1. The Bombay Art Society will hold an Exhibition of Industrial Art in March 1890, during the visit to this City of His Royal Highness Prince Albert Victor of Wales, and invite contributions, for exhibition, of good specimens of such Art.

2. The Society will be glad, in the first instance, to receive from intending exhibitors a statement of the articles they are prepared to exhibit.

3. Articles sent for sale must be of Oriental manufacture.

4. Exhibits may, if the Exhibitors desire, be offered for sale, subject to a deduction of 5 per cent. commission for the Society. All sales must be effected through the Honorary Secretary and no article will be delivered until payment has been made. Stalls may, however, be secured for the sale of articles on payment of rent, the terms of which must be arranged with the Honorary Secretary. No commission will be charged on articles sold at these Stalls.

5. Each case of articles or exhibits should be accompanied or preceded by a schedule of its contents in the enclosed form. This schedule should reach the Assistant Honorary Secretary before the 1st of March, in order to ensure insertion in the catalogue, and it will greatly assist the Committee if intending Exhibitors will send such schedules as early as possible.

6. The last day for receiving exhibits will be the 10th March 1890.

7. The Committee will use every endeavour to ensure the careful handling of exhibits, but they will not be responsible for damage or loss. All charges for transmission on goods sent for sale must be paid by the sender; but when articles are offered on loan, the Committee will be prepared, on special application being made to them, to consider if they can pay carriage on such articles as may be accepted.

8. Unsold articles will be packed and returned, at owner's risk, to the address of contributors, bearing.

9. The Committee reserve the right to refuse to exhibit such articles as they may consider unsuitable.

10. The Exhibition is expected to be open for about ten days.
