GENERAL DEPARTMENT.

No. 476.—Her Majesty the QUEEN EMPRESS has been pleased to appoint the Right Honourable the LORD HARRIS to be Governor of the Presidency of Bombay.

Bombay Castle, 25th January 1890.

No. 426.—His Excellency the Governor in Council is pleased to cancel Government Notification, General Department, dated 16th August 1869, published at pages 933 to 938 of the *Bombay Government Gazette* dated 19th idem, Part I, so far as it declared the ferry at Bedkibal in the

Chikodi Taluka of the Belgaum Collectorate to be a public ferry under Act II of 1868.

Bombay Castle, 29th January 1890.

No. 473.—The following rules for regulating the marriage expenses of the Kadva Kanbi caste in the districts of Ahmedabad and Kaira having been confirmed by the Governor General in Council under Section 3 of Act VIII of 1870 are hereby published for general information.

These rules shall come into force on the 1st February 1890, and shall apply to the Kadva Kaubis in all villages of the Ahmedabad and Kaira districts:—

“1. The chānillo to be given at betrothal by the father or guardian of the bride to the father or guardian of the bridegroom shall not exceed Re. 1 and seven soparis or betel-nuts.

2. The marriage chánllo to be paid by the father or guardian of the bride to the father or guardian of the bridegroom may be Re. 1 and shall not exceed Rs. 101, and one rupee on account of the fee to the Unja Mátá shall be deducted from the amount so paid.

3. The value of the cocoanuts to be distributed among the marriage procession or at other places on the occasion may be Re. 1 and shall not exceed Rs. 10.

Mosálu is a marriage present by the bride's maternal relations.

4. The expenses of the 'Mosálu' may be Re. 1 and shall not exceed Rs. 10 on all accounts.

Chhedo Jhaláman means the ceremony when the bridegroom touches the fringe of his mother-in-law's dress.

5. The payment on account of 'Chhedo Jhaláman' may be Re. 1 and shall not exceed Rs. 2.

Mahi Mátlu is the gift of an earthen pot with eatables at the time of the departure of the bridegroom's party after the marriage is over.

6. The payment on account of 'Mahi Mátlu' may be Re. 1 and shall not exceed Rs. 5.

Parat means the gift of metal vessels at the departure of the bridegroom after the marriage is over.

7. The payment on account of Parat may be Re. 1 and shall not exceed Rs. 5.

8. The amount to be paid to the bride's mother-in-law on account of 'Pagé Payanu' may be Re. 1 and shall not exceed Rs. 7.

Pagé Payanu means a gift to be paid at the time of prostration of the bride before her mother-in-law.

9. Not more than 5 Dasaiyán or dinner parties shall be given by the bride's family to the bridegroom's and the number of guests at each shall not exceed 25.

10. The expenses of the Ján or marriage party going to the bride's village and defrayed by the bride's family may be Re. 1 but shall not exceed Rs. 30, besides not more than five dinner parties as mentioned in Rule 9, provided that if the party stays longer, more dinner parties may be given on condition that the total number of meals given does not exceed 125.

11. The amount to be paid on all accounts to the bridegroom's friends on the occasion of the bride's going to her husband's house with her first child may be Re. 1 and shall not exceed Rs. 11. Besides this the bride's father may give a present of clothes and ornaments.

12. The 'Nátra' Chánllo to be given by the father or guardian of the bride to the father or guardian of the bridegroom or to the bridegroom himself may be Re. 1 and shall not exceed Rs. 100. Ornaments should be bought with this money which will be the wife's property during her life and after her death will belong to her husband.

13. The father or guardian of the bride shall not take any money from the bridegroom or from the parents or guardian of the bridegroom or guardian of the bridegroom on account of giving his daughter.

14. On any occasion when the bridegroom is invited to his father-in-law's house the amount to be paid to him as 'Págdi' shall not exceed Rs. 2. He shall not take with him more than five men.

* Lit: Turban.

15. Nothing in the above rules shall prevent the acceptance of customary presents of sweetmeats, &c., on the usual occasions or of such assistance or allowance as the bride's father may wish to give or make when his daughter and her husband set up house for themselves: provided that such gifts shall not be claimable under any pretext and that they shall not be used by or applied for the use or benefit of the bridegroom's father.

16. Every betrothal or marriage or nátra shall be reported to the Taláti for registration without fee and the amount of the chánllo agreed upon shall be stated at the same time."

