BOMBAY TO WIT.—By virtue of a Precept to me directed, I hereby proclaim and give notice, that the Session of Oyer and Terminer, and General Gaol Delivery, will be holden before the Supreme Court of Judicature at Bombay, at the Court House, on Monday the 4th December next, at eleven o'clock in the forenoon, for the trial of all Murders, and other Felonies, Perjuries, Trespasses, and other Crimes and Misdemeanors, had, done, or committed within the Town and Island of Bombay, and the limits thereof, and the Factories subordinate thereto, and also to enquire, hear, and determine, in like manner, all Treasons, Murders, Felonies, Forgeries, Perjuries, Crimes, Extortions, Misdemeanors, Trespasses, Wrongs, Oppressions, had, done, or committed by any of Her Majesty's British Subjects, in any of the Territories which now are subject to, or dependant upon, the said Government of Bombay, or within any of the Dominions of the Native Princes of India in alliance with the said Government.

And also, that at the same time and place will be holden a Session of Admiralty, for the trial of all Treasons, Murders, Piracies, Robberies, Trespasses, Misdemeanors, and other Crimes and Offences, had, done, perpetrated, or committed on the High Seas.

And I hereby give notice to all persons bound to prosecute, and give evidence, at the above Sessions, or in any way concerned therein, that

they are to attend at the time and place above mentioned, and not to depart without leave of the Court.

And I hereby give notice to all Justices of the Peace, Coroners, Escheators, and also all Chief Constables and Bailiffs, of the Town and Island of Bombay and the Limits thereof, that they be then and there, in their own persons, with their Rolls, Records, Indictments, and other remembrances, to do those things which to their offices in that behalf appertain to be done—Dated this 15th day of November in the twelfth year of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria.

In obedience to a Mandate under the hand and seal of the Right Reverend Father in God DANIEL, by Divine Permission Lord Bishop of Calcutta and Metropolitan of India, bearing date the 18th day of September in the year of Our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty-eight, signifying His Lordship's intention to hold his Second Metropolitan Visitation of the See of Bombay at the Cathedral in Bombay on Tuesday, the 12th day of December, in the year of Our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty-eight, all and singular the Ministers and Chaplains and all Priests and Deacons in Holy Orders of the United Church of England and Ireland being within the Diocese of Bombay, are hereby cited, if within Fifty Miles from Bombay aforesaid, to appear before the said Lord Bishop of Calcutta, the Metropolitan, at his said Second Metropolitan Visitation to be held at the Cathedral Church of St. Thomas, at Bombay, on the 12th day of December next, at the hour of Ten o'clock in the forenoon, and then and there to produce their Letters of Orders of Priests and Deacons, with all Licences and other faculties relative to their official appointment, to be by them exhibited, and to hear and receive all such matters and things as may be delivered in charge.—Dated this First day of November, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty-eight.

BY DIVINE PERMISSION

LORD BISHOP OF CALCUTTA,
AND METROPOLITAN IN INDIA.

To our Right Reverend Brother THOMAS CARR, Lord Bishop of the Diocese of Bombay, within our Metropolitan Jurisdiction greeting; Whereas we are empowered and authorized by the Letters Patent of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, bearing date at Westminster the First day of October in the Seventh Year of His Reign, to visit once in every five years, or oftener if occasion shall require, as well as you the said Bishop of Bombay and your successors as all Ministers and Chaplains and all Priests and Deacons in Holy Orders resident in your said Diocese for the purposes therein stated. And we are also authorized and empowered to inhibit, during any such Visitation, the exercise of all or of such part or parts of the ordinary Jurisdiction of you, the said Bishop of Bombay and your successors, as to us shall seem expedient. And whereas it is our purpose, with the blessing of Almighty God, to commence our Second Metropolitan Visitation and to hold such our said Visitation in your Cathedral Church at Bombay on Tuesday, the Twelfth day of December next, or at such other day as may be found convenient by us and to be duly notified. We therefore hereby require and strictly enjoin you, the Right Reverend THOMAS CARR, Lord Bishop of the said Diocese of Bombay, to cite or cause to be cited in your Cathedral

Church at Bombay aforesaid, on the said Twelfth day of December next, at the hour of Ten o'clock, or upon such other day and time as may be found convenient by us and to be duly notified as aforesaid, all and singular the Ministers and Chaplains and all Priests and Deacons in Holy Orders of the United Church of England and Ireland within your said Diocese, and specially those resident within Fifty Miles from Bombay aforesaid, to appear personally before us as Metropolitan Bishop of India at your said Cathedral Church on the day and hour aforesaid, to hear and receive all such matters and things as may be delivered in charge. And further we do by these presents expressly inhibit and restrain you, during such our Visitation, from the exercise of all ordinary Jurisdiction by right and usage appertaining to your Office of Bishop of Bombay aforesaid, and all under you, and until the same shall be relaxed by us on our departure; and whatsoever you shall do or cause to be done in the premises you shall duly certify unto us on our arrival together with these presents. NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC.

