PROSPECTUS.

AN INTERNATIONAL EXHIBITION OF INDUSTRY, SCIENCE, AND ART will be held in Edinburgh during the Summer of 1886, under the Royal Patronage of HER MOST GRACIOUS MAJESTY THE QUEEN.

This is the first INTERNATIONAL EXHIBITION ever held in Scotland. A prominent feature will be to illustrate the Material Resources, Manufactures, and Art Treasures of Scotland.

THE DEPARTMENT OF MACHINERY IN MOTION will be under the direction of eminent Engineers, a well-known local firm having generously placed at the disposal of the Executive handsome Engines for driving.

THE DEPARTMENT OF FINE ARTS, allied to Ancient Historical Treasures of Scotland, will be of a peculiarly interesting character.

A SPECIAL SECTION will be devoted to Ladies' Work, embracing Embroidery, Art Needlework, &c., &c.

THE ARTISAN SECTION is intended to evoke and afford opportunity for display of the talent and ingenuity of the Working Classes.

OLD EDINBURGH, in its historical buildings and costumes of the fourteenth, fifteenth, and sixteenth centuries, will be carefully represented.

THE TOWN COUNCIL OF EDINBURGH have placed one of the finest and most accessible parks in the City at the disposal of the Executive. A building of substantial character will be erected, and the most improved methods of lighting adopted. The beauty of the surroundings of the park, along with the usual accessories of Music and other entertainments of high-class character, cannot fail to attract the public of Scotland, England, and Ireland, while visitors from Colonial and Foreign Countries may be expected to visit the Exhibition in large numbers.

THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE reserve the right of making alterations on the following Regulations, and the decisions of the Council or its Committees shall in every case be held final.

REGULATIONS FOR EXHIBITORS.

1. AN INTERNATIONAL EXHIBITION OF INDUSTRY, SCIENCE, AND ART, under the patronage of Her Date. Majesty the Queen, will be held in Edinburgh in 1886.

2. The Exhibition will be opened on 4th May, and will be closed on 30th October 1886.

3. Schedules of Application for Space may be had from the Secretary, Mr. JAMES MARCHBANK, Applications
29 Hanover Street, Edinburgh. These must be filled up and returned on or before the 1st January 1886. to Exhibit.
The decision of the Space Committee will be notified as soon as possible after that date.

- Date of Reception.** 4. No goods will be received prior to 15th March 1886, without special permission, nor after 15th April 1886; but prior arrangements may be made for Motors, Boilers, or any Exhibits requiring under-building.
- Classification not exhausted.** 5. The Classification is not exhaustive. Where there does not appear to be any head under which an Exhibit may be included, the Exhibitor should apply for space, leaving the Executive Council to judge which group most nearly resembles the article he proposes to send.
- Delivery of Goods.** 6. Should any goods be delivered in the absence of the Exhibitor, or his Representative, the Executive Council will not be responsible for any loss or damage thereto arising from any cause whatever.
- Right to refuse Exhibits.** 7. The Executive Council reserve the right to refuse any Exhibit, without stating any reason for so doing.
- Empty Cases.** 8. Cases must be unpacked as soon as possible, and the empty cases removed from the ground at the expense and risk of the Exhibitor; the Executive Council will endeavour to make arrangements for the storage of these at the expense of the Exhibitor.
- Expenses to be borne by Exhibitors.** 9. Charge will be made for space, except in special cases to be determined by the Executive Council. Exhibitors will have to pay all expenses of conveying, delivering, arranging, fixing, and removing their Exhibits, and also the cost of the erection of all fixtures, screens, and counters when required; and they must personally, or by a representative, superintend the transmission, reception, unpacking, installation, and (at the close of the Exhibition) the removal of their goods. The Executive Council reserve to themselves the right of doing whatever may be considered necessary at the expense of the Exhibitor, unless this regulation is strictly complied with.
- Railway Rates.** 10. The Executive Council will endeavour to obtain, from the various Railways and Carriers, special terms for the conveyance to and from the Exhibition; and should they succeed in doing so such arrangements will be communicated to intending Exhibitors.
- Marks on Packages.** 11. All packages containing goods for Exhibition must have painted on them the distinctive mark  together with the name and address of the Exhibitor.
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- Labels for this purpose will be supplied to each Exhibitor.
- Motive Power.** 12. Motive power (water, gas, and steam) will be supplied under certain conditions. Exhibitors requiring this, must make special application to the Secretary, stating at what speed each machine is to be driven, and power required. The furnishing of counter shafting will be at the expense of Exhibitors. All steam-boilers must be placed under efficient inspection, which will be arranged by the Executive Council at the expense of Exhibitors.
- Passes.** 13. Passes to the Exhibition will be granted to Exhibitors and to their attendants. If it is found that they are transferred, they will be immediately cancelled.
- Dangerous Substances.** 14. No Explosives, or any substances which, in the judgment of the Executive are dangerous, will be admitted, but they may be represented by Models.
- Spirits, &c.** 15. Spirits, Oils, Essences, Corrosive Substances, or anything likely to injure other articles or inconvenience to the Public, must be placed in strong and suitable vessels of small size.
- Testing.** 16. The Executive Council reserve to themselves the right of examining, or testing, any of the Exhibits. If any damage or injury shall be occasioned during the Exhibition by any exhibited machine, implement, or article, to any Visitor or other person, then the Exhibitor to whom such machinery, implement or article may belong shall indemnify and hold harmless the said Council from and against all actions, suits, expenses, and claims on account or in respect of any such damage or injury which may be so caused.
- Non-liability for Damage to Exhibits.** 17. While the Executive Council will not be responsible for loss or damage to any Exhibit resulting from any cause whatsoever, they will nevertheless take every precaution for the care and preservation of the Exhibits.
- Right of Removal.** 18. The Executive Council reserve the right to remove the Exhibits of any one who does not conform to the Regulations.
- Photography &c.** 19. No article exhibited may be copied, photographed, drawn, or reproduced without the special permission of the Exhibitor and of the Executive Council.
- Dimensions of Cases, &c.** 20. All Cases, Counters, Platforms, Screens, Partitions, must not (without special permission) exceed the following dimensions :—

