And £10 for any vessel not conveying the last Overland Mail, but bringing an Overland newspaper of the latest date, not already received in the Colony, and which shall be delivered within 80 days after publication, and be made public in the exchange room immediately after the arrival of the said vessel.

"Newspapers, printed papers or parcels, will "not be received bearing postage, unless the sender shall give his name and address, in "order that the regulated postage may be re-"covered from him in case of such paper or " parcel being refused by the party addressed."

The following Notification by H. M. Post Master General of London, is republished for general information:

BY COMMAND OF THE POST MASTER GENERAL. NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC.

GENERAL POST OFFICE, MAY 1847.

The Post Master General having been informed by the Court of Directors of the East India Company, that on and after the first June next, persons in this country may forward private correspondence by the Government Express from Bombay to Calcutta, and Madras; all persons desirous of availing themselves of this privilege will be required to mark upon the covers of their letters the words "by Express from Bombay," and in addition to this special address it will not be necessary that all letters intended to be forwarded by the way of Southampton should be so endorsed as hitherto.

The postage to be charged in India on the delivery of letters sent by this Express, will be, in addition to the ordinary inland rates,

One rupee for every letter not exceeding half a tola in weight.

Two rupees for every letter above half a tola, but not exceeding one tola in weight. Four rupees for every letter above one tola, but not exceeding two tolas in weight, two tolas being the maximum weight of letters to be conveyed by Express.

On Newspapers.—Each newspaper office in Calcutta and Madras will be allowed to receive two newspapers at the ordinary rates of Inland postage; on all other newspapers forwarded by Express, a postage of five rupees each will be charged, and no newspaper will be received for the Express exceeding three tolas in weight.

N. B.—One tola and a quarter is nearly equivalent to half an ounce avoirdupois.

INTERPRETATION

ON SECTION VI. CLAUSE 2, AND SECTION XII. CLAUSE 2, OF REGULATION XIV. OF 1827.

A case having occurred in which the consideration of the Court has been given to the mode of carrying out the requirements of the Law contained in Section VI. Clause 2, and Section XII. Clause 2, of Regulation XIV. of 1827, it is determined that the requirements of the Law, so far as concern the Sentence on a Prisoner convicted of Treason, are fulfilled by the award of death and confiscation of property: and as it will frequently be impracticable that the assignment prescribed in the former Section can be simultaneous with the passing of the Sentence, the adjudicating authority shall immediately, or as soon after passing sentence as circumstances may admit, issue such orders as may seem to him advisable, to the Magistrate of the Zillah, for ascertaining the extent of the convict's property, in order to the fixing the proportion to be assigned for the maintenance of the family of the offender.

Supplies to the Commissariat, at any of the Commissariat Godowns, or any other place which may be indicated; and for the troops, at the Regimental stores or such other places as may be appointed for their receipt.

Supplies to the Indian Navy to be weighed and conveyed from the Commissariat stores to the water's edge, and placed in boats if required,

Supplies for the House of Correction and County Gaol, at those places respectively.

The contractor shall also be required to supply under his contract Teas Black (Pouchong) and Green (Hyson) to the Hospitals at the Presidency, and to the Executive Commissariat Departments for Hospital purposes at out-stations, including Scinde and Aden, if required by the Executive Commissariat officer.

It is to be distinctly understood, that payment for the supplies obtained at the Presidency for transmission to out-stations, including Scinde and Aden, shall not be made until the receipts of acknowledgment are received from the receiving Departments.

No person will be allowed to bid for the contract unless he or they previously deposit in this office the sum of Rupees (3000) three thousand in cash, which will be forfeited in the event of delay, evasion, or refusal to execute the necessary deed of contract. Should his offer be accepted, he must be prepared to add thereto a further sum of Rupees (2,265) two thousand two hundred and sixty-five, making in all Rupees 5265 in cash, and unexceptionable bonded security to the extent of Rupees (21,061) twenty-one thousand and sixty one, to be held by Government for the due performance of his contract.

