GENERAL DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 19th March 1890.

No. 1124.—In exercise of the power conferred by Section 12 of Bombay Act VI of 1867 (an Act for the better sanitary regulation of the City of Bombay) and in modification of the order made under the said section in Notification No. 3364, dated 15th September 1884 (published at page 695 of the *Bombay Government Gazette* dated 18th idem, Part I), the Governor in Council is pleased to determine that scarlet fever and measles, as well as cholera and small-pox, shall for the purposes of the said Act be held to be infectious diseases dangerous to life.

And in exercise of the power conferred by Section 11 of the said Act the Governor in Council is pleased to direct that the following

sentence be added to No. 2 of the Rules made and promulgated in the Notification aforesaid, viz. :—

“For the disinfection of a vessel or of any part of a vessel by fumigation, not less than one pound of sulphur shall be used for every 1,000 cubic feet of space to be disinfected.”

No. 10.—The following Notice to Mariners is published for general information:—

West Coast of India.

Information has been received from the Commissioner of Customs that a fixed green light was exhibited from the 6th August 1889 on Alsbâg Fort Signal Station.

It is elevated 32 feet above the sea, and should be visible in clear weather from a distance of 4 miles between the bearings of N by W $\frac{1}{2}$ W and N by E $\frac{1}{2}$ E.

This light is for the benefit of fishing boats and coasting craft making for Alibâg roads.

(The bearings are magnetic.)

(a) To revoke Nos. 4, 6, 7, 15, 17, 19, 20*, 21, 22, 23*, 24*, 27, 44, 45, 47*, 48, 49, 50, 51, 56*, 68, 69, 70, 71, 72*, 73, 74, 75, 76, 77, 78, 79, 80, 81, 82*, 83, 84 and 85—and also Nos. 3, 4, 5 and 6 of the Bye-laws published in Government Notification No. 84 in the *Bombay Government Gazette* of 22nd October 1885, page 1,225.

(b) To alter the prefatory note No. 2 by omitting the last eight words “in regard to the Port and Pilotage Departments.”

For prefatory notes see Government Notifications Nos. 10 of 28th February 1880 and 51 of 24th June 1886.

(c) To alter prefatory note No. 3 by substituting “Master Pilots” for “Harbour Masters:” and by adding the words “when employed on duty in connection with vessels using the Docks.”

(d) To substitute the following for prefatory note No. 4:—

“A Harbour Master shall be permanently attached to the Port Office.

“There shall be two permanent Master Pilots, who shall do duty alternately at the Wet

Docks, to be called No. 2, or the Dock Station, and on board the Pilot Schooner, to be called No. 3, or the Outer Station.

“One additional Master Pilot shall be appointed to officiate during the S. W. Monsoon, from 1st June to 30th September, and during that period the three Master Pilots shall do duty in periodical rotation at the Port, Dock and Outer Station.

“The Port Office shall be called No. 1 Station.”

(e) For Bye-law No. 1 to substitute the following:—“At the

For Bye-law No. 1 see Government Notification No. 10, dated 28th February 1880. Port Station—The Harbour Master’s

duties shall be to see that all vessels are properly berthed and moored in the Harbour, for which purpose he shall frequently visit and inspect the Shipping and Port generally; to keep the Outer Station informed of berths vacated and available for the several classes of inward-bound vessels; to exercise supervision over the Light-ship, the Anchor Hoy and all launches, boats, buoys, moorings (including those at the Anchor ground) and to perform the measuring duties. In the event of a fire or an accident to the Shipping in the Harbour, he shall attend at the spot and shall give directions and advice and render assistance. He shall have supervision of the Pilot schooners which are not in use, and shall assist generally in the management of the Pilot Establishment ashore.

“The duties of the Master Pilot at the Port Station during the S. W. Monsoon shall be to convey Pilots to or from the Outer Station when it is necessary to employ the second schooner for that purpose, and (when his services may be available) to transport in Harbour such vessels as require to be piloted to or from the different Dry Docks or from one berth to another.

“During the N. E. Monsoon the general transporting duties in the Harbour shall be performed by the running Pilots.”

See remark against (e). (f) For Bye-law No. 2 to substitute the following:—“At the

Dock Station—The Master Pilot shall, under the orders of the Dock Masters, arrange the position in which vessels intending to enter the Wet Dock are to be anchored off the Dock Channel, and shall transport vessels to and from the Docks as required and assist in docking and undocking vessels.”

(g) For Bye-law No. 3 to substitute the following:—“At the Outer

For Bye-law No. 3 see Government Notification No. 10 of 28th February 1880. Station—The Master Pilot shall have

charge of the schooner and the control of the Tender vessel and Pilots at the Outer Station, and be responsible and use his utmost endeavours to supply Pilots to in-bound and to receive Pilots from out-bound vessels. He shall keep such complement of Pilots on board the schooner

as may be ordered from time to time, and arrange for the return to the Harbour of others not required. He shall remain on his station for such periods as may be ordered, leaving it (unless under exceptional circumstances) only when relieved by another Master Pilot in the fair season, or during the S. W. Monsoon when relieved by another vessel."

