RULES passed by the Hon'ble the Governor in Council under date the 28th March 1848.

WHEREAS by Sec: LI of Act I, of 1838, the Governor in Council of Bombay is empowered to establish rules for the anchoring of Coasting and Country Craft in the several Ports of this Presidency; and whereas it is desirable that certain stations should be appointed for the anchoring of coasting and country Craft at the port of Bombay, the Hon'ble the Governor in Council is pleased to pass the following rules to have effect from the 1st day of June next.

1st. Distinct and separate stations shall from time to time be fixed by the Collector of Customs in communication with the Superintendent of the Indian Navy, and with the sanction of the Honorable the Governor in Council, for anchorage of vessels discharging and those receiving cargo, as also, whenever such an arrangement is considered expedient, for the anchorage of vessels from particular Ports, or having particular cargoes.

2nd. All country and coasting Craft on arriving in Bombay Harbour shall take up such berths on their proper anchorage stations, fixed as above provided, as may be pointed out to them by the Custom House authorities.

No. 225 of 1848.—The following General Order by the Right Hon'ble the Governor General of India in Council is republished:—

FORT WILLIAM, 17TH MARCH 1848.

The Right Hon'ble the Governor General of India in Council is pleased to publish in General Order the following Extract of a Military Letter from the Hon'ble the Court of Directors to the Governor of India, No. 19 of the 20th October 1847, paras 7 to 10.

"Letter from the Governor General, dated 22nd June 1847.

Submitting a Memorandum dated 16th June 1847, containing an exposition of His Lordship's views with respect to the classes entitled to Medals when those distinctions are granted to the Troops engaged in military operations."

Para : 7. We approve of the specification by the Governor General of the following classes as entitled to receive medals, viz.—

- European and native officers of all ranks.
- Quarter Masters.
- Pay Masters.
- Surgeons and Assistant Surgeons.
- Subordinate Medical servants, including Hospital Apprentices, Native Doctors, and Assist. Surgeons.

- Veterinary Surgeons.
- Riding Masters.
- Conductors and Sub-Conductors.
- Non-Commissioned officers.
- Drummers and Rank and File.
- Gun Lascars.
- Ordnance drivers, confining the number to those

actually required to be up with the Guns at all times in action, certified by the officer commanding the battery.

8. We also approve of the suggestions with respect to other classes, as contained in the following paragraphs of the Governor General's Minutes of the 16th June 1847.

"Whenever any one of these men—Bheestees, ammunition camel drivers, artillery or staff Syces or Dooly bearers, is wounded in any action for which a Medal is granted to the army, and shall produce proof from competent authority that he was maimed in the performance of his duty, such individual shall have the medal, the batta, and the same rewards as are given to Gun Lascars when wounded. If the wound is equal to the loss of a limb, the same rewards and the same pension as a Gun Lascar; or if killed in action, his heirs shall be entitled to a similar pension as the Gun Lascars. Claims for Regimental, Tent, and Store Lascars will be equally entitled to consideration, if it can be shewn that they were maimed or hurt in the legitimate exercise of their duties, such as in Forts, Batteries, and entrenchments; and if in the course of a campaign any man of the preceding classes can prove, certified by his commanding officer, that he conducted himself with distinguished merit and gallantry, although not wounded in action, the case may be brought before the Government by the Military authorities, and if the Government should approve of an investigation, a committee may be convened and the claim be reported upon in the same manner as is now the rule for the 'order of military merit.'"

9. This decision as regards Batta will apply to the claims of camp followers, brought to our notice in the Governor General's letter of 21st January last, including the Sirdar and classies of magazines attached to the Loodianah magazine who during the late campaign acted as Artillery men, and were told off to the different Guns in that Fort. These men became for that time entitled to the privileges of "fighting men."

10. The several decisions on applications from Officers and detachments to receive medals for the Battles on the Sutlej and in Scinde, as described in the Governor General's Minute of the 16th June 1847, appear to have been founded on a correct principle and have our approval.

These services the Honorable the Governor in Council will not fail to bring to the notice of the Honorable the Court of Directors.

And £10 for any vessel not conveying the last Overland Mail, but bringing an *Overland newspaper* of the latest date, not already received in the Colony, and which shall be delivered within 80 days after publication, and be made public in the exchange room immediately after the arrival of the said vessel.

The Post Master General having been informed by the Court of Directors of the East India Company, that on and after the first June next, persons in this country may forward private correspondence by the Government Express from Bombay to Calcutta, and Madras; all persons desirous of availing themselves of this privilege will be required to mark upon the covers of their letters the words "by Express from Bombay," and in addition to this special address it will not be necessary that all letters intended to be forwarded by the way of Southampton should be so endorsed as hitherto.

The postage to be charged in India on the delivery of letters sent by this Express, will be, in addition to the ordinary inland rates,

One rupee for every letter not exceeding half a tola in weight.

Two rupees for every letter above half a tola, but not exceeding one tola in weight.

Four rupees for every letter above one tola, but not exceeding two tolas in weight, two tolas being the maximum weight of letters to be conveyed by Express.

On Newspapers.—Each newspaper office in Calcutta and Madras will be allowed to receive two newspapers at the ordinary rates of Inland postage; on all other newspapers forwarded by Express, a postage of five rupees each will be charged, and no newspaper will be received for the Express exceeding three tolas in weight.

N. B.—One tola and a quarter is nearly equivalent to half an ounce avoirdupois.

THE 25TH MARCH, 1848.

The following Act passed by the Governor General of India in Council on the 25th of March 1848, is hereby promulgated for general information.

Act No. VIII. of 1848.

To modify the provisions of Sections 9, 10, 11 and 13 of Regulation V. 1812, of the Bengal Code.

It is hereby enacted, in modification of the provisions of Sections 9, 10, 11 and 13 of Regulation V. 1812, of the Bengal Code, that if any ryot or tenant of land, upon whom such notice or demand as is specified in the said Sections is to be served, shall have no place of usual residence in the zillah where the land to which such notice or demand has reference is situate, the mode of serving such notice or demand with a jumma wassil bukkee shall be by affixing it at the Maal Cutcherry of such land, or other conspicuous place thereon, or at the village Chouree, Choupal, or other conspicuous place in the village.

THE 25TH MARCH 1848.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 25th of March 1848.

Act No — of 1848.

An Act to repeal Section IV. of Regulation XI. 1827, of the Bombay Code, and to provide for the trial of Native Subjects of the Bombay Government for offences committed out of the Zillahs of the Bombay Presidency.

I. It is hereby enacted, that from and after the day of Section IV. of Regulation XI. of 1827, of the Bombay Code, is repealed.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that from and after the said day Native Subjects of the Bombay Government when found within the Zillahs subordinate to Bombay or found within some Territory not subordinate to Bombay, and brought into any of the said Zillahs by the permission of the Government of the Territory within which they are so found, shall be amenable to the law for crimes and offences committed by them in places out of the Territories subordinate to the Presidency of Bombay.

III. Provided always and it is hereby enacted, that the Magistrate shall, previously to putting the prisoner upon his trial, make a report of the case to the Governor in Council of Bombay, who may order the trial to take place before some one of the established Courts of Criminal Judicature within any of the said Zillahs competent to try offences of the nature of that charged to have been committed, or before any Court so competent, established by the authority of the Government of Bombay, beyond the said Zillahs.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 25th day of June next.
