General Orders.

BY THE HON'BLE THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

MILITARY DEPARTMENT.

BOMBAY CASTLE, 11TH SEPTEMBER 1846.

No. 587 of 1846.—At the recommendation of His Excellency the Commander in Chief, the order by Brevet Major C. Blood, dated Ahmednuggur the 17th August 1846, appointing 2nd Lieutenant Barton, of the 1st Battalion Artillery, to act as Adjutant and Quarter Master to the 4th Battalion Artillery, until further orders, is confirmed as a temporary measure.

No. 588 of 1846.—The following orders are confirmed.

A garrison order appointing Captain S. Parr, Barrack Master, to act as Fort Adjutant from the 6th to the 24th August last, the date on which Major Willoughby C. B. was appointed to the personal Staff of the Honorable the Governor, to the time of Captain Haslewood's joining the Garrison.

An order by Lieutenant Colonel Farrell, dated Poona the 20th August 1846, appointing Lieutenant Laurie to act as Quarter Master, and Lieutenant Scott to act as Interpreter to the 21st Regiment Native Infantry, during the absence of Lieutenant Moyle, on leave to the Presidency.

An order by the same officer, dated Poona the 1st September 1846, appointing Captain Rippon, to act as Interpreter to the 21st Regiment Native Infantry, during the absence of Lieutenant Scott on leave to the Presidency, or until further orders.

No. 589 of 1846.—The unexpired portion of the leave granted to Captain Haselwood, late Assistant Garrison Engineer, in Government General Order No. 500 of the 28th July last, is cancelled from the 21st August, the date of that officers return to the Presidency.

No. 590 of 1846.—The General orders by His Excellency the Governor of Scinde, dated the 27th December 1845, and 28th July 1846, announcing that Mr. Assistant Surgeon Gibbon, afforded medical aid to the Head Quarters Staff from the 10th November 1844 to the 6th April 1845, from the 20th Jany. to the 10th February 1846, and from the 4th to the 11th April 1846, are confirmed.

No. 591 of 1846.—Assistant Surgeon W. C. Coles, has been appointed to act as Assistant Civil Surgeon at the Presidency and Surgeon to the Coroner.

No. 592 of 1846.—The leave of absence to proceed to Madras, granted in Government General Order No. 537, dated 21st August, to Captain W. B. Jackson of the 25th Regiment Madras Native Infantry, is cancelled at that officers request.

Bombay Castle, 15th September 1846.

No. 593 of 1846.—Under instructions from the Government of India, the Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased to connect the existing Regulations Art. 111, and 113, Sec. XLII. page 640 of Jameson's Code, and to declare, that the men at present on the strength of the Native Veteran Battalion, as well as those that may be hereafter transferred thereto, shall be entitled to reckon the actual period of service in the Battalion for pension; and that the period at which men of good character may be transferred to the Battalion, is fixed at 15 years actual service, from and after the age of 16, instead of 18 years as at present.

2nd. The Hon'ble the Governor in Council is further pleased to notify, that all men now on the strength of the Native Army, entitled to increased pay and pension, shall, in modification of Art. 170, page 570, Section XL; and Art. 108 and 118, page 640 and 641, Sec. XLII. of Jameson's Code, be allowed to reckon service for the same, from the age of 16, if admitted into the ranks at that age, or from the date of actual enlistment if beyond that age on entering the service.

Is hereby given that verbal offers will be received at this office at noon on Saturday the 19th proximo, for supplying any quantity of good cleaned Gram, that may be required by the Commissariat Department at Poona and Kirkee, from the 1st October to the 30th November 1846.

The Gram to be of unexceptionable quality, of the description usually furnished to the mounted Corps at Poona and Kirkee, and to be delivered free of all expense to Government, beyond the stipulated price, at the Commissariat Stores at the abovementioned stations; in case of disputes as to the quality of the Gram tendered the opinion of a Committee of officers to decide the point, when, if the Gram be rejected and not replaced immediately by the contractor the required quantity will be purchased wherever procurable at the risk and loss of the contractor, who will be liable to be fined (50) fifty Rupees or (30) thirty per cent on the amount of the expenses so incurred, at the option of the Executive Commissariat Officer.

