BOMBAY TO WIT.—By virtue of a Precept to me directed, I hereby proclaim and give notice, that the Session of Oyer and Terminer, and General Gaol Delivery, will be holden before the Supreme Court of Judicature at Bombay, at the Court House, on Monday the 25th instant, at eleven o'clock in the forenoon, for the trial of all Treasons, Murders, and other Felonies, Perjuries, Trespasses, and other Crimes and Misdemeanors, had, done, or committed within the Town and Island of Bombay, and the limits thereof, and the Factories subordinate thereto, and also to enquire, hear, and determine, in like manner, all Treasons, Murders, Felonies, Forgeries, Perjuries, Crimes, Extortions, Misdemeanors, Trespasses, Wrongs, Oppressions, had, done, or committed by any of Her Majesty's British Subjects, in any of the Territories which now are subject to, or dependant upon, the said Government of Bombay, or within any of the Dominions of the Native Princes of India in alliance with the said Government.

And also, that at the same time and place will be holden a Session of Admiralty, for the trial of all Treasons, Murders, Piracies, Robberies, Trespases, Misdemeanors, and other Crimes and Offences, had, done, perpetrated, or committed on the High Seas.

And I hereby give notice to all persons bound to prosecute, and give evidence, at the above Sessions, or in any way concerned therein, that they are to attend at the time and place above mentioned, and not to depart without leave of the Court.

And I hereby give notice to all Justices of the Peace, Coroners, Escheators, and also all Chief Constables and Bailiffs of the Town and Island of Bombay, and the limits thereof, that they be then and there, in their own persons, with their Rolls, Records, Indictments, and other Remembrances, to do those things which to their offices in that behalf appertain to be done. The following Notification by H. M. Post Master General of London, is republished for general information :

BY COMMAND OF THE POST MASTER GENERAL.
NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC.

GENERAL POST OFFICE, MAY 1847.

The Post Master General having been informed by the Court of Directors of the East India Company, that on and after the first June next, persons in this country may forward private correspondence by the Government Express from Bombay to Calcutta, and Madras; all persons desirous of availing themselves of this privilege will be required to mark upon the covers of their letters the words "by Express from Bombay," and in addition to this special address it will not be necessary that all letters intended to be forwarded by the way of Southampton should be so endorsed as hitherto.

The postage to be charged in India on the delivery of letters sent by this Express, will be, in addition to the ordinary inland rates,

One rupee for every letter not exceeding half a tola in weight.

Two rupees for every letter above half a tola, but not exceeding one tola in weight.

Four rupees for every letter above one tola, but not exceeding two tolas in weight, two tolas being the maximum weight of letters to be conveyed by Express.

On Newspapers.—Each newspaper office in Calcutta and Madras will be allowed to receive two newspapers at the ordinary rates of inland postage; on all other newspapers forwarded by Express, a postage of five rupees each will be charged, and no newspaper will be received for the Express exceeding three tolas in weight.

N. B.—One tola and a quarter is nearly equivalent to half an ounce avoirdupois.

The subjoined extract from Section LI X of the Post Office rules of 30th August 1837, is published for general information :

"Letters which individuals address on their private affairs to any Government officers must be sent post paid."

Parties addressing the Post Master General or Deputy respecting their private letters and parcels, and superscribing "Service" on such communications, render themselves liable to the penalty prescribed in Section V. Act XX. of 1838.

"Section XXVIII.—In order to protect as far as possible the Public Mails from the chance of robbery, Officers in charge of Post Offices shall not knowingly receive money, bullion, precious stones, or jewels, for despatch either by Letter or Bhangy post."

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 29th of July 1848 :

ACT No. — OF 1848.

An Act for Restoration of the Jaghire of Bunganapilly.

Whereas, by Act X. of 1843, the administration of justice and collection of the revenue in the districts of Kurnool and Bunganapilly, were vested in an Agent appointed by the Governor of Fort St. George in Council; and it is now deemed expedient to restore the Jagheer of Bunganapilly, to be holden by the Jagheeradar subject to the same conditions and reservations as heretofore, It is enacted as follows :

I. On the day of the authority of the Agent of the Governor of Fort St. George, appointed under Act X. of 1843, shall cease as to the district of Bunganapilly; and no Agent shall hereafter be appointed for Bunganapilly under that Act.

II. All lawful proceedings of the said Agent and his Assistants before the said day of shall stand good.

III. The Foujdaree Adawlut and Sudder Adawlut shall continue to have and exercise the same jurisdiction respectively, as to criminal trials referred by the Agent before the said day of, and as to appeals from any decree made by the Agent, before the said day of, as if his authority had not ceased in the said district; and their judgments and orders shall be executed in the same manner.

IV. When the Agent shall have duly accounted to the Governor of Fort St. George in Council, for all monies received and paid by him in his administration of the revenues of the said Jagheer, and shall have received, by order of the said Governor in Council, a discharge in full of all claims against him for such administration, neither he nor any of his Assistants shall be liable to give any further account, or to be questioned for the same or any part thereof in any Court of Justice.

V. Nothing in this Act contained shall be deemed to waive or abate any part of the paramount authority and controul of the East India Company over the said district, or of the Sovereign authority of the British Government.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 29th day of October, 1848.

