3 of Bombay Act IV. of 1868 certain rules of assessment for lands within the sites of the cities and towns of Ahmedabad, Broach, Surat, Ránder and Bulsár, the Governor in Council is pleased to make the following rules and to direct that they be inserted at the places indicated by the numbers respectively assigned to them in the general body of rules made under the said Code and published at pages 795-816 of the *Bombay Government Gazette* for 1881, viz.:—

(d.) *Special rules for sites of certain cities and towns.*

34A. Except as is otherwise provided in Special rules for the sites of Ahmedabad, Broach, Surat, Ránder and Bulsár, Rule 34G., nothing in Rules 15 to 34, both inclusive, shall be applicable to the grant of occupancies of lands within

the sites of the cities and towns of Ahmedabad (inclusive of the suburb of Saraspur), Broach, Surat, Ránder and Bulsár.

To the said lands the provisions of the next following Rules 34B. to 34J., both inclusive, shall apply.

34B. Whenever the holder of a building-site

Disposal of strips of land adjacent to existing building sites. within any of the said sites desires to acquire any small strip of ground belonging to Government which is adjacent to his site and which could not reasonably be disposed of by the Collector as a separate site, the Collector may, if he thinks fit and notwithstanding anything contained in Rule 9 to the contrary, dispose of such strip to the said holder by sale, subject to the same tenure and to payment of ground-rent or assessment at the same rate, if any, on which he holds the said site.

34C. Except as provided in the last preceding rule, the Collector shall not:

(a) dispose of the proprietary right in the soil of any land, within the site of any of the said towns or cities, or

(b) grant the occupancy of any land therein for any greater period than is prescribed in Rules 34E., 34F. and 34G., respectively.

34D. The occupancy of any unoccupied land

Occupancies may be granted for agricultural or non-agricultural purposes. within the site of any of the said towns or cities not assigned for special purposes may, at the Collector's discretion, be granted to such person as the Collector deems fit either for purposes of agriculture only or for other purposes.

34E. The occupancy of land for building-

Terms on which building-sites may be disposed of. sites shall be granted under written leases at a ground-rent of two pies per square yard per annum on such terms and in such form as shall from time to time be approved by Government, for terms expiring on the date fixed in this behalf by Government for each city or town.

34F. The occupancy of land eventually in-

Terms on which lands intended for future building-sites may be temporarily disposed of. tended for building-sites, but of which the immediate disposal for the said purpose appears to the Collector to be undesirable, may be let, under written leases in a form approved by Government, for short terms not exceeding in any case seven years, at a ground-rent of one anna per square yard per annum. It will be a condition of such leases that no permanent building shall be erected upon the land, or, which amounts to the same thing, that at the end of the term the land shall be restored by the lessee in the same condition in which he takes it.

34G. The occupancy of land granted by the

Terms on which lands may be disposed of for agricultural purposes only. Collector for purposes of agriculture only shall be granted for terms of one year only.

An agreement in the form of Appendix D. shall be taken from every person who is to become a registered occupant of land under this section, and the provisions of Rule 32 shall be applicable to every agreement so taken.

This rule shall not be deemed to apply to agricultural lands which, though situated within the site of any of the towns or cities aforesaid, are subjected to a survey settlement similar to that applied to lands of the same description outside the said sites. Such lands shall be subject to the same rules as those last named.

34H. Except under special circumstances, no

No. 8339.—The following Regulations respecting the examination of candidates for the Civil Service of India, which is to be held in June 1886, are published for general information :—

## “EXAMINATIONS FOR THE CIVIL SERVICE OF INDIA.

### REGULATIONS FOR THE OPEN COMPETITION OF JUNE 1886.

*N.B.—The Regulations are liable to be altered in future years.*

1. On the 1st June 1886, and following days, an Examination open to all qualified persons will be held in London (a). Not fewer than persons will be selected, if so many shall be found duly qualified; viz., for the Lower Provinces of Bengal (including Assam); for the Upper Provinces of Bengal (including the Punjab and Oudh); for Burma; for Madras, and for Bombay (b).

2. No person will be deemed qualified who shall not satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners—

(i.) That he is a natural-born subject of Her Majesty.

(ii.) That his age will be above seventeen years and under nineteen years on the 1st January 1886. [*N.B.—In the case of Natives of India this must be certified by the Government of India, or of the Presidency or Province in which the Candidate may have resided.*]

(iii.) That he has no disease, constitutional affection, or bodily infirmity unfitting him, or likely to unfit him, for the Civil Service of India.

(iv.) That he is of good moral character.

