom were the warnings given about improving the attendance of Káliparaj children at the Tarbhan School? Will Government be pleased to lay on the Council Table copies of the warnings thus given?
- (c) What provision has been made for the education of the 63 children at Tarbhan that were attending the school at that place at the time it was closed? If no such provision is made, will Government be pleased to direct it to be made for the benefit of the children of the 60 cess-payers (58 Ujiparaj and 2 Káliparaj) of the village?

His Excellency the President in reply said-

(a & b) As to distance I refer the honourable member to the Statement No. I for the Northern Division laid on the Council Table on the 17th August last. The information as to attendance and warnings has been called for.

(c) No provision was made, but the people of Tarbhan, whose population numbers 812, of whom 402 are Káliparaj, have agreed that 25 Káliparaj children shall attend if the school is re-established, and the Táluka Board, with which rests the power to close and open schools, has arranged to re-open the school at Tarbhan as soon as funds permit, which will probably be in a short time.

The Honourable Mr. SETALVAD then put question No. 5-

Now that the Central Distillery System is held to have been well established in the Khándesh District, will Government be pleased to issue licenses for the sale of toddy in that district, as was done before the introduction of the Central Distillery System?

The Honourable Mr. Nugent in reply said—In answer to the question No. 16, put by the honourable member on the 17th August, it was stated that licenses had been granted in the Khándesh District to owners of toddy trees to tap their trees for domestic consumption only. Government have no intention of changing the system of the grant of these licenses, that system having been introduced after the thorough establishment of the Central Distillery System.

The Honourable Mr. Setalvad then put question No. 6-

Is it true that numerous petitions from the Talátis in the Northern Division for an improvement of their salaries and pensions have been addressed to the Commissioner, N. D.? Will Government be pleased to call for these petitions and favourably consider them?

The Honourable Mr. Nugent in reply said —Government are not aware that petitions on the subject adverted to in the question have been addressed to the Commissioner by the Talátis in the Northern Division. It is not the practice for Government to call for petitions addressed to their officers.

The Honourable Mr. Setalvad then put question No. 7—

Will Government be pleased to lay on the Council Table the information, if now received, that was asked for about Agency Courts by my question No. 8 at the meeting of the 15th January 1896, as promised in the answer to that question?

His Excellency the President in reply said —The information is not yet ready to be laid on the Table.

The Honourable Mr. SETALVAD then put question No. 8-

Will Government be pleased to give information about the murder cases reported to the Police during the two years ending March 1895! (Question No. 13 put at the meeting of 26th February 1896.)

The Honourable Mr. Birdwood in reply said —The return is laid on the Table.*

The Honourable Mr. Setalvad then put Question No. 9—

What measures have Government decided to adopt for bringing the Mamlatdárs' Courts in Sind under some superintending and revisional jurisdiction? (Question No. 3 put at the meeting of 15th January 1896.)

The Honourable Mr. Birdwood in reply said —Government are advised that the Mámlatdárs' Courts in Sind can only be brought under superintending and revisional jurisdiction by legislation, the advisability of which is now under consideration.

The Honourable Mr. SETALVAD then put question No. 10-

(a) Will Government be pleased to state what attempts were made, and with what result, to give effect to the following assurance given by this Government in the year 1882:—

"But he (the Governor in Council) would now assure the Government of India that whenever such a course is practicable and any private person is found fit to discharge the duties of President, and

is willing to accept the office, he will have no hesitation in conferring the post upon a non-official. He is fully prepared to concur with the Governor General in Council in regarding, merely as a temporary arrangement, the proposal that the Collector should continue as a rule to be President of the Municipal and Local Fund Committees. That arrangement will cease at once as soon as properly qualified private gentlemen can be found and induced to accept the office, and the Governor in Council trusts that the experiment, which he hopes soon to make in this direction, will prove so successful as to justify the adoption of the measure."

(Paragraph 5, letter No. 4141 of 27th October 1882, from the Government of Bombay to the Secretary to the Government of India.)

- (b) Do not Government find it possible to find non-official persons fit and willing to serve as Presidents in important towns like Surat, Broach, Thána, &c.? Were any attempts to secure such persons in such places made during the last five years and with what result? If not, will Government be pleased to now move in that direction?
- (c) Are there non-official Presidents in any of the District and Táluka Local Boards?, Have any, and, if so, what attempts been made to secure for some of these bodies non-official Presidents? If not, will Government be pleased to now move in that direction?
- (d) In what Municipalities and District Local Boards presided over by official Presidents are there non-official Vice-Presidents and for what periods have those non-official gentlemen worked as such Vice-Presidents? Is it not true that for a greater portion of the year when the Presidents are absent from head-quarters, they perform all the duties of the Presidents? Do not Government consider some of them fitted to work as Presidents and were any of them requested to consent to be nominated Presidents? If not, will Government be pleased to now move in that direction?
- (e) In what Municipalities and District and Táluka Local Boards presided over by official Presidents are the Vice-Presidents also officials?

The Honourable Mr. BIRDWOOD in reply said-

- (a and b) In some cases non-official persons have been appointed Presidents or Vice-Presidents of Municipalities. Detailed information on the subject has been called for.

 Any specific proposals for the appointment of non-official Presidents or Vice-Presidents will always be considered on their merits.
- (c) The answer to this question is in the negative, but any specific proposal will be considered on its merits.
 - (d) Information has been called for.
 - (e) Information has been called for.
 - The Honourable Mr. SETALVAD then put question No. 11-
- (a) Is it true that a notification has recently been issued by the Collector of Than under the orders of Government to the effect that the privileges hitherto enjoyed in the reserved forests by the wild tribes of collecting and selling dead wood and by other villagers to remove fuel under permits have been withdrawn from the 1st September last on the ground that those privileges have been abused and that since the introduction of the coupe system the difficulty of obtaining fuel for household purposes has been removed and the wild tribes have been provided with means of getting a livelihood by getting employment as labourers for the coupe and that the only privilege now reserved to the villagers is to get branches of wood less than six inches in circumference for domestic use only?
- (b) Will Government be pleased to state the reasons for concluding that the privileges hitherto given were abused? Is there any obligation on the coupe contractor to employ wild tribes as labourers for the cutting of coupes? Will Government be pleased to state the total wild population in the district of Thana and the total number of labourers from the wild tribes employed by these contractors? How long does it generally take on an average to cut wood in an ordinary coupe?
- (c) Are Government aware that the above notification has deprived hundreds of persons of their only means of earning their livelihood and caused general and great discontent in the district of Thana?
- (d) Have the district authorities addressed any communication to Government upon the subject, and will Government be pleased to modify their orders with a view to remove the hardships complained of?

The Honourable Mr. Nugent in reply said—No report has as yet been received from the local authorities, but one is shortly expected on the whole question, and when it is received Government will pass on it such orders as may be deemed advisable.

