PROCLAMATION.

BOMBAY TO WIT. By virtue of a precept to me directed, I hereby proclaim and give notice, that the Sessions of Oyer and Terminer and general Gaol Delivery, will be holden before the Supreme Court of Judicature at Bombay, at the Court House, on Wednesday the 5th of July next, at eleven o'clock in the forenoon, for the trial of all Treasons, Murders, and other Felonies, Perjuries, Trespasses, and other Crimes and Misdemeanors, had, done, or committed within the Town and Island of Bombay, and the limits thereof, and the Factories subordinate thereto, and also to enquire, hear, and determine, in like manner, all Treasons, Murders, Felonies, Forgeries, Perjuries, Crimes, Extortions, Misdemeanors, Trespasses, Wrongs, Oppressions, had, done, or committed, by any of Her Majesty's British Subjects, in any of the Territories which now are subject to, or dependant upon, the said Government of Bombay, or within any of the Dominions of the Native Princes of India, in alliance with the said Government.

And also, that at the same time and place, will be holden a Session of Admiralty, for the trial of all Treasons, Murders, Piracies, Robberies, Trespasses, Misdemeanors, and other Crimes and Offences, had, done, perpetrated or committed on the High Seas.

And I hereby give notice to all persons bound to prosecute, and give evidence, at the above Sessions, or in any way concerned therein, that they are to attend, at the time and place above mentioned, and not to depart without leave of the Court.

And I hereby give notice to all Justices of the Peace, Coroners, Escheators, and also all Chief Constables and Bailiffs of the Town and Island of Bombay, and the limits thereof, that they be then and there, in their own persons, with their Rolls, Records, Indictments, and other Remembrances, to do those things which to their offices in that behalf appertain to be done. POST OFFICE NOTICES.

Notice is hereby given, that under instructions from the Government of India, letters posted in Bombay cannot be received for transmission by the Government Expresses despatched hence to Calcutta and Madras on the arrival of the Overland Mails, those Expresses being specially intended for Europe letters and intelligence.

It is hereby notified for general information, that letters addressed to any of the settlements to the Eastward via Point De Galle, and forwarded in a ship's bag to Colombo or Point De Galle, instead of through the Post Office, cannot be despatched, unless on payment there of the Colonial and British Packet postage due thereon.

The following extract from the new Post Office ordinance recently passed at the Mauritius, is published for general information.

ART. 22.—The following premiums shall be given to the Masters or Commanders of Vessels bringing Mails or Overland Newspapers to Mauritius under the annexed condition:—

£30 for any vessels touching expressly for the purpose of landing the *Overland Post office Mail*, upon proof of the vessel having sailed from the Port at which such Mail was taken on board within five days after the arrival thereof of the said mail.

£30 for any vessel bringing the same, upon proof of the vessel having sailed within 48 hours of the arrival of the Mail as above described.

£20 for any vessel upon proof of the vessel having sailed within five days of the said arrival.

And £10 for any vessel not conveying the last Overland Mail, but bringing an *Overland newspaper* of the latest date, not already received in the Colony, and which shall be delivered within 80 days after publication, and be made public in the exchange room immediately after the arrival of the said vessel.

In consequence of several complaints recently made, the Post Master General requests the attention of the public to the following extract from Clause VI. of the Post Office Rules, 30th August 1837.

"Newspapers, printed papers or parcels, will not be received bearing postage, unless the sender shall give his name and address, in order that the regulated postage may be recovered from him in case of such paper or parcel being refused by the party addressed."

Parties coming to the General Post Office to enquire for letters awaiting their arrival, are requested to make application to the "Dead and Unclaimed Letter Department" in the South wing of the building.

The following Notification by H. M. Post Master General of London, is republished for general information:

BY COMMAND OF THE POST MASTER GENERAL.
NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC.

GENERAL POST OFFICE, MAY 1847.

The Post Master General having been informed by the Court of Directors of the East India Company, that on and after the first June next, persons in this country may forward private correspondence by the Government Express from Bombay to Calcutta, and Madras; all persons desirous of availing themselves of this privilege will be required to mark upon the covers of their letters the words "*by Express from Bombay*," and in addition to this special address it will not be necessary that all letters intended to be forwarded by the way of Southampton should be so endorsed as hitherto.

The postage to be charged in India on the delivery of letters sent by this Express, will be, in addition to the ordinary inland rates,

One rupee for every letter not exceeding half a tola in weight.

Two rupees for every letter above half a tola, but not exceeding one tola in weight.

Four rupees for every letter above one tola, but not exceeding two tolas in weight, two tolas being the maximum weight of letters to be conveyed by Express.

On Newspapers.—Each newspaper office in Calcutta and Madras will be allowed to receive two newspapers at the ordinary rates of Inland postage; on all other newspapers forwarded by Express, a postage of five rupees each will be charged, and no newspaper will be received for the Express exceeding three tolas in weight.

N. B.—One tola and a quarter is nearly equivalent to half an ounce avoirdupois.

The subjoined extract from Section LIX of the Post Office rules of 30th August 1837, is published for general information:

"Letters which individuals address on their private affairs to any Government officers must be sent post paid."

Parties addressing the Post Master General or Deputy respecting their private letters and parcels, and superscribing "*Service*" on such communications, render themselves liable to the penalty prescribed in Section V. Act XX. of 1838.

Bombay, Genl. Post Office, 21st Dec. 1847.

It is hereby notified for general information, that in future the Steamers belonging to the Bombay Steam Navigation Company will start with the Mails on the undermentioned dates, viz :

From Bombay on the 2nd, 12th, and 22d of each month.

From Kurrachee on the 7th, 17th, and 27th do. instead of on the dates specified in the Postal Notification of the 27th October last.

