No. 132 of 1848.—The Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased to publish the following Transport Passage Rules, in supercession of all orders now in force, and to direct that the same be applicable to all Steam or Sailing Vessels of the Honorable Company, whether of War or otherwise, including all River Steamers belonging to the Indus, or other Flotilla, when employed in transport duties, and to all Packet Vessels or Steam Frigates employed in the conveyance of the Overland Europe Mail, on such occasions as they may convey Government Passengers.

SECTION No. 2 contains Rules to be applicable to the accommodation of public passengers in the Hon'ble Company's Vessels of War when not employed as Transports, or conveying the Overland Europe Mail.

I. IV. The Commander can claim the fare above authorized for such passengers only as may appear on the Quarter Master General's list at the Presidency, or are admitted on board by order of the Commanding officer through the Senior Naval officer present. These lists and orders, or certified copies of them, are to be attached to the abstracts of Table money, and no claim will be admitted without such voucher.

V. When a Military or Naval officer, or Civil functionary of corresponding rank, shall be ordered a passage on duty, the following deductions shall be made from his pay by the Military or Civil Paymaster, as the case may be, for the actual number of days he may have been accommodated, with the exception of passengers for which a fixed deduction is to be made as per Art. VI.

But officers, as above, proceeding on government vessels on private leave, or under any circumstances which do not entitle them to a free passage at the expense of the state, must make good the full amount drawn by the Commander, as laid down in Art. 1, and the same rule must be applied in regard to the families of officers whether proceeding with them on duty, or not.

VI. The general order of the 2d November 1844, fixing the average number of days for a passage between Bombay and the Ports on the Western side of India, is to continue in operation as heretofore, and is to be applicable to all government steam vessels.

The rates to, or from, any intermediate Ports on the Western Coast, not included in the above scale, to be the same as to the next nearest Port.

VII. The Military or General Pay Master, as the case may be, is authorized to deduct whatever may be due on account of Table Money from any officer's abstract; he is expected to use every possible exertion to recover such debts on account of Government, but he will not be held personally responsible as in the case of his ordinary disbursements.

VIII. When an officer for whom a passage can be provided in a Government Vessel, or in one freighted or hired by Government, shall, for his own convenience, be permitted to take his passage in a private vessel, he shall be allowed in aid of his expenses that sum which it would have cost the public to provide a table for him.

IX. For the outward voyage, all payments on account of Table Money must be made to the Paymaster in advance. The Quarter Master General will require the production of a certificate from the Pay master that the authorized charge has been paid before he admits any name upon his list. When the list is made up, the Quarter Master General will transmit it to the Superintendent Indian Navy, and upon this list the Commander's abstract will be discharged.

X. For the inward voyage, payments must necessarily be made in arrears, and the Government confidently expects that all officers will be careful to liquidate, without loss of time, whatever may be due by them, and the Paymaster will report to Government the names of all officers who may fail to do so within a reasonable time, when measures will be taken to ensure the recovery, and at the same time to mark the displeasure of Government.

Table Money Abstracts for the inward voyage must be preferred within two days of the arrival of the vessel in Bombay, or the Commander will be himself responsible for any loss that may in consequence follow.

XI. Officers proceeding on duty to Sind, or other Ports, on any of the Hon'ble Company's Steam Vessels, are required to furnish themselves with certificates from the Adjutant General that they are entitled to a free passage, in default of which the Military Paymaster will charge the full amount of fare.

XII. Passage rules for Private individuals on board Government Steamers between Bombay and Scind.

XIII. Private passengers wishing to proceed to Sind in the government Steamers, are to make application to the Superintendent of the Indian Navy, and if acceded to, the parties are to pay the full amount above specified into the Military Pay office, when the Paymaster will grant a certificate, upon the production of which at the office of the Superintendent Indian Navy, the necessary order will be given for their reception on board.

XIV. Private individuals taking passage at Kurrachee, or at the mouths of the Indus, will be required previous to embarkation to pay to the officer commanding the vessel, or to the Purser or clerk, as the case may be, the regulated sum, which is to be made over to the Presidency Paymaster immediately on the vessel's arrival at Bombay.

XV. The commander's share of table money is to be drawn at the Military Pay office on an abstract counter-signed by the Assistant Superintendent of the Indian Navy.

SECTION No. 2.

Passage Rules applicable to all the Hon'ble Company's Vessels of War

I. Every Captain or officer in command of one of the Hon'ble Company's ships or vessels of war, shall keep, and shall transmit to the Superintendent of the Indian Navy, a list according to the prescribed form, of every passenger that may be received on board.