The Honourable Mr. Setalvad then put question No. 12-

- (a) Will Government be pleased to appoint a committee consisting of a Judge of the Bombay High Court, a District Judge, a Revenue Officer and two experienced and competent Native lawyers to consider the feasibility of separating judicial from executive functions and for the purpose of formulating a scheme to carry out this reform?
- (b) Will Government be pleased to separate judicial and executive functions by way of trial at least in one district in each division of the Presidency, pending the disposal of the larger question more or less on the lines suggested by the Honourable Mr. P. M. Mehta at the meeting of the Council on the 27th July 1893, that is by increasing the number of Subordinate Judges in a district by one or two and distributing the whole civil and criminal work of the district between them and reducing the number of Manlatdars by a corresponding number and entrusting them only with the Revenue work by a re-organisation of the talukas in the district?

The Honourable Mr. BIRDWOOD in reply said-

- (a) In the absence of evidence proving that the present system of criminal administration is not suited to the circumstances of the mofussil of this Presidency, or that public inquiry by a committee would be likely to add to information already available or be otherwise attended with any advantage, Government are not prepared to adopt the honourable member's suggestion as contained in Question (a).
- (b) The question whether the administration of criminal justice can be concentrated more completely in the hands of purely judicial officers is likely before long to come up for the consideration of Government. But they are not now prepared to adopt either of the suggestions of the honourable member.

The Honourable Mr. Setalvad then put question No. 13-

Is it true that in Bandora, Vesáva and other parts of Sálsette no licenses for toddy shops are granted but only booth licenses for a limited number of trees are ginen only to owners of toddy trees? If so, are Government aware that the result of this system is that people, owing to toddy not being available, are forced to take liquor? Will Government be pleased to order licenses to be given for the sale of toddy in the towns above mentioned?

The Honourable Mr. Nugent in reply said—Information regarding the system upon which licenses are granted for disposal of toddy in the places mentioned in the question is to be found in the published report on the administration of the Abkari Department for 1894-95. Government are not aware that the result stated in the question has followed from the adoption of the system described in the report, and do not contemplate making any alteration in that system.

The Honourable Mr. Tilak, on behalf of the Honourable Meherban Chintamanrao Raghunath alias Bala Saheb Patwardhan, who was not present, then put Question No. 1 standing in the latter's name—

Will Government be pleased to include the place of the Head Master of the Sardars' High School, Belyaum, under the Provincial Service Rules?

His Excellency the President in reply said—The subject is under consideration.

The Honourable Mr. Talak (for the Honourable Meherba'n Chinta manra'o Raghunath) then put question No. 2—

Has the attention of Government been drawn to the recent interference of the Police in Shri Ganpati procession at Talegaon?

The Honourable Mr. Birdwood in reply said—The fact that interference on the part of the Police has been alleged in the public Press has been brought to the notice of Government.

The Honourable Mr. Tilak (for the Honourable Meherban Chintamanrao Raghunath) then put question No. 3—

Will Government be pleased to place before the Council an abstract showing the strength of the Police employed, and the expenses incurred annually for them, on the Railway lines passing through the Southern Marátha Country States?

The Honourable Mr. Birdwood in reply said—The honourable member is referred to the reports on the working of the Police on the several Railways in this Presidency for the year 1895, which have been published at the Government Central Press during the current year.

The Honourable Mr. Daji Abaji Khare then put question No. 1 standing in his name —

- (a) Is Government aware of the fact that in the year 1886 Survey Nos. 51, 52 in the village of Belati in Sholdpur táluka in the Sholdpur district were acquired for forest purposes from the mortgagee of those numbers, by an arrangement with him that he should not pay an instalment of the land revenue due on those lands, and that on his failure to pay that instalment the land should be forfeited to Government under Section 56 of the Land Revenue Code, and that other land should be given to him instead?
- (b) Is it a fact that the village officers were ordered not to take the instalment of land revenue from the said mortgagee and not to issue any notice to him for that instalment?
- (c) Are such arrangements with mortgagees, which have the effect of divesting the mortgagors also of their interests, consonant with the intentions and regulations of Government, and is such a procedure acceptable to Government?
- (d) Are Government aware that the Bombay High Court have held that the act of the mortgagee amounted to a fraud upon the mortgagor? (Vide P. J. for 1895, p. 553.)
- (e) Is the conduct of the officers concerned in this acquisition such as can be approved of by Government?
- (f) If not, have Government already taken or will Government now take any notice of such conduct with a view that it may be not repeated again?
- (g) Will Government place the whole of the correspondence between the various offices concerned in this acquisition on the Table?

The Honourable Mr. Nugert in reply said—The facts of the case are substantially as stated in the judgment of the High Court quoted in clause (d) of the question. When Government require land they generally prefer to acquire it by negotiation direct with the owner when such a course is feasible rather than by applying the provisions of the Land Acquisition Act. In this case the Khátedár was absent and believed to have lost or abandoned all title to the land. Government have no reason to believe that the conduct of their officers was in any way blameworthy or characterised by want of consideration for the interests of the mortgagor, which, as has now been made clear by the judgment of the High Court, are capable of vindication if injuriously affected by fraud on the part of the mortgagee.

The Honourable Mr. KHARE then put question No. 2-

Is it true that there are liquor shops in every corner of the Presidency, but there are no equal facilities for people to get the mild beverage toddy, and that people are thus forced to resort to the obnoxious liquor? Will Government be pleased to make toddy more available to people by freely granting licenses for the tapping and sale of toddy?

The Honourable Mr. Nugent in reply said—The statement contained in the first question of the honourable member is not a correct representation of the facts. The number of liquor shops and facilities for obtaining toddy are adapted with great care to the requirements of consumers. Government have not any present intention of altering the system on which licenses for the tapping and sale of toddy are granted.

The Honourable Mr. KHARE then put question No. 3-

Will Government be pleased to lay on the Council Table their recent Resolution directing Educational Conferences to be held? Were any non-official gentlemen invited to attend the Conference held at Poona, and, if so, will Government be pleased to state the principle on which persons to be so invited were selected and the names of the gentlemen that were invited? Was any public notice given through the Press or otherwise in Bombay and other places outside Poona about the Poona Conference?

* Vide Appendix B. PRESIDENT in reply said—I refer the honourable member to Government * Resolution No. 1149, dated 23rd June 1896, laid on the Council Table. On the other points, inquiries are being made.

The Honourable Mr. Khare then put question No. 4—

Are Government aware that in various talukas of the Thana Collectorate large masses of Katkaris and other forest tribes assembled together for the purpose of protesting against a recent circular issued by the Collector under the orders of Government, which has deprived them of the privilege of picking up dead wood in reserved and protected forest for sale in head-loads?

The Honourable Mr. Nugent in reply said—Government are aware of the statements in the subject-matter of this question, which have been published by the newspapers, but are not yet in possession of official reports conveying exact accounts of the occurrences in question.

The Honourable Mr. Khare then put question No. 5-

- (a) Have Government received any reports from District Collectors, especially those of Dhárwár, Bijápur and Sholapur districts, recommending relief to the rayats in the shape of remission of assessment or postponement of its collection, in view of want of rain from which those districts have suffered?
- (b) If any such reports have been received, what steps have Government taken to carry out those recommendations?

The Honourable Mr. Nugent in reply said—No reports of the nature referred to by the honourable member have been received by Government.

The Honourable Mr. Khare then put question No. 6-

Is Government aware that an Anglo-Vernacular School for girls was opened with the sanction of the Educational authorities by the Municipality of Surat?

Is it true that it was closed after being kept up for 12 months?

