No. 89.—Under the provisions of Section 42 of the Indian Steam-ships Act, 1884, the Governor in Council is pleased to publish, for the information of persons likely to be affected thereby, the annexed draft of rules proposed to be made under Section 24 of the said Act to regulate the making of surveys of steam-ships at the port of Bombay, and to give notice that the said draft will be taken into consideration on or after the 15th January 1886 :—

Draft.

1. Every application for the survey of a steam-ship at the port of Bombay shall be made between the hours of 10 A.M. and 5 P.M. on any day except Sundays or holidays on a printed sheet in the

form No. 1 hereto annexed, which will be supplied for this purpose at the Port-office, and must be lodged at the Port-office at least three clear days before the day on which it is desired that the survey shall take place.

No application will be attended to, which is not made in conformity with this rule.

2. Upon receipt of an application in the form aforesaid, duly filled in, the Port Officer will, in communication with the surveyors, fix a date and hour at which the survey shall be commenced, and will forward to the applicant an intimation of the date and hour so fixed, together with a list of the requisite preparations for the survey of the steam-ship. The said intimation and list shall be in the form No. 2 hereto annexed.

The Port Officer shall usually arrange for surveys being made in the order in which applications therefor are received.

3. If every part of the steam-ship is not ready for survey at the time so appointed, or if the requisite preparations have not been made in accordance with the list forwarded to the applicant under the last rule, the surveyor may fix some other convenient time for the survey.

If the surveyor is unavoidably prevented from being present at the time fixed, the earliest possible intimation shall be sent to the applicant, and some other time, convenient to the applicant and to the surveyor, shall be fixed for the survey.

4. With a view to obviate inconvenience and delay, owners and masters, whose vessels are in dock or undergoing repairs, should communicate at once with the surveyors, if their vessels have afterwards to be surveyed.

5. If a surveyor finds that any defect exists in the hull, machinery or equipments of a steam-ship, he shall, before refusing to give a declaration regarding the ship under section 11 of the Act, address a letter in the form No. 3 hereto annexed, to the owner or master of the steam-ship, pointing out such defect and the repairs, &c., necessary to make good the same.

If the surveyor be subsequently informed by the owner or master that the requisite repairs, &c., have been executed, he shall, with the approval of the Port Officer, pay one or more extra visits to the steam-ship, and thereafter either give or refuse a declaration as he shall think proper.

6. Every declaration furnished by a surveyor under section 11 of the Act shall be in the form No. 4 hereto annexed, and shall contain the several particulars therein prescribed.

7. Every such declaration shall be sent, in accordance with section 12 of the Act, by the owner or master to whom it is given to the Port Officer, Bombay.

8. Certificates will be prepared in such form as the Governor General in Council from time to time directs and will be delivered when ready through the Port Officer.

9. The notice to be given under section 13, sub-section (3) of the Act, to the owner or master when a certificate is ready for delivery, shall be given under the signature of the Port Officer, Bombay, in the form No. 5 hereto annexed.

10. The master of any steam-ship, who claims to be exempt from the necessity of obtaining a certificate of survey under section 4 or section 5 of the Act, may obtain a certificate of exemption in the form No. 6 hereto annexed, signed by the Port Officer of any port of survey in which his ship is lying on his making a declaration in writing in one of the forms No. 7 or No. 8 hereto annexed, as the case may be, and satisfying a surveyor of the correctness of the facts stated in such declaration.

12. The duties of a surveyor making a survey shall be regulated by the instructions published in the United Kingdom for the guidance of the surveyors appointed by the Board of Trade, but all references required by those instructions to be made to the Board of Trade and its officers, shall, in the Presidency of Bombay, be made to Government through the Port Officer of Bombay.

13. A fee at the following rates shall be payable for certificates of survey:—

These rates are for certificates which, if not in the meantime cancelled or suspended, will remain in force for one year from the date thereof.

If the ship's hull, machinery or equipments are stated in the certificate to be sufficient only for a period of less than one year from the date thereof, one-twelfth of the above annual amount shall be payable for each month or fraction of a month comprised in the said period: provided that—

(a) the minimum fee shall be one-fourth of the annual fee;

(b) in the case of a new steam-ship coming under survey for the first time the full annual fee shall be payable, whatever be the nature of the certificate.

