3rd. If a Sepoy shall have served 15 years, and shall, iby a wound received in action with an enemy, lose one

limb, or one eye, he shall receive a pension of seven Rupees a month.

4th. If under 15 years service, five Rupees a month.

5th. If a Sepoy shall not have lost a limb or eye, but received such injury, as is equal to the loss of a limb, and is thereby disabled from following his profession as a soldier, he shall if he has served 15 years, receive seven Ru-

6th. If under 15 years, four Rupees a month.

The Native Army has at all times received the most liberal proofs of the solicitude of the Hon'ble the East India Company for the welfare of its troops, and the Governor General relies with confidence on receiving the approbation of the Hon'ble the Court of Directors confirming the alterations now proposed.

When the decision has been received the Governor General will take into consideration the cases of Sepoys who have been pensioned for wounds received in action at the lower rates subsequent to the General Orders of the

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 17th of January 1846:

Act No. — or 1846.

An Act for placing the Police of Surat under the Mayistrate.

Whereas it has been judged expedient that the Police jurisdiction of the City and Sudder Station of Surat should be vested in the Magistrate of the said Zillah.

It is hereby enacted, that so much of Clause 1st, Section I. Regulation IV. of 1830 of the Bombay Code as reserves to the control of the Judge and his Assistants the Police jurisdiction of the City and Suddur Station of Surat, be repealed.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be reconsidered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 17th day of April next.

BOMBAY CASTLE, 19th FEBRUARY 1846.

- 1. The Hon'ble the Governor in Council has the highest gratification in announcing for general information, that he has this day received authentic intelligence from the Head Quarters of His Excellency the Right Hon'ble the Governor General of India, of another most brilliant and decisive Victory having been obtained on the 10th instant by the British Forces over the Sikh Army, and of the storming of their strongly entrenched Camp opposite Hurceké.
- 2. The attack was commenced on the morning of the 10th instant, and after a severe shelling and cannonading the enemy's right was gallantly stormed by the British Troops and the whole of their position carried and occupied.
- 3. The Camp of the Enemy was exceedingly strong, and defended by 24,000 Regular Infantry, 66 pieces of Artillery, and flanked by heavy Guns from the opposite side of the River.
- 4. The Enemy offered a most determined and obstinate resistance, but under the blessing of Divine Providence, they were in the space of two hours most signally defeated, and driven in confusion across the Sutlej, with the loss of the whole of their Guns.
- 5. The Honorable the Governor in Council has gratification in announcing that the loss on the side of the British is believed to be comparatively small.
- 6. The Hon'ble the Governor in Council directs that a Salute of 21 Guns be fired from the Garrison of Bombay, at three P. M. this day, in honor of this Victory, and that a similar Salute be fired on receipt of this Order at all the Principal Military Stations under this Presidency.
- 7. The respective ministers of the different Christian Denominations in Bombay, are requested to offer up, on Sunday next, the 22nd Instant, and at the outstations on the first Sunday after the receipt of this Order, appropriate thanksgivings to Almighty God for the further mercies thus graciously vouch-saled.