A supply of not less than one month's consumption to be kept in the Commissariat Stores at the above Stations.

To prevent disputes hereafter, it is to be distinctly understood that the provisions of the contract are only intended to extend to the demands made at Poona and Kirkee, but in the event of any of the mounted corps moving, it will be optional with the Commissariat Officer to take 15 days supply of Gram for their use on the march, and the contractor will not be liable for any greater demand.

BY THE QUEEN.

A PROCLAMATION.

VICTORIA R.

WHEREAS by Our Order in Council of this Day's Date We were graciously pleased, for the Reasons therein contained, to annul the Royal Proclamation of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, of the Third Day of February One thousand eight hundred and thirty-six, directing that distribution should be made of the net Proceeds of Prizes captured from the Enemy, of Captures and Seizures under the several Acts passed relating to the Revenues of Customs, and to Trade and Navigation, for the Abolition of the Slave Trade, and for the Capture and Destruction of Piratical Vessels, and of the Rewards conferred for the same, according to the Scheme therein set forth; and it is expedient that Provision should be made by Us for the future Distribution of such Proceeds or Rewards; We do make known to all Our loving Subjects, and all others whom it may concern, by this Our Proclamation, by and with the Advice and Consent of Our Privy Council, that Our Royal Will and Pleasure is, and We do hereby direct, That the Distribution of such Proceeds and Rewards shall be made in the following Manner; viz.—

That Flag Officers or Officer, Commodores of the First Class, and Captains of the Fleet, shall have *One Sixteenth* of the net Proceeds arising from Prizes captured from the Enemy, and from all other Captures, Seizures, Head Moneys, Grants, and Bounties as aforesaid, made by the Ships and Vessels under his or their Command, save and except in the Cases hereinafter submitted.

That when Two Flag Officers shall be serving together, the Chief shall have Two Thirds of the said *One Sixteenth*, and the other Officer shall have the remaining Third Part.

That when there be more than Two Flag Officers, the Chief shall receive One Half of the said *One Sixteenth*, and the remaining Half shall be divided equally amongst the junior Flag Officers, Commodores of the First Class, and Captains of the Fleet.

That no Flag Officer, or Commodore of the First Class, or Captain of the Fleet, not actually present at the Capture or Destruction of any Piratical Vessel or Privateers belonging to the Enemy, shall be entitled to share in the Distribution of any Head Money or Bounty granted in respect of the Crews of such Piratical Ships, Vessels, or Boats.

That no Flag Officer as aforesaid shall share in any Remuneration or Reward conferred or awarded as Salvage, unless he shall have been actually on board the Ship or Vessel to which the Award shall be made, or have personally aided or assisted in the Transaction at the Time the Service was rendered.

That no Flag Officer commanding in the Ports of the United Kingdom shall share in the Proceeds of Prizes captured from the Enemy, nor in other Captures or Seizures as aforesaid, made by Ships or Vessels which may sail from such Ports by Order of the Lord High Admiral, on the Commis-

sioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral, nor in the Rewards, &c. conferred for the same.

That when Ships or Vessels under the Command of several Flag Officers which belong to separate Stations shall happen to be joint Captors, each Flag Officer, under whose Orders each Ship or Vessel may be, shall receive a Portion of the Flag Share of *One Sixteenth* of the net Proceeds in proportion to the Number of Officers and Men present under the Command of each such Flag Officer; and the same Regulation as to the Apportionments of the Flag Share is to be observed when Ships or Vessels under Orders from the Lord High Admiral, or the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral shall be joint Captors with Ships or Vessels under a Flag or Flags.

And We do hereby further direct, That the following Regulations be observed in respect to the Distribution of the remaining Portion of the net Proceeds of Prizes, Captures, Seizures, and Rewards before mentioned (after the Deduction of the Flag Share of *One Sixteenth*,) or of the whole Amount of such net Proceeds in the Cases herein-before provided, where no Flag Officer shall be entitled to share.