14. The fee payable under Rule 13 shall be deemed to cover three visits of a surveyor.

An additional fee at the rate of eight annas for every twenty tons or fraction of twenty tons of the ship's tonnage, but not, in any case, exceeding ten rupees, shall be payable for every extra visit that a surveyor makes, with the approval of the Port Officer, before he is able to grant his declaration.

The Queen has been graciously pleased to signify Her pleasure that a medal be granted to all Her Majesty's Forces employed in the recent operations in the Soudan in commemoration of their arduous labours in the ascent of the River Nile, and their gallantry in the operations which ensued, and also for the operations in the Eastern Soudan, in the vicinity of Suakin.

II. The medal will be similar in pattern to that already granted for service in Egypt and the Soudan.

III. Individuals already in possession of the decoration specified in para. II, will only be eligible to receive such of the clasps specified hereafter as they may be entitled to.

IV. All officers and soldiers who served south of Assouan on or before 7th March 1885 will be held to be entitled to the medal, except those who are already in possession of it.

V. All officers and soldiers who were on duty at Suakin between 26th March 1884 and 14th May 1885 will also be entitled to the medal, except those already in possession of it.

VI. Her Majesty has further approved of clasps being issued as follows:—

- (1) A clasp inscribed 'The Nile, 1884-85,' to those officers and soldiers who served south of Assouan on or before 7th March 1885.
- (2.) A clasp inscribed 'Abu Klea' to those officers and soldiers who took part in the action fought there on 17th January 1885, under the late Major-General Sir H. Stewart, K.C.B.
- (3.) A clasp inscribed 'Kirbekan' to those officers and soldiers who took part in the action fought there on the 10th February 1885, under the late Major-General W. Earle, C.B., C.S.I.
- (4.) A clasp inscribed 'Suakin, 1885,' to those officers and soldiers who were engaged in the operations at Suakin between the 1st March and 14th May 1885 (both days inclusive).
- (5.) A clasp inscribed 'Tofrek' to those officers and soldiers who were actually present at the action fought there on the 22nd March 1885.

VII. Rolls are to be forwarded to the Adjutant-General to the Forces without delay.

VIII. General officers will forward rolls for themselves and their staffs. Special service officers

will forward their applications through the general officers under whom they served.

IX. Officers who served as heads of departments will furnish rolls of officers and others who served under their command.

X. Officers commanding batteries of Royal Artillery, companies of Royal Engineers, regiments of Cavalry and battalions of Infantry will forward rolls of officers, warrant officers, non-commissioned officers and men who served under their command.

XI. The rolls are to be prepared in duplicate, in conformity with the form given in the appendix. They should be made out on foolscap, the writing to be lengthwise from bottom to top of each page, with a margin of an inch on each side of the fold of the sheet to admit of binding. The names of the officers and warrant officers will be entered in order of rank, those of the non-commissioned officers and men strictly in alphabetical order, without reference to troops or companies in the case of Cavalry and Infantry.

XII. The names of men who, under Articles 910 to 912, Army Regulations, Vol. I, (Royal Warrant relating to pay) have incurred forfeiture of the medal, are also to be included in the rolls, and in the eleventh column, the reasons which have rendered them ineligible are to be stated.

XIII. The addresses of men who have been discharged since the operations should also be inserted in the eleventh column.

MILITARY DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 9th December 1885.

No. 6.—His Excellency General the Honourable Arthur Edward Hardinge, C. B., Extra Equerry to Her Majesty the Queen, Colonel of the Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers and Honorary Colonel of the "Bombay Volunteer Rifle Corps," is about to be relieved in the Command of the Army of this Presidency, and has intimated his intention of embarking on his return to England on the 11th instant.

2. His Excellency the Governor in Council desires to place on record the high sense which the Government entertain of the Commander-in-Chief's unremitting efforts to increase—

Firstly.—The discipline and the comfort of the Bombay Army.

Secondly.—The well-being of the soldier.

3. Stress has been laid on regimental efficiency and *esprit de corps* by a careful selection of capable Commanding officers.

The work of future Commanders-in-Chief, who will find it difficult to rival the performances of their distinguished predecessor in this respect, has been materially lightened.