The following extract from H. M's Treasury Warrant, dated the 7th October 1847, is published for general information.

" Now we, the undersigned, in exercise of all powers and authorities enabling us in this behalf, do hereby order and direct, that any such privileged person as is named in the said Act, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, and also every seaman employed abroad in the service of the East India Company, whilst actually employed in the service of such Company, may both send and receive letters, not exceeding half an ounce in weight, by private ships, between any two of Her Majesty's Colonies, whether through the United Kingdom or not, on their own private concerns, in like manner as the privileged persons* mentioned in the said Act,

passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, are authorized to send and receive letters, not exceeding half an ounce in weight, on their own private concerns, between the United Kingdom and places beyond the Seas. Provided, that whenever the letters sent or received by any such persons privileged under this warrant shall be conveyed, or intended to be conveyed, by private ships, the gratuities payable by law to the Masters of such vessels, in respect of such letters, shall in all cases be paid to the Post Office in addition to such postage."

With the view to prevent disappointment, parties who call at the Post Office to receive Overland letters, or to post prepaid letters, are reminded, with reference to Sections XXIV and XXXI of the Post Office rules of 30th August 1837, that letters cannot be delivered except on payment of the postage, and that no change will be given in any case.

Notice is hereby given, that a regular Post line has been established between Gogo and Ahmedabad, and that letters and parcels may be posted in future at the Post Offices at Dholka, Dholera, Bhownuggur, and Gogo.

Letters for Great Britain can be forwarded via Madras "prepaid" the whole way, on payment of the Steam postage in addition to the Express postage.

The subjoined extract, Section XXVIII. of the Post Office Rules, is published for general information.

" Section XXVIII.—In order to protect as far as possible the Public Mails from the chance of robbery, Officers in charge of Post Offices shall not knowingly receive money, bullion, precious stones, or jewels, for despatch either by Letter or Bhanga post."

General Orders,

BY THE RIGHT HONORABLE THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

MILITARY DEPARTMENT.

BOMBAY CASTLE, 15TH JUNE 1848.

No. 355 of 1848.—An order by Major Morris, dated Bombay the 26th May 1848, Appointing Lieutenant Champion to act as Adjutant to the detachment of the 24th Regiment Native Infantry, proceeding to Tannah, is confirmed.

No. 356 of 1848.—The Right Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased to re-publish the following General Order by the Right Honorable the Governor General of India in Council, dated Fort William, 20th May 1843.

The Right Honorable the Governor General in Council is pleased to publish, for general information, the following Para. of a Military Letter from the Honorable the Court of Directors, to the Governor of the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal, No. 23, dated the 21st March 1848.

Letter dated 6th November, 1847, No. 179.

Certain questions relating to the grant of "Wound Gratuities" of Native Officers.

Para. 21.—It was understood by us, that the grant, in General Order of 13th August 1833, of Wound Pensions and allowances to Native Commissioned officers, to be governed strictly by the rules applicable to European officers, as published in General Order of 3rd June 1831, included gratuities for such Native officers as had been seriously wounded, but not to such an extent as to entitle them to pensions. The Gratuities equal to one year's pay of their regimental rank granted by you, in the year 1846, to two Native Commissioned officers, who were severely wounded in the Battle of Sobraon, were accordingly approved by us as having been made in conformity with the regulations of the service*. A similar course will be taken by us in any future case of a like nature. The donations are to be always reckoned as so many months of regimental pay according to the nature and extent of the injury sustained.

No. 357 of 1848.—The Right Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased to re-publish the following General Orders by the Right Honorable the Governor General of India in Council, dated Fort William 20th May 1843.

The following paragraphs of a Military Letter, No. 8, from the Hon'ble the Court of Directors, to the Governor General of India in Council, under date the 1st April 1846, and Her Majesty's Warrant therein referred to, are published for general information.

Para. 1. "We transmit herewith a copy of a Circular Letter, No. 958, issued by the Secretary at War, with its accompanying copy of the Royal Warrant, dated 19th December 1845, granting rewards for Meritorious Service, and for Good Conduct of Non-commissioned officers and soldiers of Her Majesty's army.

Para. 2. You will cause to be introduced into Regulations for the European Troops in the Company's service, such of the provisions of this Warrant as extend or modify the rules of previous Good Conduct Warrants, which have 12 to 21, 25, 27 and 30, and 33, 38 to } been already made applicable to Non-commissioned officers and privates of 40, and 42. } those troops. The numbers of the articles in the Warrant which come under this description, are specified in the margin.

Para. 3. Certain additional advantages have been granted by this Warrant, which we are desirous should also be granted to our European Troops; they are, 1st,—By Articles 2 to 4, special grants accompanied by Medals, to Serjeants, as rewards for distinguished or meritorious service. The number of Serjeants eligible to receive these benefits in the Company's Service, to be restricted to numbers proportionate to those allowed in Her Majesty's Service; 2ndly,—By Articles 5 to 11, Gratuities and Medals, to certain Non-commissioned officers and privates on discharge; and 3rdly,—By Article 28, permission to purchase discharges, or to obtain discharges, granted at diminished periods of service, in favor of men who have obtained one or more distinguishing marks for good conduct. The rates of purchase in the Company's Service to remain as at present."

With reference to the above, the Right Hon'ble the Governor General in Council is pleased to issue the following rules, extending the provisions of Her Majesty's Warrant of the 19th December 1845, to the Honorable Company's Troops, as far as the same can be considered applicable to Indian service.

1st. A sum of money, the extent of which will be hereafter announced, is to be distributed for the purpose of granting Annuities, as rewards for distinguished or meritorious service, to Serjeants who are now or who may be hereafter in the Hon'ble Company's Service, either while serving, or after discharge, with or without pension, in sums not exceeding £20, which may be held during service, and together with pension.