GENERAL POST OFFICE, MAY 1847.

The Post Master General having been informed by the Court of Directors of the East India Company, that on and after the first

June next, persons in this country may forward private correspondence by the Government Express from Bombay to Calcutta, and Madras; all persons desirous of availing themselves of this privilege will be required to mark upon the covers of their letters the words "by Express from Bombay," and in addition to this special address it will not be necessary that all letters intended to be forwarded by the way of Southampton should be so endorsed as hitherto.

The postage to be charged in India on the delivery of letters sent by this Express, will be, in addition to the ordinary inland rates,

One rupee for every letter not exceeding half a tola in weight.

Two rupees for every letter above half a tola, but not exceeding one tola in weight.

Four rupees for every letter above one tola, but not exceeding two tolas in weight, two tolas being the maximum weight of letters to be conveyed by Express.

On Newspapers.—Each newspaper office in Calcutta and Madras will be allowed to receive two newspapers at the ordinary rates of Inland postage; on all other newspapers forwarded by Express, a postage of five Rupees each will be charged, and no newspaper will be received for the Express exceeding three tolas in weight.

N. B.—One tola and a quarter is nearly equivalent to half an ounce avoirdupois.

No. 603 of 1848.—The Right Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased to publish for information the following General Order No. 389 of 1848, by the Right Honorable the Governor General of India in Council.

FORT WILLIAM, 10TH OCTOBER 1848.

The Right Hon'ble the Governor General of India in Council taking into consideration the inconvenience which Soldiers of Royal Regiments returning to England, who are Depositors in the Government Savings' Banks in India, experience by not being permitted, under existing Regulations, to remit to England through the Company's Treasury their deposits, when exceeding the amount of their net pay for a period of one year, and the loss to which they are exposed from fluctuations in the Money Market, when desirous of disposing of the Government Paper obtained by them on their Savings' Bank Deposits reaching the sum of Rupees 500 (Five Hundred Rupees), is pleased with the concurrence of the Hon'ble the Court of Directors to lay down the following Rules, in respect to Soldiers' Deposits from Savings of Pay in the Government Savings' Bank, which are to be applicable to all the three Indian Presidencies.

The amount of actual Savings from Pay, which a Soldier has been enabled to accumulate from his Pay from the East India Company with Interest, whether remaining in the Savings' Bank or invested in Government Paper, through the Bank, is on occasion of parties returning to Europe to be included in Regimental Pay Masters' Rolls, payable to the Secretary at War, twenty-one days after arrival at the India House, at the exchange of 2s. 3d. per Company's Rupee, and the Rolls are to be transmitted to the Pay Master to the Queen's Troops at the Presidency, who will forward them to the Accountant, Military Department, to be included in a separate General Roll, to be prepared by that Officer for transmission to the Hon'ble the Court of Directors, so as to leave by the first going Mail after receipt by him of the Rolls to ensure its reaching Europe before the arrival of the parties themselves in England.

On the receipt of these Rolls from a Regimental Pay Master, the Pay Master to the Queen's Troops will apply to the Savings' Bank at the Presidency for the amount standing in favor of the several Depositors returning home, and credit the same in his accounts to "Account Current, London."

The Secretary to the Savings' Bank will, on receipt of application from the Pay Master to the Queen's Troops, immediately pay over to that functionary all deposits as detailed in the Roll, and if there should be any Government Paper belonging to any of the Depositors which was obtained at par from deposits in the Savings' Bank, the Secretary will, on occasion of the deposits being required to be remitted to Europe, call on the Government Agent to dispose of such paper in the market, and if it be sold at a discount, the Government Agent will furnish the Sub-Treasurer with a statement exhibiting the proceeds of the sale, and the loss thereon; and the Sub-Treasurer is authorized to pay the amount of such loss to the Government Agent, and to charge the same in his accounts to "Profit and Loss."

If further any Government Paper belonging to any of the Depositors which had originally been purchased through the Savings' Bank at a *discount* be subsequently sold at a greater discount, the difference of discount between the original purchase and the subsequent sale, which is a loss to the Soldier, is not to be borne by him, and the Government Agent will claim it on behalf of the Soldier from the General Treasury.

If, however, any Government Paper belonging to any of the Depositors had originally been purchased at a greater discount than that at which it is subsequently sold, the difference between the purchase money and the sale proceeds, or the gain, is the property of the Depositor.

The rule laid down in the preceding paragraph is applicable only to investment in Government Paper, of Soldiers' deposits already made through the Savings' Bank, but hereafter on the amount of a Soldier's deposit in the Savings'

The Treasury Notes are to be deposited with the Government Agent, and are to be held free from any charge of the Soldier.