II. No passage at the public expense is to be given without a special order from the Superintendent of the Indian Navy, and, except in any case which should be such as in the opinion of the Superintendent of the Indian Navy to warrant a commanding officer taking on himself to deviate from this regulation, any officer who shall give or order any passage without such authority, will himself be liable for all the expense incurred.

III. The usual proportion of provisions may be allowed for every passenger, and for each servant, received by order, besides which, to cover the additional expences necessarily incurred on such occasions, the officers at whose table the passengers shall be entertained, will be further allowed a sum according to the rank and number of passengers, and the length of their stay, as specified in the succeeding articles, except in instances of passages of Royal personages, or the Governor General of India, or the Governors of Madras and Bombay, which will be specially considered.

IV. For Members of the Council of India, Ambassadors and their suites (not exceeding in the whole five persons) for any passage not exceeding three days, the sum of £ 40 or Rupees 400; for any passage not exceeding seven days £ 80 or Rupees 800.

V. For Judges of the Supreme Court, Lord Bishop of Calcutta, the Bishops, Members of the Councils of the other Presidencies, and General officers above the rank of Major General, and Suites, respectively (not exceeding in the whole four persons) for a period not exceeding three days, £ 30 or Rupees 300; for a passage not exceeding seven days, £ 60 or Rupees 600.

VI. For the Recorder of the Prince of Wales Island, Major and Brigadier Generals, Superintendent of the Indian Navy, Political Residents, Commissioners, and their suites, (not exceeding in the whole three persons) for a passage not exceeding three days, £ 22 or Rupees 220; for a passage not exceeding seven days, £ 44 or Rupees 440.

VII. Passages exceeding seven days, are to be paid for at the above rates for the first week, and afterwards at the rate of £ 1-5 or Rupees 12, for each male person above the age of 16—two-thirds of that sum for every female above 16—one-third for such of either sex as shall be between the ages of 7 and 16, and one-fourth for such as may be under 7 years of age, for each additional day they shall be entertained at the Captains table. When a greater suite shall be entertained than the before stated numbers for a passage not exceeding 7 days, an additional allowance is to be made of £ 1-10 or Rupees 15 per diem, during such short period for every such additional person.

VIII. When officers of the army of the rank of Field officer, or of higher rank, or other individuals not included in the foregoing articles, shall be ordered to be entertained at a Captain's table, £ 1-1 or Rupees 10½, shall be allowed daily for fourteen days, and 15s or Rupees 7½, afterwards for every additional day of the passage; two-thirds of the said sums shall be allowed for every female above 16 years of age, one-third for those of either sex between 7 and 16 years of age, and one-fourth for such as may be under 7 years of age.

IX. When individuals shall be ordered passages at the table of a Lieutenant, commanding a small vessel, or at the Lieutenant's mess on board any of the Honorable Company's ships, 12s or Rupees 6 shall be allowed daily for 14 days, and 9s or Rupees 4½ afterwards for every additional day of the passage.

X. In the possible, but improbable event of Members of the Supreme Council, or other distinguished persons mentioned in either of the Articles 4, 5 or 6, being embarked in a small vessel of war under command of a Lieutenant, the allowances, as stated in those articles, will be made to the Lieutenant, the same as to a Captain, for entertaining such distinguished person, and suite.

XI. When individuals shall be ordered passages at the Midshipmen's Mess, 9s or Rupees 4½ a day shall be allowed for the first fourteen days, and 6s or Rupees 3 a day for every additional day of the passage.

XII. The sums specified in all the above cases include, a provision for a reasonable number of servants, and for extra expences of every kind, except bedding and such fittings as the Dock Yard may be ordered to furnish, and no further allowances will on any account whatsoever be granted.

XIII. Consuls and their families are to be entertained and paid for under the 8th Article, and vice Consuls and their families under the 9th Article.

XIV. If any person ordered to be entertained at one table, should, by personal invitation or favor, be received at a superior table, no additional allowance will be granted for his change, and if he changes to an inferior one, such allowance only will be made for his entertainment there as would be given for a person of the proper rank for entertainment at such inferior table.

XV. When officers ordered passages, as aforesaid, shall prefer to join an inferior mess to that they are entitled to join by their rank, they are to be permitted to do so.