2nd. The Serjeants selected for this honorary distinction, to be entitled to receive and wear a Silver Medal, having on one side the Company's Arms, and on the other the words "For Meritorious Service," and the name and regiment of the Serjeant, with the date of its grant.

3rd. It shall rest with the Commander in Chief to select the individuals whom he may recommend for this honorable mark of approbation.

4th. With the view of further rewarding meritorious soldiers when discharged, and of encouraging good conduct in others while serving, a gratuity in addition to the ordinary pension may be granted upon discharge to certain men, who shall have served 21 years in the Company's army.

5th. The Commanding officer of every Regiment, Brigade, or Battalion, may annually recommend such individuals, while serving, as he shall consider will be best entitled to this gratuity when discharged, provided the amount recommended in any one year does not exceed £30 for a Regiment, Brigade, or Battalion, of an establishment of 700 rank and file and upwards, and £20 for one of a lower establishment than 700 rank and file.

6th. The men to be recommended, must have completed 21 years of actual service, have never been convicted by a Court Martial, and must have borne an irreproachable character; or if not coming strictly within these latter conditions, must have particularly distinguished themselves, by gallantry and zeal, in the service.

7th. Soldiers recommended to receive upon their discharge the gratuity for good conduct, shall, upon being approved by the Commander in Chief, be entitled to wear a silver Medal, having on one side the words, "For long Service and Good Conduct," and on the other side, in relief, the Company's Arms, with the name and rank of the soldier. This medal will be delivered to the soldier on parade, by the Commanding officer of the corps, and shall be worn by him during the remainder of his service.

8th. The year of the soldier's discharge shall also be inscribed on the medal, which will be returned to him, with the Parchment certificate of discharge, on which the grant will be recorded, as well as in the Regimental orders, and in the Record of Soldiers' Services.

9th. If circumstances should prevent the discharged soldier from receiving the Medal at the regiment, it will be delivered to him through the Adjutant General of the army.

10th. These gratuities will be paid under the directions of the Governor General in Council, to whom the Commander in Chief will notify the individuals selected previously to their discharge: the names and services of the individuals receiving the gratuity shall be published in regimental orders.

11th. All corporals, trumpeters, drummers, fifers, buglers, and private soldiers, enlisted, or re-enlisted into the Hon'ble Company's service, on or after the 1st day of September 1836, shall have no claim to additional pay, after any period of service, but that a reward of additional pay for good conduct shall be granted to such soldiers, under the following Rules, which shall take place from and after the 1st of January 1846.

12th. Soldiers who shall have completed 5 years' service, shall be entitled to claim 1*d.* a day, and to wear a distinguishing mark, provided their names shall not have been entered in the Regimental Defaulter's Book for at least two years immediately preceding such claim.

13th. Soldiers who shall have completed 10 years' service, shall be entitled to claim a further reward of 1*d.* a day, and to wear two distinguishing marks; provided they shall have been uninterruptedly in the enjoyment of the 1*d.* a day for at least two years immediately preceding such further claim.

14th. Soldiers who shall have completed 15 years' service, shall be entitled to claim a further reward of 1*d.* a day, and to wear three distinguishing marks; provided they shall have been uninterruptedly in the enjoyment of 2*d.* a day for two years immediately preceding their claim to the third penny.

15th. Soldiers who shall have completed 20 years' service, shall be entitled to claim a further reward of 1*d.* a day, and wear four distinguishing marks; provided they shall have been uninterruptedly in the enjoyment of the 3*d.* a day for two years immediately preceding their claim to the fourth penny.

16th. Soldiers who shall have completed 25 years' service, shall be entitled to claim a further reward of 1*d.* a day, and to wear five distinguishing marks; provided they shall have been uninterruptedly in the enjoyment of the 4*d.* a day for two years immediately preceding their claim to the fifth penny.

17th. Soldiers who shall have completed 30 years' service, shall be entitled to claim a further reward of 1*d.* a day, and to wear six distinguishing marks; provided they shall have been uninterruptedly in the enjoyment of the 5*d.* a day for two years immediately preceding their claim to the sixth penny.

18th. As a further reward of continuous good conduct, soldiers who shall have completed 18 years' service, without having their names entered in the Regimental Defaulter's Book for the last 16 years, shall be allowed the advantage of the good conduct reward hereby granted after 20, 25, and 30 years of actual service, two years earlier, that is to say, after 18, 23, and 28 years' actual service.

19th. The service requisite to entitle men to the distinction and rewards granted by this Regulation, may include former service, in all ranks, after the age of eighteen.

20th. The forfeiture of service, now attaching to individuals in respect of additional pay, in consequence of the sentence of a Court Martial, or of conviction for desertion, will equally attach to them in respect of Good Conduct Pay.

21st. Soldiers of good conduct, who may be permitted to purchase, or to obtain free discharges at their own request, shall be allowed free discharges upon the following terms; £20 being added on account of Soldiers, educated for the Sappers and Miners, as fixed by Government General Order No. 18, 23rd January 1837.

22nd. Commanding officers of regiments are strictly enjoined to enter in the Regimental Defaulter's Book the name of every soldier, who, in consequence of misconduct, shall have been subjected to any punishment beyond six days' drill, or seven days' confinement to Barracks, and the commission of every offence which shall impose upon the Commanding officer the necessity of recording the soldier's name in the Regimental Defaulter's Book, shall render the man ineligible for this reward for two years from that date, and if he be already in possession of this distinction, shall deprive him of his distinguishing mark, and good conduct pay, for one year, and a second recorded offence within twelve months, shall render two years of uninterrupted good conduct necessary to obtain a restoration of such reward.