The Government Agent will furnish, quarterly, a Register of all Treasury Notes deposited with him, to the Commanding Officer of each Regiment, to keep him informed of the deposits on account of his Corps, the Governor's Agent will also, on realization half yearly of Interest on Soldiers' Treasury Notes, deposit the amount in the Savings' Bank to the credit of the Depositors, advising the Officer Commanding the Regiment of such deposit having been made.

An Annual Return of the Treasury Notes issued under this Order, on account of Soldiers' deposits in the Savings' Banks, will be submitted by the Government Agent at each Presidency to the Government for transmission to the Hon'ble the Court of Directors.

The provisions of this Order are equally applicable to the European Soldiers of the East India Company's Service, with those of the Queen's Troops in India. In respect to Time-expired men, Invalids and other detached Soldiers of the Company's Service, the Town Major will act in the manner laid down in Government General Orders, No. 26 of 1841, dated 27th January 1841.

The Governments of Fort Saint George and Bombay will be pleased to issue such subsidiary Orders as may be deemed necessary to carry the provisions of this Order into immediate effect at their respective Presidencies.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 14th October 1848.

ACT No. — OF 1848.

An Act to confirm an Agreement between certain Shareholders and Creditors of the Union Bank of Calcutta.

Whereas by Act XXIII. 1845, certain persons therein declared to have formed themselves into a Company or Co-partnership by the name of "The Union Bank of Calcutta," and those who should thereafter become Members and Proprietors of the said Union Bank, were enabled to sue and to be sued at law and in equity in the name of the person who should be the Secretary or the Treasurer of the said Bank for the time being, and certain provisions are therein contained for the recovery of debts and demands due by the said Co-partnership:

And whereas a Memorial has been presented to the Governor General of India in Council, signed by Thomas Charles Morton, Esquire, Henry Barkin-young, Esquire, Jeremiah James Homfray, Esquire, and Baboo Prosunnoocomar Tagore, all there in described as Members of the Executive Committee of Management of the said Union Bank, and also by certain persons therein described as Members of the Committee of Creditors of the Union Bank,—that is to say) Charles Hogg, Esquire, therein described as constituted Attorney for Glyn, Halifax, Mills, and Company, by Henry Cowen, Esquire, and by Thomas Seddon Kelsall, Esquire, setting forth, that the said Joint Stock Banking Company or Union Bank of Calcutta suspended payment about the close of last year, and that the remaining assets of the said Bank are insufficient to satisfy the outstanding debts and liabilities: that several Creditors of the Bank have obtained judgments against the public Officer under the said Act XXIII. 1845, and the assets of the Bank being insufficient, certain of the said judgments re put in suit against individual Shareholders; and that the Memorialists fear that, unless some mutually satisfactory arrangement can be immediately made between the Creditors and the Shareholders, an enormous sacrifice of property will speedily take place, and a great number of persons be involved in utter ruin: that many of the creditors are willing to agree with the Shareholders, and to give as complete a discharge as the law will allow, to those Shareholders who will pay such reasonable sums of money as have been assessed on them respectively, on account of the said debts and liabilities, by a Committee of Creditors appointed at a public meeting of the creditors, provided that such discharge do not work a release or otherwise affect their claims, in respect of the said debts and liabilities, against other persons liable to make good the same who shall refuse or neglect to pay the sums so assessed on them respectively; and that many of the said Shareholders are willing to pay the sums so assessed on them, provided that they may be thereby secured from all proceedings at law or in equity, in respect of the said debts and liabilities at the suit of any creditor who shall have executed such agreement as aforesaid, and accepted any payment out of the sums so contributed; that doubts have been entertained of the legal effect of such an agreement and discharge: and praying therefore that the effect of it may be established and defined by authority of the Governor General of India in Council, without prejudice to the rights of any creditor of the said Bank who shall not execute the same, or of any creditor executing the same against any present or past Shareholder of the said Bank, who shall not have paid up in the time and manner prescribed by the said agreement, the full amount of the sum assessed on him or her as aforesaid, it is declared and enacted as follows:

I. The agreement set forth in the Schedule annexed to this Act, being the agreement referred to in the said Memorial shall be of full force as between those creditors of the said Union Bank who shall execute the same, and receive any payment out of the sums contributed according to such agreement, on account of the debts and liabilities due to them respectively by the said Union Bank, and those persons named in the Schedule hereinafter mentioned, and in the said agreement described as the Schedule thereunto annexed marked A, being the Schedule of Assessment or contribution towards the liquidation of the debts of the said Bank, who

shall pay, at the time and in the manner mentioned in the said agreement, the several sums at which they are severally assessed in the said Schedule of Assessment: and as between all other persons shall be wholly null and void.

