RULES passed by the Hon'ble the Governor in Council under date the 28th March 1848.

WHEREAS by Sec: LI of Act I, of 1838, the Governor in Council of Bombay is empowered to establish rules for the anchoring of coasting and country Craft in the several Ports of this Presidency; and whereas it is desirable that certain stations should be appointed for the anchoring of coasting and country Craft at the port of Bombay, the Hon'ble the Governor in Council is pleased to pass the following rules to have effect from the 1st day of June next.

1st. Distinct and separate stations shall from time to time be fixed by the Collector of Customs in communication with the Superintendent of the Indian Navy, and with the sanction of the Honorable the Governor in Council, for anchorage of vessels discharging and those receiving cargo, as also, whenever such an arrangement is considered expedient, for the anchorage of vessels from particular Ports, or having particular cargoes.

2nd. All country and coasting Craft on arriving in Bombay Harbour shall take up such berths on their proper anchorage stations, fixed as above provided, as may be pointed out to them by the Custom House authorities.

The following extract from the new Post office ordinance recently passed at the Mauritius, is published for general information.

ART. 22.—The following premiums shall be given to the Masters or Commanders of Vessels bringing Mails or Overland Newspapers to Mauritius under the annexed condition.

£ 30 for any vessels touching expressly for the purpose of landing the *Overland Post office Mail*, upon proof of the vessel having sailed from the Port at which such Mail was taken on board within five days after the arrival thereof of the said mail.

£ 50 for any vessel bringing the same, upon proof of the vessel having sailed within 48 hours of the arrival of the Mail as above described.

£ 20 for any vessel upon proof of the vessel having sailed within five days of the said arrival.

And £ 10 for any vessel not conveying the last Overland Mail, but bringing an *Overland newspaper* of the latest date, not already received in the Colony, and which shall be delivered within 80 days after publication and be made public in the exchange room immediately after the arrival of the said vessel.

In consequence of several complaints recently made, the Post Master General requests the attention of the public to the following extract from Clause VI. of the Post Office Rules, 30th August 1837.

"Newspapers, printed papers or parcels will not be received bearing postage, unless the sender shall give his name and address, in order that the regulated postage may be recovered from him in case of such paper or parcel being refused by the party addressed."

Parties coming to the General Post office enquire for letters awaiting their arrival, are requested to make application to the "Dead and Unclaimed letter department" in the South wing of the building.

The following Notification by H. M. Post Master General of London, is republished for general information :

BY COMMAND OF THE POST MASTER GENERAL,
NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC.

GENERAL POST OFFICE, MAY 1847.

The Post Master General having been informed by the Court of Directors of the East India Company, that on and after the first June next, persons in this country may forward private correspondence by the Government Express from Bombay to Calcutta, and Madras; all persons desirous of availing themselves of this privilege will be required to mark upon the covers of their letters the words "by Express from Bombay," and in addition to this special address it will not be necessary that all letters intended to be forwarded by the way of Southampton should be so endorsed as hitherto.

The postage to be charged in India on the delivery of letters sent by this Express, will be, in addition to the ordinary inland rates,

One rupee for every letter not exceeding half a tola in weight.

Two rupees for every letter above half a tola, but not exceeding one tola in weight.

Four rupees for every letter above one tola, but not exceeding two tolas in weight, two tolas being the maximum weight of letters to be conveyed by Express.

On Newspapers.—Each newspaper office in Calcutta and Madras will be allowed to receive two newspapers at the ordinary rates of Inland postage; on all other newspapers forwarded by Express, a postage of five rupees each will be charged, and no newspaper will be received for the Express exceeding three tolas in weight.

N. B.—One tola and a quarter is nearly equivalent to half an ounce avoirdupois.

BY THE HON'BLE THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

MILITARY DEPARTMENT.

BOMBAY CASTLE, 30TH MARCH 1848.

No. 188 of 1848.—The Hon'ble the Governor in Council is pleased to direct that the following General Orders by the Right Hon'ble the Governor General of India in Council, dated Fort William 17th March 1848, be republished at this Presidency.

The Right Hon'ble the Governor General of India in Council is pleased to direct that the provisions of Her Majesty's Warrant and the orders of the Hon'ble the Court of Directors, as published in Government General Orders No. 93, of the 29th March 1844, for the distribution of the prize property taken at the assault and capture of the Fortress of Guznee, be carried into effect, under the directions of the General Prize committee at the Presidency, as respects the officers and men belonging to the Bengal establishment, the claims of those belonging to the Bombay Presidency being adjusted there, as heretofore.

2. All European commissioned and Warrant officers will draw their shares on separate bills in duplicate, and forward them to the Military Auditor General, who, as a member of the General Prize committee, will pass them for payment, if unobjectionable.

3. The shares due to European and native non-commissioned officers and men, now present with the corps in which they served at Guznee, will be drawn by officers Commanding Troops and Companies, and the Abstracts (which are to be drawn on foolscap paper and in duplicate) are to be forwarded to the office of the Military Auditor General for audit, as above directed, accompanied by a Roll of the individuals drawn for: when the Abstract shall have been discharged, and the parties paid, Commanding officers of corps will be careful that the prescribed Acquittance Rolls are duly forwarded for deposit to the office of the Military Auditor General.

4. All persons who have been discharged or removed from the Corps in which they served, and all representatives of deceased persons, will lay their claims before the proper Station Prize Committees, who will forward their report on the several claims agreeably to Forms A. and B., accompanied by a Bill in duplicate for the amount, on audit and discharge of which the necessary Acquittance Rolls will be furnished by committees respectively, and forwarded as directed in the preceding paragraph.

5. After the lapse of 12 months from the commencement of the distribution, the General Prize committee will forward to the Secretary to Government in the Military department, a Return of the European officers and men who are entitled to share, but who from having died or left India before the distribution commenced may not have received their shares: when this return shall have been prepared and transmitted, no payments must be made in India on account of the shares therein specified; a Return of the European part of the Force, shewing how the different shares have been paid, must also be forwarded.

LEGISLATIVE.

The 25th March 1848.

The following Act is brought up before the Legislative Council this day, the Governor General of India in Council being desirous that no time should be lost in passing the Act.

Resolved—That the Rules requiring that all Acts of the Governor General of India in Council shall be brought up for second reading in two months, or in three months from the date of the first reading, be suspended in respect to the following proposed Act, and that it be at once passed into Law.

ACT No. VII. OF 1848.

An Act to except certain free Ports from the operation of Section III., Act No. VI. of 1848, and otherwise to amend that Act.

I. In modification of Section III., Act No. VI. of 1848, it is hereby enacted, that the provisions of the said Section shall not apply to Goods exported from any part of the Territories subject to the Government of the East India Company, to any of the ports in the Straits of Malacca, or to any of the ports in the Tenasserim Provinces, or to any of the ports in the province of Aracan, nor to Goods imported from any of those ports into any part of the said Territories.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that no drawback shall be allowed on the re-export of Goods from any port in the Territories, subject to the Government of the East India Company to any other port in the said Territories, to which the operation of Section III., Act No. VI. of 1848, may extend.