3. Should the evidence upon the above points be *prima facie* satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners, the Candidate, on payment of the prescribed fee (c), will be admitted to the Examination. The Commissioners may however, in their discretion, at any time prior to the grant of the Certificate of Qualification hereinafter referred to, institute such further inquiries as they may deem necessary; and if the result of such inquiries, in the case of any Candidate, should be unsatisfactory to them in any of the above respects, he will be ineligible for admission to the Civil Service of India; and if already selected will be removed from the position of a Probationer.

(a) An order for admission to the Examination will be sent to each Candidate on the 18th of May.

(b) The numbers will be announced hereafter.

(c) The fee (£5) will be payable by means of a special stamp according to instructions which will be communicated to Candidates.

Candidates are at liberty to name any or all of these branches of knowledge. No subjects are obligatory.

5. The merit of the persons examined will be estimated by marks; and the number set opposite to each branch in the preceding regulation denotes the greatest number of marks that can be obtained in respect of it.

6. The marks assigned to Candidates in each branch will be subject to such deduction as the Civil Service Commissioners may deem necessary (g), in order to secure that a Candidate be allowed no credit at all for taking up a subject in which he is a mere smatterer.

7. The Examination will be conducted on paper and *visd voce*, as may be deemed necessary.

8. The marks obtained by each Candidate, in respect of each of the subjects in which he shall have been examined, will be added up, and the names of the several Candidates who shall have obtained, after the deduction above mentioned, a greater aggregate number of marks than any of the remaining Candidates, will be set forth in order of merit, and such Candidates shall be deemed to be selected Candidates for the Civil Service of India, provided they appear to be in other respects duly qualified. Should any of the Selected Candidates become disqualified, the Secretary of State for India will determine whether the vacancy thus created shall be filled up or not. In the former case, the Candidate next in order of merit, and in other respects duly qualified, shall be deemed to be a Selected Candidate. A Selected Candidate declining

(d) A considerable portion of the marks for English History and Literature will be allotted to the work selected by the Candidate. (See notice on p. 1207). In awarding marks for this, regard will be had partly to the extent and importance of the periods or books selected, but chiefly to the thoroughness with which they have been studied.

(e) The Examination will range from Arithmetic, Algebra, and Elementary Geometry, up to the elements of the differential and integral calculus including the lower portions of applied Mathematics.

(f) The standard of marking in Sanskrit and Arabic will be determined with reference to a high degree of proficiency, such as may be expected to be reached by a Native of good education.

(g) Marks assigned in English Composition and Mathematics will be subject to no deduction. Each science will, for the purpose of deduction, be treated as a separate subject.

9. Selected Candidates, before proceeding to India, will be on probation for two years, during which time they will be examined periodically, with a view of testing their progress in the following subjects:— (h)

In these Examinations, as in the open competition, the merit of the Candidates examined will be estimated by marks, and the number set opposite to each subject denotes the greatest number of marks that can be obtained in respect of it at any one Examination. The Examination will be conducted on paper and *vivâ voce*, as may be deemed necessary. The last of these Examinations will be held at the close of the second year of probation, and will be called the 'Final Examination,' at which it will be decided whether a Selected Candidate is qualified for the Civil Service of India. At this Examination Candidates will be permitted to take up any one of the following branches of Natural Science, viz.—Agricultural Chemistry, Botany, Geology, or Zoology, for which 350 marks will be allowed.

10. Candidates will be tested during their probation as to their ability to perform journeys on horseback; and no Candidate will be deemed qualified for the Civil Service of India who fails to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners of his competence in this respect.

11. Any Candidate who, at any of the periodical Examinations, shall appear to have wilfully neglected his studies, or to be physically incapacitated for pursuing the prescribed course of training, will be liable to have his name removed from the list of Selected Candidates.

12. The Selected Candidates who, at the Final Examination, shall be found to have a competent knowledge of the subjects specified in Regulation 9, and who shall have satisfied the Civil Service Commissioners of their eligibility in respect of nationality, age, health, character, and ability to ride, shall be certified by the said Commissioners to be entitled to be appointed to the Civil Service of India, provided they shall comply with the regulations in force, at the time, for that Service.

13. Persons desirous to be admitted as Candidates must apply on Forms,\* which may be obtained from 'The Secretary, Civil Service Commission, London, S.W.', at any time after the 1st December 1885. The Forms must be returned so as to be received at the office of the Civil Service Commissioners on or before 31st March 1886 (2).

(h) Full instructions as to the course of study to be pursued will be issued to the successful Candidates as soon as possible after the result of the Open Competition is declared.

\* Copies of these Regulations and of the form of application may be obtained on application to the Secretary to Government, Revenue Department, Bombay.

