The Right Hon'ble the Governor in Council is pleased to publish for general information, the following Extracts from an Ordinance enacted by the Government of Mauritius in 1846, for giving premiums to Commanders of Vessels taking Mails, or Overland Newspapers, to that Settlement.

"Extracts from Ordinance No. 13 of 1846,
Concerning Captains of Vessels.

"Article 22d. The following premiums shall be given to the Masters or Commanders of Vessels bringing Mails or Overland Newspapers to Mauritius under the annexed conditions:—

"£ 30 for any Vessel touching expressly for the purpose of landing the Overland Post Office Mail, upon proof of the Vessel having sailed from the Port at which such Mail was taken on board, within five days after the arrival thereof of the said Mail.

"£ 30 for any Vessel bringing the same, upon proof of the Vessel having sailed within 48 hours of the arrival of the Mail as above described.

"£ 20 for any Vessel, upon proof of the Vessel having sailed within 5 days of the said arrival.

"And £ 10 for any Vessel not conveying the last Overland Mail, but bringing an Overland Newspaper of the latest date, not already received in the Colony, and which shall be delivered within 80 days after publication, and be made public in the Exchange Room immediately after the arrival of the said vessel."

POST OFFICE NOTICES.

Notice is hereby given, that under instructions from the Government of India, letters posted in Bombay cannot be received for transmission by the Government Expresses despatched hence to Calcutta and Madras on the arrival of the Overland Mails, those Expresses being specially intended for Europe letters and intelligence.

Bombay, General Post Office, 4th March 1846.

Notice is hereby given, that the General Post Office will in future be strictly closed on Sundays, except from 6 to 10 A. M. for the delivery of letters, and from 4 to 6 P. M. for the receipt and despatch of letters, or except on the arrival of the Overland Mail.

The receiving house at Bycullah, will henceforth be strictly closed on Sundays.

In consequence of several complaints recently made, the Post Master General requests the attention of the public to the following extract from Clause VI. of the Post Office Rules, 30th August 1837.

"Newspapers, printed papers or parcels, will not be received bearing postage, unless the sender shall give his name and address, in order that the regulated postage may be re-covered from him in case of such paper or parcel being refused by the party addressed."

Parties coming to the General Post Office to enquire for letters awaiting their arrival, are requested to make application to the "Dead and Unclaimed Letter Department" in the South wing of the building.

The following Notification by H. M. Post Master General of London, is republished for general information :

BY COMMAND OF THE POST MASTER GENERAL.
NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC.

GENERAL POST OFFICE, MAY 1847.

The Post Master General having been informed by the Court of Directors of the East India Company, that on and after the first June next, persons in this country may forward private correspondence by the Government Express from Bombay to Calcutta, and Madras; all persons desirous of availing themselves of this privilege will be required to mark upon the covers of their letters the words "by Express from Bombay," and in addition to this special address it will not be necessary that all letters intended to be forwarded by the way of Southampton should be so endorsed as hitherto.

The postage to be charged in India on the delivery of letters sent by this Express, will be, in addition to the ordinary inland rates,

One rupee for every letter not exceeding half a tola in weight.

Two rupees for every letter above half a tola, but not exceeding one tola in weight.

Four rupees for every letter above one tola, but not exceeding two tolas in weight, two tolas being the maximum weight of letters to be conveyed by Express.

On Newspapers.—Each newspaper office in Calcutta and Madras will be allowed to receive two newspapers at the ordinary rates of Inland postage; on all other newspapers forwarded by Express, a postage of five rupees each will be charged, and no newspaper will be received for the Express exceeding three tolas in weight.

N. B.—One tola and a quarter is nearly equivalent to half an ounce avoirdupois.

The subjoined extract from Section LIX of the Post Office rules of 30th August 1837, is published for general information:

"Letters which individuals address on their private affairs to any Government officers must be sent post paid."

Parties addressing the Post Master General or Deputy respecting their private letters and parcels, and superscribing "Service" on such communications, render themselves liable to the penalty prescribed in Section V. Act XX. of 1838.

Bombay, Genl. Post Office, 21st Dec. 1847.

