JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 10th December 1885.

No. 8474.—The following Rules have been framed by the Commissioner of Police for the regulation of public processions and carriage and foot passenger traffic at places of public resort and landing places:—

1. The drivers of all conveyances passing along any public road, street or thoroughfare shall, except in such cases as fall under clause 10 of the rules, whether there be a tramway line or not,

keep to the left or near side unless there be some reasonable cause for divergence, and should pass a tram cart on the left or near side, whether it be going in the same or the contrary directions.

2. The drivers of all conveyances before pulling up in any public road, street or thoroughfare shall give notice of their intention of doing so to the drivers of such conveyances as may be following in the same line of route by raising the hand or otherwise.

3. The drivers of all conveyances shall, unless there be some reasonable cause for not doing so, pull up at the extreme side of the road, street, or thoroughfare along which they are proceeding.

4. The drivers of all conveyances emerging from a cross road into a trunk-road shall rein in and give way to conveyances passing along such road.

5. The drivers of all conveyances shall obey the directions of the Police while regulating the traffic at crossings and on all public roads.

6. The drivers of all conveyances shall on no account pull up athwart a crossing.

7. No horse conveyance shall be driven in any crowded public road, street, or thoroughfare at a pace exceeding six miles an hour.

8. All labour carts and other slow-moving conveyances shall keep as close as possible to the left or near side of public roads, streets, or thoroughfares along which they are proceeding.

9. All conveyances for the carriage of goods and merchandise shall for the purpose of being loaded and unloaded be drawn up parallel with the side of the road and not athwart it.

10. The tramway lines running through the undermentioned roads shall be considered to convert them into two, forming a road on each side which will be treated as separate roads:—

1. Hornby Row.
2. Carnac Road.
3. Cruickshank Road.

11. All boats plying for hire, and all boats waiting to convey passengers from any bandar shall lie at a distance not less than 20 yards from the landing place.

12. No person or persons shall occupy any portion of any public road, street or thoroughfare so as to cause obstruction to traffic.

13. No person shall walk along a carriage way where a good foot-path exists.

14. The drivers of all public conveyances should have their two lamps lit as soon as it gets dusk and these should not be extinguished in the public thoroughfares except when the vehicle is at a public stand.

No. 97.—The following Rule is made under Section 7 of the Indian Ports Act, 1875:—

(1). No vessels of and exceeding 100 feet in length shall attempt to turn in the inshore channel, hereinafter defined, between the extreme north-east corner of the Carnac Bandar and the buoy marking the south-west extreme of Cross Island reef, except by means of warps or springs attached to the piers; the usual method of turning these vessels when requiring to do so on approaching or leaving the piers shall be by proceeding out through the channel and turning either to the north or south clear of the channel.

(2). No vessel of the above description shall attempt to turn in the said inshore channel between the points aforesaid when the water is at a lower level than half tide.

(3). The inshore channel hereinbefore referred to comprises that area of water bounded on the north by a line drawn from the northern extreme of the Carnac Bandar sea wall to the extreme north point of Cross Island; on the east by a line drawn through the buoy marking the south-west, and the beacon marking the north-west extremes of the Cross Island reefs, and extended to the north limit; on the south by a line drawn to the eastward with the northernmost of four small square houses (known as Canji houses) on Fort George, and the north-east corner of the new Bori Bandar Terminal Railway Station in transit; on the west, from the south limit to the southern extreme of Mody Bandar sea wall, by a line drawn through the beacon marking the shoal to the north of Cross Island, and the beacon marking the extremes of the north-west of the reefs off Cross Island, and continued to the southern limit, and from the southern extreme of Mody Bandar to the northern limit; by a line drawn along the sea face wall of Mody and Carnac Bandars.

With reference to Government Resolution (Revenue Department) No. 6824, dated 22nd August last, I have the honour to request that you will follow the instructions now given for the creation of a separate Village Cess fund for each District in Sind.

2. At the Treasury the accounts of the fund will be opened on 1st April 1886, and you should therefore prepare and furnish me as soon as possible with a detailed account of the transactions in your district from the commencement of the levy of the cess to the end of 1884-85, showing—

- (1) The collections.
- (2) Expenditure therefrom.
- (3) Balance at the end of March 1885.

