GENERAL DEPARTMENT.

The Right Hon'ble the Governor in Council having sanctioned the publication of a weekly paper to be styled the "BOMBAY GOVERNMENT GAZETTE," notice is hereby given, that after this day all advertisements and other public papers of the government will be printed in the BOMBAY GOVERNMENT GAZETTE only: and all orders or other public notices, appearing in that paper, under the signature of the secretaries, or other public officers of the government, are hereby ordered and directed to be conform'd to and obey'd accordingly.

When official notifications from the government are inserted in the BOMBAY GOVERNMENT GAZETTE, no communication on the same subject will be made in writing to any department concerned; but all public officers are required to take notice of such official notifications in the same manner as if they had been directly communicated to them by letter from the secretary's office, and as heads of offices alone will be furnished by government with the BOMBAY GOVERNMENT GAZETTE, they will be expected to communicate to their subordinate officers all orders which may in any manner concern them.

The Bombay Government Gazettes furnished by government to public offices are to be lodged with the records, and are not to be removed from the office.

PUBLIC ORDER.

To regulate the religious procession of the Mohurrun, and for the preservation of the public peace during that festival, sanctioned by the Honorable the Governor in Council, as provided for by Rule, Ordinance and Regulation II. A. D. 1827.

1st. Every person desirous of erecting or carrying about a *Taboot*, *Punjia*, or *Dholeeka Punjia* at the ensuing Mohurrun, must obtain a license from the Magistrates of Police, and a license will be granted to no persons except Mussulmans.

2nd. The licenses shall bear the signatures of the Magistrates of Police, and all persons obtaining them shall be bound to produce them when demanded by any authority having a right so to do; any refusal to do so shall be held to be a breach of these rules.

3rd. Each *Taboot* is to have but one set of "Tassa," one set of "Dholec," one "Kurnah" and fifteen "Hillals."

4th. Any person who may be seen carrying a Sword, Dirk, Bludgeon, or other offensive weapon, will be taken into custody.

5th. *Taboots* meeting on the public road, are to give way to one another in the same manner that carriages do, each *Taboot* keeping to the left.

6th. *Taboots* are not permitted to go abreast on the public road, but they are to follow each other in a peaceable manner.

7th. No *Taboots* are allowed to go in procession on the last night of the Mohurrun before 12 o'clock, or to continue so after 3 o'clock in the following morning. These processions are limited (on the last night and day of the Mohurrun) to the Bhendy Bazaar Road, Duncan Road, Chinch Bunder and Market Streets; and *Taboots* are not to be taken out on the last day before 12 o'clock; and on meeting carriages and horsemen are strictly enjoined to cease playing country music until they shall have

passed, the *Taboots* keeping the left side of the road; and it is directed that they be thrown into the sea, and the ceremony concluded by 5 o'clock P. M.

8th. No procession of the *Zool Junnah*, or Horse, through the public streets or roads will be permitted.

9th. All persons licensed to sell Spirituous Liquors and all venders of Opium and Bhang are enjoined to keep their shops closed; and persons found selling any thing of an intoxicating nature, during the aforesaid period, will be taken into custody and punished.

10th. Any persons violating any of the above rules, or behaving in any manner likely to create a breach of the peace, or making a disturbance of any kind, will be immediately taken into custody and dealt with according to Law.

THE 22^D NOVEMBER 1845.

The following Act is passed by the Hon'ble the President in Council on the 22^d November 1845, with the assent of the Right Hon'ble the Governor General of India, which has been read and recorded.

Ordered, that the Act be promulgated for general information.

Act No. XXIV. OF 1845.

An Act for establishing a Court for the trial of Officers of the Pilot Service accused of breach of duty.

I. It is hereby enacted, that from and after the First day of January next, if any person employed in the Pilot Service of the East India Company, at the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal, shall be accused of having committed any breach of duty while engaged in such Service, and it shall appear to the Superintendent of Marine that such person ought to be brought to trial for such breach of duty, such person shall be brought to trial before a Court, consisting of a President and two Merchants of Calcutta, four Commanders of British Ships and two Branch Pilots or Master Pilots of the East India Company's Service, as Members.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that the said President shall be such person as shall be, from time to time appointed for that purpose by the Governor of Bengal.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that whenever it shall appear to such Superintendent of Marine that any person employed in the said Pilot Service ought to be brought to trial before such Court, the said Superintendent shall convene such Court by giving notice to the said President, and Summoning by writing under his hand any two Merchants of Calcutta, any four Commanders of British Ships lying in the Port of Calcutta and any two Branch Pilots or Master Pilots of the East India Company's Service, to appear for the purpose of holding such trial at a time and place to be subsequently intimated to them by the Judge Advocate appointed to conduct the Proceedings of such Court. Provided always that every Court to be held under this Act shall consist of the President, and at least four Members, and that the decision shall in every case be according to the votes of the majority, and that in case of equality of votes the President shall have a casting vote.

