INTERPRETATION

ON SECTION VI. CLAUSE 2, AND SECTION XII. CLAUSE 2, OF REGULATION XIV. OF 1827.

A case having occurred in which the consideration of the Court has been given to the mode of carrying out the requirements of the Law contained in Section VI. Clause 2, and Section XII. Clause 2, of Regulation XIV. of 1827, it is determined that the requirements of the Law, so far as concern the Sentence on a Prisoner convicted of Treason, are fulfilled by the award of death and confiscation of property: and as it will frequently be impracticable that the assignment prescribed in the former Section can be simultaneous with the passing of the Sentence, the adjudicating authority shall immediately, or as soon after passing sentence as circumstances may admit, issue such orders as may seem to him advisable, to the Magistrate of the Zillah, for ascertaining the extent of the convict's property, in order to the fixing the proportion to be assigned for the maintenance of the family of the offender.

POST OFFICE NOTICES.

Notice is hereby given, that under instructions from the Government of India, letters posted in Bombay cannot be received for transmission by the Government Expresses despatched hence to Calcutta and Madras on the arrival of the Overland Mails, those Expresses being specially intended for Europe letters and intelligence.

The following extract from the new Post Office ordinance recently passed at the Mauritius, is published for general information.

ART. 22.—The following premiums shall be given to the Masters or Commanders of Vessels bringing Mails or Overland Newspapers to Mauritius under the annexed condition:—

£30 for any vessels touching expressly for the purpose of landing the *Overland Post office Mail*, upon proof of the vessel having sailed from the Port at which such Mail was taken on board within five days after the arrival thereof of the said mail.

£30 for any vessel bringing the same, upon proof of the vessel having sailed within 48 hours of the arrival of the Mail as above described.

£20 for any vessel upon proof of the vessel having sailed within five days of the said arrival.

And £10 for any vessel not conveying the last Overland Mail, but bringing an *Overland newspaper* of the latest date, not already received in the Colony, and which shall be delivered within 80 days after publication, and be made public in the exchange room immediately after the arrival of the said vessel.

In consequence of several complaints recently made, the Post Master General requests the attention of the public to the following extract from Clause VI. of the Post Office Rules, 30th August 1837.

"Newspapers, printed papers or parcels, will not be received bearing postage, unless the sender shall give his name and address, in order that the regulated postage may be recovered from him in case of such paper or parcel being refused by the party addressed."

Parties coming to the General Post Office to enquire for letters awaiting their arrival, are requested to make application to the "Dead and Unclaimed Letter Department" in the South wing of the building.

The following Notification by H. M. Post Master General of London, is republished for general information:

BY COMMAND OF THE POST MASTER GENERAL.
NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC.

GENERAL POST OFFICE, MAY 1847.

The Post Master General having been informed by the Court of Directors of the East India Company, that on and after the first June next, persons in this country may forward private correspondence by the Government Express from Bombay to Calcutta, and Madras; all persons desirous of availing themselves of this privilege will be required to mark upon the covers of their letters the words "by Express from Bombay," and in addition to this special address it will not be necessary that all letters intended to be forwarded by the way of Southampton should be so endorsed as hitherto.

The postage to be charged in India on the delivery of letters sent by this Express, will be, in addition to the ordinary inland rates,

One rupee for every letter not exceeding half a tola in weight.

Two rupees for every letter above half a tola, but not exceeding one tola in weight.

Four rupees for every letter above one tola, but not exceeding two tolas in weight, two tolas being the maximum weight of letters to be conveyed by Express.

On Newspapers.—Each newspaper office in Calcutta and Madras will be allowed to receive two newspapers at the ordinary rates of Inland postage; on all other newspapers forwarded by Express, a postage of five rupees each will be charged, and no newspaper will be received for the Express exceeding three tolas in weight.

N. B.—One tola and a quarter is nearly equivalent to half an ounce avoirdupois.

The subjoined extract from Section LIX of the Post Office rules of 30th August 1837, is published for general information:

"Letters which individuals address on their private affairs to any Government officers must be sent post paid."

Parties addressing the Post Master General or Deputy respecting their private letters and parcels, and superscribing "Service" on such communications, render themselves liable to the penalty prescribed in Section V. Act XX. of 1838.

Bombay, Genl. Post Office, 21st Dec. 1847.

It is hereby notified for general information, that in future the Steamers belonging to the Bombay Steam Navigation Company will start with the Mails on the undermentioned dates, viz :

From Bombay on the 2nd, 12th, and 22d of each month.

From Kurrachee on the 7th, 17th, and 27th do. instead of on the dates specified in the Postal Notification of the 27th October last.

The following extract from H. M's Treasury Warrant, dated the 7th October 1847, is published for general information.

" Now we, the undersigned, in exercise of all powers and authorities enabling us in this behalf, do hereby order and direct, that any such privileged person as is named in the said Act, passed in the fourth year of Her present Majesty, and also every seaman employed abroad in the service of the East India Company, whilst actually employed in the service of such Company, may both send and receive letters, not exceeding half an ounce in weight, by private ships, between any two of Her Majesty's Colonies, whether through the United Kingdom or not, on their own private concerns, in like manner as the privileged persons*

* Soldiers and Sailors in the service of Her Majesty or of the East India Company.

mentioned in the said Act, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, are authorized to send and receive letters, not exceeding half an ounce in weight, on their own private concerns, between the United Kingdom and places beyond the Seas. Provided, that whenever the letters sent or received by any such persons privileged under this warrant shall be conveyed, or intended to be conveyed, by private ships, the gratuities payable by law to the Masters of such vessels, in respect of such letters, shall in all cases be paid to the Post Office in addition to such postage."

