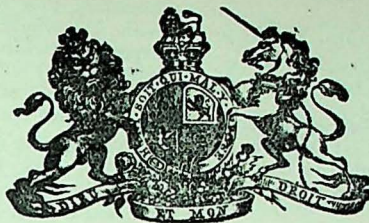

GENERAL DEPARTMENT.

No. 1687.—The following rules, framed by the municipalities of Lárkhána, Kambar and Ratodero, in accordance with the provisions of Section 3 of the Wild Birds Protection Act XX of 1887, are published for general information :—

I.—1. For the purposes of the said Act in its application to the municipalities of—

Lárkhána,
Kambar,
Rato-dero,

(a) "Wild bird" means grey partridge, black partridge, quail, snipe, wild duck or wild goose.

(b) The "breeding season" means, in the case of a—

- (1) Grey partridge, from 15th March to 15th September.
- (2) Black partridge, from 15th March to 15th September.
- (3) Quail, from 1st May to 1st September.
- (4) Snipe, from 1st April to 1st October.
- (5) Wild duck, from 1st April to 1st October.
- (6) Wild goose, from 1st April to 1st October.

II.—(a) No one shall, within the limits of the said municipalities, possess or sell during its breeding season any wild bird which has been recently killed or taken.

(b) No one shall import into the said municipalities the plumage of any wild bird during its breeding season.

III.—A breach of Rule II(a) or Rule II(b) shall be punished with fine which may extend—

(a) in the case of a first offence to five rupees in respect of every wild bird possessed or sold in breach of Rule II(a), or of which the plumage has been imported in breach of Rule II(b), and

(b) in the case of a subsequent offence to ten rupees in respect of every such bird or plumage.

No. 1688.—In accordance with the provisions of Section 53 (2) and (3) of the Native Passenger Ships Act X of 1887 the Governor in Council is pleased to publish for general information the following draft of the rules which, with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council, Government propose to make for observance by coasting steamers sailing under general passes granted to them under the provisions of Section 164 of the Sea Customs Act VIII of 1878 when embarking or discharging passengers at the ports under the control of the Collector of Salt Revenue, Bombay Presidency. Persons who have any objections to urge to them are required to communicate the same in writing to the Chief Secretary to Government before the 1st June 1890:—

I.—The owner of every such steamer shall provide two separate gangways on each side, two fore and two aft.

II.—It shall be the duty of the master of every such steamer to have two of such gangways, one fore and one aft, lowered immediately after the signal referred to in Rule I of the Rules issued under Section 6 of the Indian Ports Act X of 1889 (Government Notification No. 1735 of the 5th March 1890) is exhibited.

III.—No master of such vessel shall permit passengers to embark except by the aft gangway so lowered, or shall permit passengers to be discharged except by the fore gangway.

Every owner of such steamer shall for every breach of Rule No. I of these Rules be punished with fine which may extend to two hundred rupees and, when the breach continues, shall be punished with a further fine which may extend to twenty rupees for every day after the first during which the breach continues.

Every master of such steamer shall for every breach of Nos. II and III of these Rules be punished with a fine which may extend to two hundred rupees.

*No. 1688A.—In exercise of the powers conferred by Section 6 of the Native Passenger Ships Act X of 1887, and for the purposes of clause (2) (a) of Section 53 of the said Act, His Excellency the Governor in Council is pleased to appoint the ports under the control of the Collector of Salt Revenue, Bombay Presidency, to be ports for the embarkation and discharge of passengers by coasting steam ships sailing under general passes granted under the provisions of Section 164 of the Sea Customs Act VIII of 1878.

No. 30.—The following Notice to Mariners is published for general information:—

RED SEA.

Dangerous Shoal south-eastward of Zebayir Islands.

Information has been received through the Political Resident, Aden, that Commander W. U. Moore, H. M.'s surveying vessel *Penguin*, reports that a Coral Shoal with 22 feet water over it has been discovered in latitude 14° 57' 24" N., longitude 42° 20' 21" E. From it the summit of Zebayir bears N.W. by W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W. distant 10.7 miles. This shoal has not been thoroughly examined; it should be avoided, and vessels should not pass eastward of the Zebayir Islands.

(Bearings are magnetic.)

"Simla, the 25th April 1890.

No. 1377-I.—In exercise of the powers conferred by sections 4 and 5 of the Foreign Jurisdiction and Extradition Act, XXI of 1879, and of all other powers enabling him in this behalf, the Governor-General in Council is pleased to apply the provisions of the Cantonments Act, XIII of 1889, so far as circumstances admit, to the Cantonment of Deesa, subject to the following modifications:

(1) For the words 'Local Government' wherever they occur the words 'Governor of Bombay in Council' shall be substituted.

(2) For section 4 the following words shall be substituted:

'4. The Governor of Bombay in Council, with the previous sanction of the Governor-General in Council, may, by notification in the official Gazette, define or alter the limits of the Cantonment of Deesa for the purposes of this Act and of all other enactments for the time being in force.'

(3) For section 7 the following section shall be substituted:

'7. The Cantonment Magistrate shall be such person as the Governor of Bombay in Council from time to time, by name or in virtue of his office, appoints in this behalf, and shall exercise the powers of a District Magistrate and such other powers described in the Code of Criminal Procedure, 1882, as the Governor of Bombay in Council may from time to time confer upon him.'

(4) For the first portion of section 8 down to and including the word 'order' the following words shall be substituted:

'8. The Governor of Bombay in Council may appoint the Cantonment Magistrate to be the Judge of the Court of Small Causes in the Cantonment of Deesa, and shall in his order.'

(5) For section 12 the following section shall be substituted:

'12. (a) All the provisions of Bombay Act, VII of 1867, or the corresponding law for the time being in force in Bombay, shall be applicable to the Police-force employed in the Cantonment of Deesa.

'(b) The administration of the Police-force in the Cantonment of Deesa shall be vested in such person as the Governor of Bombay in Council, by name or in virtue of his office, appoints in this behalf, subject to the general control and direction of the Commanding Officer of the Cantonment.'

(6) In section 17, for the words 'the territories administered by such Government' each time they occur the words 'British India' shall be substituted.

(7) In sub-section (1) of section 18, for the words 'any cantonment which is not included in a municipality and which is situated in any part of British India in which that Act is in force' the words 'the Cantonment of Deesa' shall be substituted.

(8) For sub-sections (1) and (2) of section 27 the following shall be substituted, namely:

'(1) Whenever the Governor-General in Council has, by a notification in the *Gazette of India*, extended under section 25 any enactment in any form to any cantonment or any part of any cantonment in British India, or made under section 26 any rule for any such cantonment or any part of any such cantonment, the Governor-General in Council may, by notification in the *Gazette of India*, declare the enactment or rule so extended or made to be in force in the Cantonment of Deesa or any part thereof, subject to such restrictions and modifications, if any, as he thinks fit.

'(2) The enactment or rule shall thereupon, in accordance with such declaration, be in force in the Cantonment of Deesa or the part thereof, as the case may be, until the Governor-General in Council otherwise directs.'

II.—For the purpose of facilitating the application of the Cantonments Act, 1889, in the Cantonment of Deesa, any Court in the said Cantonment may construe it with such alterations not affecting the substance as may be necessary or proper to adapt it to the matter before the Court.

III.—So much of the notification of the Government of India in the Foreign Department, No. 403-I, dated 4th February 1885, as extended the Cantonments Act, III of 1880, to the Cantonment of Deesa, and the portion of sub-section (1) of section 4 of the Deesa Small Cause Court Law, 1889, from and after the words 'and shall be deemed' to the end of the sub-section, are hereby cancelled.