First, That the Officers and Men composing the Complements of Our Ships and Vessels be distributed into Thirteen Classes, and that each Officer and Man and Boy who shall have been actually on board at the Time of any such Capture, Seizure, &c. as aforesaid, shall receive such Number or Portion of Shares as are expressed to each Class respectively in the following Table:—

First Class: Commodores of the Second Class, Captains, Field Officers of Marines or Land Forces above the Rank of Major, when doing Duty as Field Officers above the Rank of Major, One hundred Shares.

Second Class: *Commanders, Medical Inspector of Hospitals and Fleets, Field Officers of Marines or Land Forces of the Rank of Major, when doing Duty as such, Fifty Shares.

* (But when a Commander is not in Company with a Captain he is to receive seventy-five Shares.)

Third Class: Secretaries to Flag Officers Commanding in chief, Deputy Medical Inspectors of Hospitals and Fleets, †Sea Lieutenants, †Masters, Captains of Marines or of Marine Artillery, or of Land Forces when doing Duty as such, whether having higher Brevet Rank or not, Ten Shares each.

† (But Lieutenants or Masters in command of Vessels of War, and Masters of the Fleet, are to receive Twenty Shares each, instead of Ten.)

Fourth Class: Chaplains, Secretaries to junior Flag Officers and Commodores of the First Class, Surgeons, Paymasters and Pursers, Naval Instructors, Mates, Lieutenants of Marines, of Marine Artillery, or of Land Forces when doing Duty as such, Second Masters, Assistant Surgeons, Five Shares each.

Fifth Class: Gunners, Boatswains, Carpenters, First Engineers, Clerks in charge, Clerks (passed), Four and a Half Shares each.

Sixth Class : Midshipmen, Master's Assistants, Second and Third Class Engineers, Clerks, Naval Cadets, Clerks Assistant, Three Shares each.

Seventh Class : Ship's Cooks, Admiral's Coxswains, Leading Stokers, Masters-at-Arms, Seaman's Schoolmaster, Sailmakers, Ropemakers, Gunner's Mates, Boatswain's Mates, Carpenter's Mates, Caulkers, Blacksmiths, Serjeants of Marines, Serjeants of Marine Artillery, Serjeants of Land Forces when doing Duty as such, Two and Half Shares each.

Eight Class : Ship's Corporals, Captain's Coxswains, Quarter Masters, Captains of the Forecastle, Captains of the Main Top, Captains of the Fore Top, Captains of the Hold, Coxswains of the Launch, Corporals of Marines, and of Land Forces when doing Duty as such, Corporals and Bombardiers of Marine Artillery, Head Kroomen, Pilots, Two Shares each.

Ninth Class : Sailmaker's Mates, Coopers, Armourers, Caulker's Mates, Captains of the Mast, Captains of the Afterguard, Captains of the Mizen Top, Yeoman of Signals, Coxswain of Pinnace, Second Head Kroomen, Paymaster and Purser's Steward, One and a Half Shares each.

Tenth Class : Able Seamen, Musicians, Stokers and Coal Trimmers, Carpenter's Crew, Sailmaker's Crew, Cooper's Crew, Painters, Yeomen of Store Rooms, Flag Officer's Stewards, Flag Officer's Cooks, Flag Officer's Domestics, Captain's Steward, Captain's Cook, Subordinate Officer's Steward, Subordinate Officer's Cook, Sick Berth Attendant, Privates and Fifers of Marines and Land Forces when doing Duty as such, Gunners of Marine Artillery, Ordinary Seamen, One Share each.

Eleventh Class : Paymaster and Purser's Steward's Mates, Cook's Mates, Barbers, Landsmen, Kroomen, Three Fourths of a Share each.

Twelfth Class : Boys of First Class, Half a Share each.

Thirteenth Class : Boys of Second Class, Three Eighths of a Share each. Seamen Gunners to share in all Captures, Rewards, &c. as aforesaid, in the Class immediately above that of the Class in which their Rating is mentioned.