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that if after the Court shall have been convened the President shall be prevented by sickness or any other cause from attending the said Court, it shall be lawful for the Members of the said Court, not being less than five in number, to elect one from among themselves, who shall perform the functions of President of the said Court until the end of the trial.

V. And it is hereby enacted, that if any person summoned, as aforesaid, shall neglect or refuse to

attend in pursuance thereof, or to remain in attendance to the end of such trial without sufficient cause, then it shall be lawful for the said Superintendent of Marine to impose upon any such person a fine not exceeding the sum of Rupees 200 for every such default, and every Justice of the Peace for the Town of Calcutta is hereby authorized and required upon representation made to him in writing and signed by the said Superintendent, to enforce the payment of such fine in like manner as if such fine had been imposed by himself.

VI. And it is hereby enacted, that the proceedings before such Court shall be conducted on the part of Government by such person as the Governor of Bengal shall from time to time appoint as Judge Advocate for that purpose.

VII. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall be lawful for the said Judge Advocate, and he is hereby authorized and required either at the request of the party accused, or of the party making the accusation, or of the said Court, by writing under his hand to summon any person whatsoever, to attend as a witness at a time and place to be specified in such Summons for the purpose of being examined at any trial before a Court constituted as aforesaid, or if such person shall be about to depart from Calcutta so as to be unable to attend at such trial without serious inconvenience, then to be examined before the President of the said Court, and any two Members of the said Court, provided always that due notice of the time and place of such examination shall be given to the person against whom a charge is about to be preferred, and provided also, that such witness may nevertheless be examined at the trial if he shall be able to attend thereat in which case his previous examination may also be read at the trial.

VIII. And it is hereby enacted, that every witness duly summoned to attend any such Court or President and two Members, shall during his necessary attendance on such Court or President and two Members, and in going to and returning from the same, be privileged from arrest, and shall, if arrested in breach of such privilege, be discharged by such Court or President and two Members, or by the Supreme Court, or any Judge thereof, or by any Justice of the Peace in and for the Town of Calcutta upon its being made to appear to such Court or President and two Members constituted by this Act, or to such Supreme Court, or Judge, or to such Justice of the Peace by affidavit in a summary way that such witness was arrested in going to or returning from or attending upon such Court or President and two Members constituted by this Act, and that every witness so duly summoned to attend as aforesaid, who shall not attend on such Court or President and two Members, or who attending shall refuse to give evidence on Oath or Solemn Affirmation or Declaration, or to answer all such questions as the Court or President and two Members may legally demand, shall be liable to be attached in the Supreme Court, upon complaint made in like manner as if such witness had neglected to attend on any trial in such Supreme Court.

IX. And it is hereby enacted, that every Member assisting at every such Court before the commencement of any proceeding, to be had before it shall take the following Oath upon the Holy Evangelists, which Oath shall be administered by the President of such Court to the other Members thereof, and to the President by the Judge Advocate, that is to say,

“I, A. B., do swear that I will duly determine and administer justice according to the evidence in the matter that shall be brought before me, and that I will not divulge the sentence till it shall be approved of by competent authority, neither will I at any time divulge the vote or opinion of the President, nor my own vote, nor that of any Member of this Court unless required to give evidence thereof as a Witness by a Court of Justice in due course of Law. So help me God.”

X. And it is hereby enacted, that the Judge Advocate who is to conduct the Proceedings of the said Court shall take the following Oath, which Oath shall be administered by the President.

“I, A. B., do swear that I will not upon any account whatsoever disclose or discover any vote or opinion of the President or any particular Member of this Court unless required to give evidence thereof as a witness by a Court of Justice in due course of

Law. So help me God."

XI. And it is hereby enacted, that every witness before any such Court or President and two Members, shall be examined upon Oath, which such Courts and President and two Members are hereby authorized to administer. Provided always that in all cases wherein a Solemn Declaration or Affirmation would be allowed in Her Majesty's Courts of Judicature to be substituted for an Oath, the said Court or President and two Members constituted by this Act, shall substitute such Solemn Declaration or Affirmation for an Oath.

XII. And it is hereby enacted, that any person wilfully and knowingly giving false testimony on Oath or Solemn Declaration or Affirmation in any case in which an Oath or Solemn Declaration or Affirmation is by this Act required to be made, shall be deemed guilty of wilful and corrupt perjury, and being duly convicted, shall be liable to the pains and penalties of perjury.