With the view to prevent disappointment, parties who call at the Post Office to receive Overland letters, or to post prepaid letters, are reminded, with reference to Sections XXIV and XXXI of the Post Office rules of 30th August 1837, that letters cannot be delivered except on payment of the postage, and that no change will be given in any case,

Bombay, General Post Office, 22nd March 1848.

Notice is hereby given, that as no intermediate or mid-monthly Mails will be forwarded from Bombay by direct Steamer to Aden in the months of June, July, and August, an Express will be despatched from this Office in each of those months to Madras, to meet the Peninsular and Oriental Company's Steamers from Calcutta to Suez.

The following rates of Express postage (which includes the inland postage from Bombay to Madras) will be charged, and must be paid in advance:
 On Letters not exceeding half a Tola. . . Rs. 1 0 0
 Exceeding half, & not exceeding one ditto. . . 2 0 0
 Exceeding one, & not exceeding two ditto. . . 5 0 0
 No Letters exceeding two tolas in weight will be received.

No exemption from this Express postage will be allowed in favor of any person or on any account.

Letters for Great Britain can be forwarded via Madras "prepaid" the whole way, on payment of the Steam postage in addition to the Express postage.

The subjoined extract, Section XXVIII. of the Post Office Rules, is published for general information.

"Section XXVIII.—In order to protect as far as possible the Public Mails from the chance of robbery, Officers in charge of Post Offices shall not knowingly receive money, bullion, precious stones, or jewels, for despatch either by Letter or Blangy post."

The 10th June 1848.

The following Act, passed by the Governor General of India in Council on the 10th June 1848, is hereby promulgated for general information.

ACT No. XIII. of 1848.

For limiting the time within which a Suit may be brought to contest the awards of the Revenue Authorities in the Presidency of Bengal.

For the greater security of possessory titles in the Presidency of Bengal derived from awards made by the Revenue Authorities under Regulation V.II. of 1822, Regulation IX. of 1825, and Regulation IX. of 1833, of the Bengal Code, It is enacted as follows:

I. No suit shall be entertained in any Court for contesting the justice of any award made before the passing of this Act by the Revenue Authorities under any of the recited Regulations after the expiration of twelve years from the date of the final award.

II. After the expiration of three years from the passing of this Act, no such suit shall be entertained for

contesting the justice of any such award made before the passing of this Act.

III. No such suit shall be entertained for contesting the justice of any such award made after the passing of this Act, after the expiration of three years from the date of the final award.

The following Act is brought up before the Legislative Council this day, the Governor General of India in Council being desirous that no time should be lost in passing the Act—

Resolved.—That the Rules requiring that all Acts of the Governor General of India in Council shall be brought up for second reading in two months, or in three months from the date of the first reading, be suspended in respect to the following proposed Act, and that it be at once passed into Law.

ACT No. XIV. of 1848.

To enable the Supreme Court of Calcutta to issue Commissions for taking Affidavits.

Whereas doubts are entertained whether the Supreme Court of Judicature at Fort William in Bengal has power, on the Crown and Plea side of the Court, under the Charter of that Court, to grant a Standing Commission to take Affidavits, or solemn affirmations, and it is expedient that such power be had and exercised as occasion requires, It is enacted as follows:

I. After the passing of this Act, the said Court shall have power to issue a Commission or Commissions from time to time under the Seal of the said Court, to such person or persons as the said Court shall think fit to name therein, empowering him, or them, or any one or more of them, to take Affidavits and solemn affirmations, in any cause or other proceeding in the said Court, now or hereafter to be depending, or with the intent to institute any proceeding whatever in the said Court.

II. Every Affidavit or solemn affirmation so taken shall be deemed to be taken in the said Court, and shall render the person or persons taking the same liable to payment of the same fees (if any), to be received and accounted for in the same manner, as in the case of an Affidavit or solemn affirmation made and taken in Court.

III. Every person so making any Affidavit or solemn affirmation, knowing the same or any part thereof to be untrue, shall be liable to the same penalties in all respects, as if such Affidavit or solemn affirmation had been made and taken in open Court.

The following Act passed by the Governor General of India in Council on the 17th of June 1848, is hereby promulgated for general information.