- Railings and Canopies.** 21. Exhibitors may erect Railings around their Stands, and provide Canopies, subject to approval; in every instance these Railings must be within the area of the space allotted. In the case of machinery in motion, it is imperative that it be sufficiently *railed*.

22. Loan Exhibits will be specially numbered and catalogued with the name of the sender. The Loan Exhibits Fine Art Exhibits will be received under special regulations, which will be supplied on application to the Convener of the Sectional Committee.

23. The Artisan Exhibits will be specially numbered and catalogued with the name of the sender. Artisan Section. These may be located in a distinct section, or otherwise, as the Executive Council may think proper.

24. The Flooring must not be altered, removed, or strengthened, except by sanction of the Flooring Executive Council.

25. No Exhibitor will be permitted to display Exhibits in such a manner as to obstruct the light, Obstructions. or impede the view along the open spaces, or to occasion inconvenience or injury to other Exhibitors.

26. In order to insure uniformity of decoration, no Exhibitor will be allowed to put up flags, Decorations. banners, or other kind of decoration without permission, and for covering counters, screens, or partitions, a material will be selected, which may be procured by Exhibitors at the building.

27. Signs or Name-boards must be placed to the satisfaction of the Space Committee, and must Sign-boards. in no case interfere with the lighting. They must be black, with gold letters.

28. All hand-bills, printed matter, &c., connected with Exhibits, and intended for gratuitous Hand-bills. distribution, must first receive the approval and permission of the Executive Council, which permission may be withdrawn at any time.

29. Exhibitors will be required to provide all necessary attendance to keep their Stands and Attendance. Exhibits properly cleaned and in good order during the whole period of the Exhibition.

30. No Exhibitor will be allowed to transfer any portion of the space allotted to him, or to allow Non-transfer of Space. any other than his own Exhibits to be placed thereon.

31. All goods must be exhibited in the name of the Individual or Firm signing the Application Name. Form.

32. Exhibitors will be permitted to mark the selling prices of the various articles exhibited, for Selling Price the information of the Juries and Visitors.

33. Exhibitors or their attendants may explain their Exhibits to Visitors, but they will not be Selling. allowed to press Visitors to purchase the goods, the Exhibition being intended primarily for purposes of display.

