Is hereby given, that persons desirous of entering into a contract for supplying Provisions, Teas, &c. to the European troops, Commissariat and Indian Naval Departments, House of Correction and County Gaol, and for such other purposes as may from time to time be required, for the term of seven months and nine days—namely, from the 23d July next, to the 28th Feb. 1849,—may, on application at this office from 10 A. M. till 5 P. M., duily (Sundays excepted), obtain a list of prices and such other information relating thereto as they may require.

Verbal offers for the contract will be received at this office on Tuesday the 13th proximo, when persons will be required to bid a per centage above or below the prices exhibited in the above mentioned list, at which they will undertake to furnish the whole of the articles therein embraced, of unexceptionable quality, in such number or quantity as may from time to time be demanded; on the distinct understanding, that all the provisions &c. are to be supplied in a cleaned state, free from refuse, sediment or dirt of any kind, and that the whole of the articles are to be of the best description of the sort or kind demanded, and shall be liable to be rejected if not approved of by a committee of officers appointed at the place of delivery to examine the same, whose decision is to be final. And further, that they are to be delivered by measure or weight as follows, viz:

Supplies to the Commissariat, at any of the Commissariat Godowns, or any other place which may be indicated; and for the troops, at the Regimen-

tal stores or such other places as may be appointed for their receipt.

Supplies to the Indian Navy to be weighed and conveyed from the Commissariat stores to the water's edge, and placed in boats if required,

Supplies for the House of Correction and County Gaol, at those places respectively.

The contractor shall also be required to supply under his contract Teas Black (Pouchong) and Green (Hyson) to the Hospitals at the Presidency, and to the Executive Commissariat Departments for Hospital purposes at out-stations, including Scinde and Aden, if required by the Executive Commissariat officer.

It is to be distinctly understood, that payment for the supplies obtained at the Presidency for transmission to out-stations, including Scinde and Aden, shall not be made until the receipts of acknowledgment are received from the receiving Departments.

No person will be allowed to bid for the contract unless he or they previously deposit in this office the sum of Rupces (3000) three thousand in cash, which will be forfeited in the event of delay, evasion, or refusal to execute the necessary deed of contract. Should his offer be accepted, he must be prepared to add thereto a further sum of Rupces (2,265) two thousand two hundred and sixty-five, making in all Rupces 5265 in cash, and unexceptionable bonded security to the extent of Rupces (21,061) twenty-one thousand and sixty one, to be held by Government for the due performance of his contract.

The contractor will be required to sign and seal a contract stipulating to the above effect, and that he or they shall comply immediately with all emergent demands for the articles included in the abovementioned list, and others of less argency must be met within the period stated in the requisitions made upon him or them; in failure whereof, and if the supply be condemned by the committee of officers as aforesaid, it shall, or such other as may be required in lieu, be purchased by this department without reservation at his or their risk and loss; and in all such cases an advance of (30) thirty per cent. upon the amount of expences incurred, or a fine of Rupees (50) lifty, at the option of the executive officer, will be levied as liquidated damages for each and every such breach of contract as often as the same may occur. And the contract may in all such cases be put an end to on the part of the East India Company.

The amount of retrenchments made by the Military Board on the contractors' bills, will be recovered from the first bills presented for payment by the contractors, but in the event of such retrenchments being subsequently removed, the amount thereof will be returned to them.

The annual outlay of the above contract is estimated at Rupees 105,307 or thereabouts. All further particulars will be communicated at the time of bidding, and no reason will be assigned for the rejection of any offer.

And £10 for any vessel not conveying the last Overland Mail, but bringing an Overland newspaper of the latest date, not already received in the Colony, and which shall be delivered within 80 days after publication, and be made public in the exchange room immediately after the arrival of the said vessel.

