INTERPRETATION

ON SECTION VI. CLAUSE 2, AND SECTION XII.

CLAUSE 2, OF REGULATION XIV. OF 1827.

A case having occurred in which the consideration of the Court has been given to the mode of carrying out the requirements of the Law contained in Section VI. Clause 2, and Section XII. Clause 2, of Regulation XIV. of 1827, it is determined that the requirements of the Law, so far as concern the Sentence on a Prisoner convicted of Treason, are fulfilled by the award of death and confiscation of property: and as it will frequently be impracticable that the assignment prescribed in the former Section can in all cases be simultaneous with the passing of the Sentence, the adjudicating authority shall immediately, or as soon after passing sentence as circumstances may admit, issue such orders as may seem to him advisable, to the Magistrate of the Zillah, for ascertaining the extent of the convict's property, in order to the fixing the proportion to be assigned for the maintenance of the family of the offender.

POST OFFICE NOTICES.

Notice is hereby given, that under instructions from the Government of India, letters posted in Bombay cannot be received for transmission by the Government Expresses despatched hence to Calcutta and Madras on the arrival of the Overland Mails, those Expresses being specially intended for Europe letters and intelligence.

The following extract from the new Post Office ordinance recently passed at the Mauritius, is published for general information.

ART. 22.—The following premiums shall be given to the Masters or Commanders of Vessels bringing Mails or Overland Newspapers to Mauritius under the annexed condition:—

£30 for any vessels touching expressly for the purpose of landing the *Overland Post office Mail*, upon proof of the vessel having sailed from the Port at which such Mail was taken on board within five days after the arrival thereat of the said mail.

£30 for any vessel bringing the same, upon proof of the vessel having sailed within 48 hours of the arrival of the Mail as above described.

£20 for any vessel upon proof of the vessel having sailed within five days of the said arrival.

And £10 for any vessel not conveying the last Overland Mail, but bringing an *Overland newspaper* of the latest date, not already received in the Colony, and which shall be delivered within 80 days after publication, and be made public in the exchange room immediately after the arrival of the said vessel.

In consequence of several complaints recently made, the Post Master General requests the attention of the public to the following extract from Clause VI. of the Post Office Rules, 30th August 1837.

"Newspapers, printed papers or parcels, will not be received bearing postage, unless the sender shall give his name and address, in order that the regulated postage may be recovered from him in case of such paper or parcel being refused by the party addressed."

Parties coming to the General Post Office to enquire for letters awaiting their arrival, are requested to make application to the "Dead and Unclaimed Letter Department" in the South wing of the building.

The following Notification by H. M. Post Master General of London, is republished for general information:

BY COMMAND OF THE POST MASTER GENERAL.
NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC.

GENERAL POST OFFICE, MAY 1847.

The Post Master General having been informed by the Court of Directors of the East India Company, that on and after the first June next, persons in this country may forward private correspondence by the Government Express from Bombay to Calcutta, and Madras; all persons desirous of availing themselves of this privilege will be required to mark upon the covers of their letters the words "by Express from Bombay," and in addition to this special address it will not be necessary that all letters intended to be forwarded by the way of Southampton should be so endorsed as hitherto.

The postage to be charged in India on the delivery of letters sent by this Express, will be, in addition to the ordinary inland rates,

One rupee for every letter not exceeding half a tola in weight.

Two rupees for every letter above half a tola, but not exceeding one tola in weight.

Four rupees for every letter above one tola, but not exceeding two tolas in weight, two tolas being the maximum weight of letters to be conveyed by Express.

On Newspapers.—Each newspaper office in Calcutta and Madras will be allowed to receive two newspapers at the ordinary rates of Inland postage; on all other newspapers forwarded by Express, a postage of five rupees each will be charged, and no newspaper will be received for the Express exceeding three tolas in weight.

N. B.—One tola and a quarter is nearly equivalent to half an ounce avoirdupois.

"Letters which individuals address on their private affairs to any Government officers must be sent post paid."

Parties addressing the Post Master General, or Deputy respecting their private letters and parcels, and superscribing "Service" on such communications, render themselves liable to the penalty prescribed in Section V. Act XX. of 1838.

The following extract from H. M's Treasury Warrant, dated the 7th October 1847, is published for general information.

