The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 31st March 1854:—

ACT No. — OF 1854.

An Act for the Suppression of Outrages in the District of Malabar, in the Presidency of Fort St. George.

Whereas in the District of Malabar, in the Presidency of Fort St. George, violent outrages have been committed, for which the laws now in force do not afford adequate remedy, It is enacted that the following provisions shall take effect in the said district:—

I. Any person who shall commit or take part in any outrage wherein murder or other heinous crime shall be perpetrated or attempted, or who after having been engaged in, or been accessory to such outrage, shall forcibly resist the authorities constituted by law for his apprehension or punishment, or who shall join or assist in any such resistance, or who shall procure or promote such outrage, or shall in any manner, directly or indirectly, incite or encourage any person or persons to commit such outrage, or to join or assist in such resistance, shall on conviction thereof be liable, not only to punishment under the existing law as a principal or accessory in such crime, but also to the forfeiture of all his property, of whatever kind, to Government, by the sentence of the Court by which he shall be convicted; and whenever any person shall be killed in the act of committing any such offence as aforesaid, or shall die of wounds received in the act of committing any such offence as aforesaid, it shall be competent to the Court which would have had cognizance of the offence if the offender could have been brought to trial to proceed on the application of the Magistrate, and to hold an inquest into the circumstances of the death of the offender; and on proof of his having been killed as aforesaid, or of his having died of wounds received as aforesaid, to adjudge that the whole of his property shall be forfeited to Government.

II. The offences mentioned in the preceding Section, and all outrages committed by persons acting in combination, in defiance of the constituted authorities, shall be held to be within the scope of Regulation II. 1819 of the Madras Code, and crimes within the meaning of Act V. 1841.

III. It shall be competent to the Governor in Council of Fort St. George, whenever he shall see cause, by reason of any such outrage which shall have occurred, or in anticipation of any such outrage, by a proclamation published in the *Fort St. George Gazette*, to declare the whole or any part or parts of the District of Malabar to be in a disturbed state, and by the same proclamation to exempt the Magistrate of the district, in cases arising within the disturbed tract or tracts, from the ordinary restrictions in respect to the requisition of security for the maintenance of the peace imposed by Section V. Regulation VI. of 1827 of the Madras Code, or by any other Regulation or Act, and in extension of the power vested in the Magistrate by Section III. Regulation II. of 1822 of the said Code, to authorise him to apprehend any person against whom there shall be a strong suspicion of a design to commit any such outrage, and to issue his warrant for the reception, and detention in custody, in the Jail of the district, of the person against whom such suspicion shall exist; or for the greater safety of the public peace, to issue his warrant, ordering such person to be removed from the district, and to be received and detained in custody in the Jail of another district, until the Magistrate shall direct his release, or until his release shall be ordered by the Governor in Council; or to oblige such person to remove himself from the district beyond sea, and not to return without permission of Government, on pain of being so dealt with. It shall also be competent to the Governor in Council, by proclamation, in like manner, to confer on such Magistrate the powers

vested in the Government Agents in Ganjam and Vizagapatam by Section VII. Act XXIV. 1839, provided that any proclamation issued under this Section shall be repealed whenever it shall appear to the Governor in Council that the extraordinary powers vested in the Magistrate may be safely revoked.

IV. When extraordinary powers shall have been conferred on the Magistrate, under the authority vested in the Governor in Council by the preceding Section, his proceedings in execution thereof shall be subject only to the control of the Governor in Council, to whom they shall be reported for such orders as he may think proper. When the Magistrate shall deem it necessary, for the safety of the public peace, to detain a person in custody beyond the term of one year, he shall report the case, with his reasons for detaining him, for the orders of the Governor in Council at the expiration of the year.

V. If in any such outrage any person be killed, or any damage be done to any person or property, and it appear that any individual or community connected with the offender or offenders had reason to suspect the commission of such an outrage, and took no proper measures to prevent it, or to divulge the grounds of suspicion to the Police Authorities, or made no efforts to suppress it when it was within their power so to do, it shall be lawful for the Magistrate, after such local inquiry as shall be found necessary, to levy such sum or sums of money as may seem proper from such individual or community, and to appropriate the same, wholly or in part, in compensation to the parties subjected to loss or grievance, or as fines to Government; provided that in every case in which any sum of money shall be so levied, the case shall be forthwith reported to the Governor in Council for his final orders, and the Governor in Council, if he shall not think fit to confirm the orders of the Magistrate, may order the amount levied to be restored to the person or persons from whom the same shall have been levied.

VI. All fines and pecuniary liabilities incurred under this Act may be levied by a Magistrate under summary process, in the same manner as the public revenue may be realized by a Collector, provided that the said Magistrate shall not, in respect of any Attachment, Sale, or Warrant of Commitment, ordered or directed under the provisions of this Section, be held subject to the interposition of the ordinary Civil Tribunals, nor shall any such act be held to constitute a legal ground for a Civil Action; anything contained in any Regulation or Act notwithstanding.

VII. The provisions of this Act shall continue in force for the space of five years only.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 30th day of June next.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 31st March 1854:—

ACT No. — OF 1854.