The contractor will be required to sign and seal a contract stipulating to the above effect, and that he or they shall comply immediately with all emergent demands for the articles included in the abovementioned list, and others of less urgency must be met within the period stated in the requisitions made upon him or them; in failure whereof, and if the supply be condemned by the committee of officers as aforesaid, it shall, or such other as may be required in lieu, be purchased by this department without reservation at his or their risk and loss; and in all such cases an advance of (30) thirty per cent. upon the amount of expences incurred, or a fine of Rupees (50) fifty, at the option of the executive officer, will be levied as liquidated damages for each and every such breach of contract as often as the same may occur. And the contract may in all such cases be put an end to on the part of the East India Company.

The amount of retrenchments made by the Military Board on the contractors' bills, will be recovered from the first bills presented for payment by the contractors, but in the event of such retrenchments being subsequently removed, the amount thereof will be returned to them.

COMMISSARIAT CIRCULAR No. 259.

To, THE COMMISSARIAT OFFICER IN CHARGE.

The attention of the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury having been called to the variety of practice prevailing at the several foreign stations in respect to the quantity of baggage which officers and others are entitled to have conveyed at the public expense, it has appeared to my Lords, that a general regulation may

with advantage be established for this branch of the service.

My Lords have accordingly communicated on the subject with the Secretary at War, the Lords of the Admiralty, and the Master General and Board of Ordnance, and in concurrence with the opinion of those authorities, I am commanded to transmit, for your information and guidance, a scale of rates for the baggage of officers and regiments, for which transport is to be provided at the public expense, when proceeding on duty by sea, by land, or by inland

It is their Lordships' wish that this scale, which is the same as that heretofore in force at home, with certain modifications, should be made applicable to all the Stations abroad, India and Ceylon excepted.

You will perceive, that in regulating the quantity of baggage to be conveyed, the principle of admeasurement has been combined with weight, and it is to be understood, that neither by land nor by water is the allowed weight nor admeasurement to be exceeded.

My Lords have at the same time adverted to the mode in which the charges for transport, as well for baggage. as for the service of the army in general, are vouched in the Commissariat accounts; and they are pleased to direct, that henceforth the following rules and regulations, to embrace the different services for which the Com-

missariat provide transport, may be followed.

On receiving a requisition for transport, you will examine it, and should it be within the limits of the regulaon receiving a requisition for transport, you will examine it, and should it be within the limits of the regula-tion, if for baggage or for any other authorized public service, you will provide a sufficiency of tonnage if by water, or of waggons, drays, carts, or mules, (according to the custom of the country) if by land, for the convey-ance of the baggage or stores required to be transported; and as regards transport by land specially provided and not furnished from a transport establishment attached to the Commissariat, or under a contract specifying a rate for quantities, as it may happen that the state of the roads or other circumstances sometimes render it necessary to increase the means of conveyance for a given quantity of baggage or stores, a certificate should be annexed to the voucher in support of the charge in your accounts, that the means of transport provided have not been more than sufficient to comply with the requisitions.

If in the case of baggage, it should appear to you that the requisition is for quantities beyond the regulation, or in the case of a requisition for any other purpose, that the public ought not to provide the transport, you will submit your objection to the officer commanding, in the form prescribed for questionable issues of allowances, and take his decision thereon, reporting the case to this Board.

To facilitate as much as possible the service, and at the same time to ensure an easy and satisfactory examination of the accounts, it appears to my Lords to be desirable that all payments for transport should invariably be made either at the post or station from, or that to which the baggage or other articles may be transported, and without any unnecessary delay after the service shall have been performed; that the requisitions (see forms Nos. 1 and 2) should bear the signature of a military officer of the Quarter Master General's Department, if at head quarters and there be an officer of that department on the staff of the command, or if not, of the officer commanding at an out-post, or the proper staff officer at head quarters, and that a list, according to the accompanying form No 3, signed by the officer at the head of the Quarter Master General's Department, or by the officer commanding be annexed by your monthly cash accounts.