" Now we, the undersigned, in exercise of all powers and authorities enabling us in this behalf, do hereby order and direct, that any such privileged person as is named in the said Act, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, and also every seaman employed abroad in the service of the East India Company, whilst actually employed in the service of such Company, may both send and receive letters, not exceeding half an ounce in weight, by private ships, between any two of Her Majesty's Colonies, whether through the United Kingdom or not, on their own private concerns, in like manner as the privileged persons* mentioned in the said Act,

* Soldiers and Sailors in the service of Her Majesty or of the East India Company.

passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, are authorized to send and receive letters, not exceeding half an ounce in weight, on their own private concerns, between the United Kingdom and places beyond the Seas. Provided, that whenever the letters sent or received by any such persons privileged under this warrant shall be conveyed, or intended to be conveyed, by private ships, the gratuities payable by law to the Masters of such vessels, in respect of such letters, shall in all cases be paid to the Post Office in addition to such postage."

The contractor will be required to comply immediately with all emergent demands for the articles comprised in the above-mentioned list, and others of less urgency must be met within the period stated in the requisitions; in failure whereof, the articles, or such others as may be required in lieu, will be purchased at his risk and loss; and in all such cases an advance of Rupees (30) thirty per cent upon the amount of expences incurred, or a fine of Rupees (50) fifty, at the option of the Executive Officer, will be levied as liquidated damages for each and every such breach of contract as often as the same may occur; and the contract may in all such cases be put an end to on the part of the East India Company.

No person will be allowed to bid for the contract unless he previously deposits in this office the sum of Rupees (507) five hundred and seven, which will be forfeited in the event of delay, evasion, or refusal to execute the necessary deed of contract. Should his offer be accepted, he must be prepared to give unexceptionable bonded security to the extent of Rupees (2030) two thousand and thirty, to be held by Government as security for the due performance of his contract.

It is to be understood, that all retrenchments made by the Military Board on the contractors' bills, will be recovered from the first bills preferred for payment by the contractors; but in the event of such retrenchments being subsequently removed, the amount thereof will be returned to them.

The annual outlay on account of the above contract is estimated at Rupees (10,151) ten thousand one hundred and fifty one, or thereabouts. All further particulars will be communicated at the time of bidding, and no reason will be assigned for the rejection of any offer.

1. "Under the new system of recruiting, viz. the enlistment of men for limited service only, it becomes necessary to revise the Regulation which prohibits a soldier who may purchase or obtain a free discharge from our service, from reckoning his former service, if permitted to re-enlist; and we have resolved, that in accordance with the Regulations of Her Majesty's service, men who may hereafter re-enlist into our service within six months after their discharge by purchase, or at their own request, or upon the expiration of the first period of their limited service, shall reckon their former service, if their commanding officers at the end of one year from the date of their re-enlistment, shall recommend them for such indulgence on account of good conduct, and provided also that on being re-attested, they declared their former service, and the cause of their discharge."

2. "This Regulation will take effect from the date of its publication in General Orders."

No. 270 of 1848.—The Right Hon'ble the Governor in Council is pleased to republish the following General Order by the Government of India, No. 86, dated the 25th February last, and to declare its provisions applicable to all the stations of the army of this Presidency in Scinde, and also to Bombay and to Deesa.

"No. 86 of 1848.—The Right Honorable the Governor General in Council having taken into his consideration the opinion of a number of medical officers, experienced in the treatment of European troops, in regard to the introduction of punkahs in European barracks, is pleased to promulgate the following rules for their supply and maintenance:—

"Punkahs shall be supplied at the expense of the State, to the barracks occupied by the European troops, at the different stations in the plains under this Presidency, to be pulled night and day during the hot season.

"The sum of Rupees (25) twenty-five a month per company, and in proportion to the regulated strength per troop, will be granted by Government towards the expense of maintaining establishments for pulling punkahs, any additional expenditure that may be necessary for pulling them being defrayed by the Canteen fund.

"The punkah pullers will be entertained at the commencement of the hot season and discharged at the close of the rains, by station or other order, by the officer commanding, based on the report of a committee, one member of which should if possible be a medical officer. Commanding officers are enjoined to assemble such committees when it may appear necessary.

"The amount chargeable to Government will be paid by the executive officer to commanding officers of regiments monthly, and at detached stations, to the officer commanding the detachment or company, and brought forward in the monthly current bills, to which should be attached the receipts from those officers.