This should be followed by a similar account for each four-monthly periods of 1885-86, i.e., for the four months ending 31st July 1885, 30th November 1885, and 31st March 1886. On receipt of these, arrangements will be made to transfer the balance on 31st March 1886 as a "contribution from provincial to local" (i.e., to the new fund) in the accounts for 1885-86.

3. From 1st April 1886 the revenue and expenditure of the new fund should be carried to the debit or credit of a new banking account in accordance with Chapter 20, Rule 3, of the Civil Account Code, separate columns being opened for this purpose in the subsidiary register referred to in para. 3 of this office Circular No. 6, dated 30th January 1885, and there will be two distinct entries in the cash accounts and lists of payments thus:

Incorporated Local Funds, viz.—

Karachi Local Fund Rs.
Karachi Village Officers Cess Fund . Rs.

4. A separate cash account should be rendered to this office giving on the receipt side the following details:—

Section 6 of Act IV. { (1) One-anna Cess on Gov-

Act) of 1881. { (2) Cess on Alienated Lands.
(3) Other items (if any).

While on the charge side will appear—

- (a) Police Patels.
- (b) Pagis or Village Trackers.

It will be easy to arrange for these details by having corresponding columns opened in the subsidiary register referred to in the preceding para. (which will be in Civil Account Code form 15) thus—

The entries on the payment side of the cash account will, of course, be supported by vouchers.

5. For purposes of audit this office should be furnished through the Commissioner in Sind with a detailed statement of sanctioned establishment as prescribed in Chap. 4, Rule 3, of the Civil Account Code, and any alterations which may from time to time become necessary must be regularly reported through the same officer. Further orders on this point will, it is believed, be issued by the Commissioner.

6. One general bill for each of the different kinds of establishment should be compiled at the Huzur from the vernacular bills received from the Sub-Treasuries and submitted with the schedule referred to in para. 2 above.

As charges for the conveyance of goods by rail are often unsupported by vouchers, I have the honour to request that whenever such a charge exceeds Rs. 10 a written receipt may be obtained from the station master specifying the amount paid. This should accompany the bill and, in the absence of the printed receipt which the railway company requires to be returned, will be a sufficient voucher for the payment.

2. I have ascertained that station masters are instructed to give such acknowledgments of payment on demand.

Under Section 45 of the Civil Travelling Allowance Code a Government officer is entitled to travelling allowance for journeys undertaken in obedience to a summons to give evidence before a Court of Justice or a Court Martial, and should not therefore receive any allowance from the Court in any Criminal case or in Civil cases in which he may appear on behalf of Government. In Civil cases in which Government servants are witnesses on behalf of private parties the usual allowance may however be received from the Court and, if received, must be credited to Government by deduction from the amount claimable as travelling allowance.

2. In order to facilitate audit I have the honour to request that Government officers who propose to draw travelling allowance will apply for, and that Judges and Magistrates will, on being requested, invariably furnish a certificate stating that no payment has been made to the witness, [or mentioning the amount in private Civil cases] and giving the number of days during which the witness was detained by the Court. This certificate should accompany the travelling allowance bill which must not be paid without it.

As the Government of India has ordered that charges incurred in the Civil Department in connection with the Military Expedition to Upper Burma should be debited to the Military Department, Madras, I have the honour to request that, commencing with the accounts for November 1885, you will open a distinct register in Civil Account Code Form 70, and alter the heading as follows:—

MILITARY PAYMENTS, MADRAS ARMY.

List of payments on account of the Burmah Expeditionary Force at the Treasury, &c.

A corresponding register, should, if found necessary, be opened for receipts.

2. The instructions regarding vouchers, &c., given in paragraphs 2 to 5 of this office Circular No. 12, dated 6th March 1885, in connection with the Saukim Expedition, as well as those given in paragraph 2 of this office Circular No. 19, dated 24th April 1885, in regard to the charges for the Quetta Force, should be carefully followed in connection with the charges on account of the Expedition to Upper Burma.

