POST OFFICE NOTICES.

The following extract from the new Post Office ordinance recently passed at the Mauritius, is published for general information.

ART. 22.—The following premiums shall be given to the Masters or Commanders of Vessels bringing Mails or Overland Newspapers to Mauritius under the annexed condition:—

£30 for any vessels touching expressly for the purpose of landing the *Overland Post office Mail*, upon proof of the vessel having sailed from the Port at which such Mail was taken on board within five days after the arrival thereof of the said mail.

£30 for any vessel bringing the same, upon proof of the vessel having sailed within 48 hours of the arrival of the Mail as above described.

£20 for any vessel upon proof of the vessel having sailed within five days of the said arrival.

And £10 for any vessel not conveying the last Overland Mail, but bringing an *Overland newspaper* of the latest date, not already received in the Colony, and which shall be delivered within 80 days after publication, and be made public in the exchange room immediately after the arrival of the said vessel.

In consequence of several complaints recently made, the Post Master General requests the attention of the public to the following extract from Clause VI. of the Post Office Rules, 30th August 1837.

"Newspapers, printed papers or parcels, will not be received bearing postage, unless the sender shall give his name and address, in order that the regulated postage may be recovered from him in case of such paper or parcel being refused by the party addressed."

Parties coming to the General Post Office to enquire for letters awaiting their arrival, are requested to make application to the "Dead and Unclaimed Letter Department" in the South wing of the building.

The following Notification by H. M. Post Master General of London, is republished for general information:

BY COMMAND OF THE POST MASTER GENERAL.
NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC.

GENERAL POST OFFICE, MAY 1847.

The Post Master General having been informed by the Court of Directors of the East India Company, that on and after the first June next, persons in this country may forward private correspondence by the Government Express from Bombay to Calcutta, and Madras; all persons desirous of availing themselves of this privilege will be required to mark upon the covers of their letters the words "by Express from Bombay," and in addition to this special address it will not be necessary that all letters intended to be forwarded by the way of Southampton should be so endorsed as hitherto.

The postage to be charged in India on the delivery of letters sent by this Express, will be, in addition to the ordinary inland rates,

One rupee for every letter not exceeding half a tola in weight.

Two rupees for every letter above half a tola, but not exceeding one tola in weight.

Four rupees for every letter above one tola, but not exceeding two tolas in weight, two tolas being the maximum weight of letters to be conveyed by Express.

On Newspapers.—Each newspaper office in Calcutta and Madras will be allowed to receive two newspapers at the ordinary rates of Inland postage; on all other newspapers forwarded by Express, a postage of five rupees each will be charged, and no newspaper will be received for the Express exceeding three tolas in weight.

N. B.—One tola and a quarter is nearly equivalent to half an ounce avoirdupois.

The subjoined extract from Section LIX of the Post Office rules of 30th August 1837, is published for general information.

"Letters which individuals address on their private affairs to any Government officers must be sent post paid."

Parties addressing the Post Master General, or Deputy respecting their private letters and parcels, and superscribing "*Service*" on such communications, render themselves liable to the penalty prescribed in Section V. Act XX. of 1838.

The following extract from H. M.'s Treasury Warrant, dated the 7th October 1847, is published for general information.

"Now we, the undersigned, in exercise of all powers and authorities enabling us in this behalf, do hereby order and direct, that any such privileged person as is named in the said Act, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, and also every seaman employed abroad in the service of the East India Company, whilst actually employed in the service of such Company, may both send and receive letters, not exceeding half an ounce in weight, by private ships, between any two of Her Majesty's Colonies, whether through the United Kingdom or not, on their own private concerns, in like manner as the privileged persons* mentioned in the said Act, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, are authorized to send and receive letters, not exceeding half an ounce in weight, on their own private concerns, between the United Kingdom and places beyond the Seas. Provided, that whenever the letters sent or received by any such persons privileged under this warrant shall be conveyed, or intended to be conveyed, by private ships, the gratuities payable by law to the Masters of such vessels, in respect of such letters, shall in all cases be paid to the Post Office in addition to such postage."

* Soldiers and Sailors in the service of Her Majesty or of the East India Company.

General Orders.

BY THE HON'BLE THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

MILITARY DEPARTMENT.

BOMBAY CASTLE, 25TH APRIL 1848.

No. 242 of 1848.—The Hon'ble the Governor in Council is pleased to re-publish the following General Order by the Government of India.

General Orders by the Right Hon'ble the Governor General of India in Council.

Fort William, 7th April, 1848.—No. 132 of 1848.—The Governor General of India in Council is pleased to publish in General Orders the following Act, 10 and 11 of Victoria, Cap. 37, received in a Military letter from the Hon'ble the Court of Directors to the Government of Bengal :

“Anno Decimo and Undecimo Victoriæ, Cap. XXXVII.

An Act for limiting the Term of Service in the Army.

(21st June, 1847.)

