PROCLAMATION.

BOMBAY TO WIT.—By virtue of a Precept to me directed, I hereby proclaim and give notice that the SESSION of OYER and TERMNER, and GENERAL GAOL DELIVERY, will be holden before the Supreme Court of Judicature at Bombay, at the Court House, on Saturday, the 18th day of March instant, at 11 o'clock in the forenoon, for the trial of all Treasons, Murders, and other Felonies, Perjuries, Trespasses, and other Crimes and Misdemeanors, had, done, or committed within the Town and Island of Bombay, and the Limits thereof, and the Factories subordinate thereto; and also to inquire, hear, and determine in like man-

ner all Treasons, Murders, Felonies, Forgeries, Perjuries, Crimes, Extortions, Misdemeanors, Trespasses, Wrongs, Oppressions, had, done, or committed by any of Her Majesty's British Subjects in any of the Territories which now are subject to, or dependent upon, the said Government of Bombay, or within any of the Dominions of the Native Princes of India in alliance with the said Government.

And also, that at the same time and place will be holden a Session of Admiralty, for the trial of all Treasons, Murders, Piracies, Robberies, Trespasses, Misdemeanors, and other Crimes and Offences, had, done, perpetrated, or committed on the High Seas.

And I hereby give notice to all persons bound to prosecute and give evidence at the above Sessions, or in any way concerned therein, that they are to attend at the time and place above mentioned, and not to depart without leave of the Court.

And I hereby give notice to all Justices of the Peace, Coroners, Escheators, and also all Chief Constables and Bailiffs of the Town and Island of Bombay and the Limits thereof, that they be then and there in their own persons, with their Rolls, Records, Indictments, and other Remembrances, to do those things which to their offices in that behalf appertain to be done.—Dated this 1st day of March 1854, and in the Seventeenth year of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria.

4. A contractor must comply immediately with all emergent demands, and meet others of less urgency within the periods stated in the requisitions made upon him; in failure whereof, or if any supply be condemned by a Committee of Officers as aforesaid, the article, or such others as may be required in lieu thereof, shall be purchased by this Department without delay, at his risk and cost, if it be considered expedient to do so; and in all such cases (30) thirty per cent. upon the amount of expenses incurred, or a fine of from Rupees (25) twenty-five to (50) fifty, at the option of the executive Commissariat Officer, will be levied as liquidated damages for each and every such breach of contract, it being understood that the simple condemnation of any article by a Committee constitutes a breach of contract, whether the rejected article be replaced by the contractor or by this Department; in every such case, also, it is to be understood that the contract may be cancelled, at the discretion of the Commissary General, and that if the contract be so cancelled, the cash deposit mentioned in para. 3 of this Notice will be forfeited to Government.

5. It is also to be understood, that any negligence, evasion, or refusal on the part of a contractor to make supplies, or obey orders, or any attempt on his part, or that of his agents, to pass off an article of an inferior quality in lieu of that he is bound to supply, or any neglect to deliver it at the time and place ordered, will subject him, in every instance, to be fined to the extent of Rupees (25) twenty-five, at the option of the executive Commissariat Officer, from whose order an appeal may be made to the Commissary General, whose decision is to be final; but in cases when it may be deemed fit to exact any of the penalties provided for in the preceding clause, no further penalty shall be leviable under this clause.

6. It is further to be understood, that the contractor, or an accredited agent on his part, approved of by the executive Commissariat Officer, is to attend at this Office during the usual hours of business, i. e. from 10 A. M. to 5 P. M. daily (Sundays excepted), also at such other time or place as may be indicated by the executive Commissariat Officer, when he may consider it desirable for the public service to require such attendance.

7. Any party whose offer is accepted will be required to produce his sureties for the approval of the Honorable Company's Solicitor, within fifteen days from the date of the acceptance of his offer, or the contract will be resold. No reason will be stated for rejecting any security offered.