Will Government place upon the Table the correspondence upon this subject between the Educational Inspector, N. D., and the President of the Municipality?

His Excellency the PRESIDENT in reply said—Enquiries are being made.

The Honourable Mr. Javerilal Umiashankar Yajnik then put question No. 1 standing in his name—

- (a) Has the attention of Government been drawn to the statement in the newspapers that a deputation of Várlis, Kátkaris and other forest tribes and classes in the Thána district, numbering, it is said, about 2,000 persons, waited upon the District Collector in August last, complaining of the hardship caused to them by reason of the Collector's Maráthi notification, dated 22nd July 1896, depriving them of two of the privileges enjoyed by them long before the forests came to be conserved by Government, namely—
 - (1) the privilege to the forest tribes to collect free of charge and sell all dry wood for fuel, and
 - (2) the privilege to all persons who wanted fuel to remove the same under a permit on payment of fees,

and further intimating that, if after the 1st September 1896 any person was found to take head-loads of fuel away from the reserved forest, he shall be liable to a penalty for such offence which shall be six months' imprisonment or a fine of Rs. 500, or both?

(b) Will Government be pleased to state what steps they have taken to deal with the grievances of these jungle tribes and other classes?

The Honourable Mr. Nugent in reply said—(a) Government are aware that the newspapers have published statements similar to those contained in this question.

(b) No representation from the wild tribes regarding their alleged grievances has yet reached Government. Any such representation will, on receipt, be duly considered.

In this connection, I would invite the attention of the honourable member to the replies to question No. 11 put by the Honourable Mr. Setalvad and question No. 4 by the Honourable Mr. Khare.

The Honourable Mr. YAJNIK then put question No. 2-

Is it a fact that the contracts entered into by the Forest Department in Thána with the coupe contractors contain a provision for allowing free supplies of branches of wood not exceeding six inches in circumference? If so, why does the Collector at the close of the aforesaid notification speak of this provision in the contracts as referring to free supplies to villagers of branches of wood under six inches in thickness? Is there any such discrepancy in the terms of the contracts and of the notification as to the sizes of these free supplies of wood?

The Honourable Mr. Nugert in reply said—No report has as yet been received from the local authorities, but one is shortly expected on the whole question and when it is received Government will pass on it such orders as may be deemed advisable.

The Honourable Mr. Yajnik then put question No. 3-

Has the attention of Government been called to the fact that, in the talukas of Sirsi and Yellapur in the Kanara District, garden cultivation requires, for purposes of manure, large supplies of fresh leaves, which it has been customary for garden owners to obtain, free of charge, from the neighbouring forest, and that the Revenue Settlement Officers, after due inquiry, have affirmed this right, when fixing maximum rates of assessment in recent Settlement operations? Are Government aware of the complaints of these garden owners and landholders that, notwithstanding this recognition of their right to the use of leaves by the Revenue Settlement Officers, the Forest Department is harassing them by dragging them into Court, and getting them punished for cutting sopu leaves from the neighbouring forests? What steps have Government taken or intend taking with a view to remedying these complaints?

The Honourable Mr. Nugent in reply said—A memorial on the subjects referred to has been received from certain landholders and garden proprietors in the Sirsi and Yellápur tálukas of the Kanára District, and is receiving attention from Government.

The Honourable Mr. YAJNIK then put question No. 4-

In view of the apprehensions entertained in all parts of this Presidency about a scarcity, due to scanty or unseasonable rainfall, are Government in a position to give assurances as to the measures that are contemplated for the relief of distress before the crisis actually comes on?

The Honourable Mr. Nugent in reply said—The question of the honourable member is sufficiently answered in the reply to clause 2 of question No. 1 (b) put by the Honourable Mr. N. N. Wadia, C.I.E. The Famine Code contains full directions respecting the precautions which should be observed when scarcity is threatened, as well as regarding the measures to be taken for relief of sufferers when famine has actually arisen. The reports received by Government show that the officers in charge of threatened districts are prepared to meet any emergency that may arise.

The Honourable Mr. YAJNIK then put question No. 5-

Will Government be pleased to give figures showing the amounts expended in the years 1893-94, 1894-95 and 1895-96 on—

(a) Repairs of irrigation tanks, large and small, through the Public Works Department, in the districts of the Southern Marátha Country and Gujarát, respectively, in pursuance of the principles and orders for their treatment laid down in paragraphs 1 to 11 of their Resolution in the Public Works Department No. 125-w.i.—1473, dated 15th September 1892, in supersession of all previous orders on the subject; and

(b) Maintenance at the cost of Local funds of tanks for village water-supply in the aforesaid districts of the Southern Marátha Country and Gujarát, with such voluntary

contributions or other assistance as might have been obtained from the villagers, and, when occasion qualified it, from grants-in-aid from the Provincial assignment for the improvement of village water-supply, as per orders contained in paragraphs 10 to 17 of the said Resolution.

His Excellency the President in reply said-

- (a)—Government are not able at present to give the figures asked for;
- (b)—The information required has been called for.

The Honourable Mr. YAJNIK then put Question No. 6-

With reference to paragraph 4 (b), Gonernment Resolution No. 34-w.i.—419 of 5th March 1895, Public Works Department, will Government be pleased to supply a statement showing—

- (a) the number of tanks which Government have decided to repair;
- (b) the area and assessment charged under the tank irrigation; and
- (c) the amount of the water-rate remitted in consequence of the above decision of Government.

His Excellency the President in reply said—Inquiries are in progress, but it will not be practicable for some considerable time to specify the tanks which Government have decided to repair, and consequently no useful figures can at present be given under the sub-heads (a), (b) and (c) of this question.

The Honourable Mr. Yajnik then put Question No. 7—

Having regard to the grievances of dealers in country tobacco in Bombay, brought to light in their memorials and petitions to Government, and remembering that the trade in country tobacco has greatly developed during the last forty years, do Government contemplate an early amendment of the Tobacco Act (Act IV of 1857)?

The Honourable Mr. Nugent in reply said—Proposals relating to the amendment of the Tobacco Act are under the consideration of Government.

The Honourable Mr. YAJNIK then put Question No. 8-

With reference to my Question No. 8 put at the Council Meeting of the 14th August 1894, will Government be pleased to furnish a list of applicants to whom new licenses have been given since 1894 (vide paragraph 2 of Government Resolution No. 5530, dated 29th June 1894), with remarks on the character, capacity and means of the successful licensees?

The Honourable Mr. Nugent in reply said—Government regret they must decline to furnish a list of the nature mentioned by the honourable member.

The Honourable Mr. Yajnik then put Question No. 9—

Will Government be pleased to place on the Council Table a copy of the rules, if any, regulating the hours of weighment, grant of leave to dealers to be temporarily absent from Bomaby on private affairs, &c.?

The Honourable Mr. Nugert in reply said—As the honourable member has not stated to what rules he refers, it is not possible to give an answer to his question.

The Honourable Mr. Yajnik then put question No. 10—

Are Government aware that the model refund rules drafted by the Legal Remembrancer under Section 32 of the Bombay District Municipal Amendment Act (Act II of 1884) and forwarded with Government Resolution No. 3 of 2nd January 1890, General Department, have not yet been adopted by the Municipality of Alibáy, notwithstanding that Government Resolution No. 1936 of 15th May 1880 enjoined on the said Municipality to revise their refund rules accordingly?