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend the System of Enlistment now in use in Her Majesty's Land Forces, Be it enacted by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the Authority of the same, That after the passing of this Act no Person shall be enlisted to serve Her Majesty, or in the Forces of the *East India* Company, as a Soldier for a longer Term than Ten Years in the Infantry, or Twelve Years in the Cavalry, or Artillery, or other Ordnance Corps, to be reckoned from the Day on which the Recruit shall have been attested, if he shall have stated himself to be then of the Age of Eighteen Years, or if not, then from the Day on which he will complete the Age of Eighteen Years, to be reckoned according to the Age stated in his Attestation.

2. And be it enacted, That such of the Questions relative to Enlistment as are contained in the Schedule of an Act passed in the present Year of Her Majesty's Reign, intitled *An Act for punishing Mutiny and Desertion, and for the better Payment of the Army and their Quarters*, as relates to the enlisting and attesting of Soldiers, shall be repealed; and that in all Cases of Enlistment to serve Her Majesty or the *East India* Company, the Question directed to be put on the Attestation of Recruits, as to their Willingness to serve, shall be in the Form contained in Schedule (A.) hereto annexed.

3. And be it enacted, That any Soldier, at any Time during the last Six Months of the Term of limited Service for which he shall have first engaged, or after the Completion of such Term, may, if approved by his Commanding Officer or other competent Military Authority as a fit Person to continue in Her Majesty's Service, or in the Service of the *East India* Company as a Soldier, be re-engaged to serve for the further Term of Eleven Years in the Infantry, and Twelve Years in the Cavalry or Artillery or other Ordnance Corps, upon making a Declaration in the Form given in the Schedule marked (B.) and annexed to this Act, before any One of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace in *Great Britain* or *Ireland*, or, if not in *Great Britain* or *Ireland*, before any Person duly appointed by Her Majesty, by any Warrant signed by the Secretary at War in that behalf, to enlist and attest out of *Great Britain* and *Ireland* any Soldiers or Persons desirous of enlisting or re-enlisting into Her Majesty's Service.

4. Provided also, and be it enacted, That any Soldier who shall be ordered on Foreign Service, and who is within Three Years of the Expiration of his first Engagement, shall be at liberty, with the Approbation of his Commanding Officer, to re-engage, before he embarks for such Foreign Service, for such Period as shall complete a total Service of Twenty-one Years in the Infantry or Twenty-four Years in the Cavalry or Artillery, according to the Form given in Schedule (B.) and annexed to this Act.

5. Provided always, and be it enacted, That if either the first or second Term of limited Service for which any Soldier shall have so engaged shall expire while he is serving on any Foreign Station, the said first or second Term of limited Service may be prolonged for such further Term, not exceeding Two Years, as shall be directed by the Commanding Officer on such Foreign Station, and that any Soldier who shall give Notice to his Commanding Officer, after completing his second Term of limited Service, that he is desirous of continuing in Her Majesty's Service, or in the Service of the *East India* Company, and being approved by his Commanding Officer or other competent Military Authority, may be continued in such Service as a Soldier so long as he shall desire to be so continued, and until the Expiration of Three Calendar Months after he shall have given Notice to his Commanding Officer of his Wish to be discharged, and for that Purpose shall be considered in all respects, during such Time, as if his Term of Service were still unexpired.

6. Provided further, and be it enacted, That if at the Expiration of such first or second Term of limited Service, or of such Term of prolonged Service, any Soldier entitled to his Discharge, being on any Foreign Station, shall not be willing to re-engage or to continue in Her Majesty's Service, or in the Service of the *East India* Company, the Commanding Officer of the Regiment in which he may be serving shall, as in the Case of Soldiers invalided, take the usual Measures, with all convenient Despatch, for the Conveyance of such Soldier to *England*, and on the Arrival of such Soldier in *England* he shall be finally discharged; Provided always, that during such Time as may elapse between the Expiration of such Terms of Service as aforesaid and his final Discharge in *England*, such Soldier shall remain subject to all the Provisions of any Act which may be then in force for punishing Mutiny and Desertion, as fully as he may have been subject thereto before the Expiration of such Terms of Service: Provided also, that if at the Expiration of any such first or second Term of limited Service, or of such Term of prolonged Service, any Soldier being in any of Her Majesty's Colonies shall claim his Discharge, and shall signify to the Governor of such Colony, through the Commanding Officer of the Regiment in which he may be serving, his Desire to remain in such Colony, it shall be lawful for such Governor, if he shall think fit, with the Consent of such Commanding Officer, to permit such Soldier to remain therein, and thereupon such Soldier shall be finally discharged, and shall not be entitled to claim to be conveyed to *England* at the public Charge at any future period.

If at the Expiration of such Terms of Service Soldiers are unwilling to re-engage themselves, they shall be conveyed home.

If Soldiers desire to remain in the Colony, Governor, &c. may permit them so to do.