23rd. The soldier having two or more distinguishing marks, shall in like manner forfeit one of such marks, and the Good Conduct Pay allowed with it, for one year for each offence, and if he shall forfeit all his distinguishing marks, and Good Conduct Pay, and before restoration of any one shall be recorded for a fresh offence, he shall forfeit all claim in consequence of his previous good conduct, and shall only be entitled to obtain a restoration of his honorable distinctions by subsequently serving, with uninterrupted good conduct, for two years, to obtain one distinguishing mark, for four years to obtain two distinguishing marks, for six years to obtain three distinguishing marks, for eight years to obtain four distinguishing marks, for ten years to obtain five distinguishing marks, and for twelve years to obtain six distinguishing marks.

24th. Any soldier who, by having been recorded in the Regimental Defaulter's Book, shall have been adjudged to have been guilty of an offence by which he is to forfeit the whole or a part of his reward for previous good conduct, shall, if he denies the commission of such offence, have the right of appeal to a Court Martial.

25th. A soldier may, for a first offence of a serious nature, be adjudged, by the sentence of a Court Martial, to forfeit all or any part of the advantages he had derived from his previous good conduct, either absolutely, or for any period not less than eighteen months, according to the circumstances which shall have appeared in evidence.

26th. The distinction and the rewards for good conduct, do not extend to Serjeants and other Non-commissioned officers above the rank of corporal, and they will not be allowed, while serving, any addition to their established pay, but if permitted to purchase their discharges, or to obtain free discharges at their own request, they will be admitted to the benefits of Article 28th of this Regulation.

27th. All soldiers now in the Hon'ble Company's service, who enlisted since the 1st March 1833, but before 1st September, 1836, shall have the option of relinquishing all right to the additional pay of 2d. a day, to which they are now entitled after the completion of 14 years' service.

28th. All soldiers now serving, who enlisted on or before the 1st March, 1833, shall, by relinquishing their right to additional pay for length of service, be entitled to claim all the advantages of Good Conduct Pay, while serving, which are hereby granted.

29th. All soldiers now serving, who enlisted on or before the 1st September 1836, and who have completed 20, 25, or 30 years' service, may, on relinquishing their right to additional pay, receive respectively 4d. 5d. or 6d. a day Good Conduct Pay, provided their names shall not have been entered in the Regimental Defaulter's Book immediately preceding the exchange, for the several periods prescribed by this Warrant.

30th. Soldiers who have completed 15 years' service may, on relinquishing their right to additional pay, receive 3d. per diem Good Conduct Pay, provided their names shall not have been entered in the Regimental Defaulter's Book for at least six years immediately preceding the exchange.

31st. Soldiers of less than 15 years' service, already in the receipt of additional pay, at 2d. a day for length of service, may, on relinquishing their right to additional pay, continue to receive the same amount, as Good Conduct Pay, provided their names shall not have been entered in the Regimental Defaulter's Book for at least four years immediately preceding the exchange.

32nd. Soldiers not yet in the receipt of additional pay for length of service, may, by relinquishing their right to the same, receive Good Conduct Pay on completing the respective periods of 5, 10, 15, 20, 25, and 30 years, provided their names shall not have been entered in the Regimental Defaulter's Book, in the first case, for at least two years; in the second case, for at least four years; in the third case, for at least six years; in the fourth case, for at least eight years; in the fifth case, for at least ten years; and in the last case, for at least twelve years, immediately preceding.

REWARDS FOR MERITORIOUS SERVICE, AND FOR GOOD CONDUCT OF NON-COMMISSIONED OFFICERS AND SOLDIERS.

Dated, 19th December 1845.

VICTORIA R.

We deem it expedient to afford a greater encouragement to the Non-commissioned officers and soldiers of our army who may have distinguished themselves, or who may have given good, faithful, and efficient service.

With the view therefore of rewarding distinguished or meritorious service, and of promoting good conduct in our army, our will and pleasure is,

1st. That whenever we shall sanction the grant of a Commission without purchase to a Non-commissioned officer, selected and recommended for this distinction by our Commander in Chief, there shall be granted to such Non-commissioned officer, in aid of an outfit as a commissioned officer, a sum of £150 if appointed to a cavalry regiment, and of £100 if appointed to an infantry regiment.

2nd. It is our further will and pleasure, that a sum not exceeding £2000 a year be distributed, for the purpose of granting Annuities, as rewards for distinguished or meritorious service, to Serjeants who are now, or who may be hereafter in the service, either while serving, or after discharge, with or without pension, in sums not exceeding £20, which may be held during service and together with pension.

3rd. The Serjeants selected for this honorary distinction, to be entitled to receive and wear a Silver Medal, having on one side our effigy, and on the other, the words "For Meritorious Service," and the name and regiment of the serjeant, with the date of its grant.

4th. It shall rest with our Commander in Chief to select the individuals whom he may recommend to us for this honourable mark of our approbation.

5th. With the view of further rewarding meritorious soldiers when discharged, and of encouraging good conduct in others while serving, we are pleased to alter the Warrants of our late Royal Uncles, dated the 14th November 1829, and 7th February 1833, and to direct, that a gratuity in addition to the ordinary pension may be granted upon discharge to certain men, who shall have served 21 years in the infantry, or 24 years in the cavalry.

6th. The Commanding officer of every regiment may annually recommend such individuals while serving as he shall consider will be best entitled to this gratuity when discharged, provided the amount recommended in any one year does not exceed £30 for a regiment of an establishment of 700 rank and file and upwards, and £20 for a regiment of a lower establishment than 700 rank and file.

7th. The men to be recommended, must have completed 21 years of actual service in the infantry, and 24 years of actual service in the cavalry, have never been convicted by a Court Martial, and must have borne an irreproachable character, or if not coming strictly within these latter conditions, must have particularly distinguished themselves by gallantry and zeal in our service.

