BOMBAY TO WIT.—By virtue of a Precept to me directed, I hereby proclaim and give notice, that the Session of Oyer and Terminer, and General Gaol Delivery, will be holden before the Supreme Court of Judicature at Bombay, at the Court House, on Monday the 25th instant, at eleven o'clock in the forenoon, for the trial of all Treasons, Murders, and other Felonies, Perjuries, Trespasses, and other Crimes and Misdemeanors, had, done, or committed within the Town and Island of Bombay, and the limits thereof, and the Factories subordinate thereto, and also to enquire, hear, and determine, in like manner, all Treasons, Murders, Felonies, Forgeries, Perjuries, Crimes, Extortions, Misdemeanors, Trespasses, Wrongs, Oppressions, had, done, or committed by any of Her Majesty's British Subjects, in any of the Territories which now are subject to, or dependant upon, the said Government of Bombay, or within any of the Dominions of the Native Princes of India in alliance with the said Government.

And also, that at the same time and place will be holden a Session of Admiralty, for the trial of all Treasons, Murders, Piracies, Robberies, Trespasses, Misdemeanors, and other Crimes and Offences, had, done, perpetrated, or committed on the High Seas.

And I hereby give notice to all persons bound to prosecute, and give evidence, at the above Sessions, or in any way concerned therein, that they are to attend at the time and place above mentioned, and not to depart without leave of the Court.

And I hereby give notice to all Justices of the Peace, Coroners, Escheators, and also all Chief Constables and Bailiffs of the Town and Island of Bombay, and the limits thereof, that they be then and there, in their own persons, with their Rolls, Records, Indictments, and other Remembrances, to do those things which to their offices

POST OFFICE NOTICES.

Notice is hereby given, that under instructions from the Government of India, letters posted in Bombay cannot be received for transmission by the Government Expresses despatched hence to Calcutta and Madras on the arrival of the Overland Mails, those Expresses being specially intended for Europe letters and intelligence.

Parties coming to the General Post Office to enquire for letters awaiting their arrival, are requested to make application to the "Dead and Unclaimed Letter Department" in the South wing of the building.

The following Notification by H. M. Post Master General of London, is republished for general information :

BY COMMAND OF THE POST MASTER GENERAL.
NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC.

GENERAL POST OFFICE, MAY 1847.

The Post Master General having been informed by the Court of Directors of the East India Company, that on and after the first June next, persons in this country may forward private correspondence by the Government Express from Bombay to Calcutta, and Madras; all persons desirous of availing themselves of this privilege will be required to mark upon the covers of their letters the words "by Express from Bombay," and in addition to this special address it will not be necessary that all letters intended to be forwarded by the way of Southampton should be so endorsed as hitherto.

The postage to be charged in India on the delivery of letters sent by this Express, will be, in addition to the ordinary inland rates,

One rupee for every letter not exceeding half a tola in weight.

Two rupees for every letter above half a tola, but not exceeding one tola in weight.

Four rupees for every letter above one tola, but not exceeding two tolas in weight, two tolas being the maximum weight of letters to be conveyed by Express.

On Newspapers.—Each newspaper office in Calcutta and Madras will be allowed to receive two newspapers at the ordinary rates of Inland postage; on all other newspapers forwarded by Express, a postage of five Rupees each will be charged, and no newspaper will be received for the Express exceeding three tolas in weight.

N. B.—One tola and a quarter is nearly equivalent to half an ounce avoirdupois.

The subjoined extract from Section LIX of the Post Office rules of 30th August 1837, is published for general information:

“Letters which individuals address on their private affairs to any Government officers must be sent post paid.”

Parties addressing the Post Master General or Deputy respecting their private letters and parcels, and superscribing “Service” on such communications, render themselves liable to the penalty prescribed in Section V. Act XX. of 1838.

With the view to prevent disappointment, parties who call at the Post Office to receive Overland letters, or to Post prepaid letters, are reminded, with reference to Sections XXIV and XXXI of the Post Office Rules of 30th August 1837, that letters cannot be delivered except on payment of the postage, and that no change will be given in any case,

The subjoined extract, Section XXVIII. of the Post Office Rules, is published for general information.

“Section XXVIII.—In order to protect as far as possible the Public Mails from the chance of robbery, Officers in charge of Post Offices shall not knowingly receive money, bullion, precious stones, or jewels, for despatch either by Letter or Bhungy post.”