II. If any creditor of the said Bank who shall have executed the said agreement shall thereafter sue out any Writ of Scire Facias, or take any other proceeding at law or in equity on account of any debt or liability of the said Union Bank against any person named in the said Schedule of Assessment, who shall pay, at the time and in the manner mentioned in the said agreement the full sum at which he or she is assessed in the said Schedule of Assessment, the execution of the said agreement by such creditor, and payment of the said Assessment by the person against whom such Writ or other proceeding shall be sued out or taken may be pleaded in bar thereof: and all costs incurred by any such defendant in resisting such Writ or proceeding shall be paid by the creditor at whose suit the same shall have been sued forth or instituted.

III. If any creditor of the said Bank who shall not have executed the said agreement shall sue out any Writ of Scire Facias, or take any other proceeding at law or in equity, on account of any debt or liability of the said Union Bank against any person liable to make good the same or any part thereof, or if any creditor of the said Bank who shall have executed the said agreement shall sue out any Writ of Scire Facias, or take any other proceeding at law or in equity, on account of any debt or liability of the said Union Bank against any person liable to make good the same or any part thereof, who shall not pay at the time and in the manner mentioned in the said agreement the full sum at which he or she is assessed in the said Schedule of Assessment, the said agreement shall not be pleadable to such Writ or proceeding, nor shall the contents thereof be received in evidence in any Court of law or equity in any proceeding had for the recovery of such debt or liability from any such person.

IV. Provided always that nothing hereinbefore contained shall be construed to prevent any Writ of Scire Facias which shall have been issued, or any action or suit which shall have been actually commenced against any Shareholder before payment of his Assessment from being prosecuted and continued afterwards, if the party instituting such proceeding chooses so to do.

V. Within one week after the passing of this Act, a copy of the said Schedule of Assessment signed by the said Thomas Charles Morton, Esquire, Henry Barkin-young, Esquire, Jeremiah James Homfray, Esquire, Baboo Prosunnoocomar Tagore, Charles Hogg, Esq., Henry Cowen, Esquire, and Thomas Seddon Kelsall, Esquire, shall be filed of record in the Court for the Relief of Insolvent Debtors at Calcutta, and the Schedule so filed shall be deemed the Schedule referred to by this Act and by the said agreement, and shall be conclusive evidence of the amounts severally assessed against the persons named therein according to the true intent and meaning of this Act.

VI. A copy of the agreement set forth in the Schedule annexed to this Act shall be deposited with the Official Assignee of the Court for the Relief of Insolvent Debtors in Calcutta, who shall allow the same to be executed by all Creditors of the said Bank willing to execute the same, and shall cause every such execution to be duly witnessed.

SCHEDULE.

We, the undersigned, Creditors of the Union Bank of Calcutta, hereby undertake and promise, upon payment, by the Executive Committee of the said Union Bank of an immediate first dividend of twenty-five (25) per cent. upon our respective claims, to accept the Schedule hereunto annexed, marked A. (which has been framed by a Committee of Creditors of the Bank) as the Schedule of Assessment or contribution towards the liquidation of the debts of the said Bank of the several Shareholders, past and present, therein named; and we promise and agree not to sue out any writ of scire facias against or otherwise to molest the person or property of any Shareholder or Shareholders of the said Union Bank, named in the said Schedule, who shall pay up the full sum placed opposite his or her name in the said Schedule, as and for his or her assessment or contribution as aforesaid. Provided, however, that nothing herein contained, shall be construed to protect any of the said parties from being proceeded against, unless and until he shall have actually paid his said assessment in full, nor to prevent any writ of Scire Facias which shall have been issued, or any action or

suit which shall have been actually commenced against any Shareholder, before payment of his assessment, from being prosecuted, and continued afterwards, if the party instituting such proceeding chooses so to do: Provided, further, that if any Shareholder in the said Schedule named, shall not have paid or given security to the Executive Committee of the said Bank, certified by them to be sufficient, for the payment of his assessment, within three months from this date, if he be resident in India, or within five months if he be resident out of India, the same shall be increased ten per cent, and that a further per centage of the like amount shall be added after every succeeding period of three months, during which the same shall remain unpaid or unsecured. Provided also that the said Executive Committee of the said Bank do engage to pay from time to time such further dividends upon our respective claims until full satisfaction thereof respectively, as the sums realized from the said contribution shall enable them to do, and whenever the realization shall amount to ten per cent. upon the remaining claims, to declare and pay a new dividend at that rate. Provided always, and it is hereby expressly declared and agreed, that we the undersigned reserve to ourselves all our rights and remedies whatsoever against the assets of the said Bank, legal and equitable, and against all Shareholders, present and past, not paying up the full amount of their said assessments respectively as aforesaid: In witness whereof we have hereunto set our respective hands this Twenty-fifth day of September, in the year of Christ one thousand eight hundred and forty-eight.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 11th December, 1848.