- (h) For Bye-law No. 12A to substitute the following:—"If the Master of a steamer of the above description is in charge of the same as a Pilot

For Bye-laws Nos. 12A to 12C see Government Notification No. 54, dated 3rd October 1884.

for the Outer Harbour, under a Pilot's license granted by the Board, he shall indicate that fact on such steamer arriving within signal distance by hoisting signals as follows:—

"By day, a blue flag at her fore; by night, two lights at the fore, six feet apart, red uppermost and white below.

"On the day signal required by this Bye-law being hoisted, a Pilot will be immediately ordered to board such steamer abreast of the Sunk Rock Light and will take her to her berth, or elsewhere in the Harbour as may be required.

"On the night signal required by this Bye-law being hoisted, notice shall be sent from the Signal Station, Colába, to Bankshall for a Pilot, who will board her near the Sunk Rock Light and take her to her berth or elsewhere in the Harbour as may be required."

- (i) For Bye-law No. 12B to substitute the following:—"On the Pilot belonging to the ordinary Pilot Service leaving such vessel outward-bound at the Sunk Rock Light, the Master in charge of the vessel as a Pilot for the Outer Harbour, under a Pilot's license granted by the Board, shall indicate that fact by hoisting signals as follows:—

"By day, a blue flag at the fore; at night, two lights, one above the other, at the fore.

"Such signals on a vessel outward-bound will indicate that the vessel on which they are hoisted is in charge of a licensed Pilot who is also the Master of the vessel, and that it is therefore unnecessary to send a boat to bring him back."

- (j) To alter Bye-law No. 12C by omitting the second clause from the words "He must hoist, &c." to the end.

- (k) For Bye-law No. 18 to substitute the following:—"When Probationers are appointed to be acting Pilots, they shall receive the pay of

the class of the Pilots in which they may be acting, and shall otherwise be amenable to the rules laid down for observance by Pilots."

- (l) To alter Bye-law No. 25 by omitting all before the words "every verbal order" and by inserting the word "shall" between "Department" and "be."

For Bye-law No. 25 see Government Notification No. 10 of 28th February 1880 and Government Notification No. 51 of 24th June 1886.

- (m) To alter Bye-law No. 30 by leaving out all after the word "Commanders" and substituting the following:—"So far as can be done without endangering the vessel or without leading to inconvenience or to the infringement of orders received from the Department."

For Bye-law No. 30 see Government Notification No. 10 of 28th February 1880 and Government Notification No. 48 of 13th July 1888.

- (n) To alter Bye-law No. 34 by omitting all the words after "Shipping at night."

- (o) To substitute the following for Bye-law No. 46:—"No Pilot after he has once taken charge of an in-bound vessel shall quit it until it has been received into Dock or properly berthed in the Harbour: unless he has received from an officer of the Board an order to leave the vessel in charge of the Commander."

For Bye-law No. 53 see Government Notification No. 10 of 28th February 1880 and Government Notification No. 1, dated 9th January 1885.

- (p) To alter Bye-law No. 53 by omitting the last sentence from "In this case..." down to "...vessel."

- (q) To alter Bye-law No. 54 by omitting the third sentence from "In this case" down to "...attendance upon the vessel."

5. On His Royal Highness reaching the shore a Royal Salute of 31 guns will be fired from the Saluting Battery. A Guard of Honour of British Infantry with Band and Colours will be mounted at the Bandar head. His Royal Highness will proceed along the Esplanade Road as far as the Post Office and thence by the Queen's Road to Malabár Point. Under the orders of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief the Brigadier-General Commanding the Bombay District will make arrangements for the roads to be followed by His Royal Highness as far as the Post Office being lined with the troops in Garrison and the Volunteers.

6. His Royal Highness will be received at the Bandar by His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief and Staff, by His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief of Her Majesty's Naval Forces, East India Station, and Staff, by the Chief Justice of Bombay, the Lord Bishop of Bombay, the Members of Council, the Judges of the High Court, the Additional Members of the Council of His Excellency the Governor for making Laws and Regulations, the Vice-Chancellor of the University of Bombay, the Secretaries to Government, the Brigadier-General Commanding the Bombay District, the Director of the Indian Marine, the President of the Municipal Corporation, the Private Secretary and the Staff of His Excellency the Governor, the Municipal Commissioner of Bombay, the Sheriff of Bombay, the Chairman of the Standing Committee, the Under Secretaries to Government and the Heads of Departments, Civil and Military, or by such of the above high officials as are then in the Presidency Town, for whom a space marked A will be reserved.