My Lords will request the Secretay at War to give directions, that these instructions may be complied with in

so far as the military officers are concerned, and they rely on a punctual adherence to them on your part.

B .- It will be observed, that it is the principle of the above regulation to permit a larger relative proportion of admeasurement in respect of the weight allowed, than would be admitted according to the commercial proportion, which is 40 cubic feet, or a ton in admeasurement for 20 hundred weight, or ton in weight; but in no case is the weight allowed by this regulation to exceed, when packed, the admeasurement of 5 cubic feet for one hundred

1. The allowance of baggage for detachments of troops, companies, or services, is to be in the same proportion as the part may bear to the whole.

2. Staff officers, cavalry officers, and mounted officers of infantry, when proceeding by water, to be allowed specially to embark, besides the weight of baggage according to their respective ranks, the equipment for each horse required to be kept by them in the execution of their public duties, and forage at the public expense, in the following proportions, viz.

For one horse 10 cubic feet admeasurement. For the second and every other horse in addition, 5

3. The arms and accoutrements of the infantry, and the arms, appointments, and saddlery of the men and horses of the cavalry, when conveyed by Sea, are to be so conveyed at the public expense, without reference to the weight or admeasurement allowed for the heavy baggage of the troops or companies.

4. Regimental brevet officers are not to be allowed the quantities according to their brevet rank, unless they

may be in the performance of the duties attaching to the brevet rank.

5. When an officer is ordered to proceed on duty to an out-station, where for his reasonable comfort and convenience it may, in the opinion of the officer commanding the troops, be necessary that he should provide himself with a Tent or Marquee out of his own funds, the same, with its appurtenances, is to be conveyed at the public expense, in addition to the quantity of baggage allowed by this regulation.

6. In Southern Africa, and in the Australian Colonies, when an officer is ordered to proceed on duty to an outstation, where the necessaries and conveniences of life are not to be procured on the spot, or within a reasonable distance, the General or other officer commanding at the station from which the said officer is detached may, upon an application to that effect, grant his authority for the carriage, at the public expense of 2 cwt. additional of baggage, or its equivalent in admeasurement, belonging to the said officer, and in cases where the officer, owing to the distance of the station to which he may be ordered, and its remoteness from any town, may appear to have a just claim to have a larger allowance of baggage conveyed at the public expense, the General officer commanding will consider such cases to be special, and report the whole of the circumstances for the consideration of the So-Scretary at War,

7. When a married officer is provided with a passage in a vessel belonging to, or freighted or chartered by 7. When a married officer is provided with a passage in a vessel belonging to, or freighted or chartered by Government, and under the terms of the engagement, there shall be spare room in the vessel, not otherwise required of the public service, or when by land it may be necessary to hire such means of conveyance for the authorized quantities of baggage belonging to the officers and men as shall admit of some addition being made without incumbrance, discretion is given in those cases to the officer commanding, to direct that a limited quantity of the baggage belonging to the family of a married officer may be at the same time conveyed; but it is to be distinctly understood, that on no pretence whatever is an expense to be incurred for this object, nor under any circumstances is the additional baggage of the married officer to be conveyed in diminution of the baggage allowed by this regulation to the other officers and men of the corps or detachment.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 29th April 1818.

ACT No. -- or 1848.

An Act for better enforcing the attendance of pro-prietors and farmers of land before Collectors of Land Revenue in the Bengal Presidency.

prictors and farmers of land before Collectors of Land Revenue in the Bengal Presidency.