ACT No. XV. of 1848.

An Act to forbid trading by the Officers of the Supreme Courts.

For the better discharge of their duties by the Officers of the undermentioned Courts of Justice, It is enacted as follows:

I. No Officer of any of the Courts of Judicature established by Royal Charter, within the Territories subject to the Government of the East India Company, or of any Court established for the Relief of Insolvent Debtors within the said Territories, shall directly or indirectly by himself, or by any other person or persons on his behalf, accept from any person or persons any gift or reward for any act or behaviour in his Office, other than his legal salary and fees and profits of office; or hold any office in any Bank or Public Company, except as hereinafter excepted; or carry on or be concerned in any dealings as a banker or trader, or as agent factor, or broker, either for his own advantage, or for the advantage of any other person or persons: except

such dealings as it may be part of the duty of any such Officer by virtue of his office to carry on.

II. This Act shall not be construed to forbid any Officer of any of the said Courts, who is also a practising Advocate, Attorney, Solicitor or Proctor in any of the said Courts, from taking the usual fees and emoluments of Advocates, Attorneys, Solicitors or Proctors; nor to apply to any Advocate, Attorney, Solicitor, Proctor, Sheriff, Assignee, Receiver or Committee, so far as he is held to be in that capacity, merely for some purposes, an Officer of any of the said Courts.

III. This Act shall not be construed to forbid any Officer of any of the said Courts from holding any unpaid office in any Society for Charitable purposes, or for the advancement of knowledge, or for the encouragement of Science, Art, or Manufactures.

IV. Every Officer of any of the said Courts, who shall knowingly offend against this Act, shall, on conviction thereof, be liable to be punished by deprivation of his office; and also, by the sentence of the Court before which he shall be convicted, may be declared incapable, and in that case shall become incapable, of being appointed to the same or any other office of the same Court, or to serve Her Majesty or the East India Company in the Territories under the Government of the East India Company, or in such part of the said Territories as shall be specified in the sentence; or in the discretion of the Court may be otherwise punished by fine, or fine and imprisonment, for his misdemeanour, as to the Court shall seem fit, regard being had to the nature of his offence.

An Act to remove certain restrictions on the Salt Trade.

Whereas the Salt Trade in the North Western Provinces is burdened with unnecessary restrictions, it is enacted as follows:

I. Sections 49, 50, 85 and 93, of Regulation X. of 1819, of the Bengal Code, and so much of Section 48, of the same Regulation, as affects the importation of Salt from the North Western Provinces into the other Provinces of the Presidency of Bengal, also Section 2 of Regulation X. of 1826, of the same Code, shall be repealed from the First day of August in this year.

II. After the said first day of August, no Customs Duty shall be leviable upon Salt imported into the said North Western Provinces from the other Provinces of the said Presidency.

Act No. — of 1848.

An Act for avoiding Wagers.

Whereas it is expedient to discourage gaming and wagering for money, it is enacted as follows:

I. All agreements, whether made in speaking, writing, or otherwise, by way of gaming or wagering, shall be null and void: and no suit shall be allowed in any Court of Law or Equity for recovering any sum of money or valuable thing alleged to be won on any wager, or entrusted to any person to abide the event of any game, or on which any wager is made.

II. The several Courts of Justice established by Royal Charter, instead of directing an issue to be tried on a feigned wager for ascertaining any disputed fact, may issue summonses to witnesses, as well on the equity side as on the plea side of the Court, and cause them to be examined orally in open Court as witnesses in the cause; and the witnesses so summoned shall be bound to attend

and give their evidence, in the same manner, and under the same penalties for neglect, or for giving false evidence, as any witness duly summoned to give evidence according to the practice of the Court before the passing of this Act.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 1st day of October next.

For better avoiding the failure of Justice in Criminal proceedings for Forgery, it is enacted as follows:

I. In any information or indictment laid or brought in the Courts established by Royal Charter, for forging, or in any manner uttering, any forged instrument or writing, it shall not be needed to set forth any exact copy thereof; but it shall be enough to describe such forged instrument or writing, in such manner as would sustain an indictment for stealing it.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 1st day of October next.