7. And be it enacted, That if the Term for which any Non-commissioned Officer or Soldier shall have been enlisted or re-engaged, or for which his Term of Service may have been prolonged as aforesaid, shall expire after any Offence committed by him, and before he has been tried or punished for the same, such Non-commissioned Officer or Soldier shall, notwithstanding the Expiration of his Term of Service, be deemed and taken to be still in Her Majesty's Service, or in the Service of the *East India Company*, as the case may be, for the Purpose of undergoing his Trial and Punishment, but for no other Purpose: Provided always, that no Non-commissioned Officer or Soldier shall be so tried after the Expiration of his Service, except by a General or District or Garrison Court-martial.

If Term of Enlistment of Soldiers expire after any Offence committed, &c. he shall be deemed to be in the Service till after Trial, &c. for the same.

8. And be it enacted, That if any Non-commissioned Officer or Soldier shall have been absent from his Duty during any Portion of the time limited by his Enlistment or Re-engagement, or Prolongation of Service, by reason of his Imprisonment, whether under Sentence of a Court-martial or of any other Court duly authorized to pass such Sentence, or by reason of his Confinement for Debt, or by reason of his Desertion, such Portion of his Time shall not be reckoned as a Part of the limited Service for which such Non-commissioned Officer or Soldier was enlisted or re-engaged, or for which his Term of Service may have been prolonged as aforesaid; and if any Non-commissioned Officer or Soldier shall have been absent from his Duty during any Portion of the Time limited by his Enlistment, or Re-engagement, or Prolongation of Service, by reason of his having been made a Prisoner of War, the Circumstances under which he was so made a Prisoner shall, on his rejoining Her Majesty's Service, or the Service of the *East India Company*, be subjected to Inquiry by a Court-martial, and if it shall appear to the Satisfaction of the Court that he was taken Prisoner through his own wilful Neglect of his Duty, or that he has or has not returned to his Duty so soon as he could and ought to have returned, the Court may by its Sentence direct that all or any Part of the Time during which such Non-commissioned Officer or Soldier shall have been so absent may be deducted from his Term of service.

9. And be it enacted, That this Act may be amended or repealed by any Act to be passed in this Session of Parliament.

QUESTIONS to be put by the JUSTICE to a RECRUIT on ENLISTING.

1. What is your Name?
2. In what Parish, and in or near what Town, and in what County, were you born?
3. What is your Age?
4. What is your Trade or Calling?
5. Are you an Apprentice?
6. Are you married?
7. Are you ruptured or lame; have you ever been subject to Fits; or have you any Disability or Disorder which impedes the free Use of your Limbs, or unfits you for ordinary Labour?
8. Are you willing to be attested to serve in the _____ Regiment of _____ for the Term of [*this Blank to be filled up by the Justice with Ten Years for Infantry, and Twelve for Cavalry or Artillery or other Ordnance Corps, if the Person enlisted is of the Age of Eighteen Years or upwards; but if under that Age, then the Difference between his Age and Eighteen is to be added to such Ten or Twelve Years (as the Case may be)*] provided Her Majesty should so long require your Services, and also for such further Term, not exceeding Two Years, as shall be directed by the Commanding Officer on any Foreign Station?
9. At what Place, on what Day, at what Hour of the Day, and by whom were you enlisted?
10. For what Bounty did you enlist?
11. Have you any Objection to make to the Manner of your Enlistment?
12. Do you now belong to the Militia?
13. Do you belong to any other Regiment, or to the Marines, Ordnance, or Navy, or to the Forces of the East India Company?
14. Have you ever served in the Army, Marines, Ordnance or Navy, or in the Forces of the East India Company?
15. Have you ever been rejected as unfit for Her Majesty's Service or for the Service of the East India Company, upon any prior Enlistment?

Note.—The Justice is directed, in putting the Twelfth Question to the Recruit, and before he receives his Answer, distinctly to apprise the Recruit that if he belongs to the Militia, and denies the Fact, he is liable to Six Months' Imprisonment.

Enlisting for Service in Her Majesty's Colonies.

Question 8 is to be put by the Justice as follows:

8. Are you willing to be attested to serve in Her Majesty's Colony of _____ for the Term of [*this Blank to be filled up by the Justice with Ten Years for Infantry, and Twelve for Cavalry or Artillery or other Ordnance Corps, if the Person enlisted is of the Age of Eighteen Years or upwards; but if under that Age then the Difference between his Age and Eighteen is to be added to such Ten or Twelve Years (as the case may be)*], provided Her Majesty should so long require your Services, and also for such further Term, not exceeding Two Years, as shall be directed by the Commanding Officer on any Foreign Station?

Enlisting for either Her Majesty's or the East India Company's Service.

Question 8. is to be put by the Justice as follows :

8. Are you willing to be attested to serve in Her Majesty's Army, or in the Forces of the East India Company, according as Her Majesty shall think fit to order, for the Term of [this Blank to be filled up by the Justice with Ten Years for Infantry, and Twelve for Cavalry or Artillery or other Ordnance Corps, if the person enlisted is of the Age of Eighteen Years or upwards; but if under that Age, then the Difference between his Age and Eighteen is to be added to such Ten or Twelve Years (as the Case may be)], provided your Services should so long be required, and also for such further Term, not exceeding Two Years, as shall be directed by the Commanding Officer on any Foreign Station?