I. From the First day of December 1848, Act No. IV. of 1843, shall apply to the Settlements of Prince of Wales' Island, Singapore and Malacca, and to all in-

quests held there by any Coroner, or Deputy Coroner, and the word Presidency as used in the said Act shall be taken to mean also the Government of the said Settlements.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 5th day of November next.

The following Extract from the Proceedings of the Right Hon'ble the Governor General of India in Council, in the Legislative branch of the Home Department, under date the 12th August 1848, is published for general information.

Read a second time the Draft of a proposed Act, dated the 6th May 1848, and published in the Calcutta Gazette of the 13th May 1848, to abolish the practice of Branding Convicts.

Resolution.—The Governor General of India in Council resolves, that the following Amended Draft on the subject be published for general information.

ACT No. — OF 1848.

To abolish the practice of Branding and Exposing Convicts.

Whereas it is thought fit to abolish wholly the practice of branding and publicly exposing Convicts throughout the Territories under the Government of the East India Company, It is enacted as follows :

I. Section XI. Regulation IV. 1797, Section XXXV. Regulation VII. 1803, and Clauses Second, Third, and Fourth, Section XII. Regulation XVII. 1817, of the Bengal Code, Section XXXV. Regulation VII. 1802, of the Madras Code, Clause First, Section III. Regulation II. 1807, Sections IX. and X. Regulation XVII. 1817, of the Bengal Code, Section III. Regulation VI. 1811, Sections V. and VI. Regulation II. 1822, of the Madras Code, and all other Regulations or parts of Regulations, in force, so far as they direct that any convicted offenders shall have any words marked, or any indelible mark made upon their foreheads, or on any other part of their persons, or authorize any sentence of public exposure, commonly called Tusheer, and so much of Chapter II. Regulation XIV. 1827, of the Bombay Code, as authorizes any sentence of public disgrace, are rescinded.

II. After the passing of this Act it shall not be lawful for any Court or Magistrate within the Territories, under the Government of the East India Company, to order that any brand or indelible mark of any kind be made or renewed on any part of the person of any convicted offender, or to sentence any offender to be publicly exposed by Tusheer, or to any other degrading exposure.

Ordered, that the Draft be re-considered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 12th day of November next.

The following Extract from the Proceedings of the Right Hon'ble the Governor General of India in Council, in the Legislative branch of the Home Department, under date the 19th August 1848, is published for general information.

Read a second time the Draft of a proposed Act, dated the 29th April 1848, and published in the Calcutta Gazette of the 6th May 1848, for better enforcing the attendance of Proprietors and Farmers of Land before the Collectors of Land Revenue in the Bengal Presidency.

Resolution.—The Governor General of India in Council resolves, that the following Amended Draft on the subject be published for general information.

Act No.—OF 1848.

An Act for better enforcing the attendance of Proprietors and Farmers of Land before Collectors of Land Revenue in the Lower Provinces of the Bengal Presidency.

Whereas, by sundry Regulations of the Bengal Code, provision is made for the imposition of a daily fine, by the Board of Revenue or other authority exercising the powers of that Board, on any proprietor or farmer of land subject to the provisions contained in the said several Regulations, who, when duly summoned by the Collector or other officer exercising the powers of Collector, shall omit or refuse to attend, or to cause his Officer or Agent to attend, or to furnish the accounts or documents required, and shall not shew sufficient cause for such omission; and it is further provided that the fine, when confirmed by Government, is to be levied by the same process as is prescribed for the recovery of arrears of revenue; and Whereas in many cases, by the delay thus occasioned, the whole burden of the penalty is greatly increased beyond what would be necessary, if summary power were given to the Officer by whom the requisition is made, to impose and levy reasonable fines, subject to review by the Commissioner of Revenue and other superior authority, It is enacted as follows:

I. If any proprietor or farmer of land shall omit or refuse to attend, or to cause his Officer or Agent to attend, when duly summoned by the Collector, in any cases specified in any of the said Regulations, by the time prescribed in the notice issued by the Collector, or shall omit or refuse to furnish the accounts or documents required, and shall not shew sufficient cause for such omission, the Collector may impose of his own authority such daily fine, to be payable daily until compliance with the requisition, as he may think adequate to the situation and circumstances in life of the defaulter, not exceeding in any case the daily fine of 50 Rupees: and the amount of such fine accruing due from time to time may be levied without further confirmation by the same process as is prescribed for the recovery of arrears of revenue.

II. The Collector shall forthwith report the imposition of every such fine, and the amount thereof, and also from time to time the amount levied, to the Commissioner of Revenue, who shall report the same for the information of the local Government.

III. Every order passed by a Collector under this Act shall be appealable in the usual manner to the Commissioner of Revenue, and other superior authority; but no such appeal shall avail to prevent the levy of any fine so imposed pending the appeal.

IV. Whenever the amount levied under any such order, issued for any default by authority of a Collector under this Act, shall have exceeded 500 Rupees, the Collector shall report the case specially to the Commissioner of Revenue; and no further levy for such default shall be made otherwise than by authority of the Commissioner of Revenue.

V. Nothing in this Act contained shall be deemed to repeal the power of imposing daily fines and of levying the fines so imposed in the manner prescribed by the said several Regulations.

VI. The word "Collector" used in this Act shall be taken to mean any person lawfully exercising the powers of a Collector.

VII. This Act shall not extend to the North West Provinces of the Presidency of Bengal.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 19th day of September next.