The Post Master General having been informed by the Court of Directors of the East India Company, that on and after the first June next, persons in this country may forward private correspondence by the Government Express from Bombay to Calcutta, and Madras; all . persons desirous of availing themselves of this privilege will be required to mark upon the covers of their letters the words "by Express from Bombay," and in addition to this special address it will not be necessary that all letters intended to be forwarded by the way of Southampton should be so endorsed as hitherto.

The postage to be charged in India on the delivery of letters sent by this Express, will be, in addition to the ordinary inland rates,

One rupee for every letter not exceeding half a tola in weight.

Two rupees for every letter above half a tola, but not exceeding one tola in weight. Four rupees for every letter above one tola,

but not exceeding two tolas in weight, two tolas being the maximum weight of letters to be conveyed by Express.

On Newspapers.—Each newspaper office in Calcutta and Madras will be allowed to receive two newspapers at the ordinary rates of Inland postage; on all other newspapers forwarded by Express, a postage of five rupees each will be charged, and no newspaper will be received for the Express exceeding three tolas in weight.

N. B.—One tola and a quarter is nearly equivalent to half an ounce avoirdupois.

ACT NO -

To abolish the practice of Branding Convicts. Whereas by sundry Regulations of the Bengal and Madras Codes, it is provided, that the Convicts sentenced to confinement for life, are to have inscribed on

their foreheads their name, and crime of which they have been convicted, the date of the sentence passed against them, and the name of the Division, by the Court of which it may have been passed; and whereas it is thought fit to abolish wholly the practice of branding convicts throughout the Territories under the Government of the East In lia Company, It is enacted as

fullows:

I. Section 11 of Regulation IV. 1797, Section 35 of Regulation VII. 1803, and Clauses Second, Third, and Fourth, in Section 12 of Regulation XVII. 1817, of the Bengal Code; Section 35 of Regulation VII. 1802, of the Madras Code, and all other Regulations or parts of Regulations in force, directing that any convicted offenders shall have any indelible mark made upon their foreheads, or on any other part of their persons, are rescinded; and after the passing of this Act it shall not be lawful for any Court or Magistrate within the Territories under the Government of the East India Company, to order that any brand or indelible mark of any kind be made or renewed on any part of the person of any convicted offender.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for

general information.

An Act for the appointment of an Administrator General of unrepresented Estates in Bengal and for the regutation of that Office, and for the regulation of the Offices of the Supreme Court of Judicature at Fort William in Bengal.

Whereas by an Act of Parliament passed in a Session holden in the 30th and 40th years of the reign of King George III, entitled "An Act for establishing further Regulations for the Government of the British Territories in India, and for the better Administration of Justice within the same," it was amongst other things provided, that from and after the First day of March in the year of Our Lord One Thousand Eight Hundred and One, whenever any British Subject should die intestate within either of the Presidencies of Fort William, Fort St. George, or Bombay respectively, or the Territories subordinate to either of the said Presidencies, or to become subordinate thereto, and on the return of the citation issued from the proper Ecclesiastical Court, no next of Kin or Creditor should appear and make out their claim to the Administration of the Effects of the intestate deceased to the satisfaction of the said Court, it should and might be lawful for the Registrar of such Court respectively, and he was thereby required to apply for, and such Court was thereby required and directed to grant such Letters ad Colligenda, or of Administration, as to such Court should seem meet, by virtue whereof such Registrar should collect the assets of the deceased, and should bring them for safe custody into such Court; and account for them regularly in like manner as was then by Law provided in cases where assets were in the hands of any Officer of the Court under or by virtue of the Equitable jurisdiction of any such Court: And whereas by a certain other Act of Parliament passed in the 55th year of the same reign, entitled "An Act to amend so much of an Act of the 30th year of Ilis present Majesty as relates to fixing the limits of the Towns of Calcutta, Madras, and Bombay; and also so much of an Act of the 30th and 40th year of Ilis present Majesty as relates to the granting of Letters of Administration to the Effects of persons dying intestate within the several Presidencies in the East Indies to the Registrar of the Ecclesiastical