34. Diplomas for Gold, Silver, and Bronze Medals and Honourable Mention will be awarded Awards. to Exhibitors on the recommendation of Juries, to whom power will be given to make an adequate number of Awards, as follows, viz. :—

- (1) Diplomas for Gold Medals.
- (2) " " Silver "
- (3) " " Bronze "
- (4) " " Honourable Mention.

35. No Exhibit can be removed before the close of the Exhibition without the special permission Removal. of the Executive Council. Exhibits not removed within fifteen days after the close of the Exhibition will be warehoused at the cost and risk of the owners, and whatever remains after three months will be sold by auction, and the proceeds applied to defray expenses.

36. All who become Exhibitors signify by so doing their compliance with the whole of these Rules binding Regulations, together with such other Regulations as the Executive Council may issue from time to time.

37. The Executive Council reserve to themselves the sole right of compiling and printing Catalogue. a Catalogue of Exhibits.

38. Any Exhibitor having cause to complain regarding the conduct of any Official or Attendant Complaints by Exhibitors. must give notice in writing to the Executive Council.

39. The Executive Council reserve the right to order the removal of any Attendant whose Conduct of Attendants. behaviour they consider unseemly.

40. The right to alter, amend, add to, or cancel any of these Rules is reserved by the Executive Right to alter Rules. Council.

REGULATIONS RELATIVE TO "OLD EDINBURGH."

41. As this is regarded as a special feature of the Exhibition, parties applying for spaces must carefully indicate the Corporation, Guild, or Craft they desire to represent.

42. In every instance the Exhibitors will be required to arrange that their Attendants shall wear the costumes of their respective periods and crafts. Designs will be furnished by the Executive Council, or Exhibitors may submit these for approval.

43. In no instance will an Exhibitor be permitted to introduce more than one Craft into the space allotted to him.

44. Special care will be required by the Executive Council in cases where Fire or Gas is used in any portion of these premises, and a responsible officer will be appointed to carry out the injunctions of the Committee in this respect.

SPECIAL REGULATIONS AFFECTING FOREIGN EXHIBITS.

45. Applications for space from Foreign Countries will be received until 1st January 1886.

46. Applicants for space from Foreign Countries, where no Agent or Commissioner has been nominated, must appoint Representatives to act on their behalf.

47. Agents or Commissioners must report to the Executive Committee the particulars of all Exhibits proposed to be sent from their respective Countries, and any proposed distribution of space allotted to these Countries.

48. The letters  must be painted on all packages sent from abroad. The name of the
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Country must also be put on, along with a distinctive private mark which must be intimated to Secretary by post.

The Industries proposed to be represented in "Old Edinburgh" will embrace Typefoundry, Printing, Engraving, Lithographing and Photographing, Bookbinding, Furniture, Carvings, House Decoration, Tapestry, Silver and Gold Plating, Jewellery, &c., or such other Handicrafts as the Committee may approve.

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2. The Forest Settlement Officer, Sátára, is hereby appointed, under clause (c) of the same section, to enquire into and determine the existence, nature and extent of any rights alleged to exist in favour of any person in these lands.

No. 9865.—In exercise of the power conferred by Section 4 of the Indian Forest Act, No. VII. of 1878, His Excellency the Governor in Council is pleased to appoint the Assistant Collector in charge of the Modása Petha of the Ahmedabad District to be *ex-officio* Forest Settlement Officer for the petha for the purposes set forth in Section 4, clause (c), and Section 34 of the said Act.

"When any house, building, or land, or any portion of a house, let as a separate tenement, or for lodgings, or godowns, shall be or become vacant, the Cantonment Magistrate shall remit or refund, as the case may be, the property rates leviable in respect thereof for the number of days the said house, building, or land, or portion of a house, may have remained unoccupied, provided always that the person liable to the payment of the said rates, or his agent, shall have given notice in writing of the vacancy to the Cantonment Magistrate, and that the amount of rate to be refunded shall be calculated from the date of the delivery of such notice."

No. 638.—G. O. G. No. 690 of 1876 is hereby cancelled, and it is notified for the guidance of Cantonment Committees that the rules laid down in Chapter 20, para. 7, pages 137 and 138, of the

(a) With effect from 1st April 1886. Civil Account Code, in regard to Cantonment Fund Accounts, are to be adopted (a) in future.

2. All cash received will be forwarded daily to the treasury; none may be retained to meet expenses: cheques must be drawn on this account.