XIII. And it is hereby enacted, that if the party against whom a charge is preferred shall appear, or shall not satisfy the Court that he has a reasonable excuse for not appearing, the said Court shall proceed to hear and determine the charges preferred by the said Superintendent against any person or persons so employed in the Pilot Service as aforesaid, and if such person or persons shall be found guilty by the said Court of the breach of duty laid to his or their charge, it shall be competent to the said Court, and it is hereby required to sentence such person or persons to dismissal from the said Pilot Service, or to such other punishment by loss of rank or pay as to the said Court shall appear fit, whether or not such breach of duty be punishable under a certain Code called the Penal Code for the better order and government of the Members composing the Pilot Service, passed by order of the Right Hon'ble the Vice President in Council, on the 21st December 1826.

XIV. Provided always and it is hereby enacted, that in all cases wherein the charge preferred before such Court is a charge of a breach of duty punishable under the said Code, the said Court shall award such punishment as is prescribed for such breach of duty in the said Code and no other.

XV. Provided also, and it is hereby enacted, that the said Code shall remain in full force as regards the several breaches of duty therein specified, but that it shall be competent for the said Superintendent of Marine, and he is hereby empowered in any case of breach of duty not specified in the said Code, to frame such charge as shall be applicable to the facts of the case and to prefer the same to the said Court.

XVI. Provided always and it is hereby enacted, that nothing in this Act contained shall prevent the said Superintendent from deciding summarily in cases in which he was empowered to decide summarily before the passing of this Act.

XVII. And it is hereby enacted, that the proceedings of such Court shall be sent on completion of the trial to the Superintendent of Marine, and it shall be lawful for the said Superintendent of Marine to send back the proceedings to the Court for revision of the finding or sentence, or both.

XVIII. And it is hereby enacted, that every finding and sentence of such Court as aforesaid shall be subject to the approval of the Governor of Bengal, and that no such finding or sentence shall be considered final or conclusive until it has been submitted to and approved by the Governor of Bengal who is hereby empowered to remit any part or the whole of such sentence as he shall think fit, and that every such sentence either of dismissal from the service or of loss of rank or pay upon being confirmed or mitigated by the said Governor of Bengal, shall be considered valid and effectual from the date of such confirmation or mitigation and shall be forthwith carried into effect.

XIX. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall be lawful for the said Superintendent of Marine to make such Rules for conducting the Proceedings and regulating the practice of the said Courts, and for carrying into effect the purposes of this Act as to the said Superintendent shall seem expedient, and all such Rules shall be submitted to the Governor of Bengal, and shall have full effect after they shall have been confirmed by the Governor of Bengal.

PROCLAMATION.

BY THE RIGHT HON'BLE THE GOVERNOR
GENERAL OF INDIA.

The British Government has ever been on terms of Friendship with that of the Punjab.

In the year 1809, a Treaty of Amity and Concord was concluded between the British Government and the late Maha Rajah Runjeet Sing, the conditions of which have always been faithfully observed by the British Government, and were scrupulously fulfilled by the late Maha Rajah.

The same friendly relations have been maintained with the successors of Maha Rajah Runjeet Sing by the British Government up to the present time.

Since the death of the late Maha Rajah Shere Sing, the disorganized state of the Lahore Government has made it incumbent on the Governor General in Council to adopt precautionary measures for the protection of the British Frontier, the nature of these measures and the cause of their adoption were at the time fully explained to the Lahore Durbar.

Notwithstanding the disorganized state of the Lahore Government during the last two years, and many most unfriendly proceedings on the part of the Durbar, the Governor General in Council has continued to evince his desire to maintain the relations of Amity and Concord which had so long existed between the two States for the mutual interests and happiness of both. He has shown on every occasion the utmost forbearance from consideration to the helpless state of the infant Maha Rajah Dulleep Sing, whom the British Government had recognized as the successor to the late Maha Rajah Shere Sing.

The Governor General in Council sincerely desired to see a strong Sikh Government re-established in the Punjab, able to control its

Army, and to protect its subjects: He had not, up to the present moment, abandoned the hope of seeing that important object effected by the patriotic efforts of the Chiefs and people of that country.

The Sikh Army recently marched from Lahore towards the British Frontier, as it was alleged by the orders of the Durbar, for the purpose of invading the British Territory.