THE POST MASTER GENERAL OF BOMBAY.

SIR,—I have the honor to request that all Mails for Van Dieman's Land from Bombay during nine months of the year, that is, from 15th January to the 15th of October, may be forwarded via Singapore; by this I mean, so as to arrive at Singapore between these dates.

During the remainder of the year, viz. from the 15th of October to the 15th January, they may be sent via Mauritius—that is, to arrive at the Mauritius within these dates.

And I have further to request, that you will not on any occasion send letters, &c. for this Colony via the Cape of Good Hope or China, unless they are specially marked by these routes, the delay thereby being exceedingly great at all times.

The following Extract from the Proceedings of the Right Hon'ble the Governor General of India in Council, in the Legislative branch of the Home Department, under date the 19th August 1848, is published for general information.

Read a second time the Draft of a proposed Act, dated the 29th April 1848, and published in the Calcutta Gazette of the 6th May 1848, for better enforcing the attendance of Proprietors and Farmers of Land before the Collectors of Land Revenue in the Bengal Presidency.

Resolution.—The Governor General of India in Council resolves, that the following Amended Draft on the subject be published for general information.

ACT No.—of 1848.

An Act for better enforcing the attendance of Proprietors and Farmers of Land before Collectors of Land Revenue in the Lower Provinces of the Bengal Presidency.

Whereas, by sundry Regulations of the Bengal Code, provision is made for the imposition of a daily fine, by the Board of Revenue or other authority exercising the powers of that Board, on any proprietor or farmer of land subject to the provisions contained in the said several Regulations, who, when duly summoned by the Collector or other officer exercising the powers of Collector, shall omit or refuse to attend, or to cause his Officer or Agent to attend, or to furnish the accounts or documents required, and shall not shew sufficient cause for such omission; and it is further provided that the fine, when confirmed by Government, is to be levied by the same process as is prescribed for the recovery of arrears of revenue; and Whereas in many cases, by the delay thus occasioned, the whole burden of the penalty is greatly increased beyond what would be necessary, if summary power were given to the Officer by whom the requisition is made, to impose and levy reasonable fines, subject to review by the Commissioner of Revenue and other superior authority, It is enacted as follows:

I. If any proprietor or farmer of land shall omit or refuse to attend, or to cause his Officer or Agent to attend, when duly summoned by the Collector, in any case specified in any of the said Regulations, by the time prescribed in the notice issued by the Collector, or shall omit or refuse to furnish the accounts or documents required, and shall not shew sufficient cause for such omission, the Collector may impose of his own authority such daily fine, to be payable daily until compliance with the requisition, as he may think adequate to the situation and circumstances in life of the defaulter, not exceeding in any case the daily fine of 50 Rupees: and the amount of such fine accruing due from time to time may be levied without further confirmation by the same process as is prescribed for the recovery of arrears of revenue.

II. The Collector shall forthwith report the imposition of every such fine, and the amount thereof, and also from time to time the amount levied, to the Commissioner of Revenue, who shall report the same for the information of the local Government.

III. Every order passed by a Collector under this Act shall be appealable in the usual manner to the Commissioner of Revenue, and other superior authority; but no such appeal shall avail to prevent the levy of any fine so imposed pending the appeal.

IV. Whenever the amount levied under any such order, issued for any default by authority of a Collector under this Act, shall have exceeded 500 Rupees, the Collector shall report the case specially to the Commissioner of Revenue; and no further levy for such default shall be made otherwise than by authority of the Commissioner of Revenue.

V. Nothing in this Act contained shall be deemed to repeal the power of imposing daily fines and of levying the fines so imposed in the manner prescribed by the said several Regulations.

VI. The word "Collector" used in this Act shall be taken to mean any person lawfully exercising the powers of a Collector.

VII. This Act shall not extend to the North West Provinces of the Presidency of Bengal.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 19th day of September next.

The following Act passed by the Governor General of India in Council on the 26th of August 1848, is hereby promulgated for general information.

ACT No. XVII. of 1848.

An Act for substituting Stamp Duties instead of Institution Fees in the Courts of the District Mooniffs in the Presidency of Madras; and for refunding Stamp Duties on Plaints in certain cases.