8. Bills for articles supplied under this contract must be preferred within one month from the date of the delivery of the articles, in default of which the contractor will forfeit the full value of the supplies for which bills have not been so preferred, unless it clearly appears, to the satisfaction of the Commissary General, that the delay was unavoidable.

9. The amount of retrenchments made by the Military Board on the contractor's bills will be recovered from the first bills preferred for payment; but in the event of such retrenchments, or any portion thereof, being remitted, the amount remitted will be refunded.

10. Any party who, after offering for the contract, fails to furnish the necessary security, as provided for in clause 7 of this Notice, will be interdicted from bidding on future occasions, un-

The contracts shall be sold for the actual number of Troops that may be present on the date of sale, which will be duly notified to the bidders at the time, and the amount of the monthly payment shall not be increased or decreased on account of Troops arriving in or departing from the Cantonment, unless the strength of such details exceed one-fourth the number of men for whom the contracts have been entered into.

5. The conditions of the contracts shall not be considered binding or in force in any respect until the same are confirmed by the superior authority.

6. The 3rd February 1854.

The following Act, passed by the Governor General of India in Council on the 3rd February 1854, is hereby promulgated for general information :—

ACT No. I. of 1854.

An Act to amend the Law for facilitating the Acquisition of Land needed for Public Purposes within the Local Limits of the Jurisdiction of the Supreme Court of Judicature at Madras.

I. The provisions of Act XX. of 1852, as herein modified, shall be applicable to all lands situate within the local limits of the jurisdiction of the Supreme Court of Judicature at Madras.

II. The powers given to the Civil Court of the Zillah in Section XIV. of Act No. XX. of 1852 shall, for the purposes of this Act, be exercised by the Supreme Court of Judicature at Madras, either upon motion or petition; and the said Court, upon the investigation of any matter under the provisions of this Section, may compel the attendance of witnesses, and take their evidence in the same manner as upon a trial of an action at law, and the said Court, upon such motion or petition, may award such costs as they may think just.

III. In all cases in which payment of any part of the purchase or compensation money, exceeding in amount the sum of five hundred Rupees, is held in deposit according to Section XV. Act XX. of 1852 on account of any lands taken for any public purpose under this Act, the Government Securities mentioned in the said Section shall be deposited with the Government Agents at Fort St. George, in the name and with the privy of the Accountant General of Her Majesty's Supreme Court of Judicature at Fort St. George, to be placed by him to the credit of the persons interested in such lands, describing them as nearly as may be done according to the course of proceeding in the said Court in matters and causes depending before it in Equity.

IV. The said Securities shall remain in the hands of the Government Agents, and the interest accruing on the Securities shall be, from time to time, received and paid under the order of the said Supreme Court to the person or persons for the time being who would have been entitled to receive the rents and profits of the said lands if the same had not been taken as aforesaid, until there shall be some person or persons absolutely entitled to receive the principal sum of the monies so reserved, and thereupon the said Government Securities, with all interest then due thereon, shall be transferred and paid to such person or persons under the like order of the said Court; and so long as no person can be found entitled to receive the interest of the said Government Securities, the Government Agent shall continue to receive, and from time to time to invest the accumulation of interest due thereon in the purchase of other Government Securities, to be held and applied by him on the same trusts as the Securities first purchased.

V. The right to receive payment of all sums not exceeding five hundred Rupees which shall be held in deposit under the said Section XV. Act No. XX. of 1852, may be determined by the Madras Court of Small Causes, and the said Court may make an order for the payment thereof, which order shall be a sufficient indemnity to the Government and all persons acting in obedience thereto.

ACT No. II. of 1854.

An Act to abolish the Office of Assessor to the Court of Petty Sessions at Bombay.