8th. Soldiers recommended to receive upon their discharge the gratuity for Good Conduct, shall, upon being approved by the Commander in Chief, be entitled to wear a Silver Medal, having on one side the words "For Long Service and Good Conduct," and on the other side in relief, the Royal Arms, with the name and rank of the soldier. This Medal will be delivered to the soldier on parade by the Commanding officer of the regiment, and shall be worn by him during the remainder of his service.

9th. The year of the soldier's discharge shall also be inscribed on the medal, which will be returned to him with the parchment certificate of discharge, on which the grant will be recorded, as well as in the Regimental orders and in the Record of Soldiers' Services.

10th. If circumstances should prevent the discharged soldier from receiving the medal at the regiment, it will be delivered to him through the Adjutant General at the Board of the Commissioners of Chelsea Hospital.

11th. These gratuities will be paid under the directions of the Secretary at War, to whom the Commander in Chief will notify the individuals selected previously to their discharge; the names and services of the individuals receiving the gratuity shall be published in the Regimental Orders, and the Secretary at War will notify them to the parishes to which the men belong.

12th. Whereas it has been represented to us, that it would materially tend to the encouragement of good conduct in the army, if the reward to the well conducted soldier were attainable after shorter periods of service than those stipulated by Our Warrant of the 9th May 1839; Our will and pleasure is, that all Corporals, Trumpeters, Drummers, Fifers, Bnglers, and private Soldiers, enlisted or re-enlisted into our service on or after the 1st day of September 1836, shall have no claim to additional pay after any period of service, but that a reward of additional pay for good conduct shall be granted to such soldiers under the following rules, which shall take effect from and after the 1st of January 1846.

13th. Soldiers who shall have completed five years' service shall be entitled to claim 1*d.* a day, and to wear a distinguishing mark, provided their names shall not have been entered in the Regimental Defaulter's Book, for at least two years immediately preceding such claim.

14th. Soldiers who shall have completed 10 years' service shall be entitled to claim a further reward of 1*d.* a day, and to wear two distinguishing marks, provided they shall have been uninterruptedly in the enjoyment of the 1*d.* a day for at least two years immediately preceding such further claim.

15th. Soldiers who shall have completed 15 years' service shall be entitled to claim a further reward of 1*d.* a day, and to wear three distinguishing marks, provided they shall have been uninterruptedly in the enjoyment of the 1*d.* a day for two years immediately preceding their claim to the third penny.

16th. Soldiers who shall have completed 20 years' service shall be entitled to claim a further reward of 1*d.* a day, and to wear four distinguishing marks, provided they shall have been uninterruptedly in the enjoyment of the 3*d.* a day for two years immediately preceding their claim to the fourth penny.

17th. Soldiers who shall have completed 25 years' service shall be entitled to claim a further reward of 1*d.* a day, and to wear five distinguishing marks, provided they shall have been uninterruptedly in the enjoyment of the 4*d.* a day for two years immediately preceding their claim to the fifth penny.

18th. Soldiers who shall have completed 30 years' service shall be entitled to claim a further reward of 1*d.* a day, and to wear six distinguishing marks, provided they shall have been uninterruptedly in the enjoyment of the 5*d.* a day for two years immediately preceding their claim to the sixth penny.

19th. As a further reward of continuous good conduct, soldiers who shall have completed 18 years' service, without having their names entered in the Regimental Defaulter's Book for the last 16 years, shall be allowed the advantage of the Good Conduct reward hereby granted after 20, 25, and 30 years of actual service, two years earlier, that is to say, after 18, 23, and 28 years' actual service.

20th. The service to entitle soldiers to the rewards granted by this warrant, after each period of five years, must be service in the ranks, continually under the vigilant eye of discipline, in the execution of the ordinary duties of a soldier in barracks or in quarters.

21st. Those soldiers who accept employments, which, by keeping them more out of the control of discipline, expose them to a less chance of being recorded in the Regimental Defaulter's Book, and give them greater facilities of acquiring and retaining the reward for Good Conduct, can only be allowed to receive Good Conduct Pay, and the honorable distinctions, and addition to pension on discharge, after the periods of service prescribed in Our Warrant of the 9th May 1839, except with the special sanction of our Secretary at War.

22nd. Soldiers who by their good conduct shall have obtained one or more distinguishing marks, shall be entitled to have the full rate of that Good Conduct Pay of which they shall have been in uninterrupted possession for three years immediately preceding their discharge, added to the rate of pension, whether temporary or permanent, to which they may have a right under the provisions of the Warrant of our late Royal Uncle, dated the 7th February 1833.

23rd. Soldiers who have been in the possession of some one or other of the rates of Good Conduct Pay for four years uninterruptedly, but who have only been in possession of either of the higher rates for some period not less than two years immediately preceding their discharge, shall be entitled, if discharged with two distinguishing marks, to an addition of 1½*d.*; if discharged with three distinguishing marks, to an addition of 2½*d.*; if discharged with four distinguishing marks to an addition of 3½*d.*; if discharged with five distinguishing marks, to an addition of 4½*d.*; and if discharged with six distinguishing marks, to an addition of 5½*d.*, as an augmentation of the pension to which their services will entitle them under the warrant of the 7th February 1833.