The Governor General's Agent, by direction of the Governor General, demanded an explanation of this movement—and no reply being returned within a reasonable time, the demand was repeated. The Governor General, unwilling to believe in the hostile intentions of the Sikh Government, to which no provocation had been given, refrained from taking any measures which might have a tendency to embarrass the Government of the Maha Rajah, or to induce collision between the two States.

When no reply was given to the repeated demand for explanation, and while active Military preparations were continued at Lahore, the Governor General considered it necessary to order the advance of Troops towards the Frontier to reinforce the Frontier posts.

The Sikh Army has now, without a shadow of provocation, invaded the British Territories.

The Governor General must therefore take measures for effectually protecting the British Provinces—for vindicating the authority of the British Government, and for punishing the violators of Treaties and disturbers of the public peace.

The Governor General hereby declares the possessions of Maha Rajah Dulleep Sing on the left, or British Bank of the Sutlege, confiscated and annexed to the British Territories.

The Governor General will respect the existing rights of all Jagheerdars, Zemindars and Tenants in the said possessions, who, by the course they now pursue, evince their fidelity to the British Government.

The Governor General hereby calls upon all the Chiefs and Sirdars in the Protected Territories to co-operate cordially with the British Government for the punishment of the common enemy, and for the maintenance of order in these States. Those of the Chiefs who shew alacrity and fidelity in the discharge of this duty which they owe to the Protecting Power, will find their interests promoted thereby, and those who take a contrary course will be treated as enemies to the British Government, and will be punished accordingly.

The Inhabitants of all the Territories on the left Bank of the Sutlege are hereby directed to abide peaceably in their respective villages, where they will receive efficient protection by the British Government. All parties of men found in armed bands, who can give no satisfactory account of their proceedings, will be treated as disturbers of the Public Peace.

All subjects of the British Government and those who possess Estates on both sides the River Sutlege, who, by their faithful adherence to the British Government, may be liable to sustain loss, shall be indemnified and secured in their just rights and privileges.

On the other hand, all subjects of the British Government, who shall continue in the service of the Lahore State, and who disobey this Proclamation by not immediately returning to their allegiance, will be liable to have their

property on this side the Sutlege confiscated, and declared to be Aliens and Enemies of the British Government.

The following report of the Board of Conservancy, submitted to Government by the Worshipful Bench of Her Majesty's Justices, is published for general information.

By order of the Honorable the Governor in Council,

W. ESCOMBE, *Secy. to Govt.*

Bombay Castle, 31st December 1845.

The Board of Conservancy beg leave to submit for the information of Her Majesty's Justices the following report of their proceedings, from the date on which they assumed charge of their functions under the Municipal Act, to the 31st October.

REPORT.

1. The points to which the attention of the Board was chiefly directed in the first instance were the nomination of officers, and the organization of efficient establishments for carrying on the duties entrusted to the Board under the Act, and the formation of a regular and complete system of keeping an account of the receipt and expenditure of the public money, denominated the "Municipal Fund", as well as a full and detailed record of their own proceedings.

2. In accordance with the recommendation of the Board, the following appointments were sanctioned by the bench, and approved of by the Government, upon the monthly salaries, and with the Establishments, of which an abstract is given in the Appendix hereunto marked A.

Captain Cruickshank.....	Superintendent of Repairs.
Mr. George Hancock.....	Clerk to the Board.
Mr. James Watson.....	Clerk to the Market.

3. It was resolved also to divide the account of disbursements under separate heads, which would at any time shew the amount of expenditure incurred upon each and every one of them respectively, viz:—

Establishments.	Tanks and Wells.
New works.	Public markets.
Repairing and Watering roads.	Payments under Clause IX, of Act XI, of 1842.
Repairs of public works.	Miscellaneous charges.
Scavenging.	

4. The Board have met regularly once in a week, and oftener when necessary, and a minute book of their proceedings has been kept, together with other records in detail, such as Letter Books, Compilations, Registers of public works in progress, &c. &c. which will at all times enable the successors of the present members of the Board to carry on its duties with the full benefit of the experience already acquired.

5. On commencing their executive duties the board found a number of public works in progress under the old system; Some of them sanctioned by the Government at the recommendation of the Court of Petty Sessions and the remainder by Her Majesty's Justices. The former of these, the board was desired by the Government, in answer to reference on the subject, to consider as placed under their charge and supervision.—Appendix B. and C. specify the above works in detail, the amount originally sanctioned under each separate head, and balances remaining undrawn at the date of the Board taking charge of the same.