Enlisting for the East India Company's Service.

THE 25TH MARCH, 1848.

The following Act passed by the Governor General of India in Council on the 25th of March 1848, is hereby promulgated for general information.

ACT No. IX. OF 1848.

An Act to repeal Acts No. XII. of 1839 and No. XII. of 1840, and to raise funds for Police and Municipal purposes through the Settlement of Prince of Wales' Island, Singapore, and Malacca, and the dependencies and places subordinate or annexed thereto, by levying an Assessment upon the rents, produce, and income derived from Buildings and Lands within the said Settlement, and by taxing Carriages, Waggon, Carts, Horses, and Mules kept or used within the same

I. It is hereby enacted, that from and after the First day of January 1849, Act No. XII. of 1839 and Act No. XII. of 1840, are repealed.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that from the said First day of January 1849 an Assessment at a rate not exceeding ten per cent., to be fixed from time to time as he shall think fit, by the Chief Civil Authority within the incorporated Settlement of Prince of Wales' Island, Singapore and Malacca, shall be levied every half-year in advance on the actual or estimated rents of all Houses, Shops, and other Buildings situated within the said Settlement and the dependencies and places now or hereafter to be subordinate or annexed thereto, to be paid by the Tenant or Tenants, or Occupier or Occupiers of such Houses, Shops, and other Buildings at the time of such Assessment. Provided always, that the several Houses or Buildings specified in Schedule A hereunto annexed, shall be exempted from Assessment under this Act.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that from and after the day aforesaid an Assessment at a rate not exceeding five per cent, to be fixed from time to time as he shall

see fit by the said Chief Civil Authority, shall be levied half-yearly or annually upon the actual rent or upon the value of the net produce derived from all lands situated in the said Settlement, dependencies and places held, possessed, or used for purposes of agriculture or cultivation of any description whatsoever. Provided always, that no Assessment shall be charged on any rent paid as quit rent to the East India Company for lands held under leases or other titles from the said Company, and that the produce of lands of less extent than three (3) acres used for the cultivation of Paddy, Siri, or Vegetables, and lands of which the annual net produce shall be less than Ten Spanish Dollars, if it shall be the sole assessable property of any one or more persons, shall be exempted from the payment of any Assessment under this Act.

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that in order to ascertain the value of the net produce of any such lands for any one year or half-year for the purpose of levying such Assessment, the amount of outlay actually paid and expended during that particular period in and upon the lands yielding such produce and in the manufacture of any such produce (not including either the purchase money of such lands, or the original outlay thereon, or the cost or purchase money of any articles of Machinery used or employed, or of any Buildings erected thereon), shall be deducted from the estimated value, at the then local current rate, of the gross quantity or amount of produce whether manufactured or otherwise derived from such lands, and that upon the overplus or net balance value so ascertained the said Assessment shall be levied and paid.

V. And it is hereby enacted, that in order to facilitate the collecting of Assessment on lands in manner specified in Section IV. of this Act, it shall and may be lawful for the collector or other Officer appointed in manner hereinafter mentioned to collect the same at each of the said Stations of Prince of Wales' Island, Singapore and Malacca, and the dependencies and places aforesaid to require the Owner, Occupier, Agent, Superintendent, or other person in charge of any such lands, to furnish him either annually or half yearly in writing under his or their hand or hands, with a true and detailed statement of the gross and actual quantity and amount of produce of what nature and kind soever yielded by the said land or manufactured therefrom during either of the said periods, and likewise a true and detailed statement of the amount of actual outlay paid and expended in the cultivation of the said land and in the preparation or manufacture of the produce thereof during the like periods, which said statements shall be verified by oath or affirmation to be made by such person or persons before one of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace at such Station (who is hereby authorized and required to administer the same) if thereto required by the said Collector or other Officer as aforesaid. And any person or persons who shall refuse to make such oath or affirmation, or who shall refuse to furnish such statement, shall on conviction thereof before the Court of Quarter Session at such Station, be liable to pay a fine not exceeding Two Hundred Spanish Dollars, and in default of payment thereof to be imprisoned for a term not exceeding two months.