(i) These forms should be accompanied by evidence on the points mentioned in Regulation 2, and by a list of the subjects in which the Candidate desires to be examined. Evidence of health and character must bear date not earlier than 1st March 1886. Applications for leave to alter or add to the list of subjects named will not be entertained unless received on or before the 4th of May.

The Civil Service Commissioners are authorized by the Secretary of State for India in Council to make the following announcements:—

(1) *Selected Candidates will be permitted to choose, according to the order in which they stand in the list resulting from the open competition, so long as a choice remains, the Presidency (and in Bengal the Division of the Presidency) to which they shall be appointed; but this choice will be subject to a different arrangement, should the Secretary of State, or the Government of India, deem it necessary (k).*

(2) *The Probationers having passed the necessary Examinations, will be required to report their arrival in India within such period after the grant of their Certificate of Qualification as the Secretary of State may in each case direct.*

(3) *The seniority in the Civil Service of India of the Selected Candidates shall be determined according to the order in which they stand on the list resulting from the Final Examination.*

(4) *An allowance amounting to £300 will be given to all Candidates who pass their probation at one of the Universities or Colleges which have been approved by the Secretary of State, viz., the Universities of Oxford, Cambridge, Dublin, Glasgow, Edinburgh, St. Andrew's, and Aberdeen; University College, London; and King's College, London; provided such Candidates shall have passed the required Examinations to the satisfaction of the Civil Service Commissioners, and shall have complied with such rules as may be laid down for the guidance of Selected Candidates.*

*Candidates are not permitted to migrate from the University originally chosen by them to another University without first applying to the India Office for the permission, and receiving the sanction, of the Secretary of State, who will not entertain such applications unless good and sufficient reasons are assigned.*

(5) *Selected Candidates desiring to remain in this country an additional year after the completion of their two years' probation for the purpose of taking a degree at one of the Universities above-mentioned, should apply to the Secretary of State for India for permission to do so. Besides the allowances above-mentioned, a bonus of £150 will, as a temporary and experimental measure, be paid to any Candidate who, having obtained permission to remain an additional year, passes an examination qualifying for a degree in Honours at Oxford or Cambridge, or, being a student of University College, London, passes with credit an Honour Examination of the University of London. This privilege will be hereafter extended to any other of the Universities above referred to, at which an academical distinction is obtainable which, in the opinion of the Secretary of State, corresponds to a degree in Honours at Oxford or Cambridge, and to obtain which the additional year's residence in this country is necessary.*

(6) *All Selected Candidates will be required, after having passed the first periodical Examination, and before receiving the first instalment of their allowance, to attend at the India Office for the purpose of entering into an agreement binding themselves, amongst other things, to refund in certain cases the amount of their allowance in the event of their failing to proceed to India. A surety will be required.*

(7) *After passing the Final Examination, each Candidate will be required to attend again at the India Office, with the view of entering into covenants, by which, amongst other things, they will bind themselves to agree to such Regulations for the provision of pensions for their families as may be*

(k) *This choice must be exercised immediately after the result of the Open Competition is announced, on such day as may be fixed by the Civil Service Commissioners.*

(8). Candidates rejected at the Final Examination of 1888, will in no case be allowed to present themselves for re-examination.

### ENGLISH LITERATURE.

Under this head there will be (besides the general paper) a special paper on the following books:—

1. CHAUCER.—Prologue and Knight's Tale.
2. SHAKESPEARE.—King Lear, Merchant of Venice.
3. BACON.—Essays, I.—XXX, inclusive.
4. BYRON.—Childe Harold.
5. BURKE.—Thoughts on Present Discontents, Speeches on American Taxation, and Conciliation with America.

The oral examination in English Literature will have reference chiefly to such works, not included in the foregoing list, as the Candidate may offer for the purpose.

### EVIDENCE OF AGE TO BE REQUIRED FROM CANDIDATES FOR THE CIVIL SERVICE OF INDIA.

I.—Every Candidate born in the United Kingdom should produce a Certificate from the Registrar-General of Births, Marriages, and Deaths, or from one of his provincial Officers. This Certificate may be obtained from the Registrar-General in London, Dublin or Edinburgh, or from the Superintendent Registrar of the district in which the birth took place.

II. A Candidate born of European parents in India may produce a Certificate of Baptism from the district in which he was baptised. When such certificates are not in the possession of the candidates an Extract from the Registers kept at the India Office will probably be obtainable.

III.—A Candidate who is a Native of India must have his age certified by the Government of India, or of the Presidency or Province in which he may have resided.