Whereas it is unnecessary to continue the Office of Assessor to the Court of Petty Sessions at Bombay, It is enacted as follows :—

I. So much of Article 2, Title 2, of the Rule, Ordinance and Regulation I. of 1834, passed by the Governor in Council of Bombay, as enacts that the Court of Petty Sessions at Bombay therein mentioned shall constantly be attended by a Barrister-at-law, as and by way of Assessor to the said Court, such Assessor to be a Justice of the Peace and an Advocate of the Supreme Court of Judicature at Bombay, and to be appointed and removable by the Governor in Council, is hereby repealed.

II. It shall not be necessary for the said Court of Petty Sessions to be attended by any person as or by way of Assessor to the said Court.

ACT No. III. of 1854.

An Act to amend the 38th Article of War for the Native Army.

Whereas it is expedient that any Native Soldier who shall make away with or pawn any Medal granted to him for service in the Field or for general good behaviour, should be punished for such unsoldier-like conduct, It is enacted :—

That there shall be added to the 38th Article of War for the government of the Native Officers and Soldiers in the Military Service of the East India Company, the words following, that is to say : " or who shall make away with or pawn any medal or decoration granted to him by order of Her Majesty, or of the East India Company, or by order of Government, for service in the Field or for general good conduct."

ACT No. IV. of 1854.

An Act relating to the Execution of Sentences in Petty Cases by Superintendents of Bazaars in the Presidency of Bombay.

Whereas the rule which prohibits a Superintendent of Bazaars in the Presidency of Bombay from executing any sentence in the Criminal or Excise branches of his duties until he has submitted his proceedings to the Commanding Officer, and which requires that trials before a Superintendent of Bazaars shall be recorded as usual on Courts Martial, has been found to be productive of unnecessary inconvenience and delay in petty cases, and it is expedient to abolish the rule in such cases; It is hereby enacted as follows :—

I. So much of Section 30, Regulation XXII. 1827, of the Bombay Code, as enacts that the Superintendent

of Bazaars shall not execute any sentence in the Criminal or Excise branch of his duties until he has submitted his proceedings to the Commanding Officer, and that his trials shall be recorded in writing as usual on Courts Martial, is hereby repealed so far as it shall relate to any sentence which shall hereafter be passed by any Superintendent of Bazaars by which any fine not exceeding three rupees, or any imprisonment not exceeding three days, shall be ordered.

The following Act, passed by the Governor General of India in Council on the 10th February 1854, is hereby promulgated for general information:—

ACT No. V. OF 1854.

An Act to amend Act No. V. of 1838, relating to the Bengal Bonded Warehouse Association.

Whereas the Bengal Bonded Warehouse Association are desirous that the provisions of Act No. V. of 1838 should be amended, and it appears reasonable that such amendment should be made; It is enacted as follows:—

I. Sections XII. XIV. XXXII. and XXXVII. of the said Act are hereby repealed.

II. The business of the said Association shall be managed by six Directors, three of whom shall form a quorum.

III. The two Directors who are to go out of office by rotation in every year shall go out of office in the month of May, before the holding of the ordinary General Meeting of Proprietors directed to be holden in that month, and at such ordinary General Meeting two Directors shall be chosen, and the Directors so going out of office, or either of them, shall be capable of being re-elected in the same year at such General Meeting.

IV. No person shall be capable of being a Director of the said Association who shall not be a proprietor in his own right of Five Shares of the Capital Stock of the said Association.

V. Ordinary General Meetings of the said proprietors shall be held at least twice in every year, that is to say, on the second Wednesday in the month of May, and the second Wednesday in the month of November, and at every such ordinary Meeting the Directors of the said Association shall present a Report in writing of the state of the affairs of the said Association, and a balance sheet; and such General Meeting may declare a dividend out of the profits of the said Association, provided that no dividend shall be made which shall diminish the capital of the said Association.

VI. It shall be lawful for the said Association to make Bye-laws for the Regulation of its own proceedings, which Bye-laws shall be binding only on its own Members and Officers, provided that no such Bye-law shall be valid till it shall have been approved of by one extraordinary General Meeting of Proprietors specially convened for that purpose, provided also that no such Bye-law shall be valid till it shall have been confirmed by the Governor of the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal.