7. The Consular representatives of Foreign Governments are invited to be present on the occasion, and a space marked B will be reserved for them.

8. All officers of Her Majesty's Services, Civil, Naval, Military and the Indian Marine and officers belonging to Corps of Volunteers then in Bombay and not otherwise on duty are desired to attend. To all such who wish to attend cards of admission to space C will be supplied on application to the Executive Engineer of the Presidency. The same officer will also issue cards of admission to space A to any Heads of Departments not specified by name in paragraph 6 who may intimate that they will be present. For the Consular representatives and all others mentioned above no cards will be necessary. As far as accommodation in space D is available, it will be allotted to any ladies or gentlemen who may apply for tickets to the Executive Engineer.

9. His Royal Highness will proceed to Government House, Malabár Point, escorted by a detachment of His Excellency the Governor's Body Guard and of the Bombay Light Horse. The detachment of the Light Horse will fall out at the Church Gate Station. A Guard of Honor of Bombay Infantry will be mounted at Government House, Malabár Point. POLITICAL DEPARTMENT.

No. 1986.—His Royal Highness Prince ALBERT VICTOR CHRISTIAN EDWARD OF WALES, K.G., K.P., will take his departure from Bombay in the P. and O. S. N. Company's *S. S. Assam* on the 28th instant.

2. The arrangements connected with the departure of His Royal Highness from Government House will be made by the Military Secretary to His Excellency the Governor and will be timed so that His Royal Highness may embark from the Apollo Bandar at 4-45 p. m. (Local time). The Director of the Indian Marine should be requested to consult with His Excellency the Naval Commander-in-Chief and act in concert with him in arranging the details of embarkation. The arrangements at the Bandar will be made by the Public Works Department.

3. His Royal Highness, escorted by a detachment of His Excellency the Governor's Body Guard and by a detachment of the Bombay Light Horse, which will join at the Church Gate Station, will proceed along the Queen's Road past the Post Office and along the Esplanade Road to the Apollo Bandar. A Guard of Honour of British Infantry with Band and Colours will be mounted at the Apollo Bandar, and a royal salute of 31 guns will be fired on the embarkation taking place.

4. A deputation consisting of the Chief Secretary to Government, the Military Secretary to His Excellency the Governor, and one of His Excellency's Aides-de-Camp will accompany His Royal Highness on board the *S. S. Assam*. Under the orders of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief the

Brigadier-General Commanding the Bombay District will make arrangements for the roads from the Post Office to the Apollo Bandar being lined with the troops in Garrison and the Volunteers.

5. His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief in Bombay and Staff, His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief of H. M.'s Naval Forces, East India Station, and Staff, the Chief Justice of Bombay, the Lord Bishop of Bombay, the Members of Council, the Judges of the High Court, the Additional Members of the Council of His Excellency the Governor for making Laws and Regulations, the Vice-Chancellor of the University of Bombay, the Secretaries to Government, the Brigadier-General Commanding the Bombay District, the Director of the Indian Marine, the President of the Bombay Municipal Corporation, the Private Secretary and Staff of His Excellency the Governor, the Municipal Commissioner of Bombay, the Sheriff of Bombay, the Chairman of the Standing Committee, the Under Secretaries to Government, and Heads of Departments, Civil and Military, or such of the above high officials as are then in the Presidency town will assemble at the Apollo Bandar for the purpose of taking leave of His Royal Highness. For all these high officials a space marked A will be reserved. The Consular Representatives of Foreign Governments are invited to be present on the occasion, and a space marked B will be reserved for them.

6. All officers of Her Majesty's Services, Civil, Naval, Military, and the Indian Marine, and officers belonging to Corps of Volunteers then in Bombay and not otherwise on duty are desired to attend. To all such who are able to attend, cards of admission to space C will be supplied on application to the Executive Engineer of the Presidency. The same officer will also issue cards of admission to space A to any Heads of Departments not specified by name in paragraph 5, who may intimate that they will be present. For the Consular Representatives of Foreign Governments and all others mentioned above no cards will be necessary. As far as the accommodation in space D is available, it will be allotted to any ladies or gentlemen who may apply for tickets to the Executive Engineer.

7. The Municipal Corporation of Bombay having expressed a desire to present a farewell address to His Royal Highness, a space marked E will be reserved on the Bandar to which His Royal Highness will be conducted and where he will be received by the representatives of the Corporation. The Executive Engineer will send a card of admission to each member of the Corporation whose name is communicated to him by the President of the Corporation.

8. The Commissioner of Police, Bombay, will arrange for the maintenance of order.

9. Full dress will be worn by all Civil officers of Government entitled to wear uniform, summer dress in Review order by Military Officers and the troops, and morning dress by all others.