24th. Soldiers who shall have been in the uninterrupted possession of good conduct pay for at least three years immediately preceding their discharge for disability, or by reduction, and who shall not have acquired claims to pension, or who shall be entitled only to temporary or conditional pensions, shall have their names registered at Chelsea Hospital; and upon their attaining 60 years of age shall receive, as a reward for their former good conduct, a pension of 4*d.* a day, if discharged with one distinguishing mark; and of 5*d.* a day, if discharged after having been twelve months in possession of two distinguishing marks; and of 6*d.* a day, if discharged in possession of three distinguishing marks; and this reward for former good conduct shall also be extended to soldiers who may be permitted to obtain free discharge at their own request, as an indulgence, after certain periods of service, as described in the 28th Article of this Warrant. Those soldiers now in our service who accept the employments referred to in the 21st Article of this Warrant, shall have their names registered at Chelsea, under the condition of the Warrant of the 9th of May 1839, but all men enlisted after the date of this Warrant, who may accept such employments, shall only be allowed to register for a deferred pension of 4*d.* a day, if discharged with one distinguishing mark; of 5*d.* a day, if discharged after having been in possession of two distinguishing marks for twelve months; and of 6*d.* a day, after having been for two years in possession of two distinguishing marks.

25th. The service requisite to entitle men to the distinction and rewards granted by this Warrant may include former service in all ranks after the age of eighteen.

26th. Men discharged on reduction, or for disability, and re-enlisting within three years after the date of their discharge, may reckon their former service, provided they shall declare such former service at the time of re-enlistment; but men purchasing their discharges, or receiving free discharges, shall not reckon former service.

27th. The forfeiture of service now attaching to individuals in respect of additional pay, in consequence of the sentence of a Court Martial, or of conviction for desertion will equally attach to them in respect of Good Conduct Pay.

28th. Soldiers of good conduct, who may be permitted to purchase or to obtain free discharges at their own request, shall be allowed free discharges upon the following terms, instead of those prescribed by the Royal Warrant of the 14th November 1829, and by his late Majesty's Warrant of the 7th February 1833, but the conditions, limi-

tions, and regulations, for granting discharges by indulgence laid down in the said Warrants, shall, in the cases of all other soldiers, remain in full force.

Soldiers enlisted since the 1st March 1833, who are in the enjoyment of two or more distinguishing marks, and of the Good Conduct Pay, may obtain permanent pension as an indulgence, at the rate fixed in the Warrant of 7th February 1833, two years earlier than other men who have not earned this distinction, and may further receive the same amount of good conduct pay which would have been added to their ordinary pension, under the rules laid down in this Warrant, if they had been discharged as unfit for further service or by reduction.

30th. As it is our will and pleasure that this reward shall be strictly an honorable distinction to be conferred only upon the well conducted soldier, the Commanding officers of regiments are strictly enjoined to enter in the Regimental Defaulter's Book the name of every soldier who, in consequence of misconduct, shall have been subjected to any punishment beyond six days' drill, or seven days' confinement to Barracks, and the commission of every offence which shall impose upon the Commanding officer the necessity of recording the soldier's name in the Regimental Defaulter's Book, shall render the man ineligible for this reward for two years from that date, and if he be already in possession of this distinction, shall deprive him of his distinguishing mark, and Good Conduct Pay for one year, and a second recorded offence within twelve months shall render two years of uninterrupted good conduct necessary to obtain a restoration of such reward.

31st. The soldier having two or more distinguishing marks, shall, in like manner, forfeit one of such marks, and the Good Conduct Pay allowed with it, for one year for each offence, and if he shall forfeit all his distinguishing marks and Good Conduct Pay, and before restoration of any one, shall be recorded for a fresh offence, he shall forfeit all claim in consequence of his previous good conduct, and shall only be entitled to obtain a restoration of his honorable distinctions by subsequently serving with uninterrupted good conduct for two years, to obtain one distinguishing mark, for four years to obtain two distinguishing marks, for six years to obtain three distinguishing marks, for eight years to obtain four distinguishing marks, for ten years to obtain five distinguishing marks, and for twelve years to obtain six distinguishing marks.

32nd. Any soldier, who by having been recorded in the Regimental Defaulter's Book, shall have been adjudged to have been guilty of an offence by which he is to forfeit the whole or a part of his reward for previous good conduct, shall, if he denies the commission of such offence, have the right of appeal to a Court Martial.

33rd. A soldier may, for a first offence of a serious nature, be adjudged, by the sentence of a Court Martial, to forfeit all or any part of the advantages he had derived from his previous good conduct, either absolutely or for any period not less than eighteen months, according to the circumstances which shall have appeared in evidence.

34th. The distinction and the rewards for good conduct, granted by this Warrant, do not extend to Sergeants, and other Non-commissioned officers above the rank of Corporal, and they will not be allowed, while serving, any addition to their established pay, but if permitted to purchase their discharges, or to obtain free discharges at their own request, they will be admitted to the benefits of Article 28th of this Warrant; and if discharged to pension, they may, for peculiarly good conduct, on the special recommendation of our General Commanding in Chief, and by the consent of our Secretary at War, communicated to the Commissioners of Chelsea Hospital, be allowed additions of 1d, 2d, 3d, 4d, 5d, or 6d, a day to their pensions, provided that the aggregate pension shall in no case exceed, for Serjeant 1s. 10d., for a Quarter Master Serjeant 2s. 1d., and for a Serjeant Major 2s. 4d. a day.

35th. All soldiers now in our service who enlisted since the 1st March 1833, but before 1st September 1836, shall have the option of relinquishing all right to the additional pay of 2d. a day to which they are now entitled after the completion of 14 years' infantry, or of 17 years' cavalry service, and shall then be entitled, by their good conduct, to all the advantages, both of Good Conduct Pay while serving, of pension on discharge, and of deferred pension, which are hereinbefore granted to soldiers enlisted on or after 1st September 1836.

36th. All soldiers now serving who enlisted on or before the 1st March 1833, shall, by relinquishing their right to additional pay for length of service, be entitled to claim all the advantages of Good Conduct Pay while serving, which are hereby granted; but as the Warrants which were in force at the time of their original enlistment give them a right to higher rates of pension on discharge than those which are to be granted to men enlisted after the 1st March 1833, they will not be entitled to have their Good Conduct Pay added to their pensions on discharge.