"To prevent accidents from breaking of punkah ropes, the executive officer will see that the hanging ropes are examined occasionally, and if necessary he will at once supply new ropes, supporting the charge by an order from the commanding officer.

"Commanding officers will take measures to prevent clothes or other articles being hung on the punkahs and punkah ropes, and take precautions to exact a proper proportion of labour from the punkah pullers, who should be placed under the orders of non-commissioned officers, as well to see that they perform their duty, as to protect them from ill usage.

"Libraries, Canteens, and Main Guard, may be supplied with punkahs, but on the distinct understanding, that no excess beyond Rupees (25) twenty-five per company will be defrayed by the Government.

"The Military Board will take immediate measures for putting up the requisite number of punkahs, leaving the position of them to be determined by the regimental officers."

No. 61 of 1848.—The Right Hon'ble the Governor in Council is pleased to direct the publication in General Orders of the following extracts of a despatch, dated the 22d March, No. 17, conveying the decision of the Hon'ble the Court of Directors upon a number of memorials presented in September and October last, by officers of the Indian Navy (marginally named), which contained comments upon the constitution and administration of the service to which they belong, and highly improper reflections and imputations upon their superiors.

The Right Hon'ble the Governor in Council desires the most serious attention of all the officers of the Indian Navy to the observations of the Hon'ble the Court of Directors; implicit obedience to their instructions will be strictly enforced;

and the Government trusts that the leniency shewn in the decision now promulgated, will be duly appreciated, and induce the young officers who have been misled to join in an act which is characterised by the highest authority as a flagrant breach of discipline and subordination, to endeavour by their future behaviour to retrieve the confidence of their superiors, and obliterate the recollection of their misconduct on this occasion.

The suspension awarded to Lieutenant Manners of six months, and to Lieutenant Etheridge and Midshipman Pengelly of three months, from pay, allowances, and the active duties of the service, will take effect from a date which will be hereafter fixed.

Lieutenant B. Hamilton is admonished, in conformity with the Hon'ble Court's instructions, and cautioned to be more circumspect in his conduct hereafter.

Letter from,—dated 10th September 1847 (No. 86) and 1st October 1847 (No. 93.)

Transmitting with the observations and proceedings of Government thereon, 19 memorials addressed to Court by certain officers and Midshipmen of the Indian Navy, respecting the removal from the service of Lieutenant Bird under Court's orders, respecting also the power vested in the Superintendent of the Indian Navy, and the mode in which those powers are exercised; the inadequacy of the Pay of Lieutenants, their severe duty consequent on the paucity of commissioned officers, and the employment of strangers in command of Indian Navy vessels, to the disadvantage of the officers of the service; respecting likewise the system under which officers of the Indian Navy take relative rank with the Royal Navy, their not being granted honorary distinctions, &c.

Letter from,—dated 15th October 1847 (No. 101.)

Forwarding a memorial from Midshipman Pengelly of the same tenor as the preceding.

Para. 1.—We have considered these letters and the several minutes and proceedings of your Government therewith transmitted, with that attention which is due to the importance of the subject.

2.—With respect to the memorials from the officers and midshipmen of the Indian Navy, we concur generally in the view taken by your President in his Minute of the 14th September 1847, and we consider those documents, notless from their offensive tone, than from the manner in which they have been severally framed and presented, as highly objectionable and altogether inadmissible.

3. Although separately transcribed and signed, these memorials cannot from their similarity be deemed otherwise than the result of concert and combination. Every individual in our service is at liberty to represent his case to us if he feel aggrieved, but his appeal ought to be couched in temperate and respectful terms. That privilege however does not admit of a body of officers sending in memorials of a similarly offensive character, both in substance and in terms as the memorials alluded to are.

4. It can scarcely be unknown to the officers of the Indian Navy, that among the members of a military body, such combination is under any circumstances highly irregular, and punishable as tending to the subversion of discipline; but in a case like the present, where the parties under the pretence of presenting a memorial for the redress of alleged grievances presume to call in question the acts of the constituted authorities, and to cast imputations and reflections upon the conduct of their superior officer in the discharge of his public duty, the combination constitutes a military crime, and the parties so associated should be made to understand, that they are guilty of a grave offence subjecting the individuals to serious penalties.