XVI. When an officer is directed to make preparation for any passengers, the Superintendent of the Indian Navy will recommend that half the estimated amount of the whole expence be immediately paid by the Military Paymaster to him, or to his Agent, as the officer may desire, and when the said officer shall report through his Commander in Chief, to the Superintendent of the Indian Navy, the completion of the service, stating the names of the passengers, and the number of days they were actually entertained on board, and with whom, and enclosing also a copy of an extract of the order for their reception, a recommendation will be forwarded to Government for the payment of the remainder of the sum.

XVII. If it should happen that a passenger does not embark after the order for receiving him has been given, and provision thereupon made for his reception, or having embarked, should be relanded or transferred to another ship, the naval officer will nevertheless retain the half allowance already recommended, to cover the expenses he may have been at in making the necessary preparations for him.

XVIII. It is to be understood throughout this Section, that Captains table includes the table of a flag officer, should there be one on board, also the table of a Commander of a Sloop of War; and the Lieutenant's mess is to be understood as including also the table of a Lieutenant commanding a vessel of war, not bearing an officer of higher rank, although he may have no other naval officer messing with him.

And £ 10 for any vessel not conveying the last Overland Mail, but bringing an *Overland newspaper* of the latest date, not already received in the Colony, and which shall be delivered within 80 days after publication and be made public in the exchange room immediately after the arrival of the said vessel.

The Post Master General having been informed by the Court of Directors of the East India Company, that on and after the first June next, persons in this country may forward private correspondence by the Government Express from Bombay to Calcutta, and Madras; all persons desirous of availing themselves of this privilege will be required to mark upon the covers of their letters the words "by Express from Bombay" and in addition to this special address it will not be necessary that all letters intended to be forwarded by the way of Southampton should be so endorsed as hitherto.

The postage to be charged in India on the delivery of letters sent by this Express, will be, in addition to the ordinary inland rates.

One rupee for every letter not exceeding half a tola in weight.

Two rupees for every letter above half a tola, but not exceeding one tola in weight.

Four rupees for every letter above one tola, but not exceeding two tolas in weight, two tolas being the maximum weight of letters to be conveyed by Express.

On Newspapers.—Each newspaper office in Calcutta and Madras will be allowed to receive two newspapers at the ordinary rates of Inland postage, on all other newspapers forwarded by Express, a postage of five rupees each will be charged, and no newspaper will be received for the Express exceeding three tolas in weight.

N. B.—One tola and a quarter is nearly equivalent to half an ounce avoirdupois.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 5th of February 1848.

ACT No. — OF 1848.

An Act for the Administration of the Estate of the late Nuwab of Surat.

Whereas it is expedient to provide for the administration of the Estate of the late Nuwab of Surat, Meer Ufzoolooddeen Khan, Kumrood Dowleh, Ushmut Jung, Bahadoor; and whereas the exemption from the jurisdiction of the Civil and Criminal Courts enjoyed by certain persons under the provisions of Clause 2, Section XXI, Regulation II. of 1827, and Clause 2, Section I, Regulation XI. of 1827 of the Bombay Code, ceased and determined at the death of the said late Nuwab, and it is deemed desirable to continue such privilege to some of the said persons;

I. It is hereby enacted, that the Governor of Bombay in Council shall be, and is hereby empowered to exempt from the jurisdiction of the Civil and Criminal Courts the widows and such of the present relatives of the late Nuwab of Surat as may to him seem proper,

the to declare the persons so exempted, amenable to and authority of an Agent whom he may appoint for this purpose.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall be competent to the Governor in Council of Bombay to act in the administration of the property of whatever nature, left by the late Nuwab of Surat, in regard to the settlement and payment of the debts and claims standing against the Estate of the said late Nuwab at the time of his demise, and to make distribution of the remaining property among his family, and that all acts of the said Governor in Council of Bombay, in respect to such property from the date of the demise of the said late Nuwab, shall be held to be valid and not liable to be questioned in any Court of law.

III. And it is further enacted, that the limitation of time for filing claims in the Civil Courts, provided in the said Regulation V. of 1827, shall be held in respect to all persons who are exempted from the jurisdiction of the Civil Courts by the provisions of Clause 2d, Section XXI. of the said Regulation II. of 1827, to commence from the 8th day of August 1842, being the date of the demise of the said late Nuwab.

IV. And it is further enacted, that Deeds registered under the provisions of any Act passed by the Governor General in Council of India, shall not, on the sole ground of priority of registration invalidate Deeds which may be duly registered within six months from the promulgation of this Act, by any persons distinctly exempted under the said Clause 2d, Section XXI. of Regulation II. of 1827, provided such Deed shall relate to property conveyed to the owner prior to the date of the demise of the said late Nuwab.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 5th day of May next.