Whereas by Clause 3, Section 13 of Regulation II. 1819, and by Section 19 of Regulation VII. 1822, and Section 3, Regulation IX. 1825 of the Bengal Code, provision is made for the imposition of a daily fine by the Board of Revenue, or other authority exercising the powers of that Board, on any proprietor or farmer of land, subject to the provisions contained in the recited Clauses and Sections of the said several Regulations, who when duly summoned by the Collector or Commissioner shall omit or refuse to attend, or to cause his Officer or Agent to attend, or to furnish the accounts or documents required; and shall not shew sufficient cause for such omission; and it is further provided in and by the first recited Regulation, that the fine when confirmed by Government is to be levied by the same process as is prescribed for the recovery of arrears of revenue; and whereas in many cases by the delay thus occasioned, the progress of the survey is hindered, and the whole burden of the penalty is greatly increased beyond what would be necessary, if summary power were given to the Officer by whom the Requisition is made, to impose and levy reasonable fines, subject to review by the Commissioner of Revenue and other superior authority, it is enacted as follows:

I. If any proprietor or farmer of land shall omit or

review by the Commissioner of Revenue and other superior authority, it is enacted as follows:

I. If any proprietor or farmer of land shall omit or refuse to attend, or to cause his Officer or Agent to attend, when duly summoned by the Collector, in any of

the cases specified in the recited Regulations, or either of them, by the time prescribed in the notice issued by the Collector, or shall omit or refuse to furnish the accounts or documents required, and shall not shew sufficient every few and shall not show sufficient every few and sh counts or documents required, and shall not shew sufficient cause for such omission, the Collector or other Officer empowered to make the requisition shall be empowered to impose of his own authority such daily fine, to be payable daily until he complies with the Collector's requisition, as such Collector or other Officer may think adequate to his situation and circumstances in life, not exceeding in any case the daily fine of 50 Rupees: and the amount of such fine accruing due from time to time may be levied without further confirmation by the same process as is prescribed for the recoveryof arrears of revenue.

II. The Collector shall forthwith report the imposition of every such fine, and the amount thereof, and also from time to time the amount levied, to the Commissioner of Revenue, who shall report the same for the

information of the local Government.

information of the local Government.

III. Every order passed by a Collector, or person exercising the powers of a Collector under this Act, shall be appealable in the usual manner to the Commissioner of Revenue, and other superior authority, but no such appeal shall avail to prevent the levy of any fine so imposed pending the appeal.

IV. Whenever the amount levied under any such order issued for any default by authority of a Collector or person exercising the power of a Collector under this Act, shall have exceeded 500 Rupees, the Collector shall report the case specially to the Commissioner of Revenue, and no further levy for such default shall be made otherwise than by authority of the Commissioner of Revenue. sioner of Revenue.

Nothing in this Act contained shall be deemed to repeal the power of imposing daily fines, and of levying the fines so imposed in the manner prescribed by the

said Regulations.

Whereas by sundry Regulations of the Bengal and Madras Codes, it is provided, that the Convicts sentenced to confinement for life, are to have inscribed on their forcheads their name, and crime of which they have been convicted, the date of the sentence passed against them, and the name of the Division, by the Court of which it may have been passed; and whereas it is thought fit to abolish wholly the practice of branding convicts throughout the Territories under the Going convicts throughout the Territories under the Government of the East In Jia Company, It is enacted as

I. Section 11 of Regulation IV: 1797, Section 35 of Regulation VII. 1803, and Clauses Second, Third, and Fourth, in Section 12 of Regulation XVII. 1817, of the Bengal Code; Section 35 of Regulation VII. 1802, of the Madras Code, and all other Regulations or parts of Regulations in force directing that any convicted of of the Madras Code, and all other Regulations or parts of Regulations in force, directing that any convicted offenders shall have any indelible ark made upon their foreheads, or on any other part of their persons, are rescinded; and after the passing of this Act it shall not be lawful for any Court or Magistrate within the Territories under the Government of the East India Company, to order that any brand or indelible mark of any kind be wide or received on any part of the person of any made or renewed on any part of the person of any convicted offender.