distinct accounts of each Estate, and of all such sums of Money, Bonds, and other Securities for Money, Goods, Effects and things, as should come to his hands or to the hands of any persons employed by him, or in trust for him, by virtue of any Letters ad Colligenda, or of Administration granted to him under the authority of the said Act, and likewise of all payments made by him for and on account of the said Estates, and of all debts due by or to the same, specifying the dates of such receipts and payments respectively, which said book should be kept in the Registrar's Office, and should be open for the inspection of all such persons practitioners in the said Courts and others as might have occasion to inspect the same, at office hours, paying such reasonable fee as might be fixed therefore by the said Courts and no more; and the said Registrar sould twice in every year, that is, on the First day of March and on the Twenty-second day of October, or on the First day after those days on which their respective Courts should be sitting, exhibit and deliver in open Court, a true and perfect Schedule of all sums of Money, Bonds, or other Securities received on account of each Estate remaining under their charge, together with the payments made thereout and the balances; and also of all Administrations whereof the balances; should have been paid over to the persons entitled to the same, since the period of exhibiting the last Schedule, specifying the amount of such balances, and the persons to whom paid, which should be filed of record in the said Courts, and should within fourteen days afterwards be published in the Gazette of the Presidencies within which such Courts are respectively situated, by the said Registrar, who should likewise cause copies thereof in triplicate to be delivered to the Chief Secretary of such Presidency, and the same should be transmitted by the respective Governors at such Presidencies to the Court of Directors of the East India Company, who upon the receipt thereof should cause the same to

Commission heretofore received by the Ecclesiastical Registrar, and

Every person who having been sworn or having taken a solemn Affirmation under this Act, shall wilfully give false testimony upon any examination authorized by this Act, shall be deemed guilty of perjury, and if convicted thereof, shall be liable to fine and imprisonment, or to fine or imprisonment, which imprisonment may be at the discretion of the Court with or without hard labour, and may extend to two years.

XIV. From and after the passing of this Act the Master of the Supreme Court shall, in addition to the duties now performed by him, perform also the duties of Ecclesiastical Equity and Admiralty Registrar, and shall also on the next vacation of the Office of Sworn Clerk perform the duties of that Office.

XV. From and after the passing of this Act the Taxing Officer of the Supreme Court shall, in addition to the duties of the several Offices now held by him, and on the next vacancy of the several Offices of Examiner in the Insolvent Court and of Attorney for Paupers, discharge also the duties of those Offices. ing taken a solemn Affirmation under this Act, shall wil-

An Act for the Punishment of Wandering gangs of Thieves and Robbers.

Whereas it is expedient to extend some of the Provisions of the Law for the conviction of Thugs and Dacoits to other gangs of Thieves and Robbers, It is enacted as follows:

1. Whose-ever shall be proved to have belonged either before or after the passing of this Act to any wandering gang of persons, associated for the purposes of theft or robbery, not being a gang of Thugs or Dacoits, shall be punished with imprisonment with hard labour for any term not exceeding seven years.

II. Any person accused of the offence of belonging to any such gang as a foresaid, or of the offence of unlawfully and knowingly receiving or buying property stolen or plandered by any such gang, may be committed by any Magistrate within the Territories of the East India Company, and may be tried by any Court which India Company, and may be tried by any Court which would have been competent to try him if his offence had been committed within the Zillah where that Court

III. No Court shall, on the trial of any offence under this Act, require any Futwa from any Law Officer.

Whereas it hath been doubted how far Section V. of Whereas it hath been doubted now far section Y. of Regulation IX. 1831, of the Bengal Code, is repealed by Act XXXI. 1841, and it is expedient to remove such doubt, and to establish one rule of proceeding for the revision of the sentences of Subordinate Criminal Courts throughout the Presidencies of Bengal and Madras, It is enacted as follows:—
I. So much of Section V. of Regulation IX. 1831,

I. So much of Section V. of Regulation IX. 1831, of the Bengal Code, as is now in force, and also Section XXXV. of Act VII. 1843, are repealed.