Whereas it is expedient to substitute Stamp Duties for Institution Fees in the Courts of the District Mooniffs in the Presidency of Madras, and to authorize the return of the whole or part of the Stamp Duties paid on Plaints in all Civil Actions which are dismissed on application of the parties, It is enacted as follows:

I. Section XVI. and Clause 2, Section LVII. Regulation VI. 1816, and Sections IV. and V. Regulation II. 1834 of the Madras Code, shall be repealed from the First day of September in this year.

II. From and after the First day of September, so much of Regulation XIII. 1816, and Section VII. Regulation VII. 1818, of the Madras Code, as relates to the levying of Stamp Duties instead of Fees on the institution of Civil Actions, shall be applicable to the Courts of District Mooniffs in the Presidency of Madras.

III. Whenever a suit pending in any Civil Court within the Territories subject to the Presidency of Madras shall be dismissed on application of the parties, the plaintiff shall be entitled to claim from the Court a certificate, stating the amount of Stamp Duty paid on the Plaint, with specification of the number and endorsement of the paper filed, and whether the suit was dismissed before or after the completion of the pleadings.

IV. On presenting any such Certificate to the Collector of the District within three calendar months after the dismissal of the suit, the plaintiff shall be entitled to receive back half of the said Stamp Duty, if the certificate purports that the suit was dismissed after the completion of the pleadings; and if before, the whole of the said Stamp Duty: Provided always there be no exception taken to the paper or endorsement thereon.

The following Act passed by the Governor General of India in Council on the 26th of August 1848, is hereby promulgated for general information.

Act No. XVIII of 1848.

An Act for the Administration of the Estate of the late Nuwab of Surat, and to continue privileges to his family.

Whereas it is expedient to provide for the administration of the Estate of the late Nuwab of Surat, Meer Uzoolooddeen Khan, Kumrood Jowich, Ushmut Junr Bahadoor; and whereas the exemption from the jurisdiction of the Civil and Criminal Courts enjoyed by the said late Nuwab and his relations and servants, by virtue of the Treaty concluded between the East India Company and the said late Nuwab on the 13th May 1800, recognized and confirmed by Clause 2, Section XXI. Regulation II. 1827, and Clause 2, Section I. Regulation XI. 1827, of the Bombay Code, ceased at the death of the said late Nuwab, and it is deemed expedient that some of the said persons should continue to be privileged, It is enacted as follows:

I. No writ or process shall be sued forth or prosecuted against the person, goods or property of the several persons named in the Schedule annexed to this Act, being the widows and family of the said late Nuwab, or of any of them, unless with the consent of the Governor of Bombay in Council first obtained; such consent to be signified by the signature of one of the Secretaries to Government: and any writ or process sued forth or prosecuted against the person, goods, or property of the said several persons, or any of them, without such consent as aforesaid, shall be utterly null and void.

II. The Governor of Bombay in Council is empowered to act in the administration of the property of whatever nature, left by the late Nuwab of Surat, in regard to the settlement and payment of the debts and claims standing against the Estate of the said late Nuwab at the time of his death, and to make distribution of the remaining property among his family; and no act of the said Governor of Bombay in Council, in respect to the administration to and distribution of such property, from the date of the death of the said late Nuwab, shall be liable to be questioned in any Court of Law or Equity.

III. The limitation of time for bringing suits in the Civil Courts, provided in Regulation V. 1827, of the Bombay Code, shall be held, in respect to all persons within the provisions of Clause 2, Section XXI. of the said Regulation II. 1827, to begin, as to all causes of action arising before the passing of this Act, from the day of the passing of this Act: subject to this provision, that no suit by or against any of the said persons shall be entertained in any Civil Court, on account of any cause of action which arose at a time preceding the death of the said late Nuwab by more than the number of years or months severally limited, with reference to such cause of action, by the said Regulation V. 1827, as the period within which the suit must be filed after such cause of action arose, or came to the knowledge of the plaintiff, as the case may be.

IV. Deeds registered under the provisions of any Act passed by the Governor General of India in Council shall not, on the sole ground of priority of registration, invalidate Deeds which may be duly registered within six months from the day of the passing of this Act, by any persons within the provisions of the said Clause 2, Section XXI. Regulation II. 1827; provided that such last mentioned Deed relates to property conveyed to the owner before the day of the passing of this Act.

Act No. XIX. of 1848.