That in all Cases in which Supernumeraries, whether Officers or Men, shall be ordered to do Duty on board any of Our Ships by the Lord High Admiral, or by Our Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral, or by other proper Authority, (the Orders of the Captain or Commander, if no Senior be present, to be deemed sufficient Authority,) they shall share according to the Class of the Ranks or Ratings which they hold in the Service, if not ordered to do Duty in a higher Capacity. All Persons borne on board Our Ships merely as Passengers, whether Officers or others, and who may be present and not decline to render general Assistance in any Action that may occur in making any Capture or Seizure, shall be entitled to share in the

Eleventh Class if above the Age of Twenty, and in the Thirteenth if below that Age.

And that in the event of any Difficulty arising in respect to the Regulations hereby proposed, or any Case should occur not herein provided for, or not sufficiently provided for, We are pleased to authorize the Lord High Admiral, or Our Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral for the Time being, to issue such Directions thereupon as may appear just and expedient; and that such Directions shall be considered final, and have the same Force and Effect as if specially provided for in our Royal Proclamation.

Provided always, That the Distribution herein before proposed to be made or directed to be made shall not be construed to affect any Captures, Seizures, &c. made within Three Calendar Months from the Day of Our Royal Proclamation, nor any Captures, Seizures, &c. which shall be made after that Day, and which shall be condemned or adjudged in any of Our Courts of Vice Admiralty, or any Court of Mixed Commission, before Notice of Our Royal Proclamation shall have been received by the Vice Admiralty Court or Court of Mixed Commission in which such Condemnation or Adjudication shall pass: And We do hereby further direct, That the Proceeds of all such Captures, Seizures, &c. made within Three Months from the Day of the Date of this Our Royal Proclamation, or which shall be made after the Date of this Our Royal Proclamation, and which shall be condemned or adjudged in any of Our Courts of Vice Admiralty, or any Court of Mixed Commission, antecedent to the Notice of this Our Royal Proclamation having been received in such Courts, together with all Rewards aforesaid, shall continue to be distributed in the Proportions and Manner directed in and by His said late Majesty's said Royal Proclamation dated the Third Day of February One thousand eight hundred and thirty-six.

One Penny for each British or Colonial printed Price Current, or printed Commercial List conveyed between any of Her Majesty's Colonies.

Two Pence for each printed Price Current or printed Commercial list, whether British, Colonial or Foreign, conveyed between a British Colony and a Foreign Port or between two Foreign Ports.

British or Colonial Newspapers passing by these packets between any of Her Majesty's Colonies will not be liable to any postage for the Sea conveyance,

The prepayment of the British Packet postage on letters, is optional; when conveyed between the Indian Offices of Bombay, Aden, Calcutta, Madras, Penang & Singapore, and the Islands of Ceylon and Hongkong, or between any two of the Indian offices above enumerated; but when dispatched to a Foreign Country or Possession, such as China, Manilla &c, the above postage must be paid in advance at the Despatching Office.

The Postage chargeable on Newspapers and Prices Current and Commercial lists forwarded by these Packet Boats must in all cases be paid in advance.

The 1st August 1846,

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 1st August 1846.

Act No. — of 1846.

An Act for determining the duration of the existing Settlement of the North Western Provinces.

Whereas the settlement of the several districts of the North Western Provinces has been made for different periods, and whereas from several causes the duration of the settlement as stated in the engagements of the Malgoozars does not always agree with that sanctioned by the Government, and whereas it is necessary to avoid the confusion and litigation which may hence arise, and also to provide for the continuance of the existing settlements till a fresh revision shall take place; therefore,

I. It is hereby enacted that the Jummah of all villages included on 1st May 1846, within the limits of the Districts in the said Provinces noted below, shall be considered fixed till the date inserted opposite to each District, so far as regards the claim of the Government to any increase upon the Jummah determined at the time of settlement, or as it stands subsequently altered by Government prior to 1st May 1846.

Paneeput, July 1st 1872, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-two.