VI. And it is hereby enacted, that from and after the day aforesaid a Tax shall be levied half-yearly in advance on all Carriages, Waggon, Carts, Horses, Mules, and Elephants in use or kept within the said Settlement, dependencies and places to be charged on the Owner or Owners, or where the Owner is absent or cannot be ascertained, on the person or persons in charge thereof, at the following rates, that is to say:

On every four or three wheeled Carriage, per annum,	10 Sp. Drs.
On every two wheeled Carriage, per annum,	8 "
On every Waggon drawn by man or beast, per annum,	8 "
On every Cart drawn by any description of Cattle, per annum,	6 "
On every Cart drawn by man, per annum	4 "
On every Horse or Mule, per annum,	2 "
On every Elephant, per annum,	12 "

And that if the payment of any such Tax shall not be duly made, it shall be lawful for any Justice of the Peace upon being satisfied that due diligence has been used to obtain payment, to issue his Warrant for levying the amount of such Tax by seizing and selling the Goods and Chattels of the person or persons so charged with the payment of such Tax and so making default. Provided always, that the several vehicles and animals

specified in Schedule B hereunto annexed, shall be exempted from the payment of any Tax under this Act.

VII. And it is hereby enacted, that the Chief Civil Authority of the said Settlement shall have power to appoint a Collector or Collectors, or such other Officer or Officers as may be deemed requisite for the collection of the Assessment and Taxes leviable under this Act at the several Stations of Prince Wales' Island, Singapore and Malacca, and the dependencies and places subordinate or annexed thereto respectively.

VIII. And it is hereby enacted, that in any case where payment shall not be duly made of any Assessment charged and demanded under authority of this Act, the Collector or other Officer appointed to collect the same shall certify in writing such non-payment to any Justice of the Peace, who, if he shall be satisfied that due diligence has been used to obtain payment, and that the same has been improperly withheld, shall issue his Warrant for levying the amount of such Assessment by seizure and sale of any Goods and Chattels and growing Crops whatsoever and to whomsoever belonging in or upon the Houses, Shops, or other Buildings, or in or upon the lands respectively charged, and the overplus, if any, after deducting the expenses of such seizure and sale, shall be paid to the Owner or Owners of the Goods, Chattels, or growing Crops so seized and sold, or to the person or persons in whose possession the same may have been found.

IX. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall be competent for the Collector or other Officer appointed to collect the aforesaid Assessment and Taxes at the said Stations of Prince of Wales' Island, Singapore and Malacca, and the dependencies and places aforesaid, in lieu of proceeding against defaulters by Warrant of Distress as aforesaid, to sue in his name for the recovery of any arrears through any Court of Justice to which such defaulters shall or may be amenable.

X. And it is hereby enacted, that the Court of Quarter Session of the said Settlement shall have power to hear and determine in such manner as to the said Court shall seem just all appeals by parties who may feel themselves aggrieved by, or who may have any reason to object to any demand for payment of any Assessment or Tax leviable under this Act whether on the ground of surcharge or otherwise: provided always, that before any application for any such appeal shall be entertained by the said Court, the party or parties making the same shall first pay the amount of the Assessment or Tax charged, and at the time of such payment give notice in writing of his or their intention to appeal to the Collector or other Officer by whom such Assessment or Tax may have been demanded.

XI. And it is hereby enacted, that no appeal shall be allowed by the said Court of Quarter Session unless the same shall have been made and prosecuted within three months from the time of payment of the amount of Assessment or Tax demanded and delivery of such notice to the Collector or other Officer aforesaid.

XII. And it is hereby enacted, that the monies collected from the Assessment and Taxes leviable under this Act at the said several Stations of Prince of Wales' Island, Singapore and Malacca, and the dependencies and places aforesaid, shall be called the "Municipal Fund," and that the same or so much thereof as shall be required shall be applied in manner hereinafter mentioned, towards the payment and maintenance of an efficient Police and of an Establishment for the collection of the said Assessment and Taxes at each of the said Stations, dependencies and places; and also towards the efficient watching, repairing, renewing, cleansing, draining, and keeping in repair the public Roads and Streets and all other public thoroughfares in town and country at each of the said Stations, dependencies and places; and also towards the repairing, renewing, building, re-building, cleansing, and securely upholding all public Bridges, Jetties, Quays, Aqueducts, Canals, Sluices, Sewers, and Sluice-gates, made for or in the occupation or use of the public at the said Station, dependencies and places either made, commenced, or hereafter to be made; and also towards the lighting of the said public Streets and Bridges, and to the effecting of other purposes necessary for the comfort and protection of the inhabitants of the said Settlement, dependencies and places. Provided always, that all Roads, Streets, and Bridges leading to and terminating at any Government House and other Building belonging to Government, or any Military Post, Barracks, or Cantonment, or any Hospital, Poor Houses, Sailor's Home, or other Benevolent or Charitable Institution under the patronage of Government, or any place of public Worship, shall be deemed to be Public Roads, Streets, and Bridges, within the meaning of this Act,

