Is hereby given, that persons desirous of entering into a contract for SUPPLYING TALLOW, as per Schedule No. 4, to the Commissariat Department at the Presidency, to last until 30th day of April 1855 from the date of the acceptance of the offer, may, on application at this Office from 11 A.M. till 5 P. M. daily (Sundays excepted), obtain copies of the schedule or list of prices, and such information relating thereto as they may require.

2. Verbal offers for the contract will be received at this Office on Friday the 8th proximo, at 2 o'clock precisely, when bidders will be required to bid a per-centage above or below the prices exhibited in the above list at which the supply will be made, on the understanding that the articles supplied are to be of unexceptionable quality, according to musters which may be seen in this Office, or of the sort usually supplied, and

are to be delivered, in the first instance at the Commissariat Stores at the Presidency if required, and afterwards to the indenting Departments, in good condition, free of all charges beyond the stipulated price, in such quantities as may from time to time be demanded, and that the same are liable to examination and rejection by the executive Commissariat Officer, or by the indenting or receiving Officers; or by a Committee of Officers appointed on the part of Government, in the event of the contractor being dissatisfied with the decision of the above Officers, or either of them; it being understood that the decision of such Committee is to be final, and binding on all parties.

3. No person will be allowed to bid for the contract unless he previously deposits in this Office in cash the sum of Rs. (87) eighty-seven, which sum will be forfeited in the event of delay, evasion, or refusal on his part to execute the necessary deed of contract whenever required to do so, on his offer being accepted, in which latter case he must be prepared to give unexceptionable bonded security to the further amount of Rupees (350) three hundred and fifty, which, together with the amount previously deposited, will be held as a guarantee for the due fulfilment of his contract.

4. A contractor must comply immediately with all emergent demands, and meet others of less urgency within the periods stated in the requisitions made upon him; in failure whereof, or if any supply be condemned by a Committee of Officers as aforesaid, the articles, or such others as may be required in lieu thereof, shall be purchased by this Department, without delay, at his risk and cost, if it be considered expedient to do so; and in all such cases (30) thirty per cent. upon the amount of expenses incurred, or a fine of from Rs. (30) thirty to (75) seventy-five, at the option of the executive Commissariat Officer, will be levied as liquidated damages for each and every such breach of contract, it being understood that the simple condemnation of any article by a Committee constitutes such a breach of contract, whether the rejected articles be replaced by the contractor or by this Department; in every such case, also, it is to be understood that the contract may be cancelled, at the discretion of the Commissary General, and that if the contract be so cancelled, the cash deposit mentioned in para. 3 of this Notice will be forfeited to Government.

5. It is also to be understood that any delay, negligence, evasion, or refusal on the part of a contractor to make supplies or obey orders, or any attempt on his part, or that of his agents, to pass off articles of an inferior quality in lieu of those he is bound to supply, or any neglect to deliver them at the time and place ordered, will subject him, in every instance, to be fined to the extent of Rupees (25) twenty-five, at the option of the executive Commissariat Officer, from whose order an appeal may be made to the Commissary General, whose decision is to be final; but in cases when it may be deemed fit to exact any of the penalties provided for in the preceding Clause, no further penalty shall be leviable under this Clause.

6. It is further to be understood, that the contractor, or an accredited agent on his part, approved of by the executive Commissariat Officer, is to attend at this Office during the usual hours of business, i. e. from 10 A. M. to 5 P. M. daily (Sundays excepted), also at such other time or place as may be indicated by the executive

Commissariat Officer, when he may consider it desirable for the public service to require such attendance.

7. Any party whose offer is accepted will be required to produce his sureties for the approval of the Honorable Company's Solicitor, within fifteen days from the date of the acceptance of his offer, or the contract will be resold. No reason will be stated for rejecting any security offered.

8. Bills for articles supplied under this contract must be preferred within one month from the date of the delivery of the articles, in default of which the contractor will forfeit the full value of the supplies for which bills have not been so preferred, unless it clearly appear, to the satisfaction of the Commissary General, that the delay was unavoidable.

9. The amount of retrenchments made by the Military Board on the contractors' bills will be recovered from the first bills preferred for payment; but in the event of such retrenchments, or any portion thereof, being remitted, the amount remitted will be refunded.

10. Any party who, after offering for the contract, fails to furnish the necessary security, as provided for in Clause 7 of this Notice, will be interdicted from bidding on future occasions, unless he produces a document from some person or persons of unexceptionable character and sufficient means, guaranteeing the due execution and performance of the contract, on his offer being accepted.