The Honourable Mr. Birwood in reply said—The model rules referred to by the chonourable member were suspended by Government in 1892, as they were not considered sufficiently liberal in the matter of refunds. His Excellency the Governor in Council has decided not to publish model octroi rules pending the amendment of the District Municipal Acts. Government Resolution No. 1936, dated 15th May 1890, related to certain Municipalities in Sind and not to the Alibág Municipality.

The Honourable Mr. YA'JNIK then put question No. 11-

Have Government noticed that the consequence of such inattention on the part of the aforesaid Municipality to the orders of Government has been that the existing rules, which are said to be unfair in principle and unworkable in practice, have remained in force during the past 14 years, without having at any time received the sanction of Government, with the result that they have made the actual payment of refunds impracticable? For example, the octroi duty on rice in husk per khandi being two annas and refunds for Rs. 2 and over being alone payable, it requires, under the existing rule, 17 khandis of rice to be packed in a single package and marked or sealed by the municipal officer and produced intact by the claimant before he shall be entitled to a refund?

The Honourable Mr. Birdwood in reply said—The matter is under enquiry.

The Honourable Mr. Bal Gangadhar Tilak then put question No. 1 standing in his name—

Following the example of the Government of India, which, by its Resolution, Accounts and Finance Department, No. 2858—A, dated 7th July 1893 (vide Bombay Government Gazette, 1893, Part I, page 600), has placed on sale at the Government Central Press, Calcutta, full details of the annual estimates of revenue and expenditure in the Civil, Military, and Public Works Departments, will this Government be pleased to keep for sale the detailed estimates of revenue and expenditure of the various departments under its charge?

The Honourable Mr. Nugent in reply said—The requisite arrangements will be made.

The Honourable Mr. Tilak then put Question No. 2-

In view of the impending danger of famine on account of the withholding of rain over a greater part of the Presidency, will Government be pleased to lay on the Council Table or publish a statement giving full and detailed information regarding the rainfall, the areas in the different talukas and districts that are likely to be affected by want of sufficient rain, the condition of the present crops and the extent to which they have failed or are likely to fail, the accumulated store of grain in the said talukas and the districts available for use in time of need, and the measures that may have been contemplated by Government for giving relief in case of the occurrence of an actual famine. And will Government be also pleased to continue to publish such statement every fortnight until the necessity for such publication is over?

Does Government contemplate issuing orders to the district officers to grant suspensions of revenue in regard to the first instalment of land revenue which will shortly fall due in parts threatened with famine?

The Honourable Mr. Nugert in reply said—The honourable member's question appears to be sufficiently answered in the replies given to question No. 1 put by the Honourable Mr. Wadia. Government have no information as to the accumulated stores of grain in the various districts. The Famine Code contains explicit directions regarding the suspension of revenue instalments, which will be put in force as soon as occasion arises.

The Honourable Mr. TILAK then put question No. 3-

Will Government be pleased to call for a statement showing (1) over what part of the protected forest in each village in the Siddápur, Yellápur and Sirsi talukas of the Kárwár district the Forest Settlement Officers have recognised the villagers' rights of grazing &c., and (2) in how many cases villagers have been criminally punished for cutting sopu (leaves) in such areas in the said talukas?

The Honourable Mr. Nugent in reply said—In view of the enquiries now being made by Government into the alleged grievances in regard to sopu, they do not think it necessary to call for information in the precise form suggested in the question.

The Honourable Mr. TILAK then put question No. 4-

Has Government received, through the Collector of Thána, the memorials signed by thousands of inhabitants of the district praying for the redress of their forest grievances?

What action does Government mean to take in the matter? If the memorial or memorials be not received, will Government be pleased to call for the same and inquire into the matter?

The Honourable Mr. Nugert in reply said—Government have not yet received the memorials referred to. If these memorials are addressed to Government and sent through the Collector, they will be forwarded in due course by the Collector. If they are addressed to the Collector, that officer will deal with them in the ordinary manner. It is not the practice of Government to call for memorials addressed to the local authorities. I may also refer the honourable member to the replies given to questions on the same subject put by the Honourable Messrs. Setalvad, Khare and Yajnik.

The Honourable Mr. TILAK then put question No. 5-

Is Government aware of the fact that the sum of Rs. 21,000, lent to the Municipality of Islampur in the Sátára District for the construction of water-works, is lying with Government still unused owing to certain differences between the Municipality and the Public Works Department; and that the Municipality is required to pay full interest on the whole of the said loan for the last two years and a half? Will Government be pleased to lay on the Table the papers explaining the causes of the delay in the execution of the work?

His Excellency the President in reply said—Government are making inquiries into the circumstances stated in the question.

The Honourable Mr. NAVROJI N. WADIA then put the question standing in his name—

(a) Would Government be pleased to state as far as information is available as to-

(1) condition of crops in each of the districts;

- (2) probable percentage of yield in cotton, grain and seed in each of the districts in comparison with ordinary years?
- (b) Do Government anticipate in any district a famine, if so, in which?

(c) What steps, if any, are being organised for relief?

If the information asked for above is not available or fully available, would Government be pleased to state what they know up to the present time and promise that the remainder will be published as early as possible, but not later than the end of the present month?

The Honourable Mr. Nugert in reply said—(a) (1) Up to the present the information available regarding the crops in the various districts consists of the weekly season reports published in the Government Gazette, and the monthly rainfall report, of which the Septem-

- * Vide Appendix C. ber number will be published in the next week's Gazette. The last two weekly reports* are laid on the table. In view of the abnormal state of the season Government are calling for special reports from the Collectors.
- (a) (2) The forecasts published by the Department of Land Records and Agriculture will contain the information specified in the question respecting cotton and oil seeds. Respecting food grains, detailed forecasts of yield are not prepared; but information on the subject is contained in the reports referred to in the answer to (1).
- (b) It is still too early in the season for any reliable anticipation to be formed as to the occurrence of famine, which would certainly be averted by the abundant fall of rain before the close of the present month. Government, however, are fully apprised by the District officers of the existing situation. Government have for some time past been watching the progress of the season with the greatest care and are fully alive to the possibilities of scarcity.
- (c) The measures prescribed under the Famine Code, which has recently undergone careful revision, are being taken. The necessity for starting relief works has not yet arisen in any district.

The above answers render it unnecessary to reply separately to the last clause of the honourable member's question.

BILL No. III OF 1896: A BILL TO AMEND ACT VIII OF 1870 (AN ACT FOR THE PREVENTION OF THE MURDER OF FEMALE INFANTS).