Notice to Mariners.

No. 1.—The following Notice to Mariners, dated 1st January 1890, issued by the Port Officer, Aden, is published for general information:—

"On the 15th February 1890 the temporary light-vessel moored off Ras Morbut, Aden Harbour, will be replaced by the permanent light-ship. The vessel is moored in 18 feet at low water and shows, at an elevation of 39 feet above the sea, a flashing white light visible every minute. The vessel is painted red, but has no red ball at mast-head and exhibits no red flag during the day, as stated at page 90, Chapter IV, third Edition of the Gulf of Aden Pilot."

"Intimation has been received from the Consul General for Italy that a light visible at 6 miles distance to indicate the north entry of the Massowah Channel has been placed on the N.E. end of the Island of Difein. The light is in latitude 16° 37' 8" N. and longitude 39° 18' 15" E. Arc of illumination 195 degrees, leaving a dark sector between the 65° and 250°."

No. 4.—The following Notice to Mariners, dated 21st December 1889, issued by Her Majesty's Colonial Government, Ceylon, is published for general information:—

"Notice is hereby given that on and after December 25th, 1889, until February 28th, 1890, a red buoy, with a red flag and the words 'Torpedo Buoy' painted on it, will be placed in the entrance to Trincomalee Harbour between Osterburg Point and Little Sober Island, and 260 yards from the former.

No. 300.—In accordance with Rule 9 of the rules prescribed in the Notification of the Government of India in the Department of Finance and Commerce No. 15, dated 1st January 1889, republished in the *Bombay Government Gazette* of the 10th idem under No. 116, dated 9th idem, Financial Department, His Excellency the Governor in Council is pleased to publish the following application from the Municipal Commissioners of Ahmedabad for the grant of a loan of Rs. 1,50,000 under the provisions of the Local Authorities Loan Act, 1879 :—

“To

THE SECRETARY TO GOVERNMENT,

BOMBAY.

Municipal Office, Ahmedabad, 12th December 1889.

SIR,

We, the President and the members of the Managing Committee of the Ahmedabad Municipality, beg to apply to Government under the Local Authorities Loan Act of 1879 and Government Resolution dated 28th January 1889, for a grant of loan for Rs. 1,50,000.

2. The loan is required for the construction of a portion of Drainage Scheme sanctioned by Government Resolution dated 12th October 1889, No. 4149.

3. The funds on the security of which the amount is to be borrowed are levied by this Municipality under Act VI of 1873 and Act II of 1884.

4. The loan asked for may be advanced partly in the current year and the rest in the next official year.

5. The loan will be repaid with interest in 30 years.

6. It is hoped that Government will be pleased to grant the loan applied for at the interest of $4\frac{1}{2}$ per cent., and therefore the amount of annual equal instalments to be paid by the Municipality in liquidation of the principal and interest for 30 years will be Rs. 9,208.

7. As a special tax is sanctioned by Government for the removal of sullage water, it is estimated that an annual income of about Rs. 20,000 will be obtained from this source from which the above-mentioned instalment can be paid.

8. Statements showing the annual receipts and expenditure of this Municipality for the last three years are submitted herewith, from which it will appear that the average of our ordinary receipts is Rs. 2,38,993-4-9 and that of the expenditure is Rs. 2,01,863-11-11, leaving a surplus of Rs. 37,129-8-10.

9. Existing prior charges on this Municipality are :—

(1) A loan of Rs. 4,00,000 sanctioned in 1888, for the payment of which Rs. 26,000 per annum are set aside.

(2) A loan of Rs. 3,00,000 is sanctioned to be raised to complete the water-works, but this loan has not yet been subscribed fully. An annual instalment of Rs. 19,515 will be required for this loan. The Municipality will be easily able to meet more than this from the water-fees and saving to be effected in the cost of watering roads.

10. A reference to the President's letter No. 755, dated 9th September 1889, to the address of the Collector, and Government Resolution dated 22nd October 1889, No. 4269, will show that this Municipality will be fully able to meet all prior charges.

11. This loan of Rs. 1,50,000 for drainage works has already been duly sanctioned by Government in their Resolution dated 12th October 1889, No. 4149, to be raised in open market; but as the work for which this loan is wanted is such that Government themselves can grant it on much more favourable terms, as shown in Government Resolution dated 28th January 1879, No. 390, and its accompaniments, the Municipality is respectfully induced to make this formal application for the same.