5. With reference to the imperfect state of the law at the time, there would, we are sensible, have been great difficulty in convening a Court Martial for the trial of the offenders, but, as the tone and language assumed by them are both intemperate and disrespectful to superior authority, and involve points of which they could not properly take cognizance, and as an insubordinate spirit and contempt of authority were evinced in the very presentation of the memorials, after the memorialists had been made aware, by their superior officers, of the impropriety of the course they were pursuing, we cannot determine otherwise than to visit this flagrant breach of discipline and subordination with punishment.

6. In proceeding to notice the conduct of the memorialists, we cannot divest ourselves of the impression that the spirit of insubordination, the discontented temper, and the disposition to resist authority which have been displayed by the younger members of the service, have been connived at and encouraged by those of more mature age and of higher rank, who ought to have shewn a very different example, and to have repressed the rash proceedings of their juniors, who were permitted to proceed step by step in a course alike injurious to themselves and to the Service.

7. We are disposed, however, to make every allowance for the youth and inexperience of the junior officers and Midshipmen, and to attach all due regard to your intercession in their favor, but it seems to us imperative, that for the vindication of discipline, the upholding our authority as well as that of your Government, and of the Superintendent of the Indian Navy, the memorialists should be made to understand that their conduct cannot be passed over altogether with impunity.

8. An attentive perusal of all the proceedings, shews peculiarities in the cases of some of the memorialists which bid us to select them as fit objects for punishment and example. The most prominent case is that of Lieutenant F. E. Manners: he entered the service in 1831, and therefore youth and inexperience cannot be pleaded in mitigation of his offence; none of the other memorialists approach within 7 or 8 years of his standing in the service, and it is a remarkable fact that Mate Robinson, and Midshipmen Taylor, Ranken, Mitcheson, Brooman, and Stroyan, were all doing duty in the Hastings with Lieutenant Manners, consequently we are warranted in assuming, that his conduct and example have materially influenced these young men in signing the memorial.

9. It is true that Lieutenant Manners has requested permission to withdraw his memorial, but he has not based this request upon any admission of its impropriety; he states that he is "now aware that the document in question is illegal, a circumstance he had no conception of before," while such statement is at variance with that contained in the letter of Captain Lynch, his commanding officer, who remonstrated in vain with these officers on the impropriety of their proceedings; and it is moreover directly contradicted by the declaration of the Superintendent of the Indian Navy, that "the illegality of his proceeding was strongly impressed upon Lieut. Manners by his Commander, and every argument urged to induce him to follow a more correct course, but without avail." Neither had Lieut. Manners discovered the "illegality" of his memorial, until long after his example must have exercised a baneful influence over his junior officers. We have therefore resolved, that Lieut. Manners be suspended from pay and allowances, and from the active duties of the service for a period of six months.

10. The cases of Lieut. Etheridge and of Mr. Midshipman Pengelly, are also peculiar. They neither of them sent in any memorial for a month after the others, and they then did so in spite of the remonstrances in person of Sir Robert Oliver, of their immediate commanding officers, and of others who forcibly pointed out to them the serious consequences likely to befall them should they persist in their determination. We have accordingly resolved that Lieut. Etheridge and Midshipman Pengelly be suspended from pay and allowances and from the active duties of the service for the period of three months.

11. With respect to the other memorialists we are greatly influenced by your favorable recommendation, on the ground of their youth and inexperience, and we direct that they withdraw their memorials, that they be made acquainted with our sentiments respecting their conduct, and our hope and expectation that the leniency shewn them will be attended with the best effect.

12. The conduct of Lieut. Benjamin Hamilton in forwarding to the Superintendent of the Indian Navy the memorial of Lieut. Adams, the officer under his command, without attempting in any manner to point out to him the gross breach of discipline he was committing, or expressing an opinion on his conduct in his official report, is deserving of severe reprehension. We desire that Lieut. Hamilton be admonished, and informed that his conduct has made a very unfavorable impression upon us.

13. We are of opinion that the Superintendent of the Indian Navy has a right to expect all the support which can be accorded to him by the local authorities; and we observe with satisfaction that your Government under whose immediate orders he is acting, and who have consequently the best means of forming a judgment on his official conduct, have distinctly declared that you "regard the imputations and reflections cast upon his conduct and motives as wholly unfounded, and that your confidence in this able and strictly upright officer is undiminished in the slightest degree." We beg you will assure Sir Robert Oliver of our cordial concurrence in these sentiments.