The Honourable Mr. Birdwoop, in moving the first reading of Bill No. III of 1896, said—Your Excellency,—The Bill to amend Act VIII of 1870, an Act for the prevention of the murder of female infants, was published under your Excellency's order in the Bombay Government Gazette on the 17th September last, and such publication

is deemed, under Rule 22 of the recently amended rules of the Council, to be the introduction of the Bill. The objects sought to be obtained by the proposed legislation are explained shortly in the Statement of Objects and Reasons. proposed legislation are explained shortly in the Statement of Objects and Reasons published with the Bill, and it is necessary for me, in moving the first reading of the Bill, to supplement that statement with only a very few remarks. The Act of 1870 was passed by the Government of India for the purpose of making better provision for the prevention of the murder of female infants,—an offence which at that time was believed to be commonly committed in certain parts of British India; and on the 21st December 1870, the Bombay Government directed that measures for the prevention of infanticide should be taken under the Act in the Ahmedabad and Kaira Districts, as regards the Kadva and Lewa Kunbis. In the following year the Government of India confirmed certain rules made by this Government and any angle of the Government and the Government an year the Government of India confirmed certain rules made by this Government under Section 2 of the Act. These rules provided among other things for the formation in each of those two districts of an Infanticide Fund, which was to consist of fees levied for the registration of births, deaths, betrothals, and marriages of members of the castes of Kadva and Lewa Kunbis residing in any portions of the Districts. A Registrar of births, deaths, and marriages was to be appointed by Government for each taluka, and it was competent to Government to appoint more than one Registrar. It was the duty of this officer to collect the registration fees and to report immediately to the Collector or such officer as he might name all unregistered births, deaths, betrothals, marriages and remarriages, which might come to his knowledge. On receiving the report of the death of a female child, he was to proceed immediately to the house where the death occurred in company with the village Police Patel or a Police officer not below the grade of Head Constable. If these officers were satisfied that the death arose from natural causes, the Registrar was required to give a written permission to remove the body for burial or cremation. If either the Registrar or the Police officer entertained any doubt as to the cause of death, the matter was to be handed over to the Police officer for disposal according to law. The duties of Registrar were sometimes performed by Village Accountants and sometimes, in alienated villages, by the Police Patels. In the Ahmedabad District two special Registrars were appointed on a salary of Rs. 30 a month each, which was paid from the Infanticide Fund. The rules of 1871 remained only a short In 1873 they were rescinded, as regards the Kadva Kunbis, and were only time in force. continued in a modified form as regards the Lewa Kunbis. Two years afterwards the Act was put in abeyance in both the Ahmedabad and Kaira Districts. Indeed Government had already in 1873 been able to record with satisfaction that there was no necessity to continue the operation of the rules in the stringent form in which they had been at first issued, and it is believed by many, who are well acquainted with the circumstances of the two districts, that the particular crime at which the provisions of the Act of 1870 were directed is now happily unknown in these districts. While the rules were in force, one of the decennial periods occurred during which marriages are celebrated in the caste of Kadva and Lewa Kunbis, and the result was a large collection of fees for the registration of marriages. The Infanticide Funds were thus at once started with a substantial sum to their credit, and though some payments have been made from these funds from time to time for educational and other purposes, the greater part of these funds, which have been invested. in Government securities, has accumulated at compound interest for the last 20 years, until they now amount to more than Rs. 70,000, and this sum must go on accumulating until some legal method can be devised for spending it. In 1889, indeed, certain rules such as the Act contemplates for limiting expenses on account of the celebration of marriages were made by Government, but these rules make no provision for any expenditure under the Act, and as the law stands the only way in which the Infanticide Funds can be spent is in carrying into effect the rules made under the Act. As no establishments are now employed under the registration rules of 1871 and as no establishments are now required under those rules, which are no longer in force, it follows that only by fresh legislation can the funds be applied to any useful purpose. The Bill proposes that the funds shall be made over to the Local Boards of the two districts, and obviously there is a good deal to be said in favour of the proposal, for if it is adopted the funds could undoubtedly be spent on objects which would benefit the two communities by whose contributions the funds were first constituted. have, however, within the last few days received memorials from certain members of these communities, in which objection is taken to the precise manner in which it is now proposed to apply these funds, and it is obvious that due consideration should be given to all such objections before the Bill can be proceeded with. What I propose, therefore, is that if a motion for the first reading be adopted by the Honourable Council, the Bill be referred to a Select Committee, with instructions to report not only on the Bill itself but also on any petitions that may be received in connection with it up to the end of the present year. If the Committee be instructed to submit their report on or before the 15th of January next, they will have ample time for the consideration of all objections to the Bill and all suggestions also for its improvement. I now move that the Bill be read a first time.

The Honourable Ráo Bahádur RANCHODLAL CHOTALAL said—Your Excellency,— I have no objection to the first reading of this Bill. I however beg to bring to the notice of the Council that the accumulated funds are not lying idle. The fund for the Abmedabad District now amounts to Rs. 62,452, which I think yields an annual interest of over Rs. 2,000. Out of this interest the Collector of Ahmedabad, I am told, spends about Rs. 100 a month or Rs. 1,200 annually in giving scholarships to the girls belonging to the Lewa and Kadva castes. The money thus spent is in my opinion well spent. If these people receive a sound education, their social condition will be improved and I think they will give up their expensive marriage habits. I therefore think that it would be better to devote this fund to promote female education than to utilize it for any other purpose. I hope the Select Committee after a thorough investigation will recommend this mode of disposal, of this fund to Government.

The Honourable Mr. CHIMANLAL HARILAL SETALVAD said—Your Excellency,—I wish to make a few observations on this Bill. Clause (5) of Section 2 of Act VIII of 1870, which is the only provision in that Act authorising the levying of fees, allows only of raising such contributions as would cover the expenses of carrying into effect rules made under the Act, e.g., for paying the salaries of officers registering births, marriages, &c. That being so, it was illegal to have levied fees that left large surpluses in the hands of Government after clearing such expenses. The Honourable Mr. Birdwood has however told us how this was the result of accidental circumstances that were not anticipated. that may be, the surpluses are there and there must be legislation to dispose of them. But what I fail to understand is, why power is asked for diverting funds that might "hereafter" be accumulated in a similar way, to the Local Boards. It is to my mind a dangerous power to give. It makes it possible in the future to levy fees in excess of the actual requirements from certain classes, which is illegal under Clause (5) of Section 2, and make a gift of them to the Local Boards. Coming to the question of the disposal of the present funds, I do not think the way proposed is the best that could be devised. It is pointed out in the memorials that we have received that a large proportion of the people who have contributed towards these funds are not agriculturists and will not derive much benefit from the proposed handing over of the funds to the Local Boards. The memorialists desire that the funds should be spent on the education of the females among the Lewa and Kadya Kunbis. I have always been an ardent supporter of all education, and especially female education, and this proposal has therefore my warm sympathy. But I feel that spending the money in giving female education, such as is at present given in our schools, will do no good, but will, on the other hand, unfit the girls of these classes for household duties, and thus, by making them less prized as wives and managers of houses, indirectly encourage infanticide. The best thing therefore to do, to my mind, is to open special schools for these classes at centres like Ahmedabad and Nadiad, where, in addition to the rudiments of knowledge, the girls may be trained in the special household requirements and domestic trades of these classes. I have thought out a scheme of this character, but there will be time enough to lay it before the Select Committee. Next I think that the language of the Bill is a little inaccurate. The original Act is a General Act, and Section 7 of it speaks of the Governor of Madras and the Governor of Bombay. Now the Bill proposes to add Section 8 immediately after this, and in that section speaks only of the "Governor in Council." Of course we know this Council can legislate only about Bombay, but after this Bill is passed Section 8 will form a part of the General Act. It would therefore be more accurate to use the expression "Governor of Bombay in Council." Further, there is nothing said in the Statement of Objects and Reasons about the necessity of adding Section 9. Before the Bombay Government framed rules and got them sanctioned by the Government of India, they must have issued a notification under Section 7 extending the Act to this Presidency.