Except as noted in paragraphs II. and III. every Candidate is expected to produce a Certificate of Birth. The Civil Service Commissioners will not in ordinary cases accept a Certificate of Baptism, or other testimony, unless they are first satisfied that a certificate of Birth cannot be procured.

Official Certificates of Birth may generally be obtained as follows :—

(a.) *For persons born in England or Wales since 30th June, 1837.*—From the Registrar General, Somerset House, London, or from the Superintendent Registrar of the district in which the birth took place.

(b.) *For persons born in Scotland since 31st December, 1854.*—From the General Register Office, Edinburgh; or from the Registrar of the parish or district in which the birth took place.

(c.) *For persons born in Ireland since 31st December, 1863.*—From the General Register Office, Dublin; or from the Superintendent Registrar of the district in which the birth took place.

(d.) *For persons of English, Scottish, or Irish parentage born on board British ships since the dates mentioned in (a), (b), and (c), respectively.*—From the General Register Office, London, Edinburgh, or Dublin, according to parentage.

(e.) *For persons born in India of European parents.*—From the India Office, London.

Any Candidate who cannot produce a Certificate of Birth from one of the authorities named should, if possible, procure a Certificate of Baptism, and should then apply to the Secretary, Civil Service Commission, for further instructions.

No. 6274.—The following Notification by the Government of India in the Foreign Department is republished:—

“No. 2927 I.—Whereas Her Highness the Begum of Bhopal has ceded to the British Government full jurisdiction in the lands lying within Her Highness's territory, which are occupied, or may be hereafter occupied, by the Bhopal State Railway (including the lands occupied as stations, out-buildings, and for other railway purposes): In exercise of this jurisdiction and of the powers conferred by sections 4 and 5 of the Foreign Jurisdiction and Extradition Act, 1879, and of all other powers enabling him in this behalf, the Governor-General in Council is pleased to issue the following Notification:—

1. The Political Agent for the time being in Bhopal shall exercise the powers of a District Magistrate and a Court of Session, as described in the Code of Criminal Procedure, 1882, within the aforesaid lands: Provided that, in any case in which the complainant (if any), and all the accused persons, are not British subjects, it shall be in the discretion of the said Political Agent to decline to exercise the powers hereby conferred upon him.
2. The Agent to the Governor-General in Central India for the time being shall exercise the powers of a Court of Session and a High Court, as described in the said Code, in respect of all offences over which magisterial jurisdiction is exercised by the said Political Agent within the aforesaid lands: Provided that the said Political Agent shall not commit any accused person for trial to the Agent to the Governor-General acting as a Court of Session.
3. The Agent to the Governor-General in Central India for the time being shall exercise the powers of a High Court, as described in the said Code, in respect of all offences over which the jurisdiction of a Court of Session is exercised by the said Political Agent within the aforesaid lands.
4. In the exercise of the jurisdiction of a Court of Session conferred upon him by this Notification, the said Political Agent may take cognizance of any offence as a Court of original criminal jurisdiction without the accused person being committed to him by a Magistrate, and shall, when so taking cognizance of any offence, follow the procedure laid down by the Code of Criminal Procedure, 1882, for the trial of warrant cases by Magistrates.
5. The administration of the police within the aforesaid lands shall be vested in the District Superintendent of Police for the

time being of the Hoshangabad District, who, in subordination to the said Political Agent, shall have within the aforesaid lands the same police powers as he has for the time being in that district.

6. The said District Superintendent of Police shall have within the aforesaid lands, in subordination to the said Political Agent, the powers of a Magistrate of the second class, as described in the Code of Criminal Procedure, 1882: Provided that in any case in which the complainant, if any, and all the accused persons are not British subjects, it shall be in the discretion of the said District Superintendent of Police to decline to exercise the powers hereby conferred upon him,
7. The provisions, so far as they may be applicable, of the Indian Penal Code (Act XLV of 1860), the Whipping Act (Act VI of 1864), the Code of Criminal Procedure, 1882, and Act V of 1861 (for the regulation of Police), shall be in force in the aforesaid lands,
8. The provisions of this Notification apply to all proceedings except proceedings against European British subjects or persons jointly charged with European British subjects.
9. The Notification of the Government of India in the Foreign Department cited below is hereby cancelled:—

‘Notification No. 236-I.J., dated the 2nd December 1881.’