3. Whenever a sum is credited, reference should invariably be given to the original debit, the whole or part of which is recovered, and special care should be taken not to mix up the accounts of one Expedition with those of others.

4. It is perhaps well to repeat the caution that in the case of purchase of animals or stores, special care should be taken to obtain not merely vouchers for the payment, but also the receipt of the Military Department for the delivery of such animals or stores, so that there may be no difficulty in identifying the transactions.

With reference to Government Resolution, Financial Department, No. 2956, dated 20th October 1885, regarding the accounts of Civil Courts' Deposits at Government Treasuries, I have the honour to communicate the following instructions for your information and guidance.

2. From 1st December 1885 the system of keeping Civil Courts' Deposits will be that laid down in Chapter 17, Rule 26, of the Civil Account Code, transcribed in the margin for facility of reference. The instructions in Rule 27 and sequel regarding detailed records, which ordinarily form part of this plan of keeping the accounts of

Civil Courts' Deposit, will not however be applicable to the Civil Courts in this Presidency. The Courts will record their account in such forms as the High Court may prescribe without any interference on the part of the Account Department. The Treasury Officer's duty will be simply to see that withdrawals are made on cheques signed by the Presiding Judge of the Court or by a responsible officer of the Court named by him, and that the withdrawals never exceed the balance in hand.

3. Each Civil Court, whether presided over by a District, Assistant, or Subordinate Judge, will have a separate banking account with the Treasury, and at the close of each financial year will send to this office through the Treasury Officer for verification a memorandum of the balance of deposits it claims. If found correct the memorandum will be countersigned and returned to the Court.

4. To introduce the change from the 1st December next, each Court will prepare a similar memorandum of the balance claimed by it on the last day of November on which the accounts of the Treasury or Sub-Treasury with which it banks, close. It will be examined by the Treasury Officer and agreed with his records before

it is sent to this office for verification and counter-signature. But pending the final settlement of the balance at the credit of each Court on the 1st December 1885, the new system will be introduced from that date and the banking account of each Court will be opened with the balance worked out at the Treasury.

5. At the Treasury a page or pages of the Personal Ledger Form No. 28 of the Civil Account Code will be set apart for the account of each Court. If the Court banks with a Sub-Treasury, the Ledger must be maintained at the Sub-Treasury as well as at the Huzúr Treasury to prevent overdrawal.

6. In the monthly cash account submitted by the Treasury to this office the deposits of all the Civil Courts in the district will be merged in the general head of Personal Deposits. But in Form No. 32 (Extract Register of Receipts and Payments of Personal Deposits) the transactions and the balances of each Court will appear separately immediately before "cash orders."

7. In sending the paid cheques of the Courts as vouchers, the Treasury Officer will send with them a covering list giving the number and amount of each cheque and bring out a total for each Court which must agree with the amount of payments shown against it in Form No. 32.

GAZETTED AUDIT DEPARTMENT.

Officers officiating in higher appointments frequently feel some difficulty in understanding the principles which guide my office in the application of Section 5 of the Pay and Acting Allowance Code to their cases, and I hope the following explanation may prove useful by helping to prevent any misunderstanding in future.

2. Subject to certain provisions which I will notice hereafter, an officer "acting in a higher appointment in consequence of the absence of another officer on privilege leave" is, under the operation of Section 5, deprived of all acting allowance "during the first 30 days of such acting appointment." The most obvious and, according to general belief, the only possible example of this rule is found in the case of an officer appointed directly to act in place of an officer going on privilege leave; but a little consideration of the rules of promotion will be sufficient to show that an officer, who has commenced by acting in consequence of the absence of an officer on furlough, may continue to do so only in consequence of the absence of another officer on privilege leave, while an officer who has begun to act in place of an officer on privilege leave may continue to do so in place of another on furlough. Let *A*, *B* and *C* represent three Junior Collectors, and *D*, *E* and *F* three First Assistant Collectors all in order of seniority, of whom *D* and *E* are acting for