II. The several Courts of Nizamut Adawlut in the Presidency of Bengal, and of Foujdaree Adawlut in the Presidency of Vadras, in any case in which it shall appear to either of them, upon a review of the Abstract Statements or Calendars of prisoners punished without reference, that the sentence passed is one which cannot lawfully be passed on a person convicted of the offence as stated in the Abstract Statement or Calendar shall require the Judge of the Court in which the dar, shall require the Judge of the Court in which the conviction was had, to certify under his hand the offence of which the prisoner was convicted, and the sentence passed thereupon; and on the return of such Certifi-cate the Court of Nizamut Adawlut or Foujdarce Adawnt, as the case may be, shall annul the sentence, if it could not be lawfully passed on a person convicted of such offence, and shall certify to the Court below the sentence or sentences which may lawfully be passed for such offence, and thereupon the Court below shall pass a new sentence according to Law, and shall amend the record is converted to the court below shall passed for the court below shall passed for the court below shall amend the record in accordance therewith.

III. The said Courts of Nizamut Foujdarce Adawlut, in any case in which it shall appear to either of them, upon a review of the Abstract Statements or Calendars of prisoners punished without Statements or Catendars of prisoners punished without reference that the verdict or judgment was contrary to the evidence, or that the sentence was too severe, may, if they shall think fit, require the Judge of the Court in which the conviction was had, to certify under his hand the offence of which the prisoner was convicted, and the sentence passed thereupon, with the evidence and the sentence passed thereupon, with the evidence on which such conviction was had, and any observations which he may be desirous of making in explanation of the verdict, judgment, or sentence; and thereupon the Court of Nizamut Adawlut or Fonjdaree Adawlut, as the case may be, may annual such verdict, judgment, and sentence, if the verdict or judgment shall appear to them contrary to the evidence, or mitigate the sentence, if it shall appear to them too severe, and in either case shall certify their proceedings to the Court in which the conviction was had, which shall thereupon make such orders as shall be conformable to the decimake such orders as shall be conformable to the decision of the Court of Nizamut Adawlut or Foundaree Adawlut, and, if necessary, amend the record in accordance therewith.

Whereas it is expedient to substitute Stamp Duties for Institution Fees in the Courts of the District Moonsiffs in the Presidency of Madras, and to authorize the

return of the whole or part of the Stamp Duties paid on Plaints in all Civil Actions which are dimissed on ap-

Plaints in all Civil Actions which are dimissed on application of the parties, It is enacted as follows:—

I. Section XVI. and Clause 2, Section LVIII. of Regulation VI. of 1816, and Sections IV. and V. of Regulation II. of 1834, of the Madras Code, shall be repealed from the first day of September in this year.

II. From and after the said first day of September, so much of Regulation XIII. 1816, and Section VII. of Regulation VII. 1818, of the Madras Code, as relates to the levying of Stamp Duties instead of Fees on the institution of Civil actions, shall be applicable to the Courts of District Moonsiffs in the Presidency of Madras. Madras.

III. Whenever a suit pending in any Civil Court within the Territories subject to the Presidency of Madras shall be dismissed on application of the parties, the plaintiff shall be entitled to claim from the Court a Certificate, stating the amount of Stamp Duty paid on the Plaint, with specification of the number and endorsement of the paper filed, and whether the suit was dismissed before or after the case was called up, or was on the list of causes ready for hearing.

IV. On presenting any such Certificate to the Collector of the District, the plaintiff shall be entitled to receive back half of the said Stamp Duty, if the certificate purports that the suit was dismissed after the case was called up, or was on the list of causes ready for hearing, and if before, the whole of the said Stamp Duty. Provided always there be no exception taken to the paper or endorsement thereon.