XIII. And whereas it is desirable that a certain number of the Rate-payers of the said Settlement should from time to time be appointed to assist the Government in the management of the said Municipal Fund, as well as in the performance of other Municipal Acts hereinafter mentioned: It is hereby enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Chief Civil Authority of the said Settlement for the time being, from time to time to nominate and appoint at each of the said Stations of Prince of Wales' Island, Singapore and Malacca, a Municipal Committee to consist of five resident Rate-payers, of whom two shall be Officers of the local Government, and in case it shall be found impracticable, from refusal to act, to obtain at either of the said Stations a sufficient number of unofficial persons to compose such Committee, it shall be competent for the said Chief Civil Authority to nominate and appoint a Committee of three resident Rate-payers instead of five; and that it shall be competent for the said Municipal Committee in conjunction with the said Chief Civil Authority, and under and in conformity with such orders and instructions as may from time to time be issued by the Governor of Bengal, to make order for the performance of the several objects and purposes specified and contained in Section XII. of this Act, for which provision is thereby directed to be made out of the said Municipal Fund; and to authorize and sanction the payment and disbursement of all Bills and Charges for the same. Provided, nevertheless, that it shall be competent for the said Chief Civil Authority at any time, if he shall think fit, to refer any matter or thing whatsoever herein to be done and performed for the sanction or instruction of the Governor of Bengal, accompanied by the opinion or observations thereon of the said Municipal Committee, and that nothing in this Act contained shall be construed to affect any of the provisions of Act No. III. of 1847.

XIV. And it is hereby enacted, that the said Municipal Committee shall have power to make Rules and Regulations, subject to the approval of the said Chief Civil Authority, for more fully and effectually carrying out and performing the objects and purposes specified in Sections XII. and XIII. of this Act, and to alter or amend the same from time to time as may be necessary, subject to the like approval.

XV. And it is hereby enacted, that as soon after the 1st day of January in every year as may be practicable, the Collector or other Officer appointed to collect the Assessment and Taxes under this Act at each of the said Stations of Prince of Wales' Island, Singapore and Malacca, shall prepare a detailed Statement of the said Municipal Fund, exhibiting the sums collected under the respective heads of Assessment, Taxes, or otherwise, during the preceding year, and showing also the disbursements which have been made during the same period, and that the said statement shall be published at the Station to which it relates in a Newspaper; and if such Station shall have no Newspaper, then the publication shall be made in some Newspaper at any of the other Stations; and the said statement shall also be open to general inspection at the Office of such Collector or other Officer for a period of one month from the date of its publication.

XVI. And it is hereby enacted, that the Officer Superintending the Police at each of the said Stations of Prince of Wales' Island, Singapore and Malacca, shall, between the 1st and 15th day of January in every year, require the Owners of all Palanquin Carriages, Carts, and other Vehicles, kept in such Station for the purpose of being let to hire for the conveyance of passengers or goods, to enter such Palanquin Carriages, Carts, and other Vehicles, in a Register to be kept for that purpose at the Police Office of such Station. And every Owner of a Palanquin Carriage, Cart, or other Vehicle subject to such registration, who shall omit or refuse to enter such Vehicle at the Police Office in manner aforesaid, shall, on conviction before a Justice of the Peace, pay for each offence a fine not exceeding Twenty Spanish Dollars, with costs of prosecution, to be recoverable on non-payment by Warrant of Distress and sale under the hand of the convicting Justice of the Peace, and the overplus, if any, of the Goods and Chattels sold shall be paid to such Owner or Owners.

XVII. And it is hereby enacted, that every Owner of a registered Palanquin Carriage, Cart, or other Vehicle, who shall neglect to place in a conspicuous part of such Vehicle a numbered board which shall be furnished to him by the Registering Officer, shall, on conviction before a Justice of the Peace, pay a fine not exceeding Five Spanish Dollars for each offence, to be recovered in manner specified in the last foregoing Section.

XVIII. And it is hereby enacted, that all Quarter Session and Police fees, fines, poundage, and forfeitures imposed, levied, and paid at each of the said Stations of Prince of Wales' Island, Singapore and Malacca, shall be forthwith paid into the said Municipal Fund at such Station in aid of the several purposes specified in Section XII. of this Act.

XIX. And it is hereby enacted, that no Assessment or Charge made under authority of this Act shall be impeached or affected by reason of any mistake in the name of any person liable to Assessment or Tax, or of any thing chargeable with Assessment or Tax, or any mistake in the amount of Assessment or Tax charged, provided the directions of this Act be in substance and effect complied with; and that no proceedings or other matter or thing had or done under this Act shall be quashed or set aside for want of form in any Court or Courts of Justice.

SCHEDULE A.

Referred to in Section II. of this Act.
To be exempted from the payment of Assessment.

PUBLIC BUILDINGS.

Hospitals, Poor Houses, Places of Worship, Charitable and Benevolent Institutions and Schools not used as Private Dwelling Houses, Convict Lines, Gaols, Barracks or Lines for Soldiers, Police Officers, and Thannahs.

PRIVATE BUILDINGS.

Mills, Drying and Boiling Houses, Out Offices and Labourers' Huts belonging and attached to Estates and Plantations; and any Dwelling Houses, Shop, or other Building which shall not have been used or occupied for more than three months in any one year; and any Attap Huts or Sheds belonging and attached exclusively to Vegetable Gardens and Paddy Fields consisting of not more than five acres, and any House or Building of which the annual value or rent shall be less than Six Spanish Dollars, if it shall be the sole assessable property of the person or persons charged therewith.