A and *B* absent on furlough, and *F* is acting for *C* who is absent on privilege leave. *A* returns to duty, and it then rests with Government to decide which of the three acting officers *D*, *E* and *F* shall revert. There might be special circumstances to induce Government to retain *F* in his acting appointment, but as a general rule the junior acting officer will revert and in that case *E*, who was originally appointed to act in a furlough vacancy, would continue to act solely in consequence of the privilege leave vacancy, which alone saved him from reverting, and would therefore forfeit acting allowance for so many of the first 30 days of that vacancy as still had to run. Conversely, it will be seen without any detailed explanation, how on a Junior Collector taking furlough, the senior First Assistant who may be at the time acting in place of a Junior Collector on privilege leave, will move up one place and continue to act in a furlough vacancy, while the First Assistant whose appointment to act was directly due to the furlough vacancy will be held to be acting in a privilege leave vacancy.

3. It now remains to notice some of the provisos and exceptions by which the effect of Section 5 is restricted and some of the cases to which it has been specially applied. By note (2) below the section it is applied to the allowances given to an officer under Section 41 for the charge of the current duties of another office in addition to his own, and the Government of India has ruled that it also applies to any increase of salary to which an officer may be entitled under Section 40 (b) for discharging the duties of another appointment in the same office or on the same establishment; but it does not affect the increased emoluments which may otherwise be drawn by the incumbent of plural appointments under Section 39 nor the amount of any local allowances which may go with an acting appointment. Its application is also in all cases subject to the proviso that during the first 30 days the salary of the acting officer be not less than half the pay of the appointment in which he acts or than the salary which but for his acting appointment would be admissible to him, nor more than the salary admissible after the first 30 days. In cases where the acting officer has been transferred from another station it has also been so far modified as to let him draw three-fourths of the full acting allowances, an officer who is appointed to act in a higher appointment immediately on his return from furlough or special leave being regarded as having been transferred.

4. It will be seen from the above remarks that it is not by any means obvious in all cases whether an officer is acting in a privilege leave or in a furlough vacancy, and in all doubtful cases the question must be deferred until the dates of all transfers of charge consequent upon leave have been ascertained, and the results embodied in the monthly Gradation List. Considerable delay is often experienced in obtaining the necessary data from the officers, and as no further action can be taken by my office until the Gradation List has been approved of by Government, some delay in communicating to acting officers the salaries to which they are entitled is unavoidable.

In appending for your information and guidance a copy of the Government of India, Military Department, letter No 1854-D., dated 2nd November 1885, to the address of the Adjutant General in India (copy of which has been received in this office under their Financial Endorsement No. 3939 of the 19th November 1885), I have the honour to intimate that the amount of cheques drawn for the purchase of remounts by the President of each Committee should be debited against his personal Head under "Advances Recoverable" "Miscellaneous Advances," the amount being adjusted by the President directly with the Treasury in the manner prescribed in the letter referred to.

Copy of letter No. 1854-D., dated 2nd November 1885, from the Government of India, Military Department, to the Adjutant General in India.

"In reply to your letter No. 3587-B., (Native Army—Horses), dated the 19th October 1885, I am directed to state, for the information of the Commander-in-Chief, that the Government of India approve of the suggestion that the President of each Committee purchasing remounts for Native Cavalry Regiments at horse fairs to be held during the ensuing cold season, be authorized to draw cheques on local treasuries for the total amount required to pay for remounts bought at each fair, and to settle with sellers on the spot. The President should notify to commanding officers the amount due from each ; but he should himself adjust the advances received from the treasuries, which should be treated as personal advances, and not come into the Military Accounts."

In my Circular letter No. 16, dated 9th April 1885, I had the honour to forward to you a form in which, since 1st April last, objections raised on Gazetted Officers' bills have been communicated directly to them, thus avoiding delay and relieving Treasury Officers of the labour of communicating such objections.

2. That form having been found of advantage, I now propose to extend the system from 1st January 1886 to all cases in which the intervention of the Treasury Officer is unnecessary, and I enclose specimens of the Memoranda which in such cases will issue from my Treasury Account Department.

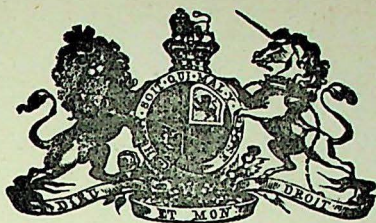