11. The annual outlay on the above contract is estimated at Rs. (1,752) one thousand seven hundred and fifty-two.

12. No reason will be assigned for the rejection of any offer.

2. Verbal offers for the contracts will be received by the above-named Officer on the date and hour specified in the preceding paragraph; and sealed tenders, accompanied by the requisite cash deposit, will also be received by the Commissary General of the Army at Bombay, on the same date.

3. No person will be allowed to bid or tender for the contracts unless he deposits with his offer the sum of Company's Rupees (120) one hundred and twenty for the Liquor, and Rupees (60) sixty for the Drug contract, which will be forfeited in the event of delay, evasion, or refusal to execute the necessary deed of contract; and two unexceptionable securities will also be required from the highest bidders, to guarantee their fulfilment of the terms of the respective contracts.

But the contracts will be sold for the actual number of Troops that may be present on the day of sale, which will be duly notified to the bidders at the time, and the amount of the monthly payment shall not be increased or decreased on account of Troops arriving at or departing from the Cantonment, unless the strength of such Details exceeds one-fourth the number of men for whom the contracts have been entered into. It is, however, to be distinctly understood, that any alteration in the number of Camp Followers will not entitle the contractor to claim any remission in the payment of the stipulated monthly amount of their respective engagements: the departure of Troops from the Cantonment, as above specified, will alone give claim for remission.

5. The conditions of the contracts shall not be considered binding, or in force in any respect, until the same are confirmed by the superior authority.

6. The person or persons whose tenders may be accepted will be required, ere entering on the performance of their contracts, to deposit with the Superintendent of Bazars the amount of one month's stipulated payment, as his or their personal security for the due execution of the agreement. This is to be in addition to the monthly payment in advance of the sums tendered for the contracts.

7. Further particulars, relative to these contracts will be made known on application at the Office of the Superintendent of Bazars at Baroda, and that of the Commissary General of the Army at Bombay, from 10 A. M. till 4 P. M. every day, Sundays excepted.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

29th July 1854.

The following Act, passed by the Legislative Council, received the assent of the Most Noble the Governor General of India on the 28th July 1854, and is hereby promulgated for general information :—

ACT No. XVI. OF 1854.

An Act to amend Regulation XI. of 1831 of the Bengal Code.

Whereas the provisions of Section III. and Section VII. of Regulation XI. 1831, have been found inconvenient; and whereas it is expedient that Regulation XI. 1831, as amended by this Act, should be extended to the whole of the Province of Benares; it is enacted as follows :—

I. Sections III. and VII. Regulation XI. 1831 of the Bengal Code are hereby repealed.

II. Wherever any Tehseeldar shall have Police jurisdiction under the provisions of Section II. of the said Regulation XI. 1831, every Darogah of Police hereafter appointed within the local limits of the Police jurisdiction of such Tehseeldar, shall be subordinate to, and subject to the control of such Tehseeldar, in his capacity of Chief Police Thanadar.

III. Regulation XI. 1831, as amended by this Act, shall extend to the whole of the Province of Benares, and all powers vested by the said Regulation in the Governor General in Council, may be exercised by the Lieutenant Governor of the North-Western Provinces.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

29th July 1854.

The following Bill was read a second time in the Legislative Council on the 29th of July 1854, and referred to a Select Committee, who are to report thereon after the 2nd of October next :—

A Bill for withdrawing certain Privileges enjoyed by the Nazim and his Family.

Whereas it is expedient to withdraw certain privileges accorded by the Regulations of the Bengal Code to the Nazim and to the family of the Nazim, and to provide for executing within the precincts of the palace of the Nazim at Moorshedabad legal process issued by any Civil or Criminal Court or Officer of the East India Company; it is enacted as follows :—

I. Section 10, Regulation XVI. of 1793, Regulation XIX. of 1805, Regulation XVI. of 1806, and Regulation XIX. of 1825 are hereby repealed.

II. When any summons or other process, issued by any Court, Judge, Magistrate, Collector, or other Officer in the territories of the East India Company, is required to be served or executed within the precincts of the palace of the Nazim at Moorshedabad, such summons or other process shall be transmitted to the Superintendent of the affairs of the Nizamut, or other Officer, however denominated, exercising for the time being the control and superintendence of the affairs of the Nizamut, and such Superintendent or other Officer shall cause such summons or other process to be served or executed according to the exigency thereof, and shall return the same with a certificate of what shall have been done thereon.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

5th August 1854.

The following Bill was read a second time in the Legislative Council on the 5th of August 1854, and referred to a Select Committee, who are to report thereon after the 9th of November 1854 :—

A Bill relating to Mesne Profits, and to Improvements made by Holders under Defective Titles.