VII. At any time after the 14th day of March 1860, it shall be lawful for the Governor General of India in Council, by an Order in Council, to direct that the said Association shall be dissolved at the expiration of five years from the date of such order, and such order shall of itself have the effect of dissolving the said corporation at the expiration of the said space of five years, except for the purposes mentioned in Section XXXIX. Act No. V. of 1838.

These must specify, both in words and figures, the rate per cent. above or below the prices exhibited in the above list at which the supply will be made, on the understanding that the articles supplied are to be of unexceptionable quality, and according to musters which may be seen in this Office, or of the sort usually supplied, and are to be delivered, in the first instance at the Commissariat Stores at the Presidency if required, and afterwards to the indenting Departments, in good condition, free of all charges beyond the stipulated price, in such quantities as may from time to time be demanded, and that the same are liable to examination and rejection by the executive Commissariat Officer, or by the indenting or receiving Officers; or by a Committee of Officers appointed on the part of Government, in the event of the contractor being dissatisfied with the decision of the above Officers, or either of them; it being understood that the decision of such Committee is to be final and binding on all parties.

3. It is to be clearly understood that such of the articles specified in the Schedule as form part of the rations or Hospital diet, are to be supplied under the rules laid down in G. O. No. 613, of the 10th October 1853, and No. 33, of the 11th January 1854, copies of which may be seen at this Office.

4. No tender will be received unless accompanied by a deposit in cash of the sum of Rupees (2,112) two thousand one hundred and twelve, which sum will be forfeited in the event of delay, evasion, or refusal on his part to execute the necessary deed of contract, when required to do so, on his tender being accepted; in which latter case he must be prepared to give unexceptionable bonded security to the further amount of Rupees (8,449) eight thousand four hundred and forty-nine, which, together with the amount previously deposited, will be held as a guarantee for the due fulfilment of his contract.

5. A contractor must comply immediately with all emergent demands, and meet others of less urgency within the periods stated in the requisitions made upon him; in failure whereof, or if any supply be condemned by a Committee of Officers as aforesaid, the articles, or such others as may be required in lieu thereof, shall be purchased by this Department without delay, at his risk and cost, if it be considered expedient to do so; and in all such cases (30) thirty per cent. upon the amount of expenses incurred, or a fine of from Rupees (30) thirty to (200) two hundred, at the option of the executive Commissariat Officer, will be levied as liquidated damages for each and every such breach of contract; it being understood that the simple condemnation of any article by a Committee constitutes a breach of contract, whether the rejected articles be replaced by the

contractor or by this Department; in every such case, also, it is to be understood that the contract may be cancelled, at the discretion of the Commissary General; and that if the contract be so cancelled, the cash deposit mentioned in paragraph 4 of this Notice will be forfeited to Government.

6. It is also to be understood that any negligence, evasion, or refusal on the part of a contractor to make supplies, or obey orders, or any attempt on his part, or that of his agents, to pass off articles of an inferior quality in lieu of those he is bound to supply, or any neglect to deliver them at the time and place ordered, will subject him, in every instance, to be fined to the extent of Rupees (25) twenty-five, at the option of the executive Commissariat Officer, from whose order an appeal may be made to the Commissary General, whose decision is to be final; but in cases when it may be deemed fit to exact any of the penalties provided for in the preceding clause, no further penalty shall be leviable under this clause.

7. It is further to be understood that the contractor, or an accredited agent on his part, approved of by the executive Commissariat Officer, is to attend at this Office during the usual hours of business, i. e. from 10 A. M. to 5 P. M. daily (Sundays excepted), also at such other time or place as may be indicated by the executive Commissariat Officer, when he may consider it desirable for the public service to require such attendance.