With the view to prevent disappointment, parties who call at the Post Office to receive Overland letters, or to post prepaid letters, are reminded, with reference to Sections XXIV and XXXI of the Post Office rules of 30th August 1837, that letters cannot be delivered except on payment of the postage, and that no change will be given in any case.

Notice is hereby given, that a regular Post line has been established between Gogo and Ahmedabad, and that letters and parcels may be posted in future at the Post Offices at Dholka, Dhollera, Blownuggur, and Gogo.

Is hereby given, that persons desirous of entering into a contract for the supply of sundry articles of Turner's work to this department for the term of two years from the 1st day of June next, may, on application at this office from 10 A. The contractor will be required to comply immediately with all emergent demands for the articles comprised in the above-mentioned list, and others of less urgency must be met within the periods stated in the requisition notes; in failure whereof the articles or such others as may be required in lieu will be purchased at his risk and loss; and in all such cases an advance of Rupees (30) thirty per cent upon the amount of expenses incurred, or a fine of Rupees (50) fifty, at the option of the Executive officer, will be levied as liquidated damages for each and every such breach of contract as often as the same may occur, and the contract may also in all such cases be put an end to on the part of the East India Company.

No person will be allowed to bid for the contract unless he previously deposits in this office the sum of Rupees (301) three hundred and four, which will be forfeited in the event of delay, evasion, or refusal to execute the necessary deed of contract. Should his offer be accepted, he must be prepared to give unexceptionable bonded security to the extent of Rupees (1,218) one thousand two hundred and eighteen, to be held by Government for the due performance of this contract.

It is to be understood, that all retrenchments made by the Military Board on the contractor's bills will be recovered from the first bills preferred for payment by the contractor, but in the event of such retrenchments being subsequently removed, the amount thereof will be returned to them.

The annual outlay on account of the above contract is estimated at Rupees (6,090) six thousand and ninety, or thereabouts. All further particulars will be communicated at the time of bidding, and no reason will be assigned for the rejection of any offer.

Letter dated 24th July, 1847.

Submit for consideration and decision correspondence originating in a claim to Staff allowance preferred by Brigadier Costley, during the time that officer was occupied in proceeding from Umballah to Barrackpore, and as a general principle of some interest is involved in the decision to be passed on the claim, His Lordship has recorded his opinion in a Memorandum, dated Simla 22nd May 1847, pointing out two modes by which the convenience might be obviated.

Para. 5.—By the existing Regulations, Brigadiers are entitled to Staff allowances for the periods only of actual command. If transferred on public or private grounds from one Brigade Command to another, they cease to draw Staff allowances during the time occupied in moving from the one station to the other.

6. This regulation, which has been long established, must be duly enforced. The regimental allowances of the Brigadier, including full batta and tentage, furnish the appropriate remuneration to him during the time of his journey.

7. We approve of the suggestion of the Governor General, that the time passed by Brigadiers in moving from one station to another, under the circumstances, shall not count as a part of the tour of five years' service.”

THE 29TH APRIL, 1848.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 29th April 1848.

ACT No. — OF 1848.

An Act for better enforcing the attendance of proprietors and farmers of land before Collectors of Land Revenue in the Bengal Presidency.

Whereas by Clause 3, Section 13 of Regulation II. 1819, and by Section 19 of Regulation VII. 1822, and Section 3, Regulation IX. 1835 of the Bengal Code, provision is made for the imposition of a daily fine by the Board of Revenue, or other authority exercising the powers of that Board, on any proprietor or farmer of land, subject to the provisions contained in the recited Clauses and Sections of the said several Regulations, who when duly summoned by the Collector or Commissioner shall omit or refuse to attend, or to cause his Officer or Agent to attend, or to furnish the accounts or documents required, and shall not shew sufficient cause for such omission; and it is further provided in and by the first recited Regulation, that the fine when confirmed by Government is to be levied by the same process as is prescribed for the recovery of arrears of revenue; and whereas in many cases by the delay thus occasioned, the progress of the survey is hindered, and the whole burden of the penalty is greatly increased beyond what would be necessary, if summary power were given to the Officer by whom the Requisition is made, to impose and levy reasonable fines, subject to review by the Commissioner of Revenue and other superior authority, it is enacted as follows:

I. If any proprietor or farmer of land shall omit or refuse to attend, or to cause his Officer or Agent to attend, when duly summoned by the Collector, in any of the cases specified in the recited Regulations, or either of them, by the time prescribed in the notice issued by the Collector, or shall omit or refuse to furnish the accounts or documents required, and shall not shew sufficient cause for such omission, the Collector or other Officer empowered to make the requisition shall be empowered to impose of his own authority such daily fine, to be payable daily until he complies with the Collector's requisition, as such Collector or other Officer may think adequate to his situation and circumstances in life, not exceeding in any case the daily fine of 50 Rupees: and the amount of such fine accruing due from time to time may be levied without further confirmation by the same process as is prescribed for the recovery of arrears of revenue,

II. The Collector shall forthwith report the imposition of every such fine, and the amount thereof, and also from time to time the amount levied, to the Commissioner of Revenue, who shall report the same for the information of the local Government.

III. Every order passed by a Collector, or person exercising the powers of a Collector under this Act, shall be appealable in the usual manner to the Commissioner of Revenue, and other superior authority, but no such appeal shall avail to prevent the levy of any fine so imposed pending the appeal.

IV. Whenever the amount levied under any such order issued for any default by authority of a Collector or person exercising the power of a Collector under this Act, shall have exceeded 500 Rupees, the Collector shall report the case specially to the Commissioner of Revenue, and no further levy for such default shall be made otherwise than by authority of the Commissioner of Revenue.

V. Nothing in this Act contained shall be deemed to repeal the power of imposing daily fines, and of levying the fines so imposed in the manner prescribed by the said Regulations.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 29th day of June next.