14. It is peculiarly the province of Courts Martial to determine all questions involving the discipline of the Indian Navy, and we are desirous that recourse should be had to that tribunal on all occasions where it is practicable.

No. 65. of 1848.—The Right Hon'ble the Governor in Council is pleased at the instance of the Commander in Chief of the Indian Navy, to direct that the subjoined Squadron order of the 5th January 1827, be re-published in the General orders of the Government, and to declare that its provisions are still in full force. The Governor in Council is prepared to appoint to the office of Interpreter to the Squadron in the Persian Gulf, any officer who may be recommended as duly qualified by the Commander in Chief of the Indian Navy, and as an additional incentive to the study of Oriental languages among the junior officers, the Governor in Council is about to submit to the consideration of the Honorable the Court of Directors, a plan for introducing the office of Interpreter into the Navy, on the same principle as that upon which it has been established in the Army, but with such difference as the circumstances of the two services may render necessary or expedient.

The Superintendent desires to publish for general information of the service the following copy of the orders from Government.

No. 10 of 1827.

Marine Department

To,

Thomas Buchanan, Esquire, Superintendent of Marine.

Sir,

The Hon'ble the Governor in Council observes that there is at present no inducement held out by Government to officers in the Marine to study the native languages, while an acquaintance with those languages is as important in the Marine Department as in any other; and indeed a more extended knowledge of that sort is necessary from the variety of countries visited by our Cruisers.

2nd. To remedy this deficiency the Honorable the Governor in Council has resolved, that any officer in the Marine, passing an examination in any one of the following languages, viz:—Hindoostanee, Persian, Arabic, or Malay, shall be allowed to draw as Moonshie allowance Rupees (30) thirty per month, for a period of twelve months.

3rd. The examination in Hindoostanee will be held before the Military Committee, those in the other languages will be held before special Committee.

4th. The Governor in Council has further been pleased to resolve that every squadron (as that in the Persian Gulf; that lately on the coast of Pegue &c) shall have an Interpreter (on a special allowance to be fixed on the occasion) qualified in the language of the country, viz:—

Arabic or Persian for the Gulf, and Malay for the eastward.

5th. You will be pleased to cause due notification of the above resolution to be given to all the officers of the Marine.

Resolution.—The following Act brought up before the Legislative Council this day. The Right Hon'ble the Governor General in Council being desirous that no time should be lost in passing the Act, Resolved, that the

Rule requiring a previous publication of two months or three months before the passing of any Act of the Government of India be suspended in respect to the following proposed Act, and that it be considered at the first Legislative Meeting after the 15th of May next.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 15th April 1848.

ACT No. — OF 1848.

An Act for better defining the jurisdiction of the Calcutta Court of Commissioners for the Recovery of Small Debts.