An Act for restricting the Possession of Arms in Malabar.

Whereas it is expedient to place restrictions upon the possession of arms in the District of Malabar, in the Presidency of Fort St. George, It is enacted as follows:—

I. The use of the Ayudha Cutty, or war-knife, or of any similar offensive weapon, is hereby prohibited throughout the District of Malabar; and every person possessing a weapon of the description so designated, or any similar weapon, is required to surrender it, on or before the date which shall be appointed for the above

provisions taking effect, and according to such orders as shall be published in that behalf by the Magistrate.

II. After such date, any person who shall be found in possession of an Ayudha Cutty, or war-knife, or of a similar offensive weapon, or who shall purchase or sell, or manufacture, or cause to be manufactured, any Ayudha Cutty, or war-knife, or similar weapon, shall be liable, on conviction before a Magistrate, to a fine not exceeding fifty Rupees, or to imprisonment, with or without hard labour, for a period not exceeding six months, or to both; and the said war-knife or weapon shall be confiscated.

III. Throughout such parts of the District of Malabar as shall from time to time be notified by public proclamation in the Official Gazette of the said Presidency, it shall not be lawful for any person to purchase, sell, manufacture, or cause to be manufactured, or to have in his possession, any Gun or Sword, without a license from the Magistrate, which license shall specify the name of the person to whom the permission shall be given, whether it is for a Gun or a Sword, and the term for which it is intended to be in force: and every such Gun or Sword licensed by the Magistrate shall be entered in a Register, and numbered, and the number shall be stamped on the Gun or Sword; any person buying, selling, manufacturing, or causing to be manufactured, or being in possession of any Gun or Sword without a license, contrary to the provisions of this Act, shall, on conviction before a Magistrate, be liable for every such offence to a fine not exceeding fifty Rupees, or to imprisonment, with or without hard labour, for a period not exceeding six months, or to both; and the said weapon shall be confiscated.

IV. The Governor in Council of Fort St. George shall appoint the day from which the provisions of Sections I. and II. of this Act shall take effect. He shall also notify by proclamation in the Official Gazette whenever he shall see cause to give effect to the provision of Section III., and shall specify the date from which the provisions of that Section are to be in force, and whether they shall apply to the whole District of Malabar, or only to a certain part, or certain parts of it; and if the latter, to what part or parts. It shall also be competent to the Governor in Council, by proclamation in the Official Gazette of the said Presidency, to direct that the provisions of Section III. of this Act shall cease to have effect in respect to all or any of the parts of the District to which they may have been made applicable.

V. It shall be lawful for the Magistrate of Malabar to cause search to be made by his Police Officers, acting under his warrant, in any house or other place in which any Ayudha Cutty, or war-knife, or any similar offensive weapon, or any unlicensed Gun or Sword may be supposed to be, contrary to this Act; and any such Ayudha Cutty, or war-knife, or any such offensive weapon, Gun, or Sword as aforesaid, which shall be found, may be seized and confiscated. It shall also be competent to the Magistrate, at his discretion, to delegate to any of his European Assistants the powers conferred by this Section. Any person who shall resist or oppose such search or seizure, or forcibly withstand any Police Officer charged with such warrant, shall be liable to the same penalties as if such person had opposed or resisted the execution of a warrant for the search after stolen goods.

VI. The provisions of Section III. of this Act, so far as it prohibits any person from purchasing or having in his possession a Gun or Sword, shall not apply to Europeans or Armenians, or any other person whom the Magistrate shall deem fit specially to exempt therefrom, nor to any persons in the Public Service authorised to bear Arms, in respect to such Arms.

VII. The provisions of Sections III. IV. and V. of this Act shall continue in force for the space of five years only.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 30th day of June next.

All the OFFICERS IN CHARGE OF PUBLIC TREASURIES.

SIR,

It having been determined by Government that every description of Public Building, Furniture, and Stores, whether perishable or not, excepting those supplied for immediate consumption, or to complete an article already on the Books, and articles received on Indent from the Superintendent of Stationery, are to be exhibited *in detail* in a separate Statement of Dead Stock to be kept by you, agreeably to the Forms suggested in my letter to Government No. 49, of the 11th June 1849, (a copy of which was forwarded to the Revenue Commissioners on the 30th of the same month, for general information,) I have the honor to communicate the following more explicit rules for your future guidance:—

1st.—Detailed Statements, according to Form A, showing the original value and designation of Government Buildings, Furniture, Stores, (including such articles purchased from the Petty Supply Fund as the Civil Auditor may order to be debited to Dead Stock,) Mathematical Implements, &c. &c. in each Province and Collectorate in the General, Revenue, Judicial, Political, and Ecclesiastical Departments, also the Dead Stock brought to account and struck off during the year, are to be forwarded by the Officers in charge of Civil Treasuries to the Civil Auditor on the 1st September of each year.

2nd.—The Civil Auditor will examine that portion of the detailed Statements having reference to the articles brought to account and struck off during the year, by comparing the items with the entries in the Cash Accounts of each Officer; and, if correct, countersign and forward the Statements to the Accountant General, who will compare them with the Dead Stock exhibited in the Subordinate Books.