37th. In special cases, however, of men enlisted on or before the 1st March 1833, who by their good conduct have obtained one or more distinguishing marks, and who, after short service, may be discharged for disabilities or by reduction, either without pension, or with temporary or conditional or permanent pensions, (not exceeding those granted for similar disabilities, and services under the Warrant of the 7th February 1833) the Good Conduct Pay may, by the consent of our Secretary at War, be added to their pensions; and such men, if not placed upon permanent pensions, may be registered at Chelsea for the deferred pension under the same rules as the men enlisted after the 1st March 1833.

38th. All soldiers now serving who enlisted on or before the 1st September 1836, and who have completed 20, 25, or 30 years' service, may, on relinquishing their right to additional pay, receive respectively 4d, 5d, or 6d. a day, Good Conduct Pay, provided their names shall not have been entered in the Regimental Defaulter's Book, immediately preceding the exchange for the several periods prescribed by this Warrant.

39th. Soldiers who have completed 15 years' service, may, on relinquishing their right to additional pay, receive 3d. per diem, Good Conduct Pay, provided their names shall not have been entered in the Regimental Defaulter's Book for at least six years immediately preceding the exchange.

40th. Soldiers of less than 15 years' service, already in the receipt of additional pay at 2d. a day for length of service, may, on relinquishing their right to additional pay, continue to receive the same amount as Good Conduct

Pay, provided their names shall not have been entered in the Regimental Defaulter's Book for at least four years immediately preceding the exchange.

41st. Soldiers who are already in the receipt of additional pay of 1d. a day for length of service, may, on relinquishing their right to additional pay, continue to receive the same amount as Good Conduct Pay, provided their names shall not have been entered in the Regimental Defaulter's Book for at least two years immediately preceding the exchange.

42nd. Soldiers not yet in the receipt of additional pay for length of service, may, by relinquishing their right to the same, receive Good Conduct Pay, on completing the respective periods of 5, 10, 15, 20, 25 and 30 years, provided their names shall not have been entered in the Regimental Defaulter's Book in the first case, for at least two years; in the second case, for at least four years; in the third case, for at least six years; in the fourth case, for at least eight years; in the fifth case, for at least ten years; and in the last case, for at least twelve years, immediately preceding.

43rd. In establishing their claims to the Good Conduct Pay, soldiers who were present at the Battle of Waterloo shall be allowed to reckon two years in addition to their actual service, and those who were enlisted before the 1st December 1829, shall be allowed to reckon three years for two of actual service, after the age of 18, in the East and West Indies (in other than West India Regiments), but in claiming their discharge under the 28th Article, actual service only will be reckoned.

44th. Soldiers enlisted before the 1st September 1836, shall be entitled to distinguishing marks, whether they accept or not the option of relinquishing additional pay, for Good Conduct Pay, and they shall be entitled to the same addition to their pensions for the number of distinguishing marks they may severally possess at the period of their discharge, as is allowed to men in receipt of Good Conduct Pay.

The following Act, passed by the Governor General of India in Council on the 20th of May, 1848, is hereby promulgated for general information.

ACT No. XI. of 1848.

An Act for the Punishment of Wandering gangs of Thieves and Robbers.

Whereas it is expedient to extend some of the Provisions of the Law for the conviction of Thugs and Dacoits to other gangs of Thieves and Robbers, It is enacted as follows:—

I. Whosoever shall be proved to have belonged either before or after the passing of this Act to any wan-

dering gang of persons, associated for the purposes of theft or robbery, not being a gang of Thugs or Dacoits, shall be punished with imprisonment with hard labour for any term not exceeding seven years.

II. Any person accused of the offence of belonging to any such gang as aforesaid, or of the offence of unlawfully and knowingly receiving or buying property stolen or plundered by any such gang, may be committed by any Magistrate within the Territories of the East India Company, and may be tried by any Court which would have been competent to try him if his offence had been committed within the Zillah where that Court sits.

III. No Court shall, on the trial of any offence under this Act, require any Fatwa from any Law Officer.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 20th of May, 1848.

ACT No. — OF 1848.

For better defining the Law as to revision of the sentences of Subordinate Criminal Courts.

Whereas it hath been doubted how far Section V. of Regulation IX. 1831, of the Bengal Code, is repealed by Act XXXI. 1841, and it is expedient to remove such doubt, and to establish one rule of proceeding for the revision of the sentences of Subordinate Criminal Courts throughout the Presidencies of Bengal and Madras, It is enacted as follows:—

I. So much of Section V. of Regulation IX. 1831, of the Bengal Code, as is now in force, and also Section XXXV. of Act VII. 1843, are repealed.

II. The several Courts of Nizamut Adawlut in the Presidency of Bengal, and of Foujdaree Adawlut in the Presidency of Madras, in any case in which it shall appear to either of them, upon a review of the Abstract Statements or Calendars of prisoners punished without reference, that the sentence passed is one which cannot lawfully be passed on a person convicted of the offence as stated in the Abstract Statement or Calendar, shall require the Judge of the Court in which the conviction was had, to certify under his hand the offence of which the prisoner was convicted, and the sentence passed thereupon; and on the return of such Certificate the Court of Nizamut Adawlut or Foujdaree Adawlut, as the case may be, shall annul the sentence, if it could not be lawfully passed on a person convicted of such offence, and shall certify to the Court below the sentence or sentences which may lawfully be passed for such offence, and thereupon the Court below shall pass a new sentence according to Law, and shall amend the record in accordance therewith.