3. The cash accounts referred to in paras. 6, 7, 9 to 14 of the above Code are those to be submitted monthly to the Accounts Department for audit. In the case of self-supporting Cantonments these accounts will be forwarded to the Accountant General, Bombay, through the local treasury officer; in the case of aided funds they will be sent to the Examiner, Commissariat Accounts, Poona, in duplicate, also through the local treasury officer; and after audit one copy will be forwarded by the Examiner to the Accountant General.

4. The accounts to be kept in Cantonment offices are as under:—

In this register will be entered in consecutive order, as the transactions occur, details of all sums received from whatever source. It will consist of columns headed (1) Date of receipt; (2) No. of receipt granted for the same; (3) From whom received; (4) Detailed headings to which the amounts are to be credited; (5) Daily totals; (6) Monthly and progressive totals.

In this register will be entered in consecutive order, as the transactions occur, details of all sums paid away on any account

No. 2.—Register of Payments. It will consist of columns headed (1) Date of payment; (2) No. of cheque (when the payment is in cash this should be stated instead in this column); (3) To whom paid and details of payment; (4) Detailed headings to which the payments are debitable; (5) Daily totals; (6) Monthly and progressive totals.

In this register will be recorded daily the totals of the daily receipts and payments included in Registers Nos. 1 and 2

No. 3.—Daily Cash Balance Register. It will consist of columns headed (1) Date; (2) Balance of previous day; (3) Receipts; (4) Totals; (5) Payments; (6) Closing Balances (in hand and at treasury); (7) Cantonment Magistrate's or Secretary's initials; (8) Remarks.

5. The figures entered in columns 4 in Registers Nos. 1 and 2 will be totalled daily, and the totals thus obtained be shown in columns 5, which latter will be initialled by the Cantonment Magistrate or Secretary after satisfying himself of their correctness. These daily totals as exhibited in column 5 will then be carried into No. 3 Register and the balances be struck therein. The closing balances shown in Register No. 3 will be checked and initialled by the Cantonment Magistrate or Secretary, who will also check the entry of total receipts shown therein with the receipt of the treasury officer for the amount paid into the treasury.

6. At the end of the month a line will be drawn across all the columns but the last in Registers Nos. 1 and 2, and the figures in each column will be totalled, the monthly totals thus arrived at being entered in each column below the line, that of the "daily total" column will be carried out to the column headed "monthly and progressive totals." A line will be drawn across the page under these totals and the daily entries of the following month will be kept dis-

tinct from the totals of the previous month, *i.e.*, not totalled up therewith, so that the total expenditure each month under the different headings can be seen at a glance at any time.

7. The registers will be finally closed annually.

8. At the end of the month a sub-committee' composed of three officers of the Cantonment Committee, will be specially appointed to examine the monthly accounts and will furnish the following certificate:—

and find that they are correct in every respect. The detailed accounts kept daily by the several Collectors of Revenue have been examined by us, and the totals exhibited in their books agree with the amounts shown in Register No. 1. Vouchers for all payments shown in Register No. 2 have also been produced and found by us to correspond with the entries in this register. We have likewise verified the entries in Register No. 3, and found them correct and properly vouched.

"No 6.—His Excellency General the Honourable Arthur Edward Hardinge, C.B., Extra Equerry to Her Majesty the Queen, Colonel of the Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers, and Honorary Colonel of the "Bombay Volunteer Rifle Corps", is about to be relieved in the command of the Army of

this Presidency, and has intimated his intention of embarking on his return to England on the 11th instant.

2. His Excellency the Governor in Council desires to place on record the high sense which the Government entertain of the Commander-in-Chief's unremitting efforts to increase—

Firstly.—The discipline and the comfort of the Bombay Army.

Secondly.—The well-being of the soldier.

3. Stress has been laid on regimental efficiency and *esprit de corps* by a careful selection of capable commanding officers.

The work of future Commanders-in-Chief, who will find it difficult to rival the performances of their distinguished predecessor in this respect, has been materially lightened.

4. The complex questions connected with the armament, the pay and enlistment of Native officers and soldiers, have been handled with intimate knowledge of the requirements of that branch of the Army.

5. General Hardinge's constant personal intercourse with the English and Native officers, non-commissioned officers and men of Native corps in this Presidency, as well as at Meerut, has given His Excellency an unparalleled experience.