The Honourable Mr. Javeriial Umiashankar Yajnik said—Your Excellency,—I am glad that the honourable mover of the Bill in the speech just made by him has promised that the memorials would receive the attention of the Select Committee. From enquiries I have made as to the present condition of the Infanticide Funds, I am in a position to confirm the statement of my friend the Honourable Mr. Ranchodlal, that the Collector of Ahmedabad has been actually disbursing for several years past Rs. 100 a month or Rs. 1,200 a year from the income of the Infanticide Fund at his disposal. This sum is being spent in the award of scholarships to the Kunbi girls of the Lewa and Kadva castes, who are receiving their education in the Female Training College and in the Girls' Schools founded by the late Ráo Bahádur Maganbhai Karamchand in Ahmedabad. This fact shows that in the case at least of the larger of the two Infanticide Funds, viz. Rs. 62,452, a good portion of its income is actually disbursed every year. That being the case, the main argument relied upon by the honourable member in charge of the Bill for legislation, namely, that the funds have been lying idle for upwards of 20 years, loses a good deal of its point and force, at least in the case of the larger of the two funds. If the fund in the hands of the Collector of Ahmedabad had, as a matter of fact, been lying idle, there could not be two opinions as to the desirability of spending it in the only legitimate manner in which it is being spent, viz., for the benefit of the very classes who were the sole contributories to it, and for objects best calculated to subserve the purposes contemplated by the rules made under the Infanticide Act of 1870. Looking at the facts of the case, I am of opinion that fresh legislation on the subject is hardly called for except only under two circumstances, viz., 1st, unless Government are advised by their law officers that the present mode of administration of the fund in the hands of the Collector of Ahmedabad is, in the absence of special legislative authority, illegal, or, 2ndly, unless the present administration of the funds is objected to by the contributories themselves. Under these two circumstances I see no objection to the present administration of the Funds receiving the necessary legislative sanction. With regard to the second point, however, I should say that none of the contributories to the fund have objected to the present mode of disbursing it for the encouragement of female education among them. Indeed, on the contrary, all the memorials before the Council on this subject earnestly suggest the expenditure of the Funds in the two districts in the very direction that the Collector of Ahmedabad has been spending the fund under his control. Any other mode of expenditure the memorialists strongly object to. If the Collector of Kaira followed a similar plan with regard to the disbursement of the income from the smaller fund in his hand, he would be meeting the wishes of those who have obviously the first claim on the attention of Government with regard to the expenditure; but if it is proposed to have recourse to legislation on the first of the two grounds pointed out by me, then I am of opinion that such legislation should proceed on the lines in which the fund in the hands of the Collector of Ahmedabad is being at present administered and not on the lines indicated in the Bill. Honourable members will see that whereas the fund in the hands of the Collector of Ahmedabad has been so far administered in one way and according to one principle, the Bill proposes the expenditure of the funds in the two districts in a wholly different manner. The Bill thereby departs from the present method of disbursement in proposing the expenditure for the benefit, not of the two classes of Kunbis from whom alone the funds had been collected, but for the benefit of the agricultural population in general in the two districts. There is also a departure in the principle, namely, in that the objects of expenditure proposed in the Bill are not in any way directly or indirectly connected with the purposes of the Act, but are obviously far removed from

them. I fail to see, for instance, that expenditure on water-supply, sanitation, and communication, though undoubtedly good in itself, is calculated to promote the good sense and elevate the moral judgment among the community, which is the one thing required at present to prevent ruinous expenses on marriages amongst the two classes of Kunbis? Nothing would, in my opinion, do them better than the spread of education and broader views, and specially female education. Education is the prime want among these backward Lewa and Kadva classes, and the opinion I have come to after mature deliberation is this, that if the present expenditure of the fund by the Collector of Ahmedabad and similar expenditure of the fund in the hands of the Collector of Kaira, need the special authority of legislation, such sanction might be given by the legislature. If, however, it is proposed to make over the funds to the Local Boards of the two districts, then, I say, their administration must in no way be departed from the present method adopted at Ahmedabad, that is to say, the two funds must be spent for the exclusive benefit of of the two classes, viz., Lewa and Kadva Kunbis in the Kaira and Ahmedabad districts, and on objects such as education, and specially female clucation, which would raise the moral tone of their society. I trust, therefore, that the honourable mover will see his way to the Bill being amended and framed on the lines suggested by me.

The Honourable Mr. ABDALLA MEHERALI DHARAMSI said—Your Excellency,—When I first read this Bill and the Statement of Objects and Reasons accompanying it, I saw no objection to its being passed into law; but from what I have now heard in the Council it would seem that there is a dispute about facts. It is stated in the Objects and Reasons that the Lewa and Kadva Kunbis form an important portion of the agricultural population of the Kaira and Ahmedabad Districts, but it is now stated that such is not the case. It is again stated in the Objects and Reasons that the accumulated funds have been lying idle over 20 years, but we are now told that such is not the case and that three-fourths of the interest of one of the funds has been utilized for the purposes of education. If the facts be as now stated, it will be the duty of the Select Committee to propose some disposal of the funds, having regard to the actual facts. Handing over the funds to the Local Boards for the purposes of sanitation, construction of roads, &c., will be diverting the funds from the original object for which they were collected. I hope the Select Committee will consider whether the present system of spending the money on education of these Kunbis should be continued or whether some other legitimate means of utilizing the funds should be adopted.

The Honourable Mr. Daji Abaji Khare said—Your Excellency,—I do not think that there is any necessity for this discussion. The Honourable Mr. Birdwood has promised that all the petitions received on this subject up to now, and those that may be received up to the end of the current year, would be referred to the Select Committee for opinion. I hope the Select Committee will be able to recommend some mode of disposing of this fund and then there will be time enough to discuss the proposals of the Committee.

The Honourable Mr. Bal Gangadhar Tilak said—Your Excellency,—Ihave now very little to say regarding the first section of this Bill except that I agree in the main with the remarks made thereon by the honourable members who preceded me, but with regard to section 2 of the Bill, which now retrospectively extends Act VIII of 1870 to this Presidency, I think that there is no necessity for such section. The only justification, so far as I can see, for such a course is the omission on the part of the Executive Government in taking the necessary steps under the Act when it was extended to the Kaira and Ahmedabad Districts in December 1870. Under Sections 1, 2 and 7 of the Act three steps are required to be taken by the Local Government when it proposes to extend the Act to any part of the territories under its control. According to Section 7 the Local Government must first publish an order extending the Act to a particular part of its territories. Then secondly, a notification under Section 1, with the previous sanction of the Governor General of India, is required to be published in the local Gazette declaring the measures proposed to be taken under the Act and defining the limits of the district, or specifying the class or family to whom such notification is to be deemed to apply. After this, Section 2 provides that the Local Government may make rules for the purposes of the Act and publish the same in the local Gazette. This is the third and the last step prescribed by the Act when it is to be extended to any province or district. Now it seems that in December 1870 when this Act was extended to Lewa and Kadva Kunbis in the Ahmedabad and Kaira Districts, the first of these steps, viz., that of extending the Act to the said districts under Section 7, was not taken by Government through oversight; and it is now