Preamble.—Whereas it is expedient to limit the liability for mesne profits in certain cases, and to secure to *bonâ fide* holders under defective titles the value of improvements made by them; It is enacted as follows :—

I. No tenant shall be chargeable in any action for mesne profits, or suit in the nature of one, with any rents or profits, which before or pending the suit he has paid over to the landlord from whom he derived his title as tenant, or to whom he had *bonâ fide* attained before the commencement of the litigation as to the title, but the claim must be asserted against the party receiving the rents and profits from such tenant.

II. No account for mesne profits shall be carried back in any Court of law or action or suit beyond the time of notice of the real title to the party against whom such demand is made, and demand of possession under it, unless the possession was taken by violence, or with knowledge of the real title.

III. Any person who is evicted by better title from immovable property acquired by him *bonâ fide*, in the belief that he took a good holding title, shall be entitled to have the value of all buildings and other improvements which he has *bonâ fide* made in the lands estimated and secured to him, and may set off the same against the rent and profits for which he may be liable to account, and shall have for the whole of the surplus a lien on the estate, which may be enforced as the lien of an unpaid vendor for his purchase-money.

The following Bill was read a second time in the Legislative Council on the 5th of August 1854, and referred to a Select Committee, who are to report thereon after the 9th of November 1854 :—

A Bill to provide Compensation to Families for Loss occasioned by the Death of a Person, caused by Actionable Wrong.

I. It is enacted, that whenever the death of a person shall be caused by wrongful act, neglect, or default, and the act, neglect, or default is such as would (if death had not ensued) have entitled the party injured to maintain an action, and recover damages in respect thereof, then, and in every such case, the party who would have been liable if death had not ensued, shall be liable to an action or suit for damages, notwithstanding the death of the person injured, and although the death shall have been caused under such circumstances as amount in law to felony. And it is enacted further, that every such action or suit shall be for the benefit of the wife, husband, parent, and child, all or any of them, of the person whose death shall have been so caused, and shall be brought by and in the name of the Executor, Administrator, or Representative of the person deceased; and in every such action the Court may give such damages as it may

think proportioned to the loss resulting from such death to the parties respectively, for whom, and for whose benefit, such action shall be brought, and the amount so recovered, after deducting all costs and expenses, including the costs not recovered from the defendant, shall be divided amongst the before-mentioned parties in such shares as the Court by its verdict or sentence shall find and direct, provided always that not more than one action shall be for and in respect of the same subject matter of complaint, and that every such action shall be brought within twelve calendar months after the death of such deceased person.

II. And it is further enacted, that on the institution of such action or suit, or as soon after as the Court shall direct, the plaintiff shall deliver to the defendant, or to his Attorney or Vakeel, or person by the practice of the Court authorised to appear and act for him, a full particular of the person or persons for whom and on whose behalf such action or suit shall be brought, and of the nature of the claim in respect of which damages shall be sought to be recovered.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

The following Bill was read a second time in the Legislative Council on the 5th of August 1854, and referred to a Select Committee, who are to report thereon after the 9th November 1854 :—

A Bill to improve the English Law in force in India, by extending to this Country, with some enlargement thereof, the Provisions of Statute 3rd and 4th William IV. Cap. 42, Section 2.

Whereas by the English Law in force in India, many actions for wrongs do not survive against the Executor or Administrator of the wrong-doer, or in favour of the Executor or Administrator of the injured person, and it is desirable to extend to this country, with some enlargement thereof, certain provisions contained in a certain Act of Parliament which has been passed for remedying these defects in the law, that is to say, the Statute 3rd and 4th William IV. Cap. 42, Section 2; It is therefore enacted that

An action may be maintained by the Executors, Administrators, or Representatives of any person deceased for any wrong committed in the life-time of such person towards him, which has occasioned pecuniary loss to his estate, for which wrong an action might have been maintained by such person, but which, before the passing of this Act, would not have survived to his Representatives, so as such wrong or injury shall have been committed within one year, or have been without his neglect first known to him within one year before the death of such deceased person, and provided such action shall be brought within one year after the death of such person, and the damages when recovered shall be part of the personal estate of such person; and further, an action may be maintained against the Executors, Administrators, or Representatives of any person deceased for any such wrong committed by him in his life-time, and which would not have survived against his Representatives, so as such injury shall have been committed within one year before such person's death, and so as such action shall be brought within six calendar months after such Executors or Administrators shall have taken upon themselves the administration of the estate and effects of such person; and the damages to be recovered in such action shall be payable in like order of administration as the simple contract debts of such person. And when any action or suit has been commenced by the injured party in his life-time, it shall not abate by his death or be lost, whatever be its nature, but the Executors, Administrators, or Representatives may continue it

for the purpose of recovering the costs and expenses of suing, or any special or consequential or other loss or damage included in the action which the injury has occasioned, or may occasion, to the estate of the deceased.