SCHEDULE B.

Referred to in Section VI. of this Act.
To be exempted from the payment of Taxes:
Waggons and Carts bearing the Owner's name painted in large letters on some conspicuous part of each, and not used on the public highway.
Waggons and Carts being the bona fide property of Government, and used in the public service.
Hearses kept exclusively for the removal of the Dead.
Elephants kept exclusively within Estates or Plantations, and not brought or used upon the public Roads or Bridges.

The following Act passed by the Governor General of India in Council on the 8th of April 1848, is hereby promulgated for general information.

ACT No. X. OF 1848.

An Act for annexing the lapsed State of Mandvee to the Presidency of Bombay.

Whereas the State of Mandvee has lapsed to the British Government:—

I. It is hereby enacted, that from and after the 1st day of May, 1848, the lapsed State of Mandvee, as described in the annexed Schedule, shall be subject to all Regulations and Acts which are, or shall be, in force within the territories subject to the Presidency of Bombay.

II. And it is hereby enacted, in modification of Section XXI. Regulation II. of 1827; of Section VI Regulation XVI. of 1827; and Sections IX, XVI., XXXIV. and XLIX. of Regulation XVII. of 1827, that suits on the following subjects shall not be cognizable by the Civil Courts within the said lapsed State of Mandvee:—

1st. All claims for damages against persons in authority under the late Government for abuse of power during that period.

2d. All claims against Government on account of Enams.

3d. All claims against Government on account of Jagheers, Wurshasuns, Pensions, Nemnooks, and other advantages not hereditary.

4th. All disputes regarding public Rent or Revenue payable to Government, and all complaints of exaction by Mamludars, or District or Village Officers.

5th. All claims on account of Village debts, all Village boundary disputes, and disputes regarding the use of wells and water courses.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that the Government of Bombay in Council shall be, and is hereby empowered to exempt from the jurisdiction of the Civil and Criminal Courts, the Widows and such of the present relatives of the late Rajas of Mandvee as may to him seem proper, and to declare the persons so exempted amenable to the authority of an Agent whom he may appoint for this purpose.

SCHEDULE.

Territorial Description of the Pargunna of Soowangiah, constituting the lapsed State of Mandvee.

It is bounded on the East by Punch Molee Pargunna, belonging to His Highness the Gaicowar.

On the West, by Turkeswar Pargunna of the Surat Zillah, and Gullah Pargunna, belonging to His Highness the Gaicowar.

On the North, by Wusravee and Nausur Pargunnas belonging to His Highness the Gaicowar, and Koondha Pargunna belonging to the Rajah of Rajpeela.

On the South, by Timbah Bearah and Soonghur Pargunnas, belonging to His Highness the Gaicowar, and Kurod and Walore Pargunnas of the Surat Zillah.

It comprises the undermentioned Towns and Villages 162.

Town of Mandvee situated on the North Bank of the Taptee River.

Resolution.—The following Act is brought up before the Legislative Council this day. The Right Hon'ble the Governor General in Council being desirous that no time should be lost in passing the Act, Resolved, that the Rule requiring a previous publication of two months or three months before the passing of any Act of the Government of India be suspended in respect to the following proposed Act, and that it be considered at the first Legislative Meeting after the 15th of May next.

*Fort William, Home Department, Legislative,
the 15th April 1848.*

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 15th April 1848.

Act No. — of 1848.

An Act for better defining the jurisdiction of the Calcutta Court of Commissioners for the Recovery of Small Debts.

Whereas by a Statute passed in the 39th year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for establishing further Regulations for the Government of the British Territories in India and the better Administration of Justice within the same," it was enacted that it should be lawful for the Governor General and Council of Fort William for the time being to order and appoint in what manner the Court of Requests of the Settlement of Fort William should in future be formed, and to what amount in value not exceeding the sum of Four Hundred Sicca Rupees the jurisdiction of the same should extend, and to frame and make such new rules and orders, and to establish and declare such new modes and forms of proceeding, as to them should appear expedient for new-modelling, altering, and reforming the then constitution of the said Court, and by their Proclamation to be made and published in due form of law to notify to all persons concerned such new constitutions, rules, orders, modes, and forms of proceeding, and the time from whence they were to have force and effect: And whereas the then Vice President in Council, with the sanction and approbation of the then Governor General, by his Proclamation bearing date the 18th day of March in the year 1802, did in pursuance of the powers and authorities given by the said Statute, order and direct that the then Court of Requests for the recovery of small Debts, and all powers and authorities exercised by it should cease and determine, and that a new Court of Requests for the Recovery of Small Debts to be composed of three