No. 6275.—The following Notification by the Government of India in the Foreign Department is republished:—

“No. 2925 I.—Whereas His Highness the Raja of Nabha and His Highness the Raja of Faridkot have granted to the British Government full jurisdiction within the lands which lie within their respective States and are occupied, or may be hereafter occupied, by the Rowari-Ferozpur State Railway, including the lands occupied as stations, out-buildings, and for other purposes connected with the railway within their territories: In exercise of this jurisdiction, and of the powers conferred by sections 4 and 5 of the Foreign Jurisdiction and Extradition Act, 1879, and of all other powers enabling him in this behalf, the Governor-General in Council is pleased to issue the following Notification:—

1. All laws for the time being in force in the Ferozpur District of the Punjab are hereby extended to the aforesaid lands.
2. The Deputy Commissioner of the Ferozpur District, the Commissioner of the Jalandhar Division, the Financial Commissioner

of the Punjab, and the Lieutenant-Governor of the Punjab and its Dependencies, for the time being, shall respectively have within the aforesaid lands the same executive powers as they may respectively exercise within the British territories subject to their administration.

3. British Courts having jurisdiction within the Ferozpur District may exercise within the aforesaid lands the jurisdiction which they respectively exercise within the said district.
4. Within the aforesaid lands the administration of the police shall be vested in the Assistant Inspector-General of Railway Police, or such other officer as the said Lieutenant-Governor may appoint, by name or in virtue of his office, in that behalf. The Assistant Inspector-General or other officer as aforesaid shall have the same police powers as may be exercised by the District Superintendent of Police under any law for the time being in force in the Ferozpur District, in subordination to the Deputy Commissioner of the Ferozpur District and the Inspector-General of Police in the Punjab.

No. 3913.—Under the provisions of Section 9B. of the Bombay Municipal Acts of 1872 and 1878 His Excellency the Governor in Council is pleased to make the following rules :—

Whenever a vacancy or vacancies in the Town Council occasioned by death, resignation or disqualification of any member or members occur and such member or members were originally elected by the Corporation, or whenever it is necessary for the Corporation to elect members of the Town Council under any of the provisions of the Bombay Municipal Acts of 1872 and 1878, the election by the Corporation to fill up such vacancy or vacancies or to elect such members shall be conducted in the following manner :—

1. The meeting at which such election is to be held shall be called in the manner provided by the said Municipal Acts.

2. No candidate shall be duly qualified for election unless his nomination duly seconded be deposited with the Clerk to the Corporation at least three clear days before the day of the meeting at which such election is to take place.
3. When the number of valid nominations is the same or less than the number of vacancies the person or persons nominated shall be deemed to be elected, and in such case the Chairman of the meeting shall declare the person or persons so nominated to have been elected accordingly.
4. Where the number of valid nominations exceeds the number of vacancies the election shall be by ballot.
5. Ballot papers with the names of the persons nominated printed thereon will be furnished to the members of the Corporation at the meeting held for the purpose of the election.
6. Each member may vote for as many candidates as there are vacancies. At the time of voting each member of the Corporation will place a cross on the right hand side of the Ballot paper opposite the name of each candidate for whom he votes thus (x), and will then fold up the Ballot paper and without showing the front of the paper to any person will, in the presence of the Chairman of the meeting, put the paper into the Ballot Box.

If a member votes for more candidates than there are vacancies, or places any mark on the paper by which he may afterwards be identified, his Ballot paper will be void and will not be counted.

7. No Ballot papers will be received after one hour from the hour for which the meeting has been called. The Ballot Box will then be opened by the Chairman of the meeting, who will initial each Ballot paper.

The Ballot paper will then (in the presence of the Chairman of the meeting) be examined by the Clerk to the Corporation, assisted by such scrutineers not exceeding three in number as the Corporation may appoint. When the scrutiny is completed the Ballot papers shall be recorded together with a statement in writing of the result of the voting under the signature of the Chairman, who shall declare such result to the meeting. In case any two or more candidates shall receive an equal number of votes, the Chairman shall have a casting vote.

No. 76.—Under the provisions of Sections 72 and 74 of the Bombay Port Trust Act, 1879, the following additional bye-laws made by the Trustees of the Port of Bombay under the former section are published :—

### *Pilots for Special Dock Duties.*

1. In addition to the Pilot Service constituted under Bye-law 13 made under Section 72 of the Bombay Port Trust Act, 1879, the Trustees may appoint and license any person as a "Special Dock Pilot" to pilot vessels belonging to any private Company who own or who are the lessees of Graving Docks at Mázaon or at Hog Island in that part of the harbour which is to the north of Cross Island between the fixed moorings belonging to any such private Company (duly laid and maintained under the written special permission of the Trustees) and from and to such moorings, to and from the Graving Docks belonging to any such Company, and also to pilot any vessels requiring to use or which may have just previously used the Hydraulic Lift Dock at Hog Island in that part of the harbour which lies to the north of Cross Island to or from the Hydraulic Lift Dock at Hog Island, provided that no person shall be so licensed and appointed unless he shall be authorized by Government under the provisions of the Indian Ports Act to pilot vessels.