Hissar, July 1st 1860, one thousand eight hundred and sixty.

Delhi, July 1st 1870, one thousand eight hundred and seventy.

Rohtuck, July 1st 1870, one thousand eight hundred and seventy.

Scharunpore, July 1st 1857, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that in the said Provinces, Mouzahs standing transferred on the above date of 1st May 1846, from Districts or Pergunnahs not permanently settled, to Districts or Pergunnahs permanently settled, shall not be held liable to any increased demand on the part of the Govern-

ment, but shall be held for ever on the highest Jummah determined at the time of settlement, or as it stands subsequently altered by Government prior to 1st May 1846.

III. Provided always and it is hereby declared, that persons holding land on special grants or on leases for longer periods than those specified in Section I. shall continue to hold them according to the terms of their several grants or leases.

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that whenever a Malgoozar may be desirous to relinquish his lease on the expiration of the term of his engagement he shall be at liberty to do so, provided that he give notice thereof in open Court and in writing to the Collector and to the Commissioner of the division within one year before the 1st of July immediately preceding the expiration of the engagement.

V. And it is hereby enacted, that when such notice shall not have been given as aforesaid, the Malgoozar shall be held bound to pay the Jummah determined at the time of settlement, or as it stands subsequently altered by Government prior to the 1st of May 1846, for the period which may be applicable to his case, according to Section I. and subsequently from year to year till the settlement be revised, or in perpetuity according to Section II.

VI. Provided however, and it is hereby declared that nothing in this Act shall bar the right of the Government to demand revenue from any resumed rent free land, alluvial Towfeer, or other land which was not assessed at the time of settlement.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 1st day of October next.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 22d of August 1846.

Act No. — of 1846 :

An Act for the exemption of certain Territory in the Province of Candeish and the Zillah Ahmednuggur from the operation of the General Regulations.

Whereas it has been deemed expedient to exempt from the jurisdiction of the Civil and Criminal Courts of the Bombay Presidency certain portions of the Purgunnahs of Nundoorbar, Sooltanpoor and Kookurmoondah in the Province of Candeish and the Zillah Ahmednuggur :

I. It is hereby enacted, that from and after the day of 1846, so much of Appendix A. of Regulation XXIX of 1827 of the Bombay Code as declares the Villages contained in the Schedule annexed to this Act, and the lands attached thereto (being parts of the Purgunnahs of Nundoorbar, Sooltanpoor and Kookurmoondah, in the Province of Candeish and the Zillah Ahmednuggur) subject to the Regulations established for the administration of Civil and Criminal Justice in the Bombay Presidency, be repealed.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that from and after the said day the administration of Civil and Criminal Justice, the Superintendence of the Police and the Collection and Superintendence of the Revenues of every description within the said portions of Territory shall vest in such Agent to the Governor of Bombay as shall be appointed by the Governor of Bombay in Council, and shall be exercised by the said Agent with the aid of such Assistants as may be appointed by the said Governor in Council.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall be competent to the said Governor in Council, by an Order in Council, to prescribe such rules as he may deem proper for the guidance of the Agent aforesaid and of all the Officers subordinate to his controul and authority and to determine to what extent the decision of the Agent in Civil suits shall be final, and in what suits an appeal shall lie to the Sudder Dewannee Adawlut, and to define the authority to be exercised by the Agent in Criminal trials and what cases he shall submit to the decision of the Sudder Foujdaree Adawlut.

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that upon the receipt of any Criminal trials referred by the Agent under the Rules which may be hereafter prescribed by the Governor in Council, the Sudder Foujdaree Adawlut shall proceed to pass a final judgment, or such other order as may after mature consideration, seem to the Court requisite and proper, in the same manner as if the trial had been sent up in ordinary course from a Session Judge.

V. And it is hereby enacted, that upon the receipt of any appeal from a decree of the Agent duly prepared under the Rules to be prescribed as

aforesaid, the Court of Sudder Dewannee Adawlut shall proceed to try and determine it in the same manner as appeals from the Zillah Courts.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be reconsidered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 22d day of November next.