4. The complex questions connected with the armament, the pay and enlistment of Native officers and soldiers have been handled with intimate knowledge of the requirements of that branch of the Army.

5. General Hardinge's constant personal intercourse with the English and Native officers, non-commissioned officers and men of Native Corps in this Presidency, as well as at Meerut, has given His Excellency an unparalleled experience.

6. The Governor in Council need only refer to the conduct of the 29th Bombay Regiment in Egypt, of the 1st Bombay Lancers, No. 1 Mountain Battery and the 2nd Bombay Grenadiers in the Zhob Valley, of the 20th Bombay Regiment near Suakin, to the selection of several Bombay Native regiments for the Army Corps formed this spring, to the results achieved by representatives of Native regiments at rifle meetings, as his justification for stating that at no time has the Bombay Army been so efficient as it was under General Hardinge.

7. An enumeration in detail of some of the reforms initiated by General Hardinge will further illustrate the success of his administration of the Bombay Army, which has contributed another remarkable page to the long record of previous services rendered by General Hardinge to His Sovereign and Country.

8. The frequency with which officers were transferred about from one regiment to another, the importation of officers into regiments with which they were not connected, the loss of the best officers by the injurious practice of allowing them to enter upon Civil or semi-Military avocations when the Army stood most in need of their services, were by General Hardinge avoided as far as is possible under the existing Staff Corps system, which is incompatible with regimental homogeneity as recognised in the Queen's Army.

9. The great care with which officers have been placed Second in Command, and the knowledge that this appointment—if the duty is well performed—will in time secure the Command of the Regiment, has elevated the moral tone of the Army.

10. The great value of frontier service to an Army has been shown by the experience gained at Quetta, and it is due to General Hardinge's influence and energy that the Quetta Brigade is partly composed of Bombay troops.

11. The concentration of troops, the formation of camps of exercise, have found in General Hardinge a staunch supporter.

12. The paramount importance of the science of musketry and "fire discipline" led General Hardinge to foster rifle meetings and to facilitate the attendance of the representatives of regiments.

Further encouragement was given by giving prizes and by instituting the "Squad Trial Stakes."

The central school for the instruction of Native officers in musketry has been held annually in Poona.

13. Assaults of arms have brought together in friendly competitions the British and Native troops.

14. The dress of the Bombay Army has been remodelled, useless articles of equipment abolished, and a serviceable uniform of khakee introduced.

The dress and equipment of the Bombay Cavalry has been simplified and assimilated and future economy promoted thereby.

15. The continuance of family pensions to the heirs of soldiers in the Quetta District so long as the state of the frontier does not admit of the wives and families of soldiers joining them, has been sanctioned on General Hardinge's recommendation, and also His Excellency's suggestion that Native officers and soldiers going on furlough shall be granted free rail conveyance to and from their regiments.

16. The prohibited districts of Rajputana have been thrown open to the Bombay Army for recruiting.

17. The 30th Regiment N. I. (formerly Jacob's Rifles) have been made a Beluch Regiment and the three Beluch Regiments thus form a Brigade, to which the following advantages have been conceded :—

(a) furlough is granted from 1st March to 1st November, which enables nearly twice the number of men to obtain four months' furlough,

(b) the continuance of Sind batta,

(c) recruiting in all frontier countries westward of Jacobabad.

18. The wish to employ pensioned Native soldiers in civil situations has led to the formation of a "Corps of Commissionaires," which has received the cordial co-operation of the official and mercantile communities of the Presidency.

19. The Volunteers, as well as the British and Native Forces, have always been able to rely on General Hardinge's wise control and support.

20. The Officers and Non-Commissioned officers and men of the Bombay Army will not forget that in General Hardinge they lose not only a distinguished Commander-in-Chief, but a real friend who took a personal interest in their welfare, and who earned the popularity he enjoyed by indefatigable zeal.

21. The Government, in bidding His Excellency farewell, wish to add that as a Member of Council they have on many occasions admired his sagacity, his tact and his conciliatory firmness when dealing with civil questions.

22. The command of the Army will devolve upon Lieutenant-General Sir Robert Phayre, K.C.B., the next Senior Officer on the Divisional Staff, as Provincial Commander-in-Chief from the date of the resignation of His Excellency the Honourable Arthur Hardinge.