2. Every such Special Dock Pilot shall hold a license to pilot vessels belonging to the Company mentioned in such license, only in that part of the harbour which lies north of Cross Island between the fixed moorings of such Company and from and to the moorings to and from the Graving Docks belonging to or leased by such Company, and also to pilot any vessel requiring to use or which may have just previously used the Hydraulic Lift Dock at Hog Island in that part of the harbour which lies to the north of Cross Island to or from the Hydraulic Lift Dock at Hog Island, and which license shall be issued under the signature and seal and be revocable at the order of the Trustees of the Port.

3. The fee for a Special Pilot's license shall be Rs. 5 to be paid by such Special Pilot to the Port Trustees.

4. To be eligible to be licensed and appointed as a Special Pilot, every candidate must be a British subject and at least 21 years of age and must possess a certificate of competency in the Merchant's service of a grade not lower than that of First Mate, and must pass an Examination as to his knowledge of the duties appertaining to the office of such Special Pilot before the Examination Board, hereinafter named, and must produce a certificate from such Examination Board that he is duly qualified to perform such duties.

5. The fee for every candidate for examination shall be Rs. 20 to be divided between the two members of the Examination Board.

6. The Examination Board shall consist of the Port Officer, or his First Assistant, as President, one Harbour Master and one First Grade or Second Grade Pilot as members.

7. Every such Special Pilot before he allows any vessel to be moved shall give at least four hours' notice in writing to the Port Officer at the Port Office between the hours of 10 A.M. and 5 P.M. on week days of the intended movements of such vessel, specifying the time of such intended movements, and in the event of the Port Officer, Master Attendant, or any of their Assistants or Harbour Masters not signifying their dissent before the time stated in such notice for the movement of such vessel, such Special Pilot may proceed with such removal, but not otherwise.

8. Every Special Pilot so to be appointed and licensed as aforesaid shall be under the authority and direction of the Port Officer and Master Attendant, and his or their Assistants, and of the Harbour Masters in all respects relating to his said duties as such Special Pilot, and every verbal order or instruction given by the Port Officer or Master Attendant or his Assistants or by any of the Harbour Masters or other officers of the Department must be promptly attended to and carried into effect by such Special Pilot, who will be careful to conform to, and to make himself acquainted with, all circulars and orders issued from time to time for guidance in connection with his duties.

9. No Special Dock Pilot so to be licensed and appointed shall in any case pilot any vessel except—

(1) vessels belonging to the Company mentioned in the license in that part of the harbour only which lies to the north of Cross Island and only between the fixed moorings to or from the Graving Docks belonging to or leased by such Company at Mázgaon or at Hog Island; or

(2) vessels requiring to use, or which may have just previously used, the Hydraulic Lift Dock to or from the Hydraulic Lift Dock at Hog Island in that part of the harbour only which lies to the north of Cross Island.

10. No Special Pilot shall on any account run unnecessary risks by venturing within the leading marks or by keeping vessels under weigh when the lights cannot be seen, and whilst under weigh the lead shall be kept going and the soundings be carefully observed.

11. Each Special Pilot shall be provided with such distinguishing flag as may be ordered by the Port Officer, which is to be displayed hoisted under the national flag of vessels of which he is in charge.

12. The following Bye-laws made under Section 72 of the Port Trust Act shall apply to Special Pilots, and be regarded by them, viz., Bye-law 35 from the commencement down to the word "personally"; Bye laws 43, 52; Bye-law 53 from the commencement down to the words "before going on with the mooring"; and, save as aforesaid, none of the said bye-laws shall apply to Special Pilots to be licensed as aforesaid.

13. No Special Dock Pilot so to be licensed shall be entitled to receive any remuneration from the Trustees of the Port, and no pilotage fees or transporting fees shall be charged by the Trustees or by any other person, or be received by any Special Pilot or other person, for rendering his

services as such Special Pilot, and no Special Pilot shall be entitled to the benefit of any of the Pension and Provident Fund Rules of the Port Trustees; and the grant of any special license shall in no way whatever prevent or prohibit any licensed general Pilot of the Port from performing any or all the duties for which such special license may have been granted.

14. In the event of any Special Dock Pilot disobeying or infringing any of the aforesaid Bye-laws, he shall be liable to a fine of Rs. 200 for every such offence, or to suspension or to deprivation of license, or both, or otherwise, for every such offence as to the Trustees may appear expedient, and as is enacted under Section 72 of the Bombay Port Trust Act VI. of 1879.