Whereas by a Statute passed in the 30th year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for establishing further Regulations for the Government of the British Territories in India and the better Administration of Justice within the same," it was enacted that it should be lawful for the Governor General and Council of Fort William for the time being to order and appoint in what manner the Court of Requests of the Settlement of Fort William should in future be formed, and to what amount in value not exceeding the sum of Four Hundred Sica Rupees the jurisdiction of the same should extend, and to frame and make such new rules and orders, and to establish and declare such new modes and forms of proceeding, as to them should appear expedient for new-modelling, altering, and reforming the then constitution of the said Court, and by their Proclamation to be made and published in due form of law to notify to all persons concerned such new constitutions, rules, orders, modes, and forms of proceeding, and the time from whence they were to have force and effect: And whereas the then Vice President in Council, with the sanction and approbation of the then Governor General, by his Proclamation bearing date the 18th day of March in the year 1802, did in pursuance of the powers and authorities given by the said statute, order and direct that the then Court of Requests for the recovery of small Debts, and all powers and authorities exercised by it should cease and determine, and that a new Court of Requests for the Recovery of Small Debts to be composed of three Commissioners and to be called "The Court of Commissioners for the Recovery of Small Debts," should be created in and for the Settlement of Fort William, and should exercise the powers and authorities in the said Proclamation particularly mentioned or referred to, and did by the said Proclamation extend the jurisdiction of the said Court to the sum of one Hundred Sica Rupees and no more, and did by the said Proclamation give to the said Court full power and authority to make and frame such Rules and Regulations as might be necessary to direct the process and practice of the same, provided that no rule should be made which should be inconsistent with the said Proclamation, and that no rule or order to be framed by the said Court should be in force until the same should have been allowed by the Supreme Court of Judicature, and that the same when so allowed should be printed and published for the information of the public, and did by the said Proclamation order that the Summonses issued by the said Court should be made returnable on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays only: And whereas the then Governor General of and for the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal in Council did afterwards by another Proclamation bearing date the 25th day of September in the year 1812, extend the jurisdiction of the said Court to the sum of Two Hundred and Fifty Sica Rupees and no more: And whereas the then Governor General in and for the Presidency of Fort William aforesaid in Council did afterwards by another Proclamation, bearing date the 29th day of October in the year 1819, order and direct that from and after the first day of December then next ensuing, the jurisdiction of the said Court should extend to the sum of Four Hundred Sica Rupees and no more, and that the Commissioners of the said Court should hold and exercise all powers and authorities theretofore or thereby granted to the said Court of Commissioners in suits for debts, duties or demands, not exceeding the value of Four Hundred Sica Rupees, in as full and ample a manner as the same powers and authorities had theretofore been or were then exercised by the said Court to the amount in value of Sica Rupees Two Hundred and Fifty, and did by such Proclamation order that summonses be made returnable on such days as the said Commissioners might lawfully from time to time direct: And whereas the said Court of Commissioners hath exercised jurisdiction over and heard and deter-

mined all such matters as it is in and by the said several Proclamations authorized to hear and determine to the extent and amount in the said last Proclamation authorized: And whereas doubts have arisen whether the Governor General in Council had authority by a second Proclamation further to extend the jurisdiction of the said Court, and it is expedient to establish both retrospectively and prospectively the legality of the said last two Proclamations and of all that has been done or may hereafter be done in pursuance of and in conformity with the same or either of them: And whereas doubts have also arisen whether the power given to the said Commissioners by the first of the said Proclamations are by the terms of the said third Proclamation effectually extended to the matters over which jurisdiction is thereby declared to be given to the said Court of Commissioners, and it is expedient to remove such doubts: And whereas the Rules, Orders, and Regulations for the direction of the process and practice of the said Court which have not been allowed or published as directed by the first Proclamation, and it is expedient to ratify and confirm the same notwithstanding such omission: And whereas the said Commissioners have been accustomed to sit separately and to form separate Courts sitting at the same time, and it is also expedient to establish as well prospectively as retrospectively the legality of that practice,—therefore, it is enacted, that all proceedings heretofore had or hereafter to be had in pursuance of and in conformity with the said Proclamations, or any of them by the said Commissioners, or any person or persons acting under their authority, shall be deemed to have been and to be valid in law to all intents and purposes whatever, and against all persons and bodies corporate whomsoever, and that all the powers and authorities declared to be given to the said Commissioners by the first Proclamation shall extend to and be exercised in respect of and shall be deemed to have heretofore extended to all matters which in and by the said several Proclamations or any of them, the said Commissioners were authorized to hear and determine, and that all proceedings heretofore had by any Commissioner or Commissioners whilst sitting apart from the others or other of them, or by any person or persons under his or their authority, shall be deemed and taken to have been as valid in law to all intents and purposes whatever, and against all persons and bodies corporate whomsoever, as if the said Commissioners had been sitting together in the said Court of Requests, and that it shall be lawful for such Commissioners henceforth to sit either altogether or apart, and to hold one Court or separate Courts sitting at the same time in like manner as they have been heretofore accustomed to do; and that all rules, orders, forms of procedure, tables of fees now used or established in the said Court, shall be deemed to have been from the time of their being first used or established respectively, and to be valid in law to all intents and purposes, notwithstanding the omission to procure the allowance of such of the same as should have been allowed as aforesaid, and notwithstanding the non-publication of such of the same as should have been published as aforesaid, and that all summonses and other process issued by the said Commissioners, or any of them, whether issued before or after the passing of this Act, shall be deemed to be valid and effectual in the law on whatsoever day the same shall have been made returnable.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 15th day of May 1848.