3rd.—District and Subordinate Officers are to forward to the Head Office of their Province or Collectorate, by the 30th of June of each year, a Statement (Form B) of the Dead Stock in their charge, for incorporation in the General Accounts of the Province or Collectorate, showing clearly the alterations which may have taken place during the year in the District Dead Stock.

4th.—The Dead Stock exhibited in the Statement (Form A) is to be entered in *Abstract* in the Subordinate Journals of Account, agreeably to Form C.

5th.—The Dead Stock is to be exhibited alphabetically under the General and Subordinate headings in the Forms A and B, in the manner indicated in the List marked D.

6th.—When an Officer is making over charge of his appointment to another, a Statement of the Dead Stock, the custody of which is transferred at the same time, is to be recorded, signed by both Officers, as “Delivered” and “Received”; and should any article be improperly injured or lost, the Officer in charge at the time the injury or loss is discovered will be held solely accountable for it.

7th.—When an Officer is soliciting the sanction of Government or other Authority to sell or otherwise dispose of Dead Stock, the original value of the Building or article, as stated in the Books, is invariably to be mentioned.

8th.—When the original value of an article of unserviceable Dead Stock does not exceed Rs. 100, the sanction of one of the following Officers will be sufficient for its sale or disposal.

9th.—Political Officers are to apply direct to Government when desiring to write off Unserviceable Dead Stock.

10th.—The cost of additions and improvements to Buildings and other Dead Stock, exceeding Rs. 100, is to be added to the original value of the Dead Stock in each instance. Petty charges for alterations to *Public Buildings* below that sum are to be debited to Charges Extraordinary of the General, Revenue, or Judicial Department, as the case may be.

11th.—On a portion of a Building or other article of Dead Stock being removed or destroyed, an appraised value is to be substituted for the original cost; the difference between the two values being credited to "Dead Stock" by a debit to "Profit and Loss," and the sale proceeds, if any, carried to "Profit and Loss." The same course is to be followed when the whole article is removed, in regard to its entire original value and the sale proceeds.

12th.—The cost of repairs to Dead Stock is to be debited to "Extraordinary Charges" of the Revenue, General, or Judicial Department, as the case may be.

13th.—When Stores of the undermentioned description are supplied to complete an article of Dead Stock already on the Books, the amount of such Stores is to be debited to its appropriate head of charge:—

- Appurtenances of Tents.
- Appurtenances of Flag-staves.
- Hose and Buckets of Fire-Engines.
- Drawing Materials to complete a Paint-box, &c. &c.

P. S.—Since the foregoing Rules were circulated, instructions to the following effect have been issued regarding Commissariat Stores and Stationery:—

The Bills for Commissariat Stores supplied to the Civil Department have been ordered to be forwarded to the Accountant General, with a view to their transmission by that Officer to the Officers in whose Accounts they have to be adjusted, with specific instruction as to the heads to which the charges are to be debited.

It has further been arranged, that each Bill shall be duly receipted by the party to whom the Stores were supplied, before the charges are brought to account.

Similar rules have also been issued with regard to the Stationery supplied to all the Government Offices and Departments.

Is hereby given, that verbal offers for the contracts for the exclusive privilege of SELLING ARRACK, COUNTRY LIQUOR, and INTOXICATING DRUGS, Ganja, Opium, Chruss, Bhang, and Mahajum, to the Native Troops and Camp Followers composing the Deesa Field Brigade, for the term of one year, commencing from the 1st June 1854, will take place at the Office of the Superintendent of Bazars and Police, Deesa at noon on the 2nd day of June 1854, and sealed tenders, accompanied by the requisite cash deposits, will also be received at the Commissary General's Office, Bombay, on the abovementioned day and hour.

2. The Native Troops composing the Deesa Field Brigade are as follows:—

3. The strength of Regiments, &c. to be computed agreeably to the number of men actually present with the Force on the date of the sale, which will be duly notified to the bidders at the time, and the amount of monthly payments shall not be increased or decreased on account of Troops arriving at or departing from the Brigade, unless the strength of such details exceeds one-fourth the number of men on account of whom the contract has been entered into; and it is to be distinctly understood that any alteration in the number of Camp Followers will not entitle the contractors to claim any remission in the payment of the stipulated monthly amount of their respective engagements. The departure of Troops from the Cantonment as above specified will alone give claim for remission.

4. The tenders, verbal and sealed, are to specify the amount offered for the contracts in Company's Rupees, and no persons will be allowed to bid or tender for the contracts unless they previously deposit in this Office, and in that of the Commissary General's Office at Bombay, the sum of Co.'s Rupees five hundred (500) for the Liquor contract, and Rupees twenty-five (25) for the Drug contract, which will be forfeited in the event of delay, evasion, or refusal to execute the necessary deeds of contract; and the person whose offer or tender is accepted will be required to add thereto a further sum sufficient to complete the amount to one month's stipulated payment in advance, which sum (including the above 500 Rupees and 25 Rupees) will be retained as a deposit in the Superintendent of Bazars' Office until the expiration of the engagement.