*In the Province of Sind.*

- (1) The draft Rules shall be published twice in the local official Gazette.
- (2) Copies shall be supplied to the Chamber of Commerce, and also to the Port Officer of Karachi for distribution to masters, owners, and agents of steam-vessels; and the Port Officer shall post in his office in a conspicuous place a notice that copies are available on application.
- (3) Copies of the drafts under Act VI of 1884 shall also be posted in conspicuous places in the towns of Sukkur, Rohri, Hyderabad, and Kotri.

*In Bengal.*

- (1) The draft Rules shall be published twice in the *Calcutta Gazette*, and twice in three of the local English newspapers.
- (2) Copies shall be supplied to the Chamber of Commerce for distribution among the agents of steam-vessels.

(3) Copies shall also be supplied to the Port Officers of Calcutta and Chittagong for distribution to masters, owners, and agents of steam-vessels; and the Port Officers shall post in a conspicuous place in their offices a notice that copies are available on application.

*In British Burma.*

- (1) The draft Rules shall be published twice in (two successive issues of) the local official Gazette, and twice in one English newspaper at each principal seaport.

No. 3845.—In exercise of the power conferred by Act I. of 1870, the following Rules for Quarantine against Cholera have been made by the Government of Bombay, with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council: they will take effect from the 5th instant in the Port of Aden and at Perim as a temporary measure:—

- I.—The Commander of every vessel, including buggalows or other native craft, arriving from Singapur shall, before entering the harbour, indicate by signal the port from which such vessel has come.
- II.—Such Commander shall not, except as hereinafter provided, allow any communication, either with the pilot boat, except orally, or with the shore, or with any other vessel or boat in the harbour.

III.—Immediately on any such arrival being signalled, the Health Officer of the port shall go alongside the vessel, and, if communication with the shore is desired, shall direct the Commander to take the vessel to the quarantine anchorage, duly appointed and notified in that behalf by the Resident, there to remain for a period of seven days from the date of arrival in the harbour, or for the shorter period prescribed in Rule IV., and undergo disinfection, which should apply as well to crew, passengers, effects and susceptible goods. The Health Officer shall also direct the Commander to prohibit, during the period for which the vessel remains at the quarantine anchorage as aforesaid, all communication, except such as is herein-after provided for, between such vessel and the shore, or other vessels and boats in the harbour. If communication with the shore is not desired, the vessel shall anchor at such place as may be pointed out by the Port authorities, having regard to the season of the year, and no communication shall be allowed with the pilot boat, otherwise than orally, or with the shore.

IV.—If the Health Officer of the Port has sufficient evidence that no cases of a suspicious nature have taken place on board during the voyage, and if the vessel is besides in good hygienic condition, the duration of the quarantine will be diminished according to the following scale:—

V.—If during the period a vessel is at the quarantine anchorage aforesaid, any case or cases of cholera should occur on board, the said vessel shall remain in quarantine for a period of seven days from the date of the last case occurring, and be subject to all the prohibitions provided for in Rule III.

VI.—When any vessel has been placed in quarantine as aforesaid, the Health Officer may direct the removal of so many of the passengers and crew as may not be suffering from illness, and whose services may not be required on board the vessel, to such particular spots as may from time to time be selected by the Resident as places of quarantine, there to remain for a period of seven days. If a case of cholera occurs among such passengers and crew during any such period, they shall remain in a place of quarantine for a period of fifteen days from the date of the occurrence of the last case of such illness.

VII.—Any mails or cargo which may be brought by any vessel so arriving shall be landed under such precautions as the Health Officer may deem necessary to prevent the spread of the disease.

VIII.—It will be the duty of the Port Officer to facilitate the conveyance to all vessels in quarantine of such supplies of provisions, stores and other articles as may be required by those on board. Such supplies will be placed on the boats of the vessels in quarantine to be subsequently removed by members of their crews.

IX.—All vessels arriving at Aden and Perim which may have communicated with vessels coming from Singapur shall be subjected to the same quarantine as vessels arriving at Aden and Perim from that Port.

X.—All vessels which have undergone quarantine in the manner above prescribed should have the fact clearly stated on their Bills of Health.

I have the honour to request that you will adhere to the following instructions issued in accordance with the orders passed in Government Resolution in the Financial Department No. 2625, dated 14th September 1885, regarding the adjustment at the Treasury of charges incurred by the Public Works Department on the construction and repair of Toll-houses and Ferry Boats.

2. The Executive Engineer will present monthly at the Treasury a bill in duplicate for the expenditure incurred during each month, the amount of which will be included in his Remittance Book as one of his ordinary Cash Remittances to the Treasury. If the charges made in the bill are accepted by the Collector the original and duplicate should be countersigned. One copy being returned with the Remittance Book to the Executive Engineer and the other sent to this office as a voucher.

