No. 394 of 1846.—The following General order by the Right Hon'ble the Governor General of India is re-published for general information.

Simla, 19th May 1846.

The whole of the Bengal troops having been withdrawn from Scinde and replaced by Bombay troops, the Staff appointments in that province heretofore allotted to Bengal officers, will in future be filled by Bombay officers, His Excellency the Governor of Scinde will be pleased to direct all Bengal officers whether commissioned, warrant, or non-commissioned, now employed in Scinde in the Department of Public Works, Army or Ordnance, Commissariat, to return to their own Presidency, as soon as he can dispense with their services. Scinde being now exclusively occupied by Bombay troops, references relating to them will necessarily be addressed to the Bombay Authorities; but His Excellency the Commander in Chief in India is requested to communicate with Sir Charles Napier, on the subject of such reports respecting Queen's troops, as he in his capacity of Commander in Chief of all Her Majesty's Forces in India may require.

One Penny for each Newspaper, whether British, Colonial or Foreign, conveyed between any of Her Majesty's Colonies and a Foreign Port, or between any two Foreign Ports,

One Penny for each British or Colonial printed Price Current, or printed Commercial List conveyed between any of Her Majesty's Colonies.

Two Pence for each printed Price Current or printed Commercial list, whether British, Colonial or Foreign, conveyed between a British Colony and a Foreign Port or between two Foreign Ports.

British or Colonial Newspapers passing by these packets between any of Her Majesty's Colonies will not be liable to any postage for the Sea conveyance,

The prepayment of the British Packet postage on letters, is optional, when conveyed between the Indian Offices of Bombay, Aden, Calcutta, Madras, Penang & Singapore, and the Islands of Ceylon and Hongkong, or between any two of the Indian offices above enumerated; but when dispatched to a Foreign Country or Possession, such as China, Manilla &c, the above postage must be paid in advance at the Despatching Office.

Extract from a Letter from the Hon'ble the Secret Committee of the Court of Directors, No. 1178, dated London, 31st March 1846.

"Whatever interruption the forward movement of the Sikhs from the River to Budhawul, may have given to the concentration of the whole of the force entrusted to the charge of Sir Henry Smith, the object the Governor General had in view in directing that concentration was, by Sir Henry Smith's prudent and skilful manœuvres, as well as by the steadiness of his comparatively small body of men, effectually attained: and we admire the energy and promptitude with which he seized the earliest opportunity of attacking the enemy, and driving him across the Sutlej. All his movements were conducted with consummate skill, and the manner in which he brought his right to bear with irresistible effect upon the key of the enemy's position at the Village of Aliwal, may justly rank amongst the most brilliant manœuvres of the most distinguished Commanders.

"Nobly seconded as Sir Henry Smith's plan of attack was, by all who had the good fortune to be under his command, success was never for a moment doubtful; and there are few instances, in the records of any army, of a success more complete, or more obviously the result of perfect combination in the plan, and perfect harmony in the execution. All did their duty: all share the glory: and all have a right to claim the applause and admiration of their country.

"It is our duty to add, that the conduct of the Native Troops shews, in the most gratifying manner, how unsuccessful have been the enemy's attempts to seduce our gallant Sepoys from their fidelity and allegiance.

"You will not fail to make generally known the sentiments, which we have expressed in this Despatch."

TO THE RIGHT HONORABLE THE GOVERNOR GENERAL OF INDIA,
 &c. &c. &c.

We have received with the warmest feelings of exultation, the interesting and important despatch from the Governor General of the 19th of February, giving an account of the glorious victory over the Sikhs on the 10th of February.

2. All that had occurred in the previous operations of the Campaign had led us to anticipate such a result, whenever the moment for attack should appear to the Governor General and the Commander-in-Chief to have arrived.

3. We admire no less the judgment and prudence with which the preparations for the attack were made, than the undaunted vigour and resolution with which it was carried into effect.

4. The determined resistance of the enemy in a position which had been skilfully fortified, and which presented the means of a powerful defence, would not have been overcome by any troops animated by a less heroic spirit than were those, who thus won for themselves an imperishable renown in the annals of their Country.

5. Fighting in a just and righteous cause, all ranks, European and Native, from the highest to the lowest, seem to have striven with each other in this great conflict, with a noble rivalry.

6. It has pleased God to crown their exertions with one of the greatest victories ever achieved; and when we consider the skill and rapidity with which this achievement was improved by the immediate crossing of the Sutlej, the unopposed advance of the army to the vicinity of Lahore, the state of submissive terror to which the enemy was reduced, and the momentous consequences which are about to follow, we tender to the Governor General, to the Commander-in-Chief, and to all the Officers and Men engaged in this glorious scene, our most cordial admiration, thanks, and gratitude.