proposed by Section 2 of the present Bill, or rather the last paragraph of Section 1 of the Bill, to rectify this error by retrospectively extending the Act to the whole of the Bombay Presidency. But in this case I think an unnecessary reflection is cast upon the social life of other communities. As a matter of fact, the practice of infanticide does not prevail in any other part of this Presidency, and if Section 2 of the Bill is intended to correct the mistake committed by the Executive Government in extending the Act to the Kaira and Ahmedabad Districts, the Act should now be retrospectively extended only to those two districts and not to the whole of the Bombay Presidency. If there was an omission made in 1870, let it be corrected by all means, but let us not over-shoot the mark, especially as it involves a reflection on the conduct of the other communities in the Presidency. I would therefore suggest that by the present Bill the Act should be retrospectively extended only to the Kaira and Ahmedabad Districts, and I hope that the Select Committee, to whom the Bill is to be referred, will fully consider this point in making their report on the Bill.

The Honourable Mr. Birdwood then replied briefly to the several objections taken to the Bill, the introduction of which, he said, had already been justified by the several admirable suggestions they had received in the course of the debate as to the best method of applying the accumulated funds. There could be no question that, in the present state of the law, the two Infanticide Funds could not be legally spent on any educational or other useful purpose, and the sooner matters were put on a proper footing the better it

would be for all concerned.

The Honourable Ráo Bahádur RANCHODLAL CHOTALAL said—With Your Excellency's permission I beg to make the following further observations. Infanticide has never existed in the Ahmedabad District although this Act has been put into operation in this district for the last 25 years. During my lifetime I do not remember a single case of infanticide having been detected in the district of Ahmedabad, and in justice to the Lewa and Kadva Kunbis I must say that it is not a fact that infanticide was practised by them. It must have been some misrepresentation that led Government to believe that infanticide was practised by these people. Perhaps this misrepresentation was caused by these people spending enormous sums towards their marriage expenses; and it must have been represented to Government that the introduction of this Act would help to check these heavy marriage expenses. I must also state that these classes are just as susceptible of human life, and especially the life of their female infants, like the Jains.

Bill read a first time.

His Excellency the President then put the motion that the Bill be read a first time. This was agreed to.

The Honourable Mr. Birdwood then moved that the Bill be referred to a Select Committee Committee consisting of the Honourable the Advocate-General, the Honourable Messrs. Ranchodlal, Setalvad, Kirkham, Batty, and the Mover, with instructions to report, on or before the 15th January 1897, not only on the Bill, but on all petitions already received and those that may be received up to the end of the current year.

The motion was put by His Excellency the President and agreed to. His Excellency the President then adjourned the Council sine die.

RESOLUTION OF GOVERNMENT.

The Governor in Council considers it desirable to invite the attention of the Head of the Educational Department to recommendation 2 in Chapter VII of the Report of the Education Commission, 1883, to the remarks of the Government of India thereon in paragraph 29 of their Resolution No. 10—309, dated the 23rd October 1884, and to the orders of this Government in paragraph 8 of their Resolution No. 2108, dated the 8th December 1884. Acting under the latter orders, the Acting Director of Public Instruction in paragraph 21 of his letter No. 836, dated the 9th May 1885, reported to Government that he had directed the Educational Inspectors to hold local Educational Conferences of official and non-official educationists in the mensoons. His Circular to the Department, No. 656, dated the 30th April 1885, indicated both the subject and method of the discussions at these Conferences. It appears, however, that the policy of regularly holding such Conferences has not been carried through. His Excellency the Governor in Council is of opinion that an effort may with advantage be made to revive them. The Director of Public Instruction is accordingly requested to take the necessary steps for this purpose, and to report in due course the action adopted by him. He should also briefly notice the work done by the Conferences in his annual Administration Reports.

The following Season Reports for the week ending 29th September 1896 are published for general information:—

Karáchi.—River at Kotri on 28th, 12 feet 5 inches against 11 feet 6 inches on same date last year. Want of water felt in Shewan, Dádu, Johi, Kohistán tálukas. Harvesting of rice and bájri commenced in places. Crops slightly damaged by rats in Ghorábári, Sákro and Sujáwal tálukas. Preparation for rabi crops commenced. Locusts in Kotri and Kohistán tálukas. Agricultural stock in fair condition.

Shikarpur.—River normal. Rabi operations general. Cattle healthy except in two talukas. Fodder scarce.

Hyderabad.—Kharif crops flourishing. Til cultivation attacked by insects in Dero Mohbat taluka. Deficiency of water in seven talukas. Locusts in Hyderabad taluka, causing slight damage. Cattle in fair condition.

Upper Sind Frontier.—Kharif crops flourishing. Height of river well sustained. Rabi operations progressing.

Thar and Parkar.—First cotton picking begun in Umarkot taluka. Locusts still in four Desert talukas.

Ahmedabad.—(For week ending 26th September 1896).—No rain during week except in three talukas, maximum at Dhandhuka 77 cents, minimum at Viramgam 3 cents; for season maximum at Parantij 38 inches 68 cents, minimum at Dhandhuka 24 inches 73 cents; total rainfall in Ahmedabad City 31 inches 36 cents. Bajri more or less premature is being reaped. Other standing crops, especially rice and pulse, withering in certain talukas for want of rain. Fodder supply sufficient. Agricultural stock in good condition. Prices have riser, 20 to 30 per cent. for want of rain.

Panch Mahals.—Rain still wanted. Standing crops and agricultural stock in good condition. Fodder ample.

Kaira.— (For week ending 26th September 1896).—Rain for week maximum at Borsad 4 cents, none at Kaira, average for the district ½ cent; for season maximum at Nadiád 51 inches 16 cents, minimum at Mehmadabad 32 inches 45 cents, average for the district 42 inches 14\frac{3}{3} cents. Cutting of early bájri and rice in progress in some parts. Crops withering without rain. Fodder supply sufficient. Agricultural stock healthy.