3. The amount of the bill or invoice should then be adjusted at the Treasury in accordance with Rule 15, Chapter 12, of the Civil Account Code, to the credit of the Public Works Department under Head I. "Remittances to Civil by the Public Works Department" by direct debit in the Registers prescribed in paragraph 4 of this Office Circular No. 6, dated 30th January 1885, as maintenance charges to be deducted from the gross receipts under the provisions of Sections 44 (c) and (d) of the Local Boards Act of 1884.

4. A separate manuscript heading should be opened in the Treasury Cash Account for these charges immediately following the entry "Charges for collecting revenue assigned to Local Funds" as follows:

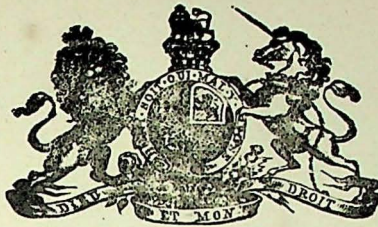

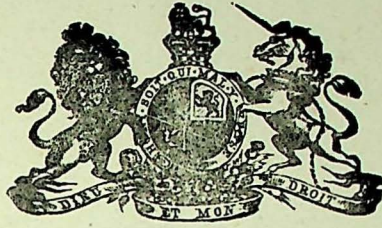

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### PART I.

#### Notification.

##### GENERAL DEPARTMENT.

*Bombay Castle, 20th October 1885.*

No. 3991.—In exercise of the power conferred by Act I. of 1870, the following Rules for Quarantine against Cholera have been made by the Government of Bombay, with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council: they will take effect from the 14th instant in the Port of Aden and at Perim as a temporary measure:—

- I.—The Commander of every vessel, including buggalows or other native craft, arriving from Shanghai shall, before entering the harbour, indicate by signal the port from which such vessel has come.
- II.—Such Commander shall not, except as hereinafter provided, allow any communication, either with the pilot boat, except orally, or with the shore, or with any other vessel or boat in the harbour.
- III.—Immediately on any such arrival being signalled, the Health Officer of the port shall go alongside the vessel, and, if communication with the shore is desired, shall direct the Commander to take the vessel to the quarantine anchorage, duly appointed and notified in that behalf by the Resident, there to remain for a period of seven days from the date of arrival in the harbour, or for the shorter period prescribed in Rule IV., and undergo disinfection, which should apply as well to crew, passengers, effects and susceptible goods. The Health Officer shall also direct the Commander to prohibit, during the period for which the vessel remains at the quarantine anchorage as aforesaid, all communication, except such as is hereinafter provided for, between such vessel and the shore, or other vessels and boats in the harbour. If communication with the shore is not desired, the vessel shall anchor at such place as may be pointed out by the Port authorities, having regard to the season of the year, and no communication shall be allowed with the pilot boat, otherwise than orally, or with the shore.

IV.—If the Health Officer of the Port has sufficient evidence that no cases of a suspicious nature have taken place on board during the voyage, and if the vessel is besides in good hygienic condition, the duration of the quarantine will be diminished according to the following scale:—

V.—If during the period a vessel is at the quarantine anchorage aforesaid, any case or cases of cholera should occur on board, the said vessel shall remain in quarantine for a period of seven days from the date of the last case occurring, and be subject to all the prohibitions provided for in Rule III.

VI.—When any vessel has been placed in quarantine as aforesaid, the Health Officer may direct the removal of so many of the passengers and crew as may not be suffering from illness, and whose services may not be required on board the vessel, to such particular spots as may from time to time be selected by the Resident as places of quarantine, there to remain for a period of seven days. If a case of cholera occurs among such passengers and crew during any such period, they shall remain in a place of quarantine for a period of fifteen days from the date of the occurrence of the last case of such illness.

VII.—Any mails or cargo which may be brought by any vessel so arriving shall be landed under such precautions as the Health Officer may deem necessary to prevent the spread of the disease.

VIII.—It will be the duty of the Port Officer to facilitate the conveyance to all vessels in quarantine of such supplies of provisions, stores and other articles as may be required by those on board. Such supplies will be placed on the boats of the vessels in quarantine to be subsequently removed by members of their crews.

IX.—All vessels arriving at Aden and Perim which may have communicated with vessels coming from Shanghai shall be subjected to the same quarantine as vessels arriving at Aden and Perim from that Port.

X.—All vessels which have undergone quarantine in the manner above prescribed should have the fact clearly stated on their Bills of Health.