III. The said Courts of Nizamut Adawlut and Foujdaree Adawlut, in any case in which it shall appear to either of them, upon a review of the Abstract Statements or Calendars of prisoners punished without reference that the verdict or judgment was contrary to the evidence, or that the sentence was too severe, may, if they shall think fit, require the Judge of the Court in which the conviction was had, to certify under his hand the offence of which the prisoner was convicted, and the sentence passed thereupon, with the evidence on which such conviction was had, and any observations which he may be desirous of making in explanation of the verdict, judgment, or sentence; and thereupon the Court of Nizamut Adawlut or Foujdaree Adawlut, as the case may be, may annul such verdict, judgment, and sentence, if the verdict or judgment shall appear to them contrary to the evidence, or mitigate the sentence, if it shall appear to them too severe, and in either case shall certify their proceedings to the Court in which the conviction was had, which shall thereupon make such orders as shall be conformable to the decision of the Court of Nizamut Adawlut or Foujdaree Adawlut, and, if necessary, amend the record in accordance therewith.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 20th day of August next.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 20th May 1848.

ACT No. — OF 1848.

An Act for substituting Stamp Duties instead of Institution Fees in the Courts of the District Moonsiffs in the Presidency of Madras, and for refunding Stamp Duties on Plaints in certain cases.

Whereas it is expedient to substitute Stamp Duties for Institution Fees in the Courts of the District Moonsiffs in the Presidency of Madras, and to authorize the return of the whole or part of the Stamp Duties paid on Plaints in all Civil Actions which are dismissed on application of the parties, It is enacted as follows:—

I. Section XVI. and Clause 2, Section LVII. of Regulation VI. of 1816, and Sections IV. and V. of Regulation II. of 1831, of the Madras Code, shall be repealed from the first day of September in this year.

II. From and after the said first day of September, so much of Regulation XIII. 1816, and Section VII. of Regulation VII. 1818, of the Madras Code, as relates to the levying of Stamp Duties instead of Fees on the institution of Civil actions, shall be applicable to the Courts of District Moonsiffs in the Presidency of Madras.

III. Whenever a suit pending in any Civil Court within the Territories subject to the Presidency of Madras shall be dismissed on application of the parties, the plaintiff shall be entitled to claim from the Court a Certificate, stating the amount of Stamp Duty paid on the Plaint, with specification of the number and endorsement of the paper filed, and whether the suit was dismissed before or after the case was called up, or was on the list of causes ready for hearing.

IV. On presenting any such Certificate to the Collector of the District, the plaintiff shall be entitled to receive back half of the said Stamp Duty, if the certificate purports that the suit was dismissed after the case was called up, or was on the list of causes ready for hearing, and if before, the whole of the said Stamp Duty. Provided always there be no exception taken to the paper or endorsement thereon.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 20th day of August next.

The following Act passed by the Governor General of India in Council on the 27th of May 1848, is hereby promulgated for general information.

ACT No. XII. OF 1848.

An Act for better defining the jurisdiction of the Calcutta Court of Commissioners for the Recovery of Small Debts.

Whereas the jurisdiction of the Court of Commissioners for the Recovery of Small Debts in and for the Settlement of Fort William in Bengal, hath been exercised under colour of a Proclamation made by the Vice President of the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal, in Council, with the approval of the Governor General of the said Presidency, bearing date the 18th day of March 1802, and of another Proclamation made by the Governor General of the said Presidency in Council, bearing date the 25th day of Sept. 1813, and of another Proclamation made by the Governor General of the said Presidency in Council, bearing date the 29th day of October 1819: And whereas doubts have arisen as to the legality of the said last two Proclamations, and of all that has been done or may hereafter be done in pursuance thereof: And whereas doubts have also arisen whether the powers given to the Commissioners of the said Court by the first of the said Proclamations are by the terms of the said third Proclamation effectually extended to the matters over which jurisdiction is thereby declared to be given to the said Court of Commissioners, and it is expedient to remove such doubts: And whereas

the Rules, Orders, and Regulations for the direction of the process and practice of the said Court which have been established in and by the said Court have not been allowed, printed or published as directed by the said first Proclamation, and it is expedient to ratify and confirm the same notwithstanding such omission: And whereas the said Commissioners have been accustomed to sit separately and to form separate Courts sitting at the same time or at different times, and it is also expedient to establish as well prospectively as retrospectively the legality of that practice,—It is enacted as follows:

I. All proceedings heretofore had or hereafter to be had in pursuance of and in conformity with the said Proclamations, or any of them by the said Commissioners, or any person or persons acting under their authority, shall be deemed to have been, and to be, valid in law to all intents and purposes whatever, and against all persons and bodies corporate whomsoever.

II. All the powers and authorities declared to be given to the said Commissioners by the said first Proclamation shall extend to and be exercised in respect of and shall be deemed to have heretofore extended to all matters which in and by the said Proclamations, or any of them, the said Commissioners were authorized to hear and determine.

III. All proceedings heretofore had by any Commissioner or Commissioners of the said Court whilst sitting apart from the others or other of them, or by any person or persons under his or their authority, shall be deemed to have been as valid in law to all intents, and against all persons and bodies corporate whomsoever, as if all the said Commissioners had been sitting together in the said Court of Requests, and such Commissioners may henceforth sit either altogether or apart, and may hold one Court or two or three separate Courts sitting at the same time or at different times, in like manner as they have been heretofore accustomed to do.

IV. All rules, orders, forms of procedure and tables of fees now used or established in the said Court shall be deemed to be and to have been from the time of their being first used or established respectively, valid in law to all intents, notwithstanding the omission to procure the allowance by the Supreme Court of Judicature of such of the same as should have been so allowed, and notwithstanding the non-printing and non-publication of such of the same as should have been printed and published.

V. All summonses and other process issued by the said Commissioners, or any of them, whether issued before or after the passing of this Act, shall be deemed to be valid and effectual in the law on whatsoever day the same shall have been made returnable.