6. The Governor in Council need only refer to the conduct of the 29th Bombay Regiment in Egypt, of the 1st Bombay Lancers, No. 1 Mountain Battery and the 2nd Bombay Grenadiers in the Zhoob Valley, of the 28th Bombay Regiment near Suakin, to the selection of several Bombay Native regiments for the Army Corps formed this spring, to the results achieved by representatives of Native regiments at rifle meetings, as his justification for stating, that at no time has the Bombay Army been so efficient as it was under General Hardinge.

7. An enumeration in detail of some of the reforms initiated by General Hardinge will further illustrate the success of his administration of the Bombay Army, which has contributed another remarkable page to the long record of previous services rendered by General Hardinge to his Sovereign and country.

8. The frequency with which officers were transferred about from one regiment to another, the importation of officers into regiments with which they were not connected, the loss of the best officers by the injurious practice of allowing them to enter upon civil or semi-military avocations when the army stood most in need of their services were by General Hardinge avoided as far as is possible under the existing Staff Corps system, which is incompatible with regimental homogeneity as recognized in the Queen's Army.

9. The great care with which officers have been placed second in command, and the knowledge that this appointment—if the duty is well performed—will in time secure the command of the regiment, has elevated the moral tone of the Army.

10. The great value of frontier service to an army has been shown by the experience gained at Quetta, and it is due to General Hardinge's influence and energy that the Quetta Brigade is partly composed of Bombay troops.

11. The concentration of troops, the formation of camps of exercise, have found in General Hardinge a staunch supporter.

12. The paramount importance of the science of musketry and "fire discipline" led General Hardinge to foster rifle meetings and to facilitate the attendance of the representatives of regiments.

Further encouragement was given by giving prizes and by instituting the "Squad trial stakes."

The central school for the instruction of Native officers in musketry has been held annually in Poona.

13. Assaults of arms have brought together in friendly competitions the British and Native troops.

14. The dress of the Bombay Army has been remodelled, useless articles of equipment abolished, and a serviceable uniform of khakee introduced.

The dress and equipment of the Bombay Cavalry has been simplified and assimilated and future economy promoted thereby.

15. The continuance of family pensions to the heirs of soldiers in the Quetta District so long as the state of the frontier does not admit of the wives and families of soldiers joining them, has been sanctioned on General Hardinge's recommendation, and also His Excellency's suggestion that Native officers and soldiers going on furlough shall be granted free rail conveyance to and from their regiments.

16. The prohibited districts of Rājputāna have been thrown open to the Bombay Army for recruiting.

17. The 30th Regiment, Native Infantry (formerly Jacob's Rifles), have been made a Beluch Regiment, and the three Beluch Regiments thus form a brigade, to which the following advantages have been conceded:—

- (a) furlough is granted from 1st March to 1st November, which enables nearly twice the number of men to obtain 4 months' furlough;
- (b) the continuance of Sind batta;
- (c) recruiting in all frontier countries westward of Jacobabad.

18. The wish to employ pensioned Native soldiers in civil situations has led to the formation of a "Corps of Commissionaires", which has received the cordial co-operation of the official and mercantile communities of the Presidency.

19. The volunteers, as well as the British and Native forces, have always been able to rely on General Hardinge's wise control and support.

20. The officers and non-commissioned officers and men of the Bombay Army will not forget that in General Hardinge they lose not only a distinguished Commander-in-Chief, but a real

friend who took a personal interest in their welfare, and who earned the popularity he enjoyed by indefatigable zeal.

21. The Government, in bidding His Excellency farewell, wish to add that as a Member of Council they have on many occasions admired his sagacity, his tact and his conciliatory firmness when dealing with civil questions.

22. The Command of the Army will devolve upon Lieutenant-General Sir Robert Phayre, K.C.B., the next senior officer on the Divisional Staff, as Provincial Commander-in-Chief from the date of the resignation of His Excellency the Honourable Arthur Hardinge.

No. 7.—With reference to Notification No. 6 of this date, His Excellency the Governor in Council directs that the honors due to the Commander-in-Chief shall be continued to be paid to General the Honourable A. E. Hardinge, C. B., Extra Equerry to the Queen, until his departure from Aden."