Commissioners and to be called "The Court of Commissioners for the Recovery of Small Debts," should be created in and for the Settlement of Fort William, and should exercise the powers and authorities in the said Proclamation particularly mentioned or referred to, and did by the said Proclamation extend the jurisdiction of the said Court to the sum of one Hundred Sicca Rupees and no more, and did by the said Proclamation give to the said Court full power and authority to make and frame such Rules and Regulations as might be necessary to direct the process and practice of the same, provided that no rule should be made which should be inconsistent with the said Proclamation, and that no rule or order to be framed by the said Court should be in force until the same should have been allowed by the Supreme Court of Judicature, and that the same when so allowed should be printed and published for the information of the public and did by the said Proclamation order that the Summonses issued by the said Court should be made returnable on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays only: And whereas the then Governor General of and for the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal in Council did afterwards by another Proclamation bearing date the 25th day of September in the year 1813, extend the jurisdiction of the said Court to the sum of Two Hundred and Fifty Sicca Rupees and no more: And whereas the then Governor General in and for the Presidency of Fort William aforesaid in Council did afterwards by another Proclamation, bearing date the 29th day of October in the year 1819, order and direct that from and after the first day of December then next ensuing, the jurisdiction of the said Court should extend to the sum of Four Hundred Sicca Rupees and no more, and that the Commissioners of the said Court should hold and exercise all powers and authorities theretofore or thereby granted to the said Court of Commissioners in suits for debts, duties or demands, not exceeding the value of Four Hundred Sicca Rupees, in as full and ample a manner as the same powers and authorities had theretofore been or were then exercised by the said Court to the amount in value of Sicca Rupees Two Hundred and Fifty, and did by such Proclamation order that summonses be made returnable on such days as the said Commissioners might lawfully from time to time direct: And whereas the said Court of Commissioners hath exercised jurisdiction over and heard and determined all such matters as it is in and by the said several Proclamations authorized to hear and determine to the extent and amount in the said last Proclamation authorized: And whereas doubts have arisen whether the Governor General in Council had authority by a second Proclamation further to extend the jurisdiction of the said Court, and it is expedient to establish both retrospectively and prospectively the legality of the said last two Proclamations and of all that has been done or may hereafter be done in pursuance of and in conformity with the same or either of them: And whereas doubts have also arisen whether the power given to the said Commissioners by the first of the said Proclamations are by the terms of the said third Proclamation effectually extended to the matters over which jurisdiction is thereby declared to be given to the said Court of Commissioners, and it is expedient to remove such doubts: And whereas the Rules, Orders, and Regulations for the direction of the process and practice of the said Court which have not been allowed or published as directed by the first Proclamation, and it is expedient to ratify and confirm the same notwithstanding such omission: And whereas the said Commissioners have been accustomed to sit separately and to form separate Courts sitting at the same time, and it is also expedient to establish as well prospectively as retrospectively the legality of that practice,—therefore, It is enacted, that all proceedings heretofore had or hereafter to be had in pursuance of and in conformity with the said Proclamations, or any of them by the said Commissioners, or any person or persons acting under their authority, shall be deemed to have been and to be valid in law to all intents and purposes whatever, and against all persons and bodies corporate whomsoever, and that all the powers and authorities declared to be given to the said Commissioners by the first Proclamation shall extend to and be exercised in respect of and shall be deemed to have heretofore extended to all matters which in and by the said several Proclamations or any of them, the said Commissioners were authorized to hear and determine, and that all proceedings heretofore had by any Commissioner or Commissioners whilst sitting apart from the others or other of them, or by any person or persons under his or their authority, shall be deemed and taken to have been as valid in law to all intents and purposes whatever, and against all persons and bodies corporate whomsoever, as if the said Commissioners had been sitting together in the said Court of Requests,

and that it shall be lawful for such Commissioners henceforth to sit either altogether or apart, and to hold one Court or separate Courts sitting at the same time in like manner as they have been heretofore accustomed to do; and that all rules, orders, forms of procedure, tables of fees now used or established in the said Court, shall be deemed to have been from the time of their being first used or established respectively, and to be valid in law to all intents and purposes, notwithstanding the omission to procure the allowance of such of the same as should have been allowed as aforesaid, and notwithstanding the non-publication of such of the same as should have been published as aforesaid, and that all summonses and other process issued by the said Commissioners, or any of them, whether issued before or after the passing of this Act, shall be deemed to be valid and effectual in the law on whatsoever day the same shall have been made returnable.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 15th day of May 1848.

Notice is hereby given, that in pursuance of instructions received from the Hon'ble the Court of Directors, the Governments of Bengal, Madras, and Bombay, have been authorized, in any case in which they may consider such a course to be expedient, to dispense with the obligation to *insure*, which is imposed by the existing Terms and Conditions upon parties who may obtain advances from the respective Governments, on the security of Goods hypothecated to the East India Company, intimating to them, that the Hon'ble Court will make the insurance in England, and requiring a Declaration binding the parties to repay the premium upon Insurance which the Court may effect, before the Bills of Lading and other Shipping Documents are handed over to their Agents.

It is to be understood, that the Insurance to be effected, will only be to the amount of the advance in each case, so as to cover the East India Company's risk.
