NOTIFICATION.

Whereas great inconvenience is often experienced by parties in the detention of their baggage, or supplies proceeding from the Presidency, at Panwell and other Ports under the Collector of Continental Customs and Excise, it is requested that attention be paid to the following rules by which all difficulties and detention may be obviated.

Agents or others in forwarding supplies or packages for Messes or Individuals, should furnish the usual certificate from the Bombay Custom House, detailing the numbers and contents of the packages, on all not so accom-

panied duty will be charged, and the goods will be liable to examination.

Passengers having dutiable goods exceeding the quantity required for consumption on the road, are required to produce certificate of the payment of duty at the port of export, without which the said goods will be liable to duty or detention till the such certificate is produced.

For private baggage, a memorandum certifying the number of packages, and that the same is private baggage is required, signed by the owner and countersigned at Bombay by the Customs authorities.—This memorandum is to be delivered at the port of destination, without this such baggage will be liable to examination, and such portion as is liable to duty will be subject to detention till the duty is paid or such voucher produced.

The Hon'ble the Governor in Council impressed with the necessity of precautionary measures to prevent serious and sometimes

fatal accidents, is pleased to publish the following regulation promulgated under the authority of the Trinity House for the Navigation of Steam Vessels in the English channel. To this regulation the Hon'ble the Governor in Council desires to direct the attention of all persons engaged in Navigating Steam Vessels on the Western Coast of India, feeling fully assured that a strict conformity therewith will be equally efficacious for the required object in the Indian Seas as in those of Europe.

NAVIGATION OF STEAM VESSELS.

Trinity House London, 30th October 1840.

The attention of this corporation having been directed to the numerous, severe and in some instances fatal accidents which have resulted from the collision of Vessels navigated by Steam; and it appearing to be indispensably necessary, in order to guard against the recurrence of similar calamities, that a regulation should be established for the guidance and government of persons intrusted with the charge of such Vessels, and

Whereas the recognized rule of sailing Vessels is, that those having the wind fair shall give way to those on a wind.

That when both are going by the wind, the Vessel on the starboard tack shall keep her wind, and the one on the Larboard tack bear up, thereby passing each other on their Larboard hand.

That when both Vessels have the wind large or abeam and meet, they shall pass each other in the same way on the Larboard hand, to effect which two last mentioned objects the Helm must be put to Port.

And as Steam Vessels may be considered in the light of vessels navigating with a fair wind, and should give way to sailing Vessels on a wind on either tack, it becomes only necessary to provide a rule for their observance, when meeting other Steamers or sailing Vessels, going large—under these considerations and with the object before stated, this Board has deemed it right to frame and promulgate the following rule, which on communication with the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, the Elder Brethren find has been already adopted in respect to Steam Vessels in Her Majesty's Service, and they desire earnestly to impress upon the minds of all persons having charge of Steam Vessels, the propriety and urgent necessity of a strict adherence thereto, viz:—

RULE.

When Steam Vessels on different courses must unavoidably or necessarily cross so near that by continuing their respective courses, there would be a risk of coming in collision, each vessel shall put her Helm to Port, so as always to pass on the Larboard side of each other.

A Steam Vessel passing another in a narrow channel, must always leave the vessel she is passing on the Larboard hand.

ACT No. — OF 1816.

An Act regarding the Deposit of Diet Money for
Witnesses in petty cases

It is hereby enacted, in modification of Clause 1,
Section 2, Regulation III. 1812, of the Bengal
Code, that in the Territories subject to the Presiden-
cy of Fort William in Bengal, it shall be lawful for
the Magistrates to regulate the amount of Diet
Money required for Witnesses in petty cases, with
reference to the probable period such Witnesses
may have to be in attendance, and in the event of
the prolonged detention of Witnesses, to direct the
deposit of any further sum which to them may seem
 requisite.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for
general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be reconsidered at
the first meeting of the Legislative Council of In-
dia after the 7th day of May next.