6. Appendix D. enumerates the new works recommended by the Board under the present system, in reference to which it will be observed how very large a proportion of the expenditure so recommended has been appropriated for the improvement of the drainage of the Native Town and the health and comfort of its inhabitants. It will be satisfactory to Her Majesty's Jutices to know that one of these improvements, to which the Board have directed their particular attention, the removal of the immense accumulations of filth for years past in the small gullies, and the paving and efficient drainage of the same, has begun to be fully appreciated by the inhabitants of the town themselves, abundantly manifested by the urgent petitions from all quarters, addressed to the Superintendent of Repairs, for the immediate improvement of individual localities; and the circumstances of the very large sum of about Company's Rupees (30,000,) thirty thousand, having been offered by the petitioners to secure their object.

7. Another public work of a different description, to which the Board would draw the notice of the Bench, in this report, is the construction (now in progress) of the new road of approach to Lady Jamsetjee's Causeway at Mahim, at an estimated expence of Company's (Rs. 28,192) twenty-eight thousand one hundred and ninety-two, to which her Ladyship has contributed the munificent sum of Company's Rupees (22,000) twenty-two thousand, leaving the balance only Company's Rupees (6,192) six thousand one hundred and ninety-two, to be borne by the public funds of the island. The Board were unwilling in recommending this work to allow the opportunity to pass, of securing the efficient execution of so great an improvement at so comparatively trifling a charge upon the public.

8. Appendix E. shews all other sanctioned expenditure recommended by the Board, and upon which no particular comment seems to be called for in this place.

9. Appendix F. enumerates the works completed by the Superintendent of Repairs to the 31st October, at an aggregate amount it will be observed, of Company's Rupees (4,045-1-11) four thousand and forty-five, one anna and eleven pies, less than the estimates for the same.

10. On the 4th day of July 1845, the Bench voted the Board a credit on the Sub-Treasurer from the "Municipal Fund" to the amount of Co's. Rs. 80,000 0 0.

11. On the 11th instant the Board submitted to the Bench a rough sketch estimate of the income of the Municipal Fund amounting to Co's. Rupees 3,21,990-10-10 for one year; or including the amount invested in Government Paper Co's. Rupees 39,213-5-4, and the unapplied balances referred to in Clause VII. of the Act, Co's. Rupees 23,146-14-4, the County Fund alone excepted, the state of which, on the 10th June, the Government have not yet communicated to the Bench, to an aggregate sum of Co's. Rupees 3,84,350-12-6 for the present year. The probable amount of expenditure being estimated at the same time as per margin at Rupees 3,21,288-2-0.

A balance of Company's Rupees 63,062-12-6 was assumed as still available for improvements during the present fair season. Out of this sum the Board have since recommended, and the Bench have approved the expenditure of the large amount of Company's Rupees 43,493-15-7 for the construction of a main sewer from the verge of the esplanade, down Sheikh Memon Street and Bholeshwar Road to the old Town drain at Ketwaddy, a work of the greatest importance in providing for the permanent and effectual drainage of the Native Town, and which it is hoped will be completed before the setting in of the next rains. Passing over a few other works of an unimportant character the Board have to add, that they contemplate submitting in due time further plans and estimates now in preparation, which will absorb the residue of the available balance for the year, and thus afford the public the immediate enjoyment of the advantages to be derived from a proper application of the funds to which they contribute.

12. As the scavenging contract would expire on the 30th ultimo, the Board in the month of September last, issued advertisements inviting tenders for the renewal of it, which has been effected since with the approval of the Bench, for the sum of Rupees (40,000) forty thousand, for the further term of one year only; by which time, the Board hope it will be in their power to recommend the commencement of the system of cleaning all private privies in the Native Town, to which access can be had, by a public establishment. The Board deem it necessary to allude to the great increase in the amount of this contract as compared with former years; but having duly considered that the contractor is now bound to clean out daily all the paved gullies, of which mention has been already made, that his duties comprize the daily scavenging in like manner of the entire Islands of Bombay and Colaba, from Mahim and Sion on the one side, to the Light House on the other, instead of as hitherto, to the old limits of the town, and that several separate works of this nature hitherto performed by particular establishments are now included within the terms of the contract, the Board were fully satisfied, that the amount in question, would be no more than a fair remuneration for the outlay necessarily incurred by the contractor, provided the scavenging be done effectually and satisfactorily, which the Board have the means of enforcing if needs be, through the Superintendent of Repairs.

13. The Board submit for the approval of the Bench a statement (Appendix G.) of the sums disbursed on various occasions, under the general sanction of the Bench, dated the 4th day of July 1845.

14. And the Board in conclusion request to be favoured with a further credit on the Sub-Treasurer for the sum of one Lakh of Rupees, against the present balance and the monies of the Municipal Fund coming into his hands to provide for the expenditure of the current quarter.