- Broach.—Rain for week maximum 10 cents in Vágra, minimum 5 cents in Broach; for season maximum 69 inches 43 cents in Broach, minimum 34 inches 46 cents in Jambusar. Sowing of juwár, til and lang in progress. Lands being prepared for winter crops. Standing crops doing well, but rain wanted in parts to prevent damage and permit sowing of wheat. Prospects and probable outturn of crops fair. Condition of fodder supply good and agricultural stock healthy. Prices continue normal.
- Surat.—(For week ending 26th September 1896).—Slight rain in the district except Chikhli and Mándvi tálukas, maximum at Bárdoli 1 inch 95 cents, minimum at Bulsár 13 cents; for season maximum at Chikhli 77 inches 92 cents, minimum at Chorási 38 inches 78 cents. Standing crops need rain. Weeding in progress. Rabi crop preparations being made in some places. Condition of fodder supply and agricultural stock good. Prices rising for want of rain.
- Khindesh.—Rain for week average in the district 9 cents; for season at Dhulia 25 inches 33 cents, average in the district 24 inches 28 cents. Rainfall insufficient in the whole district. Crops in light soils in bad state; those in black soils stunted in growth from the continued drought. Grass in most parts short and scanty. State of agricultural stock still good. Prices rising.
- Násik.—(For week ending 28th September 1896).—Rain for week at Násik 1 inch 6 cents; for season 35 inches 57 cents. Rain wanted almost everywhere. Land prepared for rabi cultivation. Prospects and probable outturn of crops fair. Condition of fodder supply and agricultural stock fair. Prices of food grains normal.
- Colába (Bombay).—Rain 0·32 inch on 25th: total to date 87·11, being 19·21 above average. Abnormal temperature 2° warm on 23rd, 24th and 25th, 1° warm on 26th, and then steadily rose to 5° warm on 29th. Vapour in air excessive except on the 23rd and 28th, when it was normal. Abnormal wind northerly on 23rd, 24th, 25th and 28th; easterly on 26th and 27th; and southerly on 29th.
- Thána.—Rain for week at Thána 43 cents; for season 133 inches 10 cents; in tálukas during week maximum at Sháhápur 2 inches 76 cents.; none at Umbargaon. Weeding nearly finished. Rain wanted throughout the district. Crops withering for want of rain. Fodder supply good and agricultural stock healthy. Prices continue normal.
- Kolába.—Rain maximum 1 inch 75 cents at Panvel, minimum 1 cent at Alibág; none at Roha and Mángaon. Crops withering for want of rain, which causes anxiety. Prices slightly rising in places. Fodder supply plentiful and agricultural stock flourishing.
- Ratnágiri.—No rain in Rájápur and Vengurla tálukas; most meagre rain in the remaining seven tálukas, maximum 3 inches 67 cents at Chiplun, minimum 2 cents at Ratnágiri. Reaping of early crops in progress. Agricultural prospects not good. Prices rising. Cattle healthy except in Sungameshvar táluka.
- Poona.—Rain for week at Poona 27 cents; for season 42 inches 48 cents: slight rain during week throughout the district. Maximum 1 inch 32 cents at Indapur, minimum 1 cent at Dhond. Rain urgently wanted throughout the district. Standing crops withering throughout the district owing to want of sufficient rain. In some villages of the Indapur taluka withered crops have been removed in order to prepare land for rabi sowing. Condition of fodder supply and agricultural stock fair. Prices rising throughout the district.
- Ahmednagar.—Rain in eight tálukas, maximum 1 inch 20 cents at Jámkhed, minimum 8 cents at Kopargaon; for season maximum 29 inches 19 cents at Akola, minimum 12 inches 56 cents at Ráhuri. More rain urgently wanted throughout the district. Standing crops withering, and rabi sowing retarded for want of rain. Fodder supply generally good. Agricultural stock healthy. Jowári dearer throughout the district.
- Sholápur—(For week ending 26th September 1896)—Rain for week at Sholápur 9, Bársi 7, Mádha 7, Pandharpur 55, and Sángola 38 cents; at Karmála 1 inch 18 cents, and none at Málsiras; for season maximum at Bársi 13 inches 58 cents, minimum at Málsiras 6 inches 19 cents. Rain wanted throughout the district. Kharif crops already sown withered except in Bársi and Sángola, where they are also withering. Rabi scwing delayed. Rain urgently wanted. Sowing of rabi crops in progress in some villages on the banks of river Bhima in Pandharpur táluka. Water-supply insufficient for the bágáyet crops in Mádha, Sángola and Málsiras tálukas. Fodder insufficient. Agricultural stock in a fair condition. Rise in the price of jowári throughout the district about 20 per cent.
- Sátára.—Rain during week maximum 2 inches 95 cents at Khánápur, minimum 20 cents at Tásgaon. Situation improved, but more rain urgently wanted in about half the district.

 Harvesting in progress. Want of water felt in Dádu, Johi, Sehwan, Ghorábári, Kotri, Jati and Sháhbandar tálukas. Locusts have caused damage to crops in Sakro, Kohistán, Kotri and Manjhand tálukas. Crops injured by rats in Sakro, Jati, Sháhbandar and Mirpur Batoro tálukas. Preparations for rabi crops commenced. Agricultural stock in fair condition.

Shikarpur.—River normal. Rabi operations continue. Prices high. Fodder scarce.

Hyderabad.—Harvesting of kharif crops in progress throughout the district. Rabi preparations in progress in four talukas. Deficiency of water in six talukas. Til cultivation in Sakrand attacked by insects. Cattle in two talukas suffering from want of pasturage.

Upper Sind Frontier .- Crops flourishing except in Desert Canal. Rabi sowing in progress.

Thar and Parkar.—Millet harvest general. Rabi preparations in Nara Valley. Locusts in four talukas. Supply of water insufficient in Dim and Sind Canals.

Ahmedabad.—No rain during week throughout the district. Standing crops withering for want of rain which is badly required, especially for rice, wheat and cotton. Fodder supply sufficient. Agricultural stock in fair condition. Prices have risen 20 to 30 per cent. for want of rain, and are still rising.

Panch Maháls.—No rain during week. Rain urgently needed for standing rice and bájri crops which are withering. Rain also needed for rabi sowings. Fodder supply sufficient. Cattle healthy. Prices ruling high, as old stocks of grain are being exported to Central India.

Kaira.—(For week ending 3rd October 1896).—No rain during week. Standing crops withering without rain, which is very badly wanted. Prospects of the rabi crops not favourable. Fodder sapply sufficient. Agricultural stock healthy.

Reaping of kharif crops begun in places. Crops in light soils in bad state. Crops in black soils stunted and suffering from drought. Grass short and scanty. Prices rising.

Núsik.—(For week ending 5th October 1896).—Rain for week at Núsik 45 cents; for season 36 inches 2 cents. More rain wanted. Rabi sowing retarded for want of rain. Prospects and probable outturn of crops fair. Condition of fodder supply and agricultural stock fair. Prices rising.

Colába (Bombay)—Rain 0.01 inch on 2nd; total to date, 87.12, being 18.10 above average.

Abnormal temperature 5° warm on 30th, 4th and 5th; 4° warm on 1st, 3rd and 6th, and 3°

- warm on 2nd. Vapour in air excessive except on 2nd, when it was normal. Wind normal from 30th to 5th. Abnormal wind 'southerly on 6th. Lightning on 6th, thunder and lightning on 30th, 1st, 2nd and 5th.
- Thána.—Rain for week at Thána 2 cents, in tálukas maximum at Sháhápur 51 cents, none at Bassein; for season at Thána 133 inches 12 cents. Weeding finished. Crops withering for want of rain throughout the district. Condition of fodder supply and agricultural stock good Prices slightly rison in Dáhánu, Bassein and Sálsette.
- Kolába.—Rain during week maximum 93 cents at Mangaou, minimum 12 cents at Alibág; none at Uran. Crops have failed in places and are elsewhere withering for want of rain. Fodder supply good and agricultural stock healthy. Prices of food grains rising.
- Ratnágiri.—Most meagre rain everywhere, maximum 2 inches 55 cents at Devgad, minimum 28 cents at Mandangad. Reaping of early crops in progress.