For better defining the Law as to revision of the sentences of Subordinate Criminal Courts in the Presidencies of Bengal and Madras.

Whereas it has been doubted how far Section V. Regulation IX. 1831, of the Bengal Code, is repealed by Act XXXI. 1841, and what power the Foujdaree Adawlut at Madras has under Section XXXV. Act VII. 1843, It is enacted as follows:

I. So much of section V. Regulation IX. 1831, of the Bengal Code, as is now in force, and also Section XXXV. Act VII. 1843, are repealed.

II. The Nizamut Adawlut in the Presidency of Bengal, and Foujdaree Adawlut in the Presidency of Madras, in any case in which it shall appear to either of them, upon a review of the Abstract Statements or Calendars of prisoners punished without reference, that the sentence passed is one which cannot lawfully be passed on a person convicted of the offence, as stated in the Abstract Statement or Calendar, shall annul the sentence; and shall certify to the subordinate Court the sentence or sentences which may lawfully be passed for such offence: and thereupon the subordinate Court shall pass a new sentence according to Law, and shall amend the record in accordance therewith.

III. The said Nizamut Adawlut or Foujdaree Adawlut, in any case in which it shall appear to either of them, upon a review of the Abstract Statements or Calendars of prisoners punished without reference, that the verdict or judgment, pronounced on any prisoner was not warranted by the evidence, or that his sentence was too severe, may, if it thinks fit, require the Judge of the Court in which the conviction was had to certify under his hand all the evidence taken in the case affecting such prisoners, with any observations which the Judge may be desirous of making in explanation of the verdict, judgment or sentence; and thereupon the Nizamut Adawlut or Foujdaree Adawlut, as the case may be, may annul such verdict, judgment, and sentence, if the verdict or judgment shall appear to it not warranted by the evidence, or mitigate the sentence, if it shall appear too severe; and in either case shall certify its proceedings to the Court in which the conviction was had, which shall thereupon make such orders as are conformable to the decision of the Nizamut Adawlut, or Foujdaree Adawlut, and, if necessary, amend the record in accordance therewith.

IV. Instead of proceeding under this Act, the said Nizamut Adawlut or Foujdaree Adawlut may, whenever it thinks fit, call for the whole record of any criminal trial in any subordinate Court, and pass thereon such orders as it thinks fit, but not so as to enhance the punishment awarded, or punish any person acquitted in the subordinate Court.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 26th of August 1848.

Act No. — of 1848.

For securing Military Pensions and Superannuation Allowances.

Whereas it is expedient to consolidate and extend the operation of the law, as to the exemption of Military Pensions and other Superannuation allowances from seizure under process of law, It is enacted as follows:

I. Regulation XII. 1814, of the Bengal Code, and Act XXXI. 1845, are repealed.

II. The reduced pay or pension, however called, of any Invalid Officer, Soldier, Sailor, or Retainer of the Army or Navy, in the Military or Naval Service of the East India Company, and also any monthly or yearly pension or pecuniary allowance to any person, in consideration of past services and present infirmities or old age, granted by authority of the Governor General in Council, or of the Governor or Governor in Council, or Lieutenant Governor of any Presidency or Place within the territories under the Government of the East India Company, and also the pension of any Out-Pensioner of Chelsea or Greenwich Hospital granted by authority of the Commissioners of Chelsea or Greenwich Hospital respectively, and also all money due or to become due on account of any such pension or allowance, shall be exempt from seizure, attachment or sequestration by process of any Court within the said

territories, at the instance of a creditor for any demand against the Pensioner, or in satisfaction of a decree or order of any such Court.

III. All assignments, agreements, orders, sales and securities of every kind made by any such Pensioner, in respect of any money not payable at or before the making thereof, on account of any such pension, or for giving or assigning any future interest therein, are null and void.

IV. This Act shall not apply to any process of any Court established by Royal Charter, issued out of such Court before the passing of this Act, or to any assignment, agreement, order, sale or security by any such Pensioner, made before the passing of this Act in respect of a Chelsea or Greenwich pension, or a pension or allowance granted in the Presidency of Madras, or before the 27th December 1845, in respect of a pension or allowance granted in the Presidency of Bombay, or before the 27th May 1814, in respect of a pension or allowance granted in the Presidency of Bengal.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 26th day of November next.