8. Any party whose tender is accepted will be required to produce his sureties for the approval of the Honorable Company's Solicitor, within fifteen days from the date of the acceptance of his tender, or the contract will be resold. No reason will be stated for rejecting any security tendered.

9. Bills for articles supplied under this contract must be preferred within one month from the date of the delivery of the articles, in default of which the contractor will forfeit the full value of the supplies for which bills have not been so preferred, unless it clearly appears, to the satisfaction of the Commissary General, that the delay was unavoidable.

10. The amount of retrenchments made by the Military Board on the contractor's bills will be recovered from the first bills preferred for payment; but in the event of such retrenchments, or any portion thereof, being remitted, the amount remitted will be refunded.

11. Any party who, after tendering for the contract, fails to furnish the necessary security, as provided for in Clause 8 of this Notice, will be interdicted from tendering on future occasions, unless he produces a document from some person or persons of unexceptionable character and sufficient means, guaranteeing the due execution and performance of the contract, on his tender being accepted.

12. The annual outlay on the above contract is estimated at Rs. 42,246.

13. No reason will be assigned for the rejection of any tender.

3. It is to be clearly understood that such of the articles specified in the schedule as form part of the Rations for European Soldiers or Hospital diet, are to be supplied under the rules laid down in the G. G. O. No. 613, of the 10th October 1853, and No. 33, of the 11th January 1854, copies of which may be seen at this Office.

4. 5. A contractor must comply immediately with all emergent demands, and meet others of less urgency within the periods stated in the requisitions made upon him; in failure whereof, or if any supply be condemned by a Committee of Officers as aforesaid, the articles, or such others as may be required in lieu thereof, shall be purchased by this department without delay, at his risk and cost, if it be considered expedient to do so; and in all such cases (30) thirty per cent. upon the amount of expenses incurred, or a fine of from Rupees (50) fifty, at the option of the executive Commissariat Officer, will be levied as liquidated damages for each and every such breach of contract, it being understood that the simple condemnation of any article by a Committee constitutes such breach of contract, whether the rejected articles be replaced by the contractor or by this Department; in every such case, also, it is to be understood that the contract may be cancelled, at the discretion of the Commissary General, and that if the contract be cancelled, the cash deposit mentioned in para. 4 of this Notice will be forfeited to Government.

6. It is also to be understood that any negligence, evasion, or refusal on the part of a contractor to make supplies or obey orders, or any attempt on his part, or that of his agents, to pass off articles of an inferior quality in lieu of those he is bound to supply, or any neglect to deliver them at the time and place ordered, will subject him, in every instance, to be fined to the extent of Rupees (25) twenty-five, at the option of the executive Commissariat Officer, from whose order an appeal may be made to the Commissary General, whose decision is to be final; but in cases when it may be deemed fit to exact any of the penalties provided for in the preceding clause, no further penalty shall be leviable under this clause.

7. It is further to be understood, that the contractor, or an accredited agent on his part, approved of by the executive Commissariat Officer, is to attend at this Office during the usual hours of business, *i. e.* from 10 A. M. to 5 P. M. daily (Sundays excepted), also at such other time or place as may be indicated by the executive Commissariat Officer, when he may consider it desirable for the public service to require such attendance.

8. Any party whose offer is accepted will be required to produce his sureties for the approval of the Civil or Bazar authorities, as may be necessary, within fifteen days from the date of the acceptance of his offer, or the contract will be resold. No reason will be stated for rejecting any securities offered.

9. Bills for articles supplied under this contract must be preferred within one month from the date of the delivery of the articles, in default of which the contractor will forfeit the full value of the supplies for which bills have not been so preferred, unless it clearly appears, to the satisfaction of the Commissary General, that the delay was unavoidable.

10. The amount of retrenchments made by the Military Board on the contractors' bills will be recovered from the first bills preferred for payment;

but in the event of such retrenchments, or any portion thereof, being remitted, the amount remitted will be refunded.
